Advice

- Limit yourself to one or two key ideas that you want your audience to remember
- Tell a story to illustrate those ideas. We all like stories more than lectures laden with statistics
- Keep it short. Remember that people are sitting in the hot sun and looking forward to post-graduation celebrations. They'll appreciate brevity
- Be relevant. Talk about major events that happened over the past four years, both worldwide and on campus. Also, given today's economy you might want to offer some practical advice. But...
- Don't give too much advice. This is the time to offer hope.
- Thank the parents. They have been through a lot. It will mean a lot. And above all...
- Avoid Cliches. Don't even think of saying "spread your wings"....
