Longtime OPIS parent, Spike Ward, recently published on her blog this essay about her son, Max, and his experience at Oak Park Independent School. With her permission, we have included it here as a testimonial about the benefits our school has to offer to families seeking quality, alternative public education.

OPIS is a very small, publicly funded, independent school, located in Oak Park, a small city adjacent to Thousand Oaks. At the beginning of each new school year, my son is given a stack of textbooks by his new teacher, who will meet with him on a weekly basis to go over the work that he did for the week, and then give him instructions on what he needs to do for the coming week. He takes the standardized spring tests, just like the kids in traditional schools do. His schedule is flexible, leaving him time to pursue other interests, such as college courses (and other classes like his Mandarin lessons, music, etc.). and sleep in. Unlike most teenagers his age, he gets up when he's ready to in the morning, fully alert and ready for the day. He is in charge of his own schedule, taking public transportation most of the time, and is very focused and committed to his education.

The end result: my son has embraced his education as HIS OWN. Unlike the average public school student, school is not something that gets done to him, but something that he is in control of. He is no longer doing time; he is being educated. Last year he started taking community college classes. He loves it because everybody there wants to be there. School is not being done to them. He's successful. He's in charge. Not the LAUSD. Not the UTLA. Not even

us anymore. He is. That's what I really hoped would happen for him after taking this plunge; he would take charge of his own education. I am so very proud of him, and I know, without a doubt, that this story would have had a much different outcome if we had sent him to the neighborhood middle and high schools. He would have gone and done his time, uninspired, with no time after school to pursue Mandarin and astronomy. He'd just be another lost kid in LAUSD.

I'll always be an advocate for public education, but I want to see the whole system torn down and rebuilt. I especially want to see justice for all of the invisible kids of my community who don't have moms like me who'd go to such lengths to make sure they get a great education. But as a parent, I won't be sacrificing my kids at the altar of LAUSD. I won't martyr either one of them for the cause. In order to do right by my son, I needed to get him out of public school. Homeschool was the best thing we could have ever done for him. In the six years that we have been homeschooling, we have never doubted ourselves, or him.

Life After OPIS

Simi ValleyLandfill and Recycling Center

Who would have guessed that a place where **2500 TONS** of trash is dumped daily would be a great place to visit? That's what OPIS families discovered on October 14th as they toured the **Simi Valley Landfill and Recycling Center** in the comfort of a plush, air-conditioned bus.

Our enthusiastic guide shared a wealth of information as we bumped across the uneven dirt paths around the ever-expanding landfill. We learned that each person generates an average of 4.5 pounds of trash per day! At the Simi Landfill over 70% of this trash is recycled which is a good thing since some materials can take 500 years to decompose.

The landfill employs 2500 employees and 140 trash trucks, many of which are powered by the methane gas generated by the trash in the landfill. The methane gas also provides power to homes in the area. Each trash truck visits 800-1000 homes per day and makes two to three trips to the landfill each day.

Surprisingly, we detected no bad odors arising from the steaming trash. We learned this is because a wind-activated mister sprays water, a natural deodorant, on the waste. We saw a material called "auto shredder fluff" that is made from ground-up old cars that provides a cover for the trash at night.







Our tour ended with a display of items made from recycled materials and a quiz about what items can be recycled. The students left with a better understanding of the importance of recycling and the technology that is advancing to put our trash to work in creating alternative energy sources.

Aquarium of the Pacific

I had a great time on my first day of home school. I visited the Long Beach Aquarium. I felt the stingrays. They were swimming in a shallow pool. I could reach in and gently touch them with two fingers. They felt like soft fish. I also felt their spines. It was hard down their backs and on their heads.

I learned many things from a chart on the wall. I learned about shark teeth. I learned that otters like to play. I found it interesting that the rays' stingers are trimmed so they won't hurt people.

I saw the sharks swimming in the tank. They were gray and blue. I saw the bonnethead, blacktip reef, zebra, nurse, white-tip reef, fresh water sawfish, sand tiger, and white-spotted bamboo sharks.

The Long Beach Aquarium was fun because I got to feel the stingrays. I learned many things and saw many kinds of sharks.

Zachary Gordon is back! Not only is he back on the big screen in the sequel to **Diary** of a Wimpy Kid, but he is back at OPIS.

Zachary gained enormous attention as the title character in the 20th Century Fox film *Diary of a Wimpy Kid*, which released in 2010. Zachary began his film career in 2007 when he made his film debut in Georgia Rule, starring Jane Fonda, Felicity Huffman, and Lindsay Lohan, and won the Young Artists Award for best supporting actor for his performance.

Since then he has appeared in *National Treasure: Book of Secrets*, and *The Brothers Bloom*, where he played the younger version of Adrien Brody's character. His television appearances include guest-starring roles on *How I Met Your Mother, Desperate Housewives, 24* and *All of Us.*

Zachary also has a busy voiceover career. He is the voice of San San on Nickelodeon's *Ni Hao, Kai-lan,* a voice on Spike TV's Emmy Award-winning *Afro Samurai: Resurrection,* alongside Samuel L. Jackson, and is the voice of

Additionally, Zach has worked on Seth Green's *Robot Chicken*, voicing Charlie Brown, Linus and Franklin. He will be featured as the voice of Papi Jr. in the upcoming movie, *Beverly Hills Chihuahua 2*. Zachary was recently named this year's Variety's Power of Youth Honoree.

Additionally, while filming *Diary of a Wimpy Kid 2*, he received the Rising Star Award at the Danville Children's Film Festival. He will soon be honored at the USA Film Festival in Dallas, TX. In his spare time, Zachary enjoys basketball, roller-skating, ping-pong and sixties music, especially The Beatles. And, on top of his unbelievably demanding schedule, he manages to keep up with his schoolwork at OPIS!

He started the summer by winning the 108th So Cal Sectional Junior Championships in Fountain Valley, CA, entering as the 8th seed in the Boy's 10s. He was among the youngest players to be invited to the Pacific Zonal Championship (12s) in Tucson, AZ. He surprised himself with a record of 9-1 against top players in the nation. This certainly boosted his confidence for the rest of the season. In the fall, he won the Little Mo Nationals Championship in Austin, TX competing well against his peers in the 10s from all over the country. He also managed to see the Capitol while in Austin. He continued his success in the So Cal Doubles Sectionals in November, winning both in the Boys 10s doubles and mixed divisions, completing a rare "Triple Crown" (winning singles, doubles and mixed in the same age division in the same year). This accomplishment will be



recognized by the USTA in a special banquet in June 2011. He continues to train hard and improve all aspects of his game.
