With sunny skies and calm seas, Island Packers took us on a memorable half-day trip in which we were fortunate to see an abundance of wildlife. Shortly after our launch we came across two enormous stellar sea lions sunning themselves on a buoy. It is a rare sight to see these largest of the sea lion species in Southern California. The males can reach 11 feet in length and weigh up to 2500 pounds! Continuing our journey, we were often surrounded by hundreds of dolphins, swimming, jumping, and playing in the boat's wake! As our boat approached the islands we fulfilled the objective of the trip - observing three gray whales for about thirty minutes as they migrated south to Mexico where they will give birth and then return on the 5,000-mile trip back to Arctic waters. Field Trip Added



The Titanic Exhibit at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library in Simi Valley was the destination for our November field trip. Here we saw artifacts from the ill-fated 1912 voyage that have not been seen together since the ship's maiden voyage, as well as items from the 1997 movie. On display was "Alvin" the submersible that Dr. Ballard took to observe the wreckage, an original deck chair, the sheet music of the song, "Narcissus" which the band leader refused stop playing as the ship sank, John Jacob Astor's pocket watch, and much more!

In addition to the Titanic artifacts, we saw the library's annual Christmas tree exhibit called "An American Christmas."
25 trees with decorations depicting American history from 1700 - 2010 were on display. And, of course, no trip to the Reagan Library is complete without a walk through Air Force One.

I was first introduced to the Thirst Project by a friend. The Thirst Project is a charity that raises money to drill wells in Africa. There are over 663 million people who don't have access to safe drinking water and there are girls as young as eight who don't go to school because they have to walk miles each day to get water. When I read about the water crisis in 2014, I wanted to help. In a month, I raised \$8,000 to build one well in Africa. About nine months later, I started raising money again and was able to raise \$24,000 to build three more wells.

The Thirst Project is the largest youth water activism organization. In order to make sure that all of students' money goes straight to building wells, the board of directors donates the money needed for administrative costs. Over eight years, the organization has traveled to 320 schools and informed over 300,000 students. They also have built 920 wells and given 280,000 people clean water. The Thirst Project was founded in 2008 by seven 19 year-olds. I have had the opportunity to get to know one of the founders and it's great to see how passionate he is about ending the global water crisis.
