UC/CSU-Subject e NCAA	This course will teach basic signed concepts, grammar, grammatical facial features, fingerspelling, and the cultural aspect issues with shifting perspectives between the medical view of deafness and Deaf individuals who are native signers and culturally Deaf. Students will learn basic communication as well as storytelling. Total participation is mandatory in order to properly learn the language. Activities will include: students working in pairs or groups, role-playing, skits, storytelling, and impromptu presentations. In addition to written homework, students are expected to study/practice the language outside the classroom on a daily basis. Students will also be required to complete a book report and attend one out-of-class function.
