 San Francisco, Washington DC, Moscow, London, New York, the Netherlands, and Portugal.
- 3. Describe, interpret, and correctly apply 'International Terms of Diplomacy':

- 4. By what name is the set of rules and principles that guides the UN in its work known as?
- 5. What are the four main purposes of the United Nations?
- 6. What organization preceded the United Nations? Was it successful? Why or why not?
- 7. When and why was the United Nations officially established?
- 8. Where is the United Nations headquartered? What is an international zone?
- 9. Which languages are used at the United Nations and in what ways?
- 10. How is the United Nations funded? To what is most of the United Nations' budget devoted?
- 11. What is meant by human rights and what is the *common standard* on human rights known as?
- 12. Who is the current Secretary-General of the United Nations?
- 13. Who are the five permanent members of the Security Council?
- 14. What are the six major organs of the United Nations? What is the purpose and general function of each organ?

- 15. Why is it difficult for the United Nations to enforce human rights?

- 18. How does the United Nations attempt to deal with the concerns of lack of food and rapid population growth throughout the world?
