SERVICES AGREEMENT UCLA Lab School

Oak Park Unified School District (herein after referred to as "Client,") and The Regents of the University of California on behalf of the UCLA Lab School (hereinafter referred to as "University,") enter this service agreement this 26th day of August 2013 (hereinafter referred to as "Agreement,") and mutually agree as follows:

- The Client requires nine full days of Professional Development in Critical Thinking Institute (CTI), and two classroom observation days (to be determined) at the University throughout the academic year 2013-2014.
- 2. The University performs the services in the area of Professional Development required by this agreement.

<u>Description of Services</u> - The proposed Professional Development includes the following components:

- To learn how to access and manage information, think critically, solve complex problems, use technology effectively for living and working productively
- b. Facilitated workshops by UCLA Lab School Educators
- c. Collaboration and vertical articulation amongst participant educators
- In-class support where facilitators observe, demo, coach and/or debrief with teachers during and after lessons
- e. Support with planning and resources for inquiry-based lessons and/or units
- f. Analysis of student work and development of next steps
- g. Observations Days at UCLA Lab School to see inquiry-based teaching in action
- 3. This agreement is effective September 24, 2013 and shall continue in effect until termination on May 27, 2014 and shall not exceed the sum of \$36,295.00. The University proposes to provide nine 8:30am-3pm CTI professional development days, which includes a minimum thirty minute lunch break for the Client. The Client can invite its teachers and administrators to participate up to a total of 25 participants. The meeting location will be at the Client's site. The proposed meeting dates are as follows:

September 24, 2013

October 15, 2013

November 19, 2013

December 17, 2013

January 21, 2014

February 18, 2014

March 18, 2014

April 15, 2014

May 20, 2014

By focusing on the content areas of science and social studies, literacy and math, the purpose of the institute are to help teachers to foster critical thinking, creativity, collaboration, community and communication among themselves and their students. The goal of CTI is to address standards and 21st century learning skills utilizing authentic learning experiences, develop a social, emotional, academically and physically supportive and rigorous classroom environment. This professional development institute teaches information literacy skills (e.g. finding, evaluating and using information) in a meaningful context of inquiry-based learning. Integrate technology into instruction and enhance student productivity via multimedia projects and the use of other new technologies. Participants are invited to transform a unit of study that employs a traditional approach, where students receive knowledge from the teacher, to a unit that uses a constructivist and inquiry-based approach, where students are actively engaged in creating their own understanding.

The fee shall be paid by the Client to the University. The fee includes all travel, coordinator fees, presenter fees, and presentation materials.

- Deposit in the amount of \$18,000.00 must be paid by October 1, 2013. The remaining balance is due February 3, 2014. Checks will be made payable to Regents of UC.

University shall own, solely and exclusively, the copyright and copyright to any written or otherwise copyrightable material created and/or delivered under this Agreement.

The Client shall defend, indemnify, and hold University, its officers, employees, and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, cost, expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees), or claims for injury or damages that are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of the Client, its officers, agents, or employees.
- Client, at its sole cost and expense, shall insure and/or self-insure its activities in connection with the work under this Agreement and obtain, keep in force, and maintain insurance and/or self-insurance as follows:

If the above insurance is written on a claims-made form, it shall continue for three years following termination of this Agreement. The insurance shall have a retroactive date of placement prior to or coinciding with the effective date of this Agreement.

Client shall furnish the University with certificate of insurance and/or self-insurance evidencing compliance with all requirements prior to commencing work under this Agreement. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Under the provisions of SB 435, the Board of Education receives a report of fully credentialed staff who are assigned to teach in academic areas for which they may not have a formal credential, but for which they have the requisite number of units required for knowledge of the subject and the ability to teach the subject in the classroom. The following credential assignments are brought to the Board of Education annually. These assignments are brought to the Board in accordance with the requirements of the Education Code and the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing.

Education Code section 44256(b) (grades 8 and below) allows, with the approval of the governing board, the holder of a multiple subject or standard elementary teaching credential to teach, with his or her consent, in departmentalized classes below grade level 9 if the teacher has completed 12 semester units, or 6 upper division or graduate semester units in the subject to be taught.

Education Code section 44258.2 (grade 5-8) allows that the holder of a single subject standard secondary teaching credential may, with his or her consent, be assigned by action of the governing board, to teach classes in grades 5 through 8 in a middle school, provided that the teacher has a minimum of 12 semester units or 6 upper division or graduate semester units of coursework at an accredited institution in the subject to be taught.

Academic Standards

The Governing Board shall adopt *high* academic standards for student achievement which challenge all students to reach their full potential and which clarify specify what students are expected to know and be able to do at each grade level and in each area of study. These standards shall reflect the knowledge and skills needed for students to be adequately prepared for postsecondary education, employment, and responsible citizenship.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the Board with recommended standards using .—In developing these recommended standards, the Superintendent or designee shall use a process that involves teachers, school site and district administrators, students, parents/guardians, community members and Board Members. He/she shall ensure the proper articulation of standards between grade levels and the alignment of the standards with the district's vision and goals, graduation requirements, college entrance requirements, and other desired student outcomes. He/she also shall ensure that the standards are easily understandable and measurable.

Nonpublic, Nonsectarian School And Agency Services For Special Education

The Governing Board recognizes its responsibility to provide all district students, including students with disabilities, a free appropriate public education in accordance with law. When the district is unable to provide direct special education and/or related services to students with disabilities, the Board may enter into a contract with state-certified a nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agency to meet the students' needs. provide special education services or facilities when an appropriate public education program is not available.

When entering into agreements with *In selecting* nonpublic, nonsectarian schools or agencies with which the district may contract for the placement of any district student with disabilities, the Superintendent or designee shall follow the procedures specified in law and accompanying administrative relation. Board shall consider the needs of the individual student and the recommendations of the individualized education program (IEP) team. The IEP team shall remain accountable for monitoring the progress of students placed in nonpublic, nonsectarian programs towards the goals identified in each student's IEP.

Prior to entering into a contract to place any student in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency, the Superintendent or designee shall verify that the school or agency is certified to provide special education and related services to individuals with disabilities in accordance with Education Code 56366. In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall monitor, on an ongoing basis, the certification of any nonpublic, nonsectarian school with which the district has a contract to ensure that the school or agency's certification has not expired.

No district student shall be place in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency unless the student's individualized education program (IEP) team has determined that an appropriate public education alaternative does not exist and that the nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency placement is appropriate for the student. In accordance with law, any student with disabilities placed in a nonpublic, nonsectarian school or agency shall have all the rights and protection to which students with disabilities are generally entitled, including, but not limited to, the procedural safeguards, due process rights, and periodic review of his/her IEP. Identification and Education Under Section 504

The Governing Board believes that all children, including children with disabilities, should have an opportunity to learn in a safe and nurturing environment. This district will work to identify children with disabilities who reside within its jurisdiction in order to ensure that they receive educational and related services required by law. recognizes the need to identify and evaluate children with disabilities in order to provide them with services required by law.

The *Superintendent or designee* district shall provide *identified students with disabilities with* a free, appropriate public education *as defined* to students who reside within the district and who are classified as disabled under Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Such students shall receive regular or special education and related aids and services designed to meet their individual educational needs as adequately as the needs of non-disabled students are met. (34 CFR 104.33)

Any dispute as to the identification, evaluation, or placement of any student with a disability shall be resolved in accordance with the processes specified in the "Procedural Safeguards" section of the accompanying administrative regulation.

Board Committees

The Governing Board may establish Board a committees whenever it determines that such a committee would benefit the district by providing diverse viewpoints, specialized knowledge or expertise, or increased efficiency. Such committees may be subcommittees of the Board or committees that include members of the community, staff, or other stakeholder groups. as necessary. The Board shall determine the duties of the committee at the time of its appointment. Unless specifically authorized by the Board to act on its behalf, Board committees shall act in an advisory capacity. When its duties have been completed, the committee shall be dissolved.

Upon establishing a committee, the Board shall clearly define the committee's purpose, any timeline for completion of assigned responsibilities, any stakeholder groups or individuals to be represented on the committee, length of time that committee members are expected to serve, and expectations for reporting to the Board and/or Superintendent or designee. Unless specifically authorized by the Board to act on its behalf, the committee shall act in an advisory capacity.

Except for subcommittees of the Board, committee members shall, as appropriate, be recommended by the Superintendent or designee and appointed by the Board president, subject to Board approval.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide committee members with information and assistance necessary for the fulfillment of the committee's charges, and may serve as a non-voting advisor to the committee at the discretion of the Board.

Whenever so charged, committees may actively seek input and participation by parents/guardians, staff, community, and students, and may consult with local public boards and agencies.

Any committee not required by law may be dissolved when its duties or term has been completed or whenever the Board deems necessary.

Committee Meetings

Unless otherwise exempted by law, Board-created committees shall provide public notice of their meetings and conduct these meetings in accordance with Government Code 54950-54963 (the Brown Act). state open meeting laws.

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However, Board advisory *sub* committees composed solely of less than a quorum of the members of the Board are not subject to open meeting laws unless they are standing committees *of the Board, irrespective of membership, are those* that have a continuing subject matter jurisdiction or a meeting schedule established by *action of* the Board. (Government Code 54952)

Standing committees with a continuing subject matter jurisdiction include, but are not limited to, those responsible for providing advice on budgets, audits, Board policy, contracts, and personnel matters at the Board's request.

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When a majority of the members of the Board attend an open and noticed meeting of a standing committee, the Board members who are not members of the standing committee shall attend only as observers. (Government Code 54952.2)

Whenever any advisory or standing committee, including a committee not otherwise subject to the Brown Act, posts a meeting agenda at least 72 hours in advance of the meeting, that meeting shall be considered as a regular meeting of the Board for the purposes of the Brown Act and therefore most be held within district boundaries unless otherwise authorized by law. (Government Code 54954)

Committees may meeting in closed session during a regular or special meeting only for those purposes specifically authorized by law for closed sessions held by the Board.

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Meetings of advisory committees or standing committees for which an agenda is posted at least 72 hours in advance of the meeting pursuant to Government Code 54954.2, shall be considered, for purposes of the Brown Act, as regular meetings of the Board. Standing committees with a continuing subject matter jurisdiction include but are not limited to those responsible for providing advice on budgets, audits, contracts and personnel matters at the Board's request.

The Superintendent or designee may serve as an advisor to any committee at the discretion of the Board.

When a Board committee composed exclusively of Board members has provided for public comment on an item at a public meeting before or during the committee's consideration of the item, the Board is not obliged to provide for public comment on the item at a subsequent Board meeting. Public comment shall be afforded, however, if the Board determines that the item has been substantially changed since it was heard by the committee. (Government Code 54954.3)

Committees shall act in an advisory capacity making recommendations to the Board but shall take no action which is binding on the full Governing Board.

Governing Board Elections

Any person is eligible to be a Governing Board member, without further qualifications, if he/she is 18 years of age or older, a citizen of *California* the state, a resident of the school district, a registered voter and not legally disqualified from holding civil office. *Any person who has been convicted of a felony involving the giving, accepting, or offering of a bribe, embezzlement or theft of public funds, exgtortion, perjury, or conspiracy to commit any such crime, under California law or the law of another state, the United State of America, or another country, is not eligible to be a candidate for office or be a Board member except when he/she has been granted a pardon in accordance with law. (Education Code 35107; Elections Code 20)*

A district employee elected to the Board shall resign his/her position before being sworn in or shall have his/her employment automatically terminated upon being sworn into office. (Education Code 35107)

(cf. 9224 – Oath of Affirmation) (cf. 9270 - Conflict of Interest)

To reduce costs associated with conducting elections, the Board may consolidate Board elections with the local municipal or statewide primary or general election. Board election procedures shall be conducted in accordance with state and federal law.

When possible, Board election procedures shall be conducted in accordance with the California Education Code and Elections Code.

Electing Board Members

Board members may reside anywhere within the district's boundaries and shall be elected by all voters in the district.

To ensure ongoing compliance with the California and federal Voting Rights Acts, the Board may review the district's Board election method to determine whether any modification is necessary due to changes in the district's population or any of its racial, color, or language minority group composition. The review shall be based on the Superintendent or designee's report to the Board after the rlease of each decennial federal census.

If the Board determines that a change is necessary, it shall adopt a resolution at an open meeting specifiying the change(s) and shall, in accordance with Education Code 5019 or other

applicable provision of law, obtain approval from the county committee on school district organization having juridisction over the district.

Compaign Conduct

In order to help protect the public's trust in the electoral process as well as the public's confidence in the Board and district, the Board encourages all candidates to sign and adhere to the principles in the Code of Fair Campaign Practices pursuant to Elections Code 20440.

(cf. 0410 – Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities) (cf. 9005 – Governance Standards)

Statement of Qualifications

The district shall assume no part of the cost of printing, handling, translating or mailing candidate statements filed pursuant to Elections Code 13307. *As a condition of having candidate statements including in the voter's pamphlet, the district may require* candidates may be required to pay their *estimated* pro rata share of these costs to the district in advance as specified in Elections Code 13307.

On the 125th day prior to the day fixed for the general district election, the Board secretary or his/her designee shall deliver a notice, bearning the secretary's signature and district seal, to notify the county clerk elections official describing both of the following: of this policy on or before the 125th day before each Board member election. (Elections Code 10509)

- 1. The elective offices of the district to be filled at the general election and which offices, if any, are for the balance of an unexpired term
- 2. Whether the district or the candidate is to pay for the publication of a statement of qualifications pursuant to Electionc Code 13307

Candidate statements shall be limited to no more than 200 words. (Elections Code 13307)

Tie Votes in Board Member Elections

Before each election, the Board shall establish whether a potential tie is to be resolved by lot or with a runoff election. (Education Code 5016)

After an election for which the Board has decided to resolve a tie by lot, the Board shall immediately notify the candidates who received the tie votes of the time and place where the candidates or their representatives should appear before the Board. Given this critical period in school district finance, budget, and cash management, the Business Office regularly generates cash flow reports as an ongoing tool to assist the Administration and Board in analyzing and managing the District's cash and maintaining fiscal solvency. This report is updated monthly to reflect actual receipts and disbursements and to update projections based on the latest information.

BOTH SCHOOLS

CAHSEE

Both schools are currently working on finishing up CAHSEE testing for students who have yet to pass either the Math or English parts of the exam. We had a total of about 35 students take either one of the tests.

LOCK DOWN DRILL

We held our first safety drill of the school year and it was a lock down drill. It was held on September 19th at 10:15 am. It went extremely well. We had several students outside of their normal classroom or in different rooms during the drill. This really tested our teachers and students on proper procedures regarding what to do during a drill. During the drill, teachers, students and the office manager must remain inside and are not to open the door to anybody. Mr. McGugan goes outside immediately to make sure there are no kids out wondering the campus. Once the sweep of the campus is completed and all musters are in, the drill is called.

BENCH MARKS

Every year our teachers complete reading, writing and math benchmarks with all students. This was an all day event, except for the last hour of the day, which was geared towards our Thursday sports, walking, and community service groups. We will give these exact same tests at the end of the 1st semester for early graduates and at the end of the year for our remaining students.

CLEAN TEEN TEAM

We are going on our first "Clean Teen Team" field trip to Freebirds restaurant. This trip is reserved for our students who have made the decision to be drug free. Not all students participate, but of the students who did, we are taking 13 students on October 4th. All of the students are looking forward to getting a free burrito on OVHS. This process is also a good opportunity for me to speak with those students who do not pass the drug test. They willingly participate to take the test, knowing they will not pass. I see this as a solid icebreaker for me to bridge the discussion about why they are using drugs and to see if I can help them.

THURSDAY SPORTS/WALKING/COMMUNITY SERVICE

Every Thursday we have an hour of sports, walking, or community service. Mr. McManus, Mr. McGugan and Mr. Rogers run the sports (football, kickball, etc.) program, while Mrs. Liepman runs the walking group and Mrs. Allen runs the community service group.
