Bylaw contains sample language listing permissible electronic communications, protocol for responding to emails received by community members and the press, confidential communications, and disclosure of messages under the Public Records Act.

REPORT FROM BOARD MEMBERS

Board Member Marie Panec congratulated Medea Creek Middle School Assistant Principal Amanda Bagheri and Teacher Kathy Schultheis for being named Tri-County GATE award winners this year. Ms. Panec attended the SEAC meeting last week. She applauds this committee and especially the President for having a time in their meeting to allow parents to express their concerns and help to moderate those concerns. Ms. Panec reported the Facilities Planning Committee continues their work which you will be

hearing more about later. Parents Tom Wulf and Peter Kristensen have been doing a yeoman job for the district in spearheading this committee. Board Member Mary Rees commented on an editorial in the newspaper which stated California is 47th in the nation in state spending on education. But the sky is not falling here in Oak Park because of the dedicated teachers, administrators, students, parents and tremendous support of the community. Ms. Rees reported she attended the High School Open House where students were excited about receiving college acceptances. The District is saving money wherever we can, not buying books, limiting staff development, and field trips paid by parents. We are finding out how lean the district can run if we are fiscally responsible. Board Member Cindy Vinson had a list of questions and answers pertaining to the Bond Resolutions that are to be voted on this evening. She and Barbara Laifman attended a meeting with the underwriter yesterday to ask these questions and gather additional information for the Board. The underwriter could not be at the Board meeting this evening due to prior commitments. Ms. Vinson commented on the thank you e-mails from teachers who attended the CUE conference and how thrilled and excited they were with the knowledge they brought back from this conference and how they couldn't wait to incorporate it into the classrooms. Board Member Barbara Laifman reported she attended the EEAC meeting where they are coordinating their efforts on Earth Week activities and recycling. She attended the Brookside Brown Bag lunch who had a parent speak about Opera and Ms. Laifman was impressed with how actively engaged the students were. Ms. Laifman attended the Brown Act Workshop at the Ventura County Office of Education with Board Member Marie Panec, Superintendent Knight, Assistant Superintendent Klauss, Linda and Oversight Committee Members and found it very worthwhile. She attended the high school Open House which was well attended. Ms. Laifman also attended the middle school Distinguished School visit which was a good visit, a typical day at the middle school and the remarkable staff make every day a great day. Board Member Jan Iceland also congratulated Amanda and Kathy, also Medea Creek and Oak Park High School for their Distinguished School visits, and also the seven National Merit Finalists at Oak Park High School, Ms. Iceland reported she attended the Chinese New Year Program where several Oak Park students performed. She attended the Friends meeting where they are working on their Slam 'n Jam Fundraiser. Ms. Iceland reported she attended the Technology Committee meeting which has sent out the acceptance letter to next year's new 21st Century Classroom teachers and to the teachers who are being asked to resubmit their application. She also received the thank you e-mails from the teachers who attended the CUE Conference. Congratulations to the CERT Committee for the Disaster Preparedness program they presented here at the high school. They will be attending the Safe Kids Task Force hoping to create a teen CERT group.

REPORT FROM STUDENT BOARD REPRESENTATIVE

Ben Pyle reported the school is working on a recycling program and awareness. Spring sports are all underway. Future Freshman are visiting this week. Comedy Sportz is this week. The Fine Arts Assembly is coming up and the PFC is sponsoring a video on the dangers of drinking and driving. AP testing is no longer a requirement for students taking AP classes.

REPORT FROM SUPERINTENDENT

Dr. Knight thanked Oak Park High School and Medea Creek Middle School for all their hard work on their Distinguished School visits especially the teachers. He talked to the teams who were both very positive about the schools so both schools should be receiving good news.

SCHOOL SITE COUNCIL REPORTS

Oak Park High School –School Site Council got an update on graduation. Ticket sales should cover the cost. They received a facilities update and budget update. They felt a priority list of cuts should be posted on the district website. The high school felt they were taking a big hit with the number of pink slips teachers received. The Site Council continued to discuss traffic safety. They also discussed the AP exam issue. It will be on the agenda again next month and they have discussed getting teachers and students more engaged in the process of making a decision about AP exams.

Oak View High School – Randi Leipman reported School Site Council reviewed the 2009-10 Handbook. They discussed the Fall 2010 WASC review. The students took a field trip to Moorpark College with Counselor Dianne Large on March 11. The site is 100% 21st Century Classrooms. They discussed upcoming assessments, Earth Week activities, and Senior events.

Oak Park Independent School – School Site Council reviewed the 2009-10 Handbook. They held their 2^{nd} annual Staff appreciation lunch. They reviewed the March newsletter. For the first time one of their high school seniors has been named STAR scholar and will attend the Ventura County STAR dinner at the Reagan Library in April. This year they will publish their first yearbook. Enrollment is holding steady and they are creating a wait list for the fall. They will have their Open House on May 7 at Red Oak from 6:00-8:00 p.m.

Medea Creek Middle School –School Site Council Student Reports – 7th Grade students presented their Medieval Museums today and in science they are studying endangered species and readying their science faire projects. 8th Grade students are dong factoring and quadratic expressions in math and in science they are studying their second unit of physics, Newton's Law and momentum. ASB reported they are having a dance, movie night, film contest, bottle cap posters and gold grabber. Brad Benioff reported on the Distinguished School Visit and the extreme careers program for 7th graders to have an opportunity to participate in 2 year program with Moorpark College to take career aptitude survey. The OPHS counselors will be coming the MCMS next week to meet with 8th graders and Future Freshman night is next week and Fifth Grade Orientation planning is underway. Seventy one students are participating in the Ventura County Science Faire. Site Council discussed the new policy on cyber-bulling and electronic devices and will be incorporating this into the handbook. The Principal asked the Site Council to review the handbook on-line and make recommendations for revisions. The Principal created his first Blog and has encouraged students comments. They have asked that parents stop bringing in outside food to students during lunch as it is causing several problems and they discussed culmination costs and charges, summer school, and electives registration.

Red Oak Elementary School – School Site Council looking at purchasing new Kindergarten playground equipment. They discussed traffic safety issues and Measure R improvements.

Facilities Planning Committee – Tom Wulf reported on the Committees activities. The Project Management has attended the Facilities Planning Committee meeting and will have weekly update meetings with Julie, Tom and Peter.

Site Location: Oak Park High School Class: *Myth to Science Fiction*, a Senior English semester course Submitted by: Don Enoch, teacher

From the State Approved List of Texts:

<u>The Island of Dr. Moreau</u> by H. G. Wells. <u>H.G. Wells</u>'s science fiction classic, *The Island of <u>Doctor Moreau</u>*, asks the reader to consider the limits of natural science and the distinction between men and beasts. A strange mix of science fiction, romance, and philosophical meandering, it is one of the standards of early science fiction.

<u>The War of the Worlds</u> by H. G. Wells. *The War of the Worlds* (1898), by <u>H. G.</u> <u>Wells</u>, is an early <u>science fiction novel</u> which describes an invasion of <u>Earth</u> by <u>Martians</u>. It is one of the earliest and best-known depictions of an <u>alien invasion</u> of <u>Earth</u>, and has influenced many others, as well as spawning several films, radio dramas, comic book adaptations, and a television series based on the story. The <u>1938 radio broadcast</u> caused public outcry against the episode, as many listeners believed that an actual Martian invasion was in progress a notable example of <u>mass hysteria</u>.

20,000 Leagues Under the Sea by Jules Verne. Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea (French: Vingt mille lieues sous les mers) is a classic science fiction novel by French writer Jules Verne published in 1870. It tells the story of Captain Nemo and his submarine Nautilus as seen from the perspective of Professor Pierre Aronnax.

For Submission (currently not on the State Approved List):

<u>The Time Machine</u> by H. G. Wells. *The Time Machine* is a novella by <u>H. G.</u> <u>Wells</u>, first published in 1895 and later directly adapted into at least two <u>feature films</u> of the same name, as well as two <u>television</u> versions, and a large number of <u>comic book</u> adaptations. It indirectly inspired many more works of <u>fiction</u> in all media. This 38,000 word <u>novella</u> is generally credited with the popularization of the concept of <u>time travel</u> using a vehicle that allows an operator to travel purposefully and selectively. The term "time machine", coined by Wells, is now universally used to refer to such a vehicle. It was also inspired by <u>Charles Darwin</u> and <u>On the Origin of Species</u>, which theorizes that humans have evolved from a different species. Wells introduces an early example of the Dying Earth subgenre as well.

<u>The Invisible Man</u> by H. G. Wells. *The Invisible Man* is an 1897 <u>science fiction</u> novella by <u>H.G. Wells</u>. Wells' novel was originally serialised in *Pearson's Magazine* in 1897, and published as a novel the same year. The Invisible Man of the title is <u>Griffin</u>, a scientist who theorises that if a person's <u>refractive index</u> is changed to exactly that of air and his body does not absorb or reflect light, then he will be <u>invisible</u>. He successfully

carries out this procedure on himself, but cannot become visible again, becoming mentally unstable as a result.

<u>The First Men in the Moon</u> by H. G. Wells. *The First Men in the Moon* is a <u>1901 scientific romance</u> novel by the British author <u>H. G. Wells</u>. The novel tells the story of a journey to the <u>moon</u> undertaken by the two main protagonists, the impoverished <u>businessman Mr Bedford</u> and the brilliant but eccentric <u>scientist</u> Dr. Cavor. On arrival, Bedford and Cavor find the moon inhabited by an <u>extra terrestrial civilization</u> the two name as "Selenites". The novel can also be read as a critique of prevailing political opinions of the period, particularly of <u>imperialism</u>. The theme of a clash between civilizations is reminiscent of Wells' earlier and more famous work, <u>The War of the Worlds</u>, it is hinted that the non-human civilization presented might reflect the way human society would develop in the far future. As such, the Selenite society depicted could be considered either a <u>utopia</u> or a <u>dystopia</u>, depending on which of its features one emphasizes.

Around the World in Eighty Days by Jules Verne. Around the World in Eighty Days (French: Le tour du monde en quatre-vingts jours) is a classic <u>adventure novel</u> by the <u>French writer Jules Verne</u>, first published in <u>1873</u>. In the story, <u>Phileas Fogg</u> of <u>London</u> and his newly employed <u>French valet Passepartout</u> attempt to <u>circumnavigate</u> the world in 80 days on a £20,000 wager set by his friends at the <u>Reform Club</u>.

Journey to the Center of the Earth by Jules Verne. A Journey to the Centre of the Earth (French: Voyage au centre de la Terre), also translated as A Journey to the Interior of the Earth, is a classic 1864 science fiction novel by Jules Verne. The story involves a man named Liedenbrock. He believed there were volcanic tubes going toward the center of the Earth. They encounter many adventures, including prehistoric animals and natural hazards, eventually coming to the surface again in southern Italy. The living organisms they meet reflect geological time; just as the rock layers become older and older the deeper they travel, the animals become more and more ancient the closer the characters come closer to the center. From a scientific point of view, this story has not aged quite as well as other Verne stories, since most of his ideas about what the interior of the Earth contains have since been proven wrong. However, a redeeming point to the story is Verne's own belief, told within the novel from the viewpoint of a character, that the inside of the Earth does indeed differ from that which the characters encounter. One of Verne's main ideas with his stories was also to educate the readers, and by placing the different extinct creatures the characters meet in their correct geological era, he is able to show how the world looked a long time ago, stretching from the ice age to the dinosaurs.

The book was inspired by <u>Charles Lyell's</u> <u>Geological Evidences of the Antiquity of Man</u> of 1863. By that time geologists had abandoned a literal biblical account of Earth's development and it was generally thought that the end of the <u>last glacial period</u> marked the first appearance of humanity, but Lyell drew on new findings to put the origin of human beings much further back in the deep geological past. Lyell's book also influenced <u>Louis Figuier's 1867</u> second edition of *La Terre avant le déluge* which included dramatic

illustrations of savage men and women wearing animal skins and wielding stone axes, in place of the <u>Garden of Eden</u> shown in the 1863 edition.

Regarding the Madness and Identity class, another Senior English semester course:

For Submission (currently not on the Approved List):

Breakfast of Champions by Kurt Vonnegut Jr. Breakfast of Champions, or Goodbye Blue Monday is a 1973 novel by the American author Kurt Vonnegut. Set in the fictional town of Midland City, it is the story of "two lonesome, skinny, fairly old white men on a planet which was dying fast." One of these men, Dwayne Hoover, is a normal-looking but deeply deranged <u>Pontiac</u> dealer who becomes obsessed with the writings of the other man, <u>Kilgore Trout</u>, taking them for literal truth. Trout, a largely unknown <u>pulp science fiction</u> writer who has appeared in several other Vonnegut novels, looks like a crazy old man but is in fact relatively sane. As the novel opens, Trout journeys toward Midland City to appear at a convention where he is destined to meet Dwayne Hoover and unwittingly inspire him to run amok.

Book Adoption Proposal Curriculum Council Fall 2009

Dear Committee Members:

Senior English teachers would like to add to the supplementary reading list Tom Stoppard's *Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead*—a retelling of Shakespeare's *Hamlet* from the viewpoint of Hamlet's two hapless school friends who are summoned to the Elsinore court and end up collateral damage. Writing in 1966, Stoppard modeled his play after Beckett's *Waiting for Godot*, but the play is much more accessible than Beckett's while covering (more lightheartedly) many of the same modern themes of fate and existentialism. In addition, the play serves as an excellent companion piece to *Hamlet*, which is often taught the first semester. The play would be on the supplementary reading list for the second semester of CP English 4.

English 3 has reached a consensus on adopting the great American playwright Eugene O'Neill's play *Desire Under the Elms* (1924) for eleventh grade English 3, which focuses on American literature. In the tradition of *Oedipus Rex* and *Hamlet*, this tragedy relies heavily on Greek myth, specifically the Phaedra-Hippolytus story, which features the passion and betrayal of a stepmother and stepson who fall in love. O'Neill makes use of Freudian psychology, taking the family dynamics found in Greek mythology and placing them in a country farmhouse setting. Students should find this play highly riveting and worthy of character analysis and class discussion. The play fits in with the Modernism Unit, which shows American authors' new awareness of psychological behavior in their literature. There is no profanity, nor are there sex scenes in this play.



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

BACKGROUND: Rancho Simi Recreation and Parks District (RSRPD) and the Oak Park Unified School District (OPUSD) jointly operate the six tennis courts located on the Oak Park High School campus. Consistent with the maintenance plans of both districts, the governing boards of both agencies have authorized funding to resurface the courts at the earliest possible time. On March 4, 2009, the District and Oak Park Teachers Association reached a tentative agreement on a Contract of Agreement for the period July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2010. This tentative Contract of Agreement was ratified by Oak Park Teachers Association the week of March 23, 2009.

This agreement includes an increase to the caps for Health and Welfare Benefits as follows: Employee Only Medical Coverage \$7,371, Employee+1 Medical Coverage \$12,724 and Employee+2 (family) Medical Coverage \$16,483. The cost of this increase to the District is \$279,790.

RATIONALE: Public disclosure of the major provisions of the Collective Bargaining Agreement with Oak Park Teachers Association satisfies the requirements of Board Policy 4143.1, Government Code 3547.5 and Assembly Bill 1200.

Search And Seizure

The Governing Board is fully committed to promoting a safe learning environment and, to the extent possible, eliminating the possession and use of weapons, illegal drugs, and other controlled substances by students on school premises and at school activities. As necessary to protect the health, safety and welfare of students and staff, school officials may search students, their property and/or district property under their control, and may seize illegal, unsafe and prohibited items.

The Governing Board requires urges that employees exercise discretion and good judgment and common sense be exercised in all cases of search and seizure. When conducting a search or seizure, employees shall act in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

Individual Searches

School officials may search individual students, their his/her property and or district property under their his/her control, when there is a reasonable suspicion that the search will uncover evidence that the student he/she is violating the law, Board policy, administrative regulation, or other rules of the district or the school. Reasonable suspicion shall be based on specific and objective facts that the search will produce evidence related to the alleged violation. The types of student property that may be searched by school officials include, but are not limited to, lockers, purses, backpacks, student vehicles parked on district property, cellular phones, or other electronic communication devices.

Any search of a student, his/her property, or district property under his/her control shall be limited in scope and designed to produce evidence related to the alleged violation. Factors to be considered by school officials when determining the scope of the search shall include the danger to the health or safety of students or staff, such as the possession of weapons, drugs, or other dangerous instruments, and whether the item(s) to be searched by school officials are reasonably related to the contraband to be found. In addition, school officials shall consider

the intrusiveness of the search in light of the student's age, gender, and the nature of the alleged violation.

Employees shall not conduct strip searches or body cavity searches of any student. (Education Code 49050)

Searches of individual students shall be conducted in the presence of at least two district employees.

The principal or designee shall notify the parent/guardian of a student subjected to an individualized search as soon as possible after the search.

Searches of Multiple Student Lockers/Desks

All student lockers and desks are the property of the district. The principal or designee may conduct a general inspection of school properties that are within the control of students, such as lockers and desks, on a regular, announced basis, with students standing by their assigned lockers or desks. Any items contained in a locker or desk shall be considered to be the property of the student to whom the locker or desk was assigned.

Because lockers and desks are under the joint control of the student and the district, school officials shall have the right and ability to open and inspect any school locker or desk without student permission or prior notice when they have reasonable suspicion that the search will uncover evidence of illegal possessions or activities or when odors, smoke, fire and/or other threats to health, welfare or safety emanate from the locker or desk.

Use of Drug-Detection Dogs

In an effort to keep the schools free of drugs, the district may use specially trained nonaggressive dogs to sniff out and alert staff to the presence of substances prohibited by law or Board policy. The dogs may sniff the air around lockers, desks, or vehicles on district property or at district-sponsored events, as long as they are not allowed to sniff within the close proximity of any students. Dogs shall not sniff within the close proximity of students or other persons and may not sniff any personal items on those persons without their consent.

Students shall be exempted from participation only in accordance with law and administrative regulation.

Identification of Individuals For Special Education

The Governing Board recognizes the need to actively seek out and evaluate district residents from birth to age 21 who have disabilities in order to provide them with appropriate educational opportunities in accordance with state and federal law.

(cf. 0430 - Comprehensive Local Plan for Special Education) (cf. 6164.41 – Children with Disabilities Enrolled by Their Parents in Private School) (cf. 6164.6 - Identification and Education under Section 504)

The Superintendent or designee shall develop processes to determine when an individual is eligible for special education services and shall establish systematic procedures for special education program identification, screening, referral, assessment, planning, implementation, review and triennial assessment. (Education Code 56301)

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a method whereby parents/guardians, teachers, appropriate professionals and others may refer an individual for assessment for special education services. Identification procedures shall be coordinated with school site procedures for referral of students with needs that cannot be met with modifications to the regular instructional program. (Education Code 56302)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians, in writing, of their rights related to identification, referral, assessment, instructional planning, implementation, and review, including the district's procedures for initiating a referral for assessment to identify individuals who need special education services. (Education Code 56301)

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BB 9223(a)

Filling Vacancies

Events Causing a Vacancy

A vacancy on the Governing Board may occur by a failure to elect or for any of the following events:

1. The death of an incumbent. (Government code 1770)

2. The adjudication pursuant to a quo warranto proceeding declaring that an incumbent is physically or mentally incapacitated due to disease, illness, or accident and that there is reasonable cause to believe that the incumbent will not be able to perform the duties of his/her office for the remainder of his/her term. (Government Code 1770)

3. A Board member's resignation. (Government Code 1779)

A vacancy resulting from resignation occurs when the written resignation is filed with the County Superintendent of Schools having jurisdiction over the district, except where a deferred effective date is specified in the resignation so filed, in which case the resignation shall become operative on that date. A Board member may not defer the effective date of his/her resignation for more than 60 days after he/she files the resignation with the County Superintendent.

Upon being filed with the County Superintendent, a written resignation, whether specifying a deferred effective date or otherwise, shall be irrevocable. (Education Code 5090)

A Board member may not defer the effective date of his/her resignation for more than 60 days after he/she files the resignation with the County Superintendent.

4. A Board member's removal from office, including recall. (Government code 1770; Elections Code 11384)

5. A Board member's ceasing to be an inhabitant of the state or resident of the district. (Government Code 1770)

6. A Board member's absence from the state beyond the period allowed by law without the permission required by law. (Government Code 1770)

No Board member shall be absent from the state for more than 60 days, except in any of the following situations: (Government Code 1064)

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BB 9223(b)

- a. Upon business of the school district with the approval of the Board
- b. With the consent of the Board for an additional period not to exceed a total absence of 90 days
- c. For federal military deployment not to exceed six months as a member of the armed forces of the United States or the California National Guard

If the absence of the Board member for this purpose exceeds six months, the Board may approve an additional six-month absence upon a showing that there is a reasonable expectation that the member will return within the second six-month period, and the Board may appoint an interim member to serve in his/her absence. If two or more members of the Board are absent by reason of these circumstances, and those absences result in the inability to establish a quorum at a regular meeting, the Board may immediately appoint one or more interim members, as necessary to enable the Board to conduct business and discharge its responsibilities.

d. In the case of illness or other urgent necessity, and upon a proper showing thereof, the time limit for absence from the state may be extended by the Board for an additional period not to exceed 30 days.

(cf. 9250 – Remuneration, Reimbursement and Other Benefits)

7. A Board member's ceasing to discharge the duties of his/her office for the period of three consecutive months, except when prevented by sickness or when absent from the state with the permission required by law. (Government Code 1770)

8. A Board member's conviction of a felony or any offense involving a violation of his/her official duties *or conviction of a designated crime resulting in a forfeiture of office*. (Government Code 1770 *and 3000-3003*)

9. A Board member's refusal or neglect to file his/her required oath or bond within the time prescribed. (Government Code 1770)

(cf. 9224 - Oath or Affirmation)

10. The decision of a competent tribunal declaring void a Board member's election or appointment. (Government Code 1770)

11. The making of an order vacating a Board member's office or declaring the office vacant when the officer fails to furnish an additional or supplemental bond. (Government Code 1770)

OAK PARK UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT BYLAWS OF THE BOARD

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12. A Board member's commitment to a hospital or sanitarium as a drug addict, dipsomaniac, inebriate, or stimulant addict-by a court of competent jurisdiction, in this event which case, the office shall not be deemed vacant until the order of commitment has become final. (Government Code 1770)

13. A failure to elect when either no candidate or an insufficient number of candidates have filed to run for a Board seat(s) (Education Code 5090, 5326, 5328)

Timelines for Filling a Vacancy

When a vacancy occurs, the Board shall take the following action, as appropriate:

1. When a vacancy occurs less than four months before the end of a Board member's term, the Board shall take no action. (Education Code 5093)

2. When a vacancy occurs four or more months before the end of a Board member's term, the Board shall, within 60 days of the date of the vacancy or the filing of the member's deferred resignation, either order an election or make a provisional appointment, unless a special election is mandated as described *in item #3* below. (Education Code 5091, *5093*)

3. When a vacancy occurs from six months to 130 days before a regularly scheduled Board election at which the position is not scheduled to be filled, a special election to fill the position shall be consolidated with the regular election. The person so elected shall take office at the first regularly scheduled Board meeting following the certification of the election and shall serve only until the end of the term of the position which he/she was elected to fill. (Education Code 5093)

When a special election is not required, the Board may make a provisional appointment. (Education Code 5091, 5093)

Provisional Appointments

In order to draw from the largest possible number of candidates, the Board shall advertise in the local media to solicit candidate applications or nominations. A committee consisting of less than a quorum of the Board shall ensure that applicants are eligible for Board membership and announce the names of the eligible candidates. The Board shall interview the candidates at a public meeting, accept oral or written public input, and select the provisional appointee by a majority vote.

(cf. 9130 - Board Committees) (cf. 9220 - Governing Board Elections) (cf. 9323.2 - Actions by the Board)

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In order to serve on the Board, a person must meet the eligibility requirements specified in Education Code 35107.

(cf. 9220 - Governing Board Elections)

Within 10 days after the appointment is made, the Board shall post notices of the actual vacancy, or the filing of a deferred resignation, and the provisional appointment. The notice shall be published in the local newspaper pursuant to Government Code 6061 and posted in at least three public places within the district. (Education Code 5092)

The notice shall contain: (Education Code 5092)

1. The date of the occurrence of the vacancy or the date of the filing of, and the effective date of, the resignation

2. The full name of the appointee

3. The date of appointment

4. A statement notifying the voters that unless a petition calling for a special election pursuant to Education Code 5091 is filed in the office of the County Superintendent of Schools within 30 days of the provisional appointment, it shall become an effective appointment

The person appointed shall hold office until the next regularly scheduled election for district Board members and shall be afforded all the powers and duties of a Board member upon appointment. (Education Code 5091)

Appointment Due to Failure to Elect

When a vacancy occurs because no person or an insufficient number of candidates have been nominated (i.e., a failure to elect), and a district election will not be held, the Board shall appoint a qualified person to the office. This appointment shall be made at a meeting prior to the day fixed for the election and the appointment shall be seated at the organizational meeting as if elected at the district election. (Education Code 5328)

(cf. 9100 – Organization)

When an appointment is being made because of a failure to elect, the district shall publish a notice once in a newspaper of general circulation published in the district, or if no such newspaper exists, in a newspaper having general circulation within the district. This notice

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shall state that the Board intends to make an appointment and shall inform persons of the procedure available for applying for the appointment. (Education Code 5328.5)

The procedure for selecting and interviewing candidates shall be the same as the procedures for "Provisional Appointments," as specified above.

BACKGROUND: Board Bylaw 9320 is being revised to reflect new law (SB 1732) which amends the definition of a prohibited serial meeting by deleting the requirement that the Board reach a "collective concurrence" as to action to be taken. As amended, a prohibited serial meeting is now defined as a series of communications of any kind, directly or through intermediaries, to discuss, deliberate, or take action on any item of district business. Board Bylaw 9320 is being submitted with recommended language from CSBA.

Bylaws of the Board

BB 9320(a)

Meetings And Notices

Meetings of the Governing Board are conducted for the purpose of accomplishing district business. In accordance with state open meeting laws (*Brown Act*), the Board shall hold its meetings in public and shall conduct closed sessions during such meetings only as authorized by law. To encourage community involvement in the schools, meetings shall provide opportunities for questions and comments by members of the public. *All meetings and shall be conducted in accordance with law and Board bylaws, policies and administrative regulations.* procedures.

(cf. 9321 - Closed Session Purposes and Agendas) (cf. 9321.1 - Closed Session Actions and Reports) (cf. 9323 - Meeting Conduct)

A Board meeting exists whenever a majority of Board members gather at the same time and place to hear, discuss or deliberate upon any item within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board or district. (Government Code 54952.2)

A majority of the Board shall not, outside of an authorized meeting, use a series of communications of any kind, directly or through intermediaries, to discuss, deliberate, or take action on any item that is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. However, an employee or district official may engage in separate conversations with Board members in order to answer questions or provide information regarding an item within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board, as long as that employee or district official does not communicate the comments or position of any Board members to other Board members. (Government Code 54952.2)

Except as otherwise authorized by law, direct communication, personal intermediaries, and technological devices shall not be used by a majority of Board members to develop a collective concurrence as to an action to be taken by the Board on any item of district business. (Government Code 54952.2)

In order to help ensure participation in the meeting by disabled individuals, the Superintendent or designee shall provide appropriate disability-related accommodations or modifications upon request in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. (Government Code 54953.2, 54954.1)

Meeting notices and agendas shall specify that any individual who requires disability-related accommodations or modifications, including auxiliary aids and services, in order to participate in the Board meeting should contact the Superintendent or designee in writing. (Government Code 54954.2)

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BB 9320(b)

Each agenda shall also list the address(es) designated by the Superintendent or designee for public inspection of agenda documents that have been distributed to the Board less than 72 hours before the meeting. (Government Code 54957.5)

(cf. 9322 – Agenda/Meeting Materials)

Regular Meetings

The Board shall hold one regular meeting each month. Regular meetings shall be held at 5:00 p.m. for Closed Session and 6:00 p.m. for Open session on the 3rd Tuesday of the month at the Oak Park High School Presentation Room G-9 or Library Film and Lecture Room (Conference Room) or the District Office Conference Room.

At least 72 hours prior to a regular meeting, the agenda shall be posted at one or more locations freely accessible to members of the public. (Government Code 54954.2)

Special Meetings

Special meetings of the Board may be called at any time by the presiding officer or a majority of the Board members. (Government Code 54956)

Written notice of special meetings shall be delivered personally or by any other means to all Board members and the local media who have requested such notice in writing. The notice shall be received at least 24 hours before the time of the meeting. The notice shall also be posted at least 24 hours before the meeting in a location freely accessible to the public. The notice shall specify the time and place of the meeting and the business to be transacted or discussed. No other business shall be considered at these meetings. (Education Code 35144; Government Code 54956)

Any Board member may waive a failure to receive the 24-hour written notice requirement prior to the time of the meeting by filing a written waiver of notice with the clerk or secretary of the Board or by being present at the meeting at the time it convenes. (Government Code 54956)

Every notice of a special meeting shall provide an opportunity for members of the public to directly address the Board concerning any item that has been described in the meeting notice, before or after the item's consideration. (Government Code 54954.3)

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Emergency Meetings

In the case of an emergency situation for which prompt action is necessary due to the disruption or threatened disruption of public facilities, the Board may hold an emergency meeting without complying with the 24-hour notice and/or 24-hour posting requirement for special meetings pursuant to Government Code 54956. The Board shall comply with all other requirements for special meetings during an emergency meeting. (Government Code 54956.5)

An emergency situation means either of the following: (Government Code 54956.5)

1. An emergency, which shall be defined as a work stoppage, crippling activity or other activity that severely impairs public health and/or safety as determined by a majority of the members of the Board

(cf. 4141.6/4241.6 - Concerted Action/Work Stoppage)

2. A dire emergency, which shall be defined as a crippling disaster, mass destruction, terrorist activity, or threatened terrorist act that poses peril so immediate and significant that requiring the Board to provide one-hour notice before holding an emergency meeting may endanger the public health and/or safety as determined by a majority of the members of the Board

(cf. 3516 – Emergencies and Disaster Preparedness Plan)

Except in the case of a dire emergency, the Board president or designee shall give notice of the emergency meeting by telephone at least one hour before the meeting to the local media that have requested notice of special meetings. All telephone numbers provided by the media in the most recent request for notification must be exhausted. If telephone services are not functioning, the notice requirement of one hour is waived and, as soon after the meeting as possible, the Board shall notify those media representatives of the meeting and shall describe the purpose of the meeting and any action taken by the Board. In the case of a dire emergency, the Board president or designee shall give such notice at or near the time he/she notifies the other members of the Board about the meeting. (Government Code 54956.5)

The minutes of the meeting, a list of persons the Board president or designee notified or attempted to notify, a copy of the roll call vote, and any actions taken at the meeting shall be posted for at least 10 days in a public place as soon after the meeting as possible. (Government Code 54956.5)

Adjourned/Continued Meetings

A majority vote by the Board may adjourn/continue any regular or special meeting to a later time

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and place that shall be specified in the order of adjournment. Less than a quorum of the Board may adjourn such a meeting. If no Board members are present, the secretary or the clerk may declare the meeting adjourned to a later time and shall give notice in the same manner required for special meetings. (Government Code 54955)

A copy of the order or notice of adjournment/continuance shall be conspicuously posted on or near the door of the place where the meeting was held within 24 hours after the time of adjournment. (Government Code 54955)

Study Sessions, Retreats, Public Forums, and Discussion Meetings

The Board may occasionally convene a study session or public forum to study an issue in more detail or to receive information from staff or feedback from members of the public.

The Board may also convene a retreat or discussion meeting to discuss Board roles and relationships.

(cf. 2000 – Concepts and Roles) (cf. 2111 – Superintendent Governance Standards) (cf. 9000 – Role of the Board) (cf. 9005 – Governance Standards) (cf. 9400 – Board Self-Evaluation)

Public notice shall be given in accordance with law when a quorum of the Board is attending a study session, retreat, public forum, or discussion meeting. All such meetings shall comply with the Brown Act and shall be held in open session and within district boundaries. Action items shall not be included on the agenda for these meetings.

Other Gatherings

Attendance by a majority of the Board members at any of the following events is not subject to the Brown Act provided that a majority of the Board members do not discuss specific district business among themselves other than as part of the scheduled program: (Government Code 54952.2)

- 1. A conference or similar public gathering open to the public that involves a discussion of issues of general interest to the public or to school board members
- 2. An open, publicized meeting organized by a person or organization other than the district to address a topic of local community concern

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3. An open and noticed meeting of another body of the district

4. An open and noticed meeting of or a legislative body of another local agency

- 5. A purely social or ceremonial occasion
- 6. An open and noticed meeting of a standing committee of the Board, provided that the Board members who are not members of the standing committee attend only as observers

(cf. 9130 - Board Committees)

Individual contacts or conversations between a Board member and any other person are not subject to the Brown Act. (Government Code 54952.2)

Location of Meetings

Meetings shall not be held in a facility that prohibits the admittance of any person on the basis of ancestry or any characteristic listed in Government Code 11135, including, but not limited to, religion, sex, or sexual orientation. In addition, meetings shall not be held in a facility which is inaccessible to disabled persons or where members of the public must make a payment or purchase in order to be admitted. (Government Code 54961)

(cf. 0410 – Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities)

Meeting shall be held within district boundaries, except to do any of the following: (Government Code 54954)

1. Comply with state or federal law or court order or attend a judicial or administrative proceeding to which the district is a party

2. Inspect real or personal property which cannot conveniently be brought into the district, provided that the topic of the meeting is limited to terms directly related to the property.

3. Participate in meetings or discussions of multiagency significance, provided these meetings are held within one of the other agencies' boundaries, with all participating agencies giving the notice required by law.

4. Meet in the closest meeting facility if the district has no meeting facility within its boundaries or if its principal office is located outside the district.

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5. Meet with elected or appointed state or federal officials when a local meeting would be impractical, solely to discuss legislative or regulatory issues affecting the district over which the state or federal officials have jurisdiction.

6. Meet in or near a facility owned by the district but located outside the district, provided the meeting is limited to items directly related to that facility.

7. Visit the office of the district's legal counsel for a closed session on pending litigation, when doing so would reduce legal fees or costs.

8. Attend conferences on nonadversarial collective bargaining techniques

9. Interview residents of another district regarding the Board's potential employment of an applicant for Superintendent of the district

10. Interview a potential employee from another district

Meetings exempted from the boundary requirement, as specified in items #1-10 above, shall still be subject to the notice and open meeting requirements for regular and special meetings when a quorum of the Board attends the meeting.

If a fire, flood, earthquake, or other emergency renders the regular meeting place unsafe, meetings shall be held for the duration of the emergency at a place designated by the Board president or designee, who shall so inform, by the most rapid available means of communication, all news media who have requested notice of special meetings. (Government Code 54954)

Teleconferencing

A teleconference is a meeting of the Board in which Board members are in different locations, connected by electronic means through audio and/or video. (Government Code 54953)

The Board may use teleconferences for all purposes in connection with any meeting within the Board's subject matter jurisdiction. All votes taken during a teleconference meeting shall be by roll call. (Government Code 54953)

During the teleconference, at least a quorum of the members of the Board shall participate from locations within district boundaries. (Government Code 54953)

Agendas shall be posted at all teleconference locations and shall list all teleconference locations whenever they are posted elsewhere. Additional teleconference locations may be provided to the

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public. (Government Code 54953)

All teleconferenced meetings shall be accessible to the public. All teleconference meetings shall be conducted in a manner that protects the statutory and constitutional rights of the parties or the public appearing before the Board, including the right of the public to address the Board directly at each teleconference location. (Government Code 54953)

All Board policies, administrative regulations and bylaws shall apply equally to meetings that are teleconferenced. The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate public participation in the meeting at each teleconference location.

Bylaw contains sample language listing permissible electronic communications, protocol for responding to emails received by community members and the press, confidential communications, and disclosure of messages under the Public Records Act. Board Bylaw 9012 is being submitted with recommended language from CSBA.

Board Member Electronic Communications

The Governing Board recognizes that electronic communication among Board members and between Board members, district administration, and members of the public is an efficient and convenient way to communicate and expedite the exchange of information and to help keep the community informed about the goals, programs, and achievements of the district and its schools. Board members shall exercise caution so as to ensure that electronic communications are not used as a means for the Board to deliberate outside of an agendized Board meeting.

A majority of the Board shall not, outside of an authorized meeting, use a series of electronic communications of any kind, directly or through intermediaries, to discuss, deliberate, or take action on any item that is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board. (Government Code 54952.2)

Examples of permissible electronic communications concerning district business include, but are not limited to, dissemination of Board meeting agendas and agenda packets, reports of activities from the Superintendent, and reminders regarding meeting times, dates, and places.

Board members shall make every effort to ensure that their electronic communications conform to the same standards and protocols established for other forms of communication. A Board member may respond, as appropriate, to an electronic communication received from a member of the community and should make clear that his/her response does not necessarily reflect the views of the Board as a whole. Any complaint or request for information should be forwarded to the Superintendent in accordance with Board bylaws and protocols so that the issue may receive proper consideration and be handled through the appropriate district process. As appropriate, communication received from the press shall be forwarded to the designated district spokesperson.
