

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Board does provide public notice that the attached calculations and documentation of the Gann limits for the 2011-12 and 2012-13 fiscal years are made in accord with applicable constitutional and statutory law;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Board does hereby declare that the appropriations in the Budget for the 2011-12 and 2012-13 fiscal years do not exceed the limitations imposed by Proposition 4;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Superintendent provides copies of this resolution along with the appropriate attachments to interested citizens of this district.

The Superintendent or designee shall encourage early detection and treatment in a manner that minimizes disruption to the educational program and reduces student absences. believes that The district's head lice management program should emphasize the correct diagnosis and treatment of head lice in order to minimize disruption of the education process and to reduce the number of student absences resulting from infestation. In consultation with the school nurse, the Superintendent or designee may establish a routine screening program to help prevent the spread of head lice.

The Superintendent or designee may distribute information to parents/guardians of preschool and elementary students regarding routine screening, symptoms, accurate diagnosis, and proper treatment of head lice infestations.

School employees shall report all suspected cases of head lice to the school nurse or designee as soon as possible. The nurse or designee shall examine the student and any siblings of affected students or members of the same household.

If a student is found with active, adult head lice, he/she shall be excluded from attendance. The parent/guardian of any such student an excluded student shall be given receive information about recommended treatment of head lice and encouraged to begin treatment of the student immediately and to check all members of the family. The parent/guardian also shall be informed that the student shall be checked upon return to school the next day and allowed to remain in school if no active head lice are detected. procedures and sources of further information. The student shall be allowed to return to school the next day following treatment and shall be checked by the nurse or designee before returning to class. Once he/she is determined to be free of active, adult head lice, the student shall be rechecked weekly for up to six weeks.

Career Technical Education

The Governing Board desires to provide a comprehensive career technical education (CTE) program in *secondary grades* grades 7-12 which integrates core academic instruction with technical and occupational instruction in order to increase student achievement, graduation rates, and readiness for postsecondary education and employment. The district's CTE program shall be designed to help students develop the academic, career, and technical skills needed to succeed in a knowledge- and skills-based economy. The program shall include a rigorous academic component and provide students with a strong experience and understanding of all aspects of an industry.

The District's CTE program shall focus on preparing students to enter current or emerging high-skill, high-wage, and/or high-demand occupations. CTE opportunities may be offered through linked learning programs, partnership academies, apprenticeship programs or orientation to apprenticeships, regional occupational centers or programs, tech prep programs, charter schools, small learning communities, or other programs that expose students to career options while preparing them for future careers in a given industry or interest area.

The Board shall review and approve all district plans and applications for the use of state and/or federal funds supporting CTE.

The Board shall adopt standards for CTE which meet or exceed the state's model content standards and describe the essential knowledge and skills that students enrolled in these courses are expected to master. The course curriculum shall be aligned with district-adopted standards and the state's curriculum framework.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop partnerships with local businesses and industries to ensure that *course sequences*, *career technical and integrated curriculum*, classroom instruction *and projects*, *and assessments* have real-world relevance and reflects labor market needs and priorities. He/she also shall work to develop connections with *businesses*, *postsecondary institutions*, *community organizations*, *and/or* employers to provide students with *actual and simulated* work-based learning opportunities.

In addition, secondary students shall receive individualized career guidance and academic counseling which provides information about academic and CTE opportunities related to the student's career goals.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers of CTE courses possess the qualifications and credentials necessary to teach their assigned courses. He/she also shall provide teachers and administrators with professional development designed to enhance their knowledge of standards-aligned CTE and shall provide opportunities for CTE teachers to collaborate with teachers of academic courses in the development and implementation of integrated curriculum models. ways to integrate technical and occupational instruction with academic instruction.

Nondiscrimination

The district's program shall provide equal access to and shall not unlawfully discriminate against students who are members of special populations. Special populations include, but are not limited to, students with disabilities; students from economically disadvantaged families, including foster youth; single parents and single pregnant females; displaced homemakers; students with limited English proficiency; and students preparing for nontraditional fields. Nontraditional fields include occupations or fields of work, including careers in computer science, technology, and other emerging high-skill occupations, for which individuals from one gender constitute less than 25 percent of the individuals employed in each such occupation or field of work. (20 USC 2302, 2354, 2373)

Prior to the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall advise students, parents/guardians, employees, and the general public that all CTE opportunities are offered without regard to *any actual or perceived characteristic protected from discrimination by law.* race, color, national origin, sex, or disability. (34 CFR 100.B, 104.8, 106.9)

The above notification shall be disseminated in languages other than English as needed and shall state that the district will take steps to ensure that the lack of English language skills will not be a barrier to admission and participation in the district's CTE program. (20 USC 2354)

School and Community Involvement Advisory Committee

The Board shall appoint a CTE advisory committee to develop recommendations on the district's CTE program and to serve as a liaison between the district and potential employers. The

committee shall consist of at least one student, teacher, business representative, industry representative, school administrator, member of the general public knowledgeable about the disadvantaged, and representative of the field office of the California Employment Development Department.one or more representatives of the general public knowledgeable about the disadvantaged; students; teachers; business; industry; school administration; (Education Code 8070)

The Board shall monitor and evaluate the achievement of students participating in the district's CTE program. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board on program enrollment and completion rates, including enrollment and completion of programs in nontraditional fields as defined in 20 USC 2302; student academic assessment results; attainment of career and technical skill proficiencies; attainment of a high school diploma or equivalent; graduation rates; and subsequent placement in postsecondary education or advanced training, military service, or employment.




SUBJECT: Monthly Board Report

Our Parent/Teacher Conferences are over and the teachers are working on the Desired Results Developmental Profile (DRDP) for each child. The DRDP is an ongoing assessment that uses anecdotal records, work samples, and photos to document the child's abilities and developmental stages. The DRDP helps the teacher plan activities that enhance and expand the child's abilities.

In November we will be starting three Parent & Child Together classes. This is a requirement for our First 5 grant and has been a challenge to get up and running. We have an infant massage class for newborns to 6 months old beginning November 6; a Yoga class for walkers to 24 months beginning November 8; and a Play & Learn class for 18 months to 30 months beginning November 19.

On October 20th, all of the teachers and I attended a "Makeshop" a hands on exploratory experience exploring what making and tinkering can look like for preschoolers and kindergarteners. This was a really fun day learning scientific terminology for electricity, circuits, motors, and wind tunnels. The best part is we made a car that runs!! Three years ago we spent a great deal of time and research trying to get our robot to move, but none of us had enough knowledge about motors and gears. We also learned about circuits, getting lights and buzzers to work, and playing music with bananas. It was a fascinating day.
