2011 SUMMER SCHOOL REPORT

INFORMATION/DISCUSSION

ISSUE:

To receive a report detailing the 2011summer school program administered by Friends of Oak Park Schools.

BACKGROUND:

During the 2010-2011 school year the board of education made a decision not to offer a 2011 summer school program due to a decrease in state funding for all hourly programs. As a result of this decision Friends of Oak Park Schools agreed to investigate the possibility of administering the program The Friends board approved the concept and this resulted in a grades 5-12 program that was tuition based. Both remedial and enrichment classes were offered in all grade levels. An elementary program for grades 1-4 was offered, but the interest level was not sufficient to be able to run the program. Friends of Oak Park Schools is open to adding an elementary program in the future should the interest level be enough to support the operating costs.

A written report detailing the results of the secondary program is attached for the board's review and the summer school administrator will be in attendance to answer any questions related to the summer school.

The Governing Board recognizes *that* the health-hazards associated with smoking and the use of tobacco products, including the breathing of second-hand smoke, *are inconsistent with its goal* and desires to provide a healthy environment for students and staff.

Any written joint use agreement governing community use of district facilities or grounds shall include notice of the district's tobacco-free schools policy and consequences for violations of the policy.

The Board prohibits the use of tobacco products at any time in district-owned or leased buildings, on district property and in district vehicles. (Health and Safety Code 104420; Labor Code 6404.5; 20 USC 6083)

This prohibition applies to all employees, students and visitors at any instructional program, activity or athletic event.

Smoking or use of any tobacco-related products and disposal of any tobacco-related waste are prohibited within 25 feet of any playground, except on a public sidewalk located within 25 feet of the playground. (Health and Safety Code 104495)

Employee Security

The Governing Board desires to provide a safe, orderly working environment for all employees. As part of the district's comprehensive school safety plan, the Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for protecting employees from potentially dangerous persons and situations and for *providing* assisting them with the necessary assistance and support when in the event of an emergency situations occur.

Any employee against whom violence or any threat of violence has been directed in the workplace shall notify the Superintendent or designee immediately. The Superintendent or designee shall initiate legal and security measures to protect the employee and others in the workplace. In addition, the Superintendent or designee may initiate legal proceedings against any individual to recover damages for injury caused by the willful misconduct of that individual to the person or property of an employee or another person on district premises. When violence is directed against an employee by any individual and the employee so notifies the Superintendent or designee, the Superintendent or designee shall take steps to ensure that appropriate legal measures are instituted. When the employee notifies the Superintendent or designee of a threat of bodily harm, the district shall take appropriate measures to enable the employee to request assistance if a threat occurs on school grounds.

The district shall provide such communications devices in classrooms to the extent possible.

Employees may not carry or possess pepper spray on school property or at school activities. On a case-by-case basis, however, the Superintendent or designee may allow *an employee to possess* the possession of a pepper spray weapon that meets the requirements of Penal Code 12403.7 when justified by unusual dangerous circumstances. Any employee who is negligent or careless in the possession or handling of pepper spray shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary measures.

- 1. Confiscate the object and deliver it to the principal immediately
- 2. Immediately notify the principal, who shall take appropriate action
- 3. Immediately notify the local law enforcement agency call 911 and the principal

The Governing Board recognizes that tobacco use presents serious health risks and desires to provide support and assistance in reducing the number of students who begin or continue to use tobacco. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive program that includes consistent enforcement of laws prohibiting tobacco possession and use by students, tobacco-use prevention education, and intervention and cessation activities and/or referrals. the prevention and intervention of tobacco use among youth.

When two-thirds of the members present, or if less than two-thirds of the members are present then by a unanimous vote of all members present, determine that the need to take immediate action came to the district's attention after the agenda was posted. The Board determines, either by a two-thirds majority vote of the members present at the meeting or, if less than two thirds of the members are present, by a unanimous vote of all members present,

Challenging Board Actions

Any interested person or the district attorney's office may present a demand that the Board cure and to-correct a Board action which he/she alleges is in violation of Government Code 54954.2 (agenda posting), Government Code 54953 (open meeting and teleconferencing), Government Code 54954.5 (closed session item descriptions), Government Code 54954.6 (new or increased tax assessments), Government Code 54956 (special meetings), or Government Code 54956.5 (emergency meetings). Any demand to "cure and correct" an alleged violation shall clearly describe the challenged action and the nature of the alleged violation *and* shall be presented to the Board in writing within 90 days of the date when the action was taken. If the alleged violation concerns action taken in an open session but in violation of Government Code 54954.2 (agenda posting), the written demand must be made within 30 days of the date when the alleged action took place. (Government Code 54960.1)

Staff shall use preventative measures and positive conflict resolution techniques whenever possible. In addition, discipline shall be used in a manner that corrects student behavior without intentionally creating an adverse effect on student learning or health.

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The Oak Park Unified School District supports a "Progressive Discipline Policy" and associated practice because this approach provides a logical, escalating sequence to consequences while informing students and parents at the earliest level where rehabilitation might be employed. The selection process shall invite recommendations from administrators, teachers, other staff, parents/guardians and students as appropriate.

REGISTRATION DEBRIEF

All the staff and parents involved in organizing the registration process had a very productive meeting where we reviewed the processes to improve next year's registration. The consensus was that this year's registration was significantly improved over last year. Specifically, having all the new students register on their respective days rather than having a special day for new and out of district students was well received. Changes to the course selection procedures, especially how students select Zero period classes eased the pressure and wait times in the counseling office. Also, ensuring that we had sufficient lockers and locks, textbooks, and PE clothes on hand eliminated many of the frustrations expressed last year. Lastly, the proactive measures taken to communicate and facilitate the new Pertussis vaccination requirements were very successful and we had 100% compliance by the first day of school with no lost ADA revenue.

FACILITIES

In addition to the modernization projects, we just acquired a new three-color electronic Marquee for the front of the school. The old one was in disrepair and ASB and PFC combined to provide the funding for the new replacement. We also bought one to be installed in Quad area to broadcast events and news to the students. We are hoping to repurpose one of the older panels and install it on the College and Career Center to announce college visits and happenings. ASB has purchased a now sound system for rallies and ASB events so that we can allow the Pavilion sound project to move forward independent of ASB. We also have some progress with the Pavilion sound system and have fixed the "house" system. This means that for the first time in years we will not be using portable speakers and amps for the Drama and Choral productions. There is still work to be done and we are working with community members and industry professionals to complete the project. We have a lot of confidence that we will make progress in the coming weeks.

We recently had an incident of graffiti vandalism and the new surveillance cameras helped us find and identify the culprits and restitution is being arranged.

Back to School Activities

OPHS held a very successful back to school night with great turnout and I received many very positive comments from parents and teachers who did a great job of showcasing what students will be learning in their classes this year.

ASB held a very spirited Back to School rally, the highlight was another choreographed dance performed by the teachers and administration. It is on Youtube. Club week was held in the Pavillion and the students were out in force with all sorts of clubs ranging from Beekeeping to Operation Smile. Our Rocket Club held its first launch of the year with only minor malfunctions.

NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

This year, seven OPHS seniors were selected as Semi-finalists for the 2011-12 National Merit Scholarship Program. Fifteen students were also recognized as National Merit Commended Scholars. Semi-finalists represent the top one percent of each state's high school seniors, and Commended Scholars the top 3%.

COLLEGE KNOWLEDGE NIGHT

Through a collaborative effort between Calabasas, Oak Park, and Agoura PFCs, an evening of workshops ranging from financial aid and essay writing, to the application process of public and private colleges and universities was presented to parents and students from all local schools at Agoura High School on October 13.

OPHS MAC REPRESENTATIVE

The OPHS Student representative to the MAC was selected through an application process that included a written statement of intent and interview. Meral Arik will be in the position and is to be congratulated for having a firm understanding of school and community issues and a commitment to improvement on both fronts.

SCHOOL SITE COUNCIL

School Site Council held it's first meeting and has full representation with some spots still to be filled.

SAFE SCHOOL AMBASSADORS

OPHS Safe School Ambassadors will hold their annual Kick-Off event on October 12-13, and promises to be a very positive start to this year's program.

SCHOOL SAFETY

We have focused our attention this October on school safety with several activities including a full review of our safety and disaster procedures.
