This mandated Board Policy is revised and reorganized to address certain privacy issues related to students and/or their parents/guardians, including the administration of surveys and physical exams/screenings, parent/guardian rights to inspect instructional materials, and the collection of personal information for marketing purposes.

- e. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 3100 Budget First Reading

  Updated policy expands section on "Fund Balance" to include sample policy statements, in compliance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 54, related to 1) how funds will be committed by the board to the "committed fund balance," 2) delegation of the authority to assign funds to the "assigned fund balance," 3) the order in which fund balances will be spent when multiple fund balance types are available for an expenditure, and 4) the minimum level of unrestricted fund balances that will be maintained in the general fund. Policy also reflects new law (SB 70) which extends the timeline for restoring the level of reserves to the level specified in state relations and new law (AB 114) which requires districts, for the 2011-12 fiscal year, to base their budget on the same level of state revenues in the 2010-11 fiscal year.
- f. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 3280 Sale or Lease of District-Owned Real Property First Reading 63

  Policy updated to reflect new law (SB 70, 2011) which extends, until July 1, 2014, the authorization to use the proceeds from the sale of surplus real property, along with the proceeds from any personal property located on such surplus real property, for any one-time general fund purpose. Date in text deleted to eliminate the need for additional revision if flexibility is extended in the future.
- g. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 3290 Gifts, Grants, and Bequests First Reading

  Revised policy includes language requiring annual report to te board of gifts, grants, and bequests received by the district and the expenditure of any monetary gifts. Policy also includes 1) new section on "Appreciation" which lists authorized forms of appreciation for donations to the district, and 2) new section on "Corporate Sponsorship" which authorizes the board to allow outside entities to advertise or promote their products and services within district facilities in exchange for funds, products, and services provided by such entities.
- h. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 5145.11 Questioning and Apprehension First Reading
  75
  Policy updated to reflect new court decision (Camreta v. Greene) which vacated the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeal's decision that required law enforcement to have parental consent, warrant, or other court order to interview a student in school absent exigent circumstances.
- i. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 6111 School Calendar First Reading 79

  Updated policy reflects new law (SB 70, 2011) which extends, until the end of the 2014-15

  school year, authorization for districts to reduce the length of the school year without incurring financial penalties.
- j. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 7310 Naming of Facility First Reading
  Updated policy includes new section on "Naming Rights" which authorizes the board to
  enter into a written agreement granting any person or entity the right to name any district
  building or facility. Section on "Memorials" expanded to include commemorative trees,
  monuments, or other district facilities.

k. Approve Amendment to Board Bylaw 9150 – Student Board Members – 1<sup>st</sup> Reading87

Updated bylaw clarifies that student board members must be selected by district high school students. Bylaw also includes new section on "Student Board Member Development" which 1) authorizes student board members to participate in trainings, workshops, and conferences at district expense to enhance their knowledge, understanding, and performance of board responsibilities and 2) authorizes the superintendent to provide an orientation to student board member candidates regarding board responsibilities.

ISSUE:		Shall the Board approve Resolution #11-21 authorizing emergency repairs to classrooms and offices due to water damage at Oak Hills Elementary School?			
BACKGROUND:		At Oak Hills Elementary School, a cleaning solution dispenser located in a custodial room and connected to an active water line failed, flooding classrooms and offices over the weekend of October 22-23, 2011. The affected areas include rooms 10, 11, and 12, the computer lab, and a series of adjacent offices. Upon discovery of the damage on October 24, 2011, the District immediately engaged property damage and mold remediation experts Pacific Property Restoration, Inc. to correct the problem. As of November 4 2011, all remediation was completed and the affected areas tested and declared free of mold and toxins by a certified industrial hygienist Restoration of the classrooms, offices and computer lab is scheduled to begin on November 7 and is expected to take 10 days to complete. - WHEREAS, at Oak Hills Elementary School, a cleaning solution dispenser, located in a custodial room and connected to an active water line, failed and flooded classrooms 10, 11, and 12, the computer lab, and a series of adjacent offices during the weekend of October 22-23, 2011, and
- WHEREAS, said flooding created mold and caused extensive damage to floors, walls, and cabinetry walls to the classrooms, offices and computer lab that posed a clear and imminent danger requiring immediate action to prevent or mitigate the impairment of life, health, property, or essential public services, and
- WHEREAS, the District must contract with certified industrial hygienists, mold remediation and property restoration experts, and similar trades to return the affected areas to a safe and healthy environment for students and staff; and
- WHEREAS, the cost of the of repairs to correct this emergency exceeded the statutory \$15,000 requirement for bidding of contracts specified by the Public Contracts Code (PCC); and
- WHEREAS, time was of the essence and bidding for repairs specified by the Public Contracts Code (PCC) would have created significant delays in resolving the emergency conditions and prevented the continuance of existing school classes; and
- WHEREAS, PCC Section 20113 provides upon unanimous consent of the governing board, and subject to the approval of the Ventura County Superintendent of Schools, for the award of emergency contracts without securing bids when any repair, alteration, work, or improvement is necessary to prevent or correct any condition that poses a clear and imminent danger, requiring immediate action to prevent or mitigate the loss or impairment of life, health, property, or essential public services permit the continuance of existing school classes.
- NOW, THEREFORE, The Board of Education of the Oak Park Unified School District by unanimous vote declares than an emergency exists, and approves and authorizes, subject to approval by the Ventura County Superintendent of Schools, the award of contract for appropriate repairs, remediation, and sanitation, at Oak Hills Elementary School to Pacific Property Restoration, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$55,000.

- Families that host F-1 students receive a monthly stipend to off-set the cost of a teenager in their home. J-1 Host families cannot receive compensation of any kind.

## Who Handles the Host Family Process?

Educatius has local International Coordinators that fully oversee and supervise the entire host family/home stay experience. Each adult member of the host family is screened with a criminal background check, the host family home is visited by the local International Coordinator and a number of references are

#### **Discipline**

The Governing Board desires to prepare students for responsible citizenship by fostering self-discipline and personal responsibility. The Board believes that high expectations for student behavior, effective classroom management and parent involvement can minimize the need for discipline. Staff shall use preventative measures and positive conflict resolution techniques whenever possible. In addition, discipline shall be used in a manner that corrects student behavior without intentionally creating an adverse effect on student learning or health.

Board policies and regulations shall delineate acceptable student conduct and provide the basis for sound disciplinary practices. Each school shall develop disciplinary rules to meet the school's individual needs.

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The Oak Park Unified School District supports a "Progressive Discipline Policy" and associated practice because this approach provides a logical, escalating sequence to consequences while informing students and parents at the earliest level where rehabilitation might be employed. An exception for implementing progressive discipline will be for more serious offenses, which require immediate suspension and mandatory expulsion by law.

At all times, the safety of students and staff and the maintenance of an orderly school environment shall be priorities in determining appropriate discipline. When misconduct occurs, staff shall attempt to identify and address the causes of the student's behavior *and* implement appropriate discipline. *Persistently* disruptive students may be assigned to alternative programs or removed from school in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation.

The Board desires to provide libraries media centers with up-to-date books, reference materials and electronic information resources necessary to promote literacy, support students in achieving academic standards and encourage *prepare* students to become lifelong learners.

#### Classroom Libraries for Grades K-4

When state funding is available for library materials in grades K-4 classrooms, the Superintendent or designee shall develop, for certification by the Board, a districtwide classroom library plan for grades K-4. The plan shall include a means of preventing loss, damage or destruction of the materials. (Education Code 60242, 60422)

The Superintendent or designee is encouraged to consult with primary grade teachers and school *librarians employed by the district* and/or county office of education library media teachers in the development of the *K-4 classroom library* plan and to consider selections from the list of books recommended by the State Librarian pursuant to Education Code 19336.

The district's school libraries may provide: (5 CCR 16040)

Selection and Evaluation of Library Materials

Library materials shall include print and electronic resources that align with the curriculum and are accessible to students with varying cognitive or language needs.

Responsibility for the selection of library materials is delegated to the professional library staff through the principal. School librarians shall evaluate and select materials in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall use using professional selection aids and standards, in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation. The selection process shall invite recommendations from administrators, teachers, other staff, parents/guardians and students as appropriate.

- 2. Evaluate and analyze information to determine appropriateness in addressing the scope of inquiry
- 3. Organize, synthesize, create, and communicate information
- 4. Integrate information literacy skills into all areas of learning and pursue information independently to become life-long learners

School librarians also may provide support to teachers, administrators, and other staff by identifying instructional materials that will aid in the development of curriculum and

instructional activities and by providing information about effective and ethical uses of school library services and equipment.

The Governing Board recognizes its critical responsibility for adopting a sound budget for each fiscal year that is aligned with the district's vision, goals and priorities. The district budget shall guide administrative decisions and actions throughout the year and serve as a tool for monitoring the fiscal health of the district.

The district budget shall show a complete plan and itemized statement of all proposed expenditures and all estimated revenues for the current year and two subsequent years, and include following fiscal year, together with a comparison of revenues and expenditures for the current fiscal year. The budget shall also include the appropriations limit and the total annual appropriations subject to limitation as determined pursuant to Government Code 7900-7914. (Education Code 42122)

#### Budget Development and Adoption Process

The Superintendent or designee shall establish an annual budget development process and calendar in accordance with the single budget adoption process described in Education Code 42127(i). He/she shall annually notify the County Superintendent of Schools of the district's decision to use the single budget adoption process in the subsequent year.

In order to provide guidance in the development of the budget, the Board shall annually establish budget priorities based on identified district needs and goals and on realistic projections of available funds.

The Superintendent or designee shall oversee the preparation of a proposed district budget for approval by the Board and shall involve appropriate staff at all levels in the development of budget projections.

The Board encourages public input in the budget development process and shall hold public hearings and meetings in accordance with Education Code 42103 and 42127.

#### **Budget Criteria and Standards**

In developing the district budget, the Board shall analyze criteria and standards adopted by the State Board of Education which address estimation of funded average daily attendance (ADA), projected enrollment, ratio of ADA to enrollment, projected revenue limit, salaries and benefits, other revenues and expenditures, facilities maintenance, deficit spending, fund balance, and reserves. The budget review shall also identify supplemental information regarding contingent liabilities, use of one-time revenues for ongoing expenditures, use of ongoing revenues for one-time expenditures, contingent revenues, contributions, long-term commitments, unfunded liabilities, and the state of labor agreements. (Education Code 33127, 33128, 33129; 5 CCR 15440-15451)

The Board shall establish and maintain a general fund reserve for economic uncertainty that meets or exceeds the requirements of *law*. 5 CCR 15450. (Education Code 33128.3; 5 CCR 15440)

The Board may establish other budget assumptions or parameters which may take into consideration the stability of funding sources, legal requirements and constraints on the use of funds, anticipated increases and/or decreases in the cost of services and supplies, categorical program requirements, and any other factors necessary to ensure that the budget is a realistic

plan for district revenues and expenditures.

#### Fund Balance

The district shall classify fund balances in compliance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement 54 as follows:

- 1. Non spendable fund balance includes amounts that are not expected to be converted to cash, such as resources that are not in a spendable form (e.g., inventories and prepaids) or that are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.
- 2. Restricted fund balance includes amounts constrained to specific purposes by their providers or by law.
- 3. Committed fund balance includes amounts constrained to specific purposes by the Board.

For this purpose, all commitments of funds shall be approved by a majority vote of the Board. The constraints shall be imposed no later than the end of the reporting period of June 30, although the actual amounts may be determined subsequent to that date but prior to the issuance of the financial statements.

4. Assigned fund balance includes amounts which the Board or its designee intends to use for a specific purpose.

The Board delegates authority to assign funds to the assigned fund balance to the Superintendent or designee and authorizes the assignment of such funds to be made any time prior to the issuance of the financial statements.

5. Unassigned fund balance includes amounts that are available for any purpose.

When multiple types of funds are available for an expenditure, the district shall first utilize funds from the restricted fund balance as appropriate, then from the committed fund balance, then from the unassigned fund balance.

To protect the district against unforeseen circumstances such a revenue shortfalls and unanticipated expenditures, the Board intends to maintain a minimum unassigned fund balance which includes a reserve for economic uncertainties equal to at least two months of

general fund operating expenditures, or 17 percent of general fund expenditures and other financing uses.

If the unassigned fund balance falls below this level due to an emergency situation, unexpected expenditures, or revenues shortfalls, the Board shall develop a plan to recover the fund balance which may include dedicating new unrestricted revenues, reducing expenditures, and/or increasing revenues or pursuing other funding sources.

### **Long-Term Financial Obligations**

The district's current-year budget and multi-year projects shall include adequate provisions for addressing the district's long-term financial obligations, including, but not limited to, long-term obligations resulting from collective bargaining agreements, financing of facilities projects, unfunded or future liability for retiree benefits, and accrued workers' compensation claims.

#### **Budget Amendments**

Whenever revenues and expenditures change significantly throughout the year, the Superintendent or designee shall recommend budget amendments to ensure accurate projections of the district's net ending balance. When final figures for the previous year budget are available, this information shall be used as soon as possible to update the current-year budget's beginning balance and projected revenues and expenditures.

In addition, budget amendments shall be submitted for Board approval when the state budget is adopted, collective bargaining agreements are accepted, district income declines, increased revenues or unanticipated savings are made available to the district, program proposals are significantly different from those approved during budget adoption, interfund transfers are needed to meet actual program expenditures, and/or other significant changes occur that impact budget projections.

#### Sale or Lease of District-Owned Real Property

The Governing Board believes that the district should utilize its facilities and resources in the most economical and practical manner. The Superintendent or designee shall periodically study the current and projected use of all district facilities in order to ensure the efficient utilization of space and the effective delivery of instruction.

Upon determination that district property is no longer needed or may not be needed until some future time, the Board shall offer to sell or lease district-owned real property in accordance with priorities and procedures specified in law, including, but not limited to, Education 17230, 17464, 17485-17500, and Government Code 54222.

When required by law, *Prior to the sale or lease of any surplus real property*, the Board shall appoint a district advisory committee to advise the Board in the development of policies and procedures governing the use or disposition of schools or school building space which is not needed for school purposes. ### Resolution of Intention to Sell or Lease

Before ordering the sale or lease of any real property, the Board shall adopt a resolution at a regular, open meeting, by a two-thirds vote of all of its members. The resolution shall describe the property proposed to be sold or leased in such a manner as to identify it, specify the minimum price or rent, describe the terms upon which it will be sold or leased, and specify the commission or rate, if any, which the Board will pay to a licensed real estate broker out of the minimum price or rent. The resolution shall fix a time, not less than three weeks thereafter, for a public meeting, held at the Board's regular meeting place, at which sealed proposals to purchase or lease will be received and considered. (Education Code 17466)

The Superintendent or designee shall provide notice of the adoption of the resolution and of the time and place of the meeting that will be held to consider bids by posting copies of the resolution, signed by the Board, in three public places not less than 15 days before the date of the meeting. weeks before the meeting, in a newspaper of general circulation published in the county in which the district is located if such a newspaper exists. (Education Gode 17469)

The Superintendent or designee shall take reasonable steps to provide notification to the former owners of the property of the district's intent to sell it in accordance with Education Code 17470.

#### Acceptance/Rejection of Bids

At a public meeting specified in the resolution of intention to sell or lease property, the Board shall open, examine, and declare all sealed bids. Before accepting any written proposal, the Board shall call for oral bids in accordance with law. (Education Code 17472, 17473)

The Board may reject any and all bids, either written or oral, and withdraw the properties from sale when the Board determines that rejection is in the best public interest. If no proposals are submitted or the submitted proposals do not conform to all the terms and conditions specified in the resolution of intention to lease, the Board may lease the property in accordance with Education Code 17477 (Education Code 17476, 17477)

Of the proposals submitted by responsible bidders which conform to all terms and conditions specified in the resolution of intention to sell or lease, the Board shall finally accept the highest bid after deducting the commission, if any, to be paid to a licensed real estate broker, unless the Board accepts a higher oral bid or rejects all bids. (Education Code 17472)

The final acceptance of the bid may be made either at the same meeting specified in the resolution or at any adjourned/continued meeting held within 10 days. Upon acceptance of the bid, the Board may adopt a resolution of acceptance that directs the Board president, or any other Board member, to execute the deed or lease and to deliver the document upon performance and compliance by the successful bidder of all the terms and conditions of the contract. The Governing Board may accept any gift, grant, or bequest or gift of money, or property, or service to the district from any individual, private agency or organization, or other public agency that desires to support the district's educational program. on behalf of the district. While greatly appreciating suitable donations, the Board shall reject discourages any gifts which may directly or indirectly impair its authority to make decisions in the best interest of district students or its ability or commitment to provide equitable commitment to providing equal educational opportunities. for all district students.

When any gift of money received by the district is not immediately used, it shall be placed in the county treasury in accordance with law. (Education Code 41030-410031)

The Superintendent or designee shall annual provide a report to the Board indicating the gifts, grants, and/or bequests received on behalf of the district in the preceding fiscal year. The report shall include a statement of account and expenditure of all gifts of money and an inventory of all gifts of physical assets.

#### Corporate Sponsorship

The Board may enter into an agreement or arrangement with an outside entity for the sponsorship of an educational, athletic, or other program or activity. When appropriate, the agreement may allow the outside entity to advertise or promote its business, product, or service in district publications or on district property or web sites.

Every sponsorship agreement shall be in writing and shall be approved by the Board. The Board shall ensure that the district's relationship and arrangement with the sponsor are consistent with the district's mission, values, and goals. Any advertising or promotional message, image, or other depiction to be used by the sponsor shall meet the standards set for commercial advertising on district property and in district-sponsored publications. No message, image, or other depiction that promotes the use of obscene language, pornography, alcohol, tobacco, or prohibited drugs or that advocates unlawful discrimination, use of violence, or the violation of law or district policy shall be allowed.

Each sponsorship agreement shall contain statements including, but not limited to:

- 1. The purpose of the relationship with the sponsor, details of the benefits to the district, and how the benefits will be distributed.
- 2. The duration of the agreement and the roles, expectations, rights, and responsibilities of the district and the sponsor, including whether and to what extent the sponsor is allowed to advertise or promote its products and/or services.
- 3. The authority of the Board to retain exclusive right over the use of the district's name, logo, and other proprietary information. The sponsor's use of such information shall require prior approval of the Board.
- 4. The authority of the Board to terminate the agreement without any penalty or sanction to the district if the sponsor's message, business, or product becomes inconsistent with district vision, mission, or goals or the sponsor engages in any prohibited activity.
- 5. The prohibition against the collection of students' personal information except as allowed by law.

## Questioning And Apprehension

The Governing Board is believes that the safety of district students and staff is essential to achieving the goal of student learning. In accordance with standards specified in law, law enforcement officers may interview and question students on school premises and may remove them when appropriate. committed to providing a safe learning environment and cooperating with law enforcement officials and peace officers as necessary to help ensure the safety of students, staff, and the community and in carrying out their official duties.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with local law enforcement agencies to establish procedures which enable law enforcement officers to carry out their duties on campus, including, when necessary, the questioning and/or apprehensive of students. develop parameters under which law enforcement officers will interview students at school.

When any law enforcement official requests an interview with a student, the principal or designee shall request the officer's that the official provide verification of his/her identity, his/her and official capacity and eertify the legal authority under which the interview is being to be conducted. If the officer refuses to provide certification of the legal authority for the interview, the principal or designee shall document such refusal and should consult with district legal counsel, as appropriate, before allowing the interview to proceed. The principal or designee shall maintain a record of all documentation relative to law enforcement interviews of students.

If the officer needs to interview or question the student immediately, the principal or designee shall accommodate the process in a way that causes the least possible disruption for the student and school, gives the student appropriate privacy, and models exemplary cooperation with law enforcement authorities.

The principal or designee shall accommodate the interview in a way that causes the least possible disruption for the student and school and provides the student appropriate privacy.

At the law officer's discretion and with the student's approval, the principal or designee may be present during the interview.

Except in cases of child abuse or neglect, the principal or designee shall attempt to notify the student's parent/guardian as soon as practicable after law enforcement has interviewed the student on school premises.

If a-minor student is removed from school into the custody of law enforcement, the principal or designee shall immediately notify the parent/guardian or responsible relative regarding the student's release and the place to which he/she is reportedly being taken, except when the minor has been taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse. (Education Code 48906)

### Subpoenas

Although subpoenas may legally be served at school on students age 12 or older, the Board believes that serving officials should be strongly urged to serve subpoenas at the home of the student whenever possible. When served at school, the principal or designee shall take all reasonable steps to ensure a minimum of embarrassment of protect the student's privacy rights and to minimize loss of class time for the student.

## Naming of Facility

It is the intent of the Governing Board that a name be selected for each new school early in the planning process. The Board of Education will make its selection from names suggested by students.

All names shall relate to the geography, ecology, anthropology, or history of the Oak Pak area. The following criteria should also be considered in the selection of a name:

- 1. Not more than four syllables
- 2. A name that is easily pronounced
- 3. A name that is easily spelled
- 4. A word not easily debased by slang use

The Governing Board places the following limitations on names suggested, and will not accept any suggested names which violate these limitations:

- 1. No school facility will be named for a living person.
- 2. No school facility will be given the name of a commercial development unless the name existed in the area prior to the development.

### **Dedication of Facility**

There shall be a formal public dedication of all new schools and major additions to existing schools.

The Governing Board shall name district schools and other district-owned or leased buildings, grounds, and facilities in recognition of:

- 1. Individuals, living or deceased, and entities that have made outstanding contributions, including financial contributions, to the school community
- Individuals, living or deceased, who have made contributions of statewide, national or worldwide significance
- 3. The geographic area in which the school or building is located

The Board encourages community participation in the process of selecting names. A citizen advisory committee shall be appointed to review name suggestions and submit recommendations for the Board's consideration.

Before adopting any proposed name, the Board shall hold a public hearing at which members of the public will be given an opportunity to provide input.

When naming or renaming a district school, building or facility, the Board may specify the duration for which the name shall be in effect.

## **Memorials**

Upon request, the Board shall consider planning commemorative trees, erecting monuments, or dedicating building, parts of buildings, athletic fields, gardens, or other district facilities, in memory of deceased students, staff members, community members, and benefactors of the district.

### Naming Rights

The Board may grant to any person or entity the right to name any district building or facility. In doing so, the Board shall enter into a written agreement which shall:

- 1. Specify the benefits to the district from entering into the agreement
- 2. State the roles and responsibilities of the parties to the agreement, including whether or not the Board shall retain the power to approve any proposed name
- 3. Provide details related to the name right granted, including the building, grounds, or facility involved and the duration for which the name shall be in effect
- 4. Prohibit any message, image, or other depiction that advocates or endorses the use of drugs, tobacco, or alcohol, encourages unlawful discrimination against any person or

## Student Board Members

The Governing Board believes that engaging the study body and seeking its input and feedback regarding the district's educational programs and activities are vital to achieving the district's mission of education district students. To enhance communication between the Board and the student body and to encourage student involvement in district affairs, it is important to seek out and consider students' ideas, viewpoints and reactions to the educational program. In order to provide student input and involvement, the Board shall include at least one (1) student Board member(s) selected by the district's high school students in accordance with procedures approved by the Board.

The term of student Board members shall be one ealendar year, commencing on July 1 of each year. A Student Board members shall have the right to attend all Board meetings except closed (executive) sessions. (Education Code 35012)

A Student Board members shall be seated with regular other members of the Board, members and be In addition, a Student Board member shall be recognized at Board meetings as a full members, shall receive all materials presented to other Board members except those related to closed sessions, They and may participate in questioning witnesses and discussing issues. (Education Code 35012)

A Student Board member(s) may cast preferential votes on all matters except those subject to closed session discussion. Preferential votes shall be cast prior to the official Board vote and shall not affect the final numerical outcome of a vote. Preferential votes shall be recorded in the Board meeting minutes. (Education Code 35012)

A Student Board member(s) may make motions that may be acted upon by the Board, except on matters dealing with employer-employee relations pursuant to Government Code 3540-3549.3. (Education Code 35012)

A Student Board members may shall be reimbursed for mileage to the same extent as other members of the Board but shall not receive compensation for attendance at Board meetings. (Education Code 35012)

## Student Board Member Development

As necessary, the Superintendent or designee shall, at district expense, provide learning opportunities to Student Board members, through trainings, workshops, and conferences, to enhance their knowledge, understanding, and performance of their Board responsibilities.

Our 5<sup>th</sup> grade students participated in an incredible learning experience on our Santa Cruz Island adventure. Students easily conquered a rather rough crossing and arrived on the island eager to explore this beautiful place they have been studying. They observed several Island Foxes that are found nowhere else on earth. They met with a research biologist and discussed her work with the National Park Service studying these rare animals. They learned first-hand about the delicate balance of the island ecosystem. They also enjoyed a hike with spectacular views of Anacapa Island, explored diatomaceous earth, and discovered Chumash midden sites that are thousands of years old.

On our return trip we followed groups of feeding dolphins, a pod of Humpback whales, and experienced a feeding frenzy where thousands of marine birds of every variety joined the whales, dolphins, and California sea lions in a carefully choreographed feast. Researchers and filmmakers spend years traveling all over the world in search of experiences like this, and there we were right in the middle of it. Science was happening all around us, and there is no better learning experience than that. We owe a huge thank you to Ms. West and Dr. Knight for making this trip possible.

On Monday morning, October 24<sup>th</sup>, staff arrived at Oak Hills to discover that a plumbing leak had flooded several classrooms over the weekend. The water reached all three 3<sup>rd</sup> grade classrooms, along with the Computer Lab, Math Lab, Literacy Room, EL Room, Psychologist Office, Custodial Office, and several small offices and storage closets.

Thanks to some quick action and incredible teamwork, we were able to continue all classes and instructional programs with minimal disruption. Our teachers, support staff, maintenance staff, guest teachers, and parent volunteers did an amazing job moving classrooms while keeping our students actively engaged in their learning. Our students also did a great job throughout this unexpected adventure. The following adjustments have been implemented to keep all our educational programs up and running:

Mrs. Reints (3<sup>rd</sup> Grade) has moved to the Music Room Classroom (Rm.19)

Mrs. Arnold (3<sup>rd</sup> Grade) has relocated to Literacy Classroom (Rm. 23)

Mrs. Deel (3<sup>rd</sup> Grade) has been able to return to her classroom.

**Music** for all classes is now being held in the MPR, including the before and after-school Choir programs.

Literacy Support & Math Support was initially held in various locations including the Library, Staff Room, and Cafeteria. We now have three temporary classroom trailers on the playground that are fully set up and working very well.

Computer classes are continuing in the regular classrooms by moving the COW's form room to room.

Occupational Therapy, English Language Support, and Psychologists are able to continue to serve their students in the front office, counselors office, and principal's conference room.

Repairs are moving along rapidly and we fully expect that all programs will be able to continue uninterrupted throughout the rebuilding process.

On Halloween morning, the Oak Hills students, staff and parents enjoyed a traditional costume parade. The students gathered on the playground dressed in their Halloween best. Each class paraded around their schoolmates, while Dr. Knight and our proud parents cheered them on and snapped pictures. A good time was had by all.
