Suspension And Expulsion/Due Process

The Governing Board desires to provide district students access to education opportunities in an orderly school environment that protects their safety and security, ensures their welfare and well-being, and promotes their learning and development. The Board shall develop has established policies rules and regulations setting the standards of behavior expected of district students and the disciplinary processes and procedures for addressing violations of those standards, including suspension and/or expulsion. and standards of behavior in order to promote learning and protect the safety and well-being of all students. When these policies and standards are violated, it may be necessary to suspend or expel a student from regular classroom instruction.

(cf. 5131 – Conduct) (cf. 5144 - Discipline)

The grounds for suspension and expulsion and the procedures for considering, recommending and/or implementing suspension and expulsion shall be those specified in law and/or administrative regulation.

District staff shall enforce the rules concerning suspension and expulsion of students fairly, consistently, and in accordance with the district's nondiscrimination policies.

(cf. 0410 - Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities)

Except where suspension for a first offense is warranted in accordance with law, suspension shall be imposed only when other means of correction fail to bring about proper conduct. (Education Code 48900.5)

Expulsion is an action taken by the Board for severe or prolonged breaches of discipline by a student. Except for single acts of a grave nature or offenses for which suspension or expulsion is required by law, expulsion is shall be used only when there is the student involved has a history of misconduct, when other forms of discipline, including suspension, and other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct, or when the student's presence causes a continuing danger to him/herself or others. (Education Code 48915)

To correct the behavior of students who are subject to discipline, the Superintendent or designee, to the extent allowed by law, shall use alternative disciplinary measures that keep students in school during the day.

Alternatives to suspension or expulsion also shall be used with students who are truant, tardy or otherwise absent from assigned school activities.

Suspended or expelled students shall be denied the privilege of participation in all school-related extracurricular activities during the period of suspension or expulsion.

Progressive Discipline

Although the Oak Park Unified School District follows a progressive approach to student discipline, the acts enumerated in Education Code 48915 ("possessing, selling or otherwise furnishing a firearm; brandishing a knife at another person; unlawfully selling a controlled substance listed in section 11053 of the Health and Safety Code; committing or attempting to commit a sexual assault; and possession of explosives") constitute serious threats to school and individual safety. As a result, they will be dealt with in a swift and appropriate manner as prescribed by Education Code. This approach makes the removal of potentially dangerous students from the classroom a top priority. It ensures fair and equal treatment of all students and requires that all offenders be punished to the fullest extent allowed by law. Staff shall immediately report to the Superintendent or designee any incidence of offenses specified in law, Board policy and administrative regulation as cause for suspension or expulsion.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify staff, students and parents/ guardians about the district's discipline policies and the consequences which may result from student offenses. He/she shall also ensure strict enforcement of these policies.

Student Due Process

The Board shall provide for the fair and equitable treatment of students facing suspension and expulsion by affording them their due process rights under the law. The Superintendent or designee shall comply with procedures for notices and appeals as specified in law *and* administrative regulation and/or. (Education Code 48911, 48915, 48915.5)

Removal from Class by a Teacher and Required-Parental Attendance

The Board believes that parental involvement plays an important role in the resolution of classroom behavior problems. The Board expects that teachers will communicate with parents/guardians when behavior problems arise.

Whenever is removing a student from a class because he/she for committeding an obscene act, engaging in habitual profanity or vulgarity, disrupteding school activities or otherwise willfully defyingied valid staff authority, the teacher of the class from which the student was removed may provide require any that the student's parent/guardian who lives with the student to attend a portion of a school day in that class from which the student was is being suspended, to assist in resolving the classroom behavior problem. (Education Code 48900.1)

Before requiring parental attendance, the teacher shall make reasonable efforts to have the parent/guardian visit the class voluntarily. The teacher also may inform the parent/guardian about available resources and parent education opportunities. Teachers should reserve the option of required parental attendance for cases in which they have determined that it is the best strategy to promote positive interaction between the student and the parent/guardian and to improve classroom behavior.

The Any teacher requiring parental attendance pursuant to this policy shall apply this the policy uniformly to all students within the classroom. This policy shall apply only to a parent/guardian who lives with the student. (Education Code 48900.1)

When a teacher requires parental attendance, the principal shall send a written notice to the parent/guardian stating that his/her attendance is pursuant to law. (Education Code 48900.1)

The notice shall specify that the attendance may be on either the date the student returns to class or within one week thereafter.

A parent/guardian who has received a written notice shall attend class as specified in the notice. After completing the classroom visit and before leaving school premises, the parent/guardian also shall meet with the principal or designee. (Education Code 48900.1)

When a parent/guardian does not respond to the request to attend school, the principal or designee shall contact his/her by telephone, mail, or other means that maintains the confidentiality of the student's records. any parents/guardians who do not respond to the

request to attend school. The Board recognizes that parental compliance with this policy may be delayed, modified or prevented for reasons such as serious illness/injury/disability, absence from town, or inability to get release time from work.

District regulations and school-site rules for student discipline shall include procedures for implementing parental attendance requirements. Parents/guardians shall be notified of this policy prior to its implementation. (Education Code 48900.1)

On-Campus Supervised Suspension Classroom Program

The Board recognizes that students who are suspended from school often have no supervision or guidance during the school hours when they are off campus and may fall behind in the coursework. The Board believes that, in many cases, it would be better to manage the student's behavior by keeping the student at school and providing him/her with supervision that is separated from the regular classroom.

To ensure the proper supervision and ongoing learning of students who are suspended for any of the reasons enumerated in Education Code 48900 and 48900.2, but who pose no imminent danger or threat to anyone at school and for whom expulsion proceedings have not be initiated, the Superintendent or designee shall establish a supervised in house classroom suspension program which meets the requirements of law. The use of such alternatives does not preclude off-campus suspensions. for suspended students for any of the reasons enumerated in Education Code 48900 and 48900.2, who pose no imminent danger or threat at school and for whom an expulsion action has not been initiated.

The Superintendent or designee shall examine alternatives to off-campus suspension and may establish a suspension program which involves progressive discipline during the school day on campus; use of conferences between staff, parents/guardians and students; detention; student study teams or other assessment-related teams; and/or referral to school support services staff. The use of such alternatives does not preclude off-campus suspensions.

<u>Decision Not to Enforce Expulsion Order</u>

In cases where expulsion is mandatory pursuant to Education Code 48915(c), the enforcement of an expulsion order shall not be suspended by the Board. In all other cases of expulsion, the order for expulsion may be suspended by the Board, on case-by-case basis, pursuant to the requirements of law.

Parental Attendance

- (a) The governing board of each school district may adopt a policy authorizing teachers to require the parent or guardian of a pupil who has been suspended by a teacher pursuant to Section 48910 for reasons specified in subdivision (i) or (k) of Section 48900, to attend a portion of a schoolday in the classroom of his or her child or ward. The policy shall take into account reasonable factors that may prevent compliance with a notice to attend. The attendance of the parent or guardian shall be limited to the class from which the pupil was suspended.
- (b) The policy shall be adopted pursuant to the procedures set forth in Sections 35291 and 35291.5. Parents and guardians shall be notified of this policy prior to its implementation. A teacher shall apply any policy adopted pursuant to this section uniformly to all pupils within the classroom.

The adopted policy shall include the procedures that the district will follow to accomplish the following:

- (1) Ensure that parents or guardians who attend school for the purposes of this section meet with the school administrator or his or her designee after completing the classroom visitation and before leaving the schoolsite.
- (2) Contact parents or guardians who do not respond to the request to attend school pursuant to this section.
- (c) If a teacher imposes the procedure pursuant to subdivision (a), the principal shall send a written notice to the parent or guardian stating that attendance by the parent or guardian is pursuant to law. This section shall apply only to a parent or guardian who is actually living with the pupil.
- (d) A parent or guardian who has received a written notice pursuant to subdivision (c) shall attend class as specified in the written notice. The Governing Board recognizes that the district's is primarily responsibility for complying with applicable state and federal laws and regulations governing educational programs. The district shall investigate any complaints alleging failure to comply with such laws and/or alleging unlawful discrimination, and shall seek to resolve those complaints in accordance with the district's uniform complaint procedures. The Board recognizes that a neutral mediator can often suggest a compromise that is agreeable to all parties in a dispute. In accordance with uniform complaint procedures, whenever all parties to a complaint agree to try resolving their problem through mediation, the Superintendent or designee shall initiate that process. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that mediation results are consistent with state and federal laws and regulations.

In investigating complaints, the confidentiality of the parties involved and the integrity of the process shall be protected. As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee may keep the identity of a complainant confidential to the extent that the investigation of the complaint is not obstructed. The Board acknowledges and respects individual's right to privacy. Discrimination complaints shall be investigated in a manner that protects the confidentiality of the parties and the integrity of the process. This may include keeping the identity of the complainant confidential and except to the extent necessary to carry out the investigation or proceedings, as determined by the Superintendent or designee, on a case-by-case basis.

The Governing Board desires to facilitate the preparation of secondary school students for college and career by providing work-based learning opportunities school to career transitions by providing secondary students with a program of work experience education (WEE) which links classroom learning with real-world the academic curriculum with experiences in actual work settings. Work-based learning opportunities offered by the district shall be designed to teach The Superintendent or designee shall encourage programs which provide paid and/or unpaid on-the-job experiences as well as instruction in the skills, attitudes and knowledge necessary for successful employment and to reinforce mastery of both academic and career technical education (CTE) standards.

The Governing Board recognizes the importance of long-range planning for school facilities in order to address changes in student enrollment and in the district's educational program needs. The Superintendent or designee shall develop, for Board approval, a master plan for district facilities which describes the district's anticipated short-and long-term facilities needs and priorities. help meet the changing needs of district students and to help ensure that resources are allocated in an efficient and effective manner. To that end, the Board directs the Superintendent or designee to develop and maintain a master plan for district facilities.

The plan shall describe the district's anticipated short and long term facilities needs and priorities and shall be aligned with the district's educational goals.

<u>Plan Development</u>

The district's facilities master plan shall be based on an assessment of the condition and adequacy of existing facilities, a projection of future enrollments, and alignment of facilities with the district's vision for the instructional program.

To solicit broad input into the planning process, the Superintendent or designee may establish a facilities advisory committee consisting of staff, parents/guardians, and business, local government, and other community representatives. He/she shall also ensure that the public is informed of the need for construction and modernization of facilities and of the district's plan for facilities.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that staff, parents/guardians, students, and business and community representatives are kept informed of the need for construction and modernization of facilities and of the district's plans for facilities. The Superintendent or designee may also establish a facilities committee that shall meet at regular intervals in order to give community members opportunities to provide input into the planning process. The committee may consult local governmental and state planning agencies in order to ensure compliance with local and state standards.

- 3. Demographics of the community, such as economic trends, migration patterns, employment base, residential base, socioeconomic makeup, historical school enrollments, and inventory of physical resources and needs
- 4. A description of the educational program, such as grade-level organization, class size, staffing patterns, technology plans, special programs and support services, and other educational specifications
- 5. Analysis of the safety, adequacy, and equity of existing facilities and potential for expansion, including the adequacy of classrooms, school cafeterias and food preparation areas, physical activity areas, playgrounds, parking areas, and other school grounds

General Obligation Bonds

The Governing Board recognizes that school facilities are an essential component of the educational program and that the Board has a responsibility to ensure that the district's facilities needs are met in the most cost-effective manner possible. When the Board determines that it is in the best interest of district students, it desires to provide adequate facilities in order to enhance curriculum and to help the district achieve its vision for educating district students. To that end, the Board may order an election on the question of whether bonds shall be issued for school facilities when in the Board's judgment it is advisable and in the best interest of district students.

(cf. 1160 – Political Processes) (cf. 7110 - Facilities Master Plan) (cf. 7210 - Facilities Financing)

The Board shall determine the appropriate amount size of the bond in accordance with law.

Bonds Requiring 55% Approval by Local Voters

The Board may decide to pursue the authorization and issuance of bonds by approval of 55% majority of the voters pursuant to Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3) and Article 16, Section 18(b) of the California Constitution. If two-thirds of the Board agree to such an election, the Board shall vote to adopt a resolution to incur bonded indebtedness if approved by a 55% majority of the voters. (Education Code 15266)

The bond election may only be ordered at a primary or general election, a statewide special election, or a regularly scheduled local election at which all of the electors of the school district are entitled to vote. (Education Code 15266)

Bonded indebtedness incurred by the district shall be used only for the *following purposes*: (California Constitution Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3) and 1(b)(3)(A))

- 1. *The* construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities
- 2. The acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities

The proposition approved by the voters shall include the following accountability requirements: (California Constitution Article 13A, Section 1(b)(3))

- 1. A requirement that proceeds from the sale of the bonds be used only for the purposes specified above and not for any other purposes including teacher and administrative salaries and other school operating expenses
- 2. A list of specific school facility projects to be funded and certification that the Board has evaluated safety, class size reduction and information technology needs in developing that list

(cf. 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan)

(cf. 6151 - Class Size)

- 3. A requirement that the Board conduct an annual, independent performance audit to ensure that the funds have been expended only on the specific projects listed
- 4. A requirement that the Board conduct an annual, independent financial audit of the proceeds from the sale of the bonds until all of those proceeds have been expended for the school facilities projects

If a district general obligation bond requiring a 55% majority is approved by the voters, the Board shall appoint an independent citizens' advisory oversight committee. This committee shall be appointed within 60 days of the date that the Board enters the election results in its minutes pursuant to Education Code 15274. (Education Code 15278)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the annual, independent performance and financial audits conducted pursuant to items #3 and #4 above are issued in accordance with the U.S. Comptroller General's Government Auditing Standards. He/she shall submit the audits to the citizens' oversight committee by March 31 of each year. (Education Code 15286)

Bonds Requiring 66.67% Approval by Local Voters

Bonds shall be sold for the purpose of raising money for the following purposes: (Education Code 15100)

- 1. Purchasing school lots
- 2. Building or purchasing school buildings

- 3. Making of alterations or additions to school building(s) other than as may be necessary for current maintenance, operation or repairs
- 4. Repairing, restoring or rebuilding of any school building damaged, injured or destroyed by fire or other public calamity
- 5. Supplying of school buildings and grounds with furniture, equipment or necessary apparatus of a permanent nature
- 6. Permanent improvement of school grounds
- 7. Refunding of any outstanding valid indebtedness of the district, evidenced by bonds or of state school building aid loans
- 8. Carrying out of sewer or drain projects or purposes authorized in Education Code 17577
- 9. Purchase of school buses with a useful life of at least 20 years
- 10. Demolition or razing of any school building with the intent to replace it with another school building, whether in the same location or in any other location

Except for refunding any outstanding indebtedness, any of the purposes listed above may be united and voted upon as a single proposition by order of the Board and entered into the minutes. (Education Code 15100)

The Board may appoint a citizens' oversight committee to review and report to the Board and the public as to whether the expenditure of bond revenues complies with the intended purposes of the bond.

Certificate of Results

If the certificate of election results received by the Board shows the appropriate majority of the voters are in favor of issuing the bonds, the Board shall record that fact in its minutes. The Board shall then certify to the county board of supervisors all proceedings it had in connection with the election results. (Education Code 15124, 15274)

Resolution Regarding Sale of Bonds

Following passage of the bond measure by the appropriate majority of voters, the Board shall pass a resolution to issue the sale of bonds. The resolution shall prescribe the total amount of

the bonds to be sold and may also prescribe the maximum acceptable interest rate, not to exceed eight percent, and the time(s) when the whole or any part of the principal of the bonds shall be payable, which shall not be more than 25 years from the date of the bonds. (Education Code 15140)

Prior to the sale of bonds, the Board shall adopt, as an agenda item at a public meeting, another resolution, which includes all of the following items: (Education Code 15146)

- 1. Express approval of the method of sale
- 2. Statement of the reasons for the method of sale selected
- 3. Disclosure of the identity of the bond counsel, and the identities of the bond underwriter and the financial advisor if either or both are utilized for the sale, unless these individuals have not been selected at the time the resolution is adopted, in which case the Board shall disclose their identities at the public meeting occurring after they have been selected
- 4. Estimates of the costs associated with the bond issuance

After the sale, the Board shall be presented with the actual cost information and shall disclose that information at the Board's next scheduled meeting. The Board shall ensure that an itemized summary of the costs of the bond sale and all necessary information and reports regarding the sale are submitted to the California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission. (Education Code 15146)

Use Of School Facilities

The Governing Board recognizes that district facilities and grounds are a community resource and authorizes their use by community groups for purposes provided for in the Civic Center Act when such use does not interfere with school activities.

(cf. 6145.5 - Student Organizations and Equal Access)

All school-related activities (clubs, class events etc.) shall be given priority in the use of facilities and grounds under the Civic Center Act. Thereafter, the use of facilities shall be on a first-come, first-served basis.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain procedures and regulations for the use of school facilities and grounds that: (Education Code 38133)

- 1. Aid, encourage and assist groups desiring to use school facilities for approved activities
- 2. Preserve order in school buildings and on school grounds and protect school facilities, designating a person to supervise this task, if necessary.

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(cf. 0450 – Comprehensive School Safety Plan)
(cf. 3516 – Emergencies and Disaster Preparedness Plan)
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3. Ensure that the use of school facilities or grounds is not inconsistent with their use for school purposes and does not interfere with the regular conduct of school work.

Fees

The Board authorizes the use of school facilities or grounds without charge by nonprofit organizations, clubs or associations organized to promote youth and school activities. These groups include, but are not limited to, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Camp Fire, Inc., parent-teacher associations, school-community advisory councils, Oak Park Municipal Advisory Council and Community Foundation for Oak Park. Other groups requesting the use of school facilities under the Civic Center Act shall be charged at least direct costs.

Groups shall be charged fair rental value when using school facilities or grounds for entertainment or meetings where admission is charged or contributions solicited and net receipts are not to be expended for charitable purposes or for the welfare of the district's students. (Education Code 38134)

Use Of School Facilities

Application for Use of Facilities

Any persons applying for the use of any school facility or grounds on behalf of any society, group or organization shall present written authorization from the group or organization to make the application.

Persons or organizations applying for the use of school facilities or grounds shall submit a statement of information indicating that the organization upholds the state and federal constitutions and does not intend to use school premises to commit unlawful acts.

Civic Center Use

Subject to district policies and regulations, school facilities and grounds shall be available to citizens and community groups as a civic center for the following purposes: (Education Code 38131, 32282)

- 1. Public, literary, scientific, recreational, educational or public agency meetings
- 2. The discussion of matters of general or public interest
- 3. The conduct of religious services for temporary periods, on a one-time or renewable basis, by any church or religious organization
- 4. Child care programs to provide supervision and activities for children of preschool and elementary school age

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(cf. 5148 – Child Care and Development)
(cf. 5148.2 – Before/After School Programs)
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- 5. The administration of examinations for the selection of personnel or the instruction of precinct board members by public agencies
- 6. Supervised recreational activities including, but not limited to, sports league activities that are arranged for and supervised by entities, including religious organizations or churches, and in which youths may participate regardless of religious belief or denomination
- 7. A community youth center

8. Mass care and welfare shelters during disasters or other emergencies affecting the public health and welfare

(cf. 0450 – Comprehensive Safety Plan) (cf. 3516 - Emergencies and Disaster Preparedness Plan)

9. A ceremony, patriotic celebration, or related educational assembly conducted by a veterans' organization

A veterans' organization means the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, United Spanish War Veterans, Grand Army of the Republic, or other duly recognized organization of honorably discharged soldiers, sailors, or marines of the United States, or any of their territories. (Military and Veterans Code 1800)

10. Other purposes deemed appropriate by the Governing Board

The district may grant the use of the school facilities on those days on which the public school is closed. (Education Code 37220)

Restrictions

School facilities shall not be used for any of the following activities:

- 1. Any use by an individual or group for the commission of any crime or any act prohibited by law
- 2. Any use which is inconsistent with the use of the school facility for school purposes or which interferes with the regular conduct of school or school work
- 3. Any use which involves the possession, consumption or sale of alcoholic beverages or any restricted substances, including tobacco use

(cf. 3513.3 - Tobacco-Free Schools)

The district may exclude certain school facilities from non-school use for safety or security reasons.

Damage and Liability

Groups, organizations, or persons using school facilities or grounds shall be liable for any property damages caused by the activity. The Board may charge the amount necessary to repair the damages and may deny the group further use of school facilities.

Any group or organization using school facilities or grounds shall be liable for any injuries resulting from its negligence during the use of district facilities or grounds. The group shall bear the cost of insuring against this risk and defending itself against claims arising from this risk. (Education Code 38134)

Groups or organizations shall provide the district with evidence of insurance against claims arising out of the group's own negligence. Groups or organizations shall also be required to include the district as an additional insured on their liability policies for claims arising out of the negligence of the group.

As permitted, the Superintendent or designee may require a hold harmless agreement and indemnification when warranted by the type of activity or the specific facility being used.

Erin began working with special needs students at Pleasant Valley School District 6 years ago as an Instructional Assistant. Since then, she has worked in Phoenix, Arizona and Las Virgenes Unified School District. In addition, she has been a tutor for students with learning disabilities and worked as a vendor for the Tri-Counties Regional Center, assessing adults with disabilities to insure they are receiving the services they need. Her student teaching was completed at Red Oak Elementary in our very own Oak Park Unified School District. In her free time, Erin enjoys reading, cooking, and spending time with family.

Possible Schedule Changes

For the past decade or so, Oak Hills has been able to use PTA funds to hire a credentialed PE teacher, allowing our classroom teachers to have 45 minutes of grade-level common planning time, and 45 minutes of individual planning time each week, all without banking time and having a shortened day Wednesday. This was made possible because of an agreement between the Oak Park Teachers' Association (OPTA) and the District, known as a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), which must be renewed each year.

The OPTA has informed us over the summer that the union will no longer agree to the MOU. Without this agreement, our regular classroom teachers are forbidden from leaving their students with these specialists and using this time to plan. Therefore, Oak Hills will be considering switching to a banking time schedule. We have put together a Schedule Committee that includes both parents and teachers. This group will work out the best possible plan, carefully taking into account the needs of all stakeholders. While it may not be possible to develop a schedule that is perfect for everyone, we will do our best to design a schedule that maximizes instructional time, and minimizes any inconvenience for parents. The committee will be working quickly so that parents and staff will have as much lead-time as possible to adjust.

We have begun the school year with our regular schedule in place with no shortened days. Any revised schedule would not be implemented until Thanksgiving break, after the first trimester parent conferences at the earliest. Our PTA has agreed to continue to fund the PE and Music positions. As a result, our students will continue to experience outstanding PE instruction, and will be able to have Music with support for grade-level performances throughout the year. We will also continue our plans to rebuild our choir and create an after-school instrumental music program.

Opening Day

We had a great opening day at Oak Hills. Our eager students gathered together on the playground Wednesday morning, and were greeted by our enthusiastic teachers and staff. Two assemblies were held to discuss expectations and daily responsibilities with all of the students. We were very pleased to have our School Board stop by for a visit. The entire Oak Hills school community is excited for another fantastic year!

REGISTRATION

Thanks to Lori DiGrinis and Bev Futterman, PFC volunteers, and staff, the fall registration went very smoothly. Because of several adjustments to the scheduling processes and procedures, there was less pressure on the counseling office as students adjusted their schedules. Currently, the counselors are busy balancing classes and making minor adjustments to student schedules. The new layout of the Admin building really helped ease the flow of traffic in the building.

TEACHERS RETURN

Teachers returned and welcomed 10 new staff members, seven teachers and three instructional aides. The first day began with a review of assessment results including STAR, Advanced Placement, and SAT which all showed strong gains across the board but especially in math. Also we discussed the WASC three-year review process and the adoption of Common Core Standards. Following the introductions of new staff, the District awards, and an OPTA-hosted luncheon, staff spent an afternoon of professional development with a review of the Q-SIS revamped student information system and grade-book.

FACILITIES

The modernized Administrative Services offices were ready to be occupied just in time for support staff to move in prior to the students' return, with minor items to be completed during the first few days of school. Updated student restrooms were badly needed and are a major improvement. Upgrades to the pavilion and G-9 audio/video systems were completed and the gym got a brand new sound system and a motorized U.S flag that descends slowly from the rafters during the National Anthem. The bungalows adjacent to the Great Lawn received fresh interior paint and carpet.

OPENING DAY

Opening day went very smoothly with an air of student excitement. Administrators visited every classroom to discuss school polices related to attendance, discipline, electronic behavior, and academic honesty.

NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

This year, six OPHS seniors were selected as Semifinalists for the 2013 National Merit Scholarship Program. Their selection indicates that they scored among the top 1,200 students in the state of California. Representing the top one percent of each state's high school seniors, these excellent students continue in the competition for National Merit Scholarship Finalist awards. The students are: Annie Cheng, Hemaxi Desai, Michael Ebert, Rachel Hsiong, Avyay Panchapakesan, and Ellice Wang.

BACK-TO-SCHOOL NIGHT

Back to School Night will be held on September 20. The evening will begin for our teachers with a dinner hosted by our PFC, and following a brief parent welcome in the Pavilion, the school bell will then lead parents through their student's class schedule and to their classrooms where teachers will discuss the courses and class procedures.

SENIOR COLLEGE ADVISEMENT

On October 2-4, OPHS Counselors will be holding an Advisement Session for all 4-year college bound students. Procedures for college applications, letters of recommendation, transcripts, scholarships, Naviance and more will be discussed.

Oak View and Independent School

Classes have begun and we have a nice group of students in both schools. I am so fortunate to have such a fine staff at both schools!

OPIS remains strong, with interdistrict enrollment, attracting students from as far as central Los Angeles locations. Last June, we projected 103 students and we have 160 at this time.

Our additional outreach and advertisement strategies are paying off very well. We have attracted a group of working actors from Disney and beyond. We also have enrolled Somis students from their defunct charter school. Additionally, we continue to attract athletes and just a variety of students from out of district.

Oak View is steadily increasing enrollment, as well. We have 42 and heading higher. As you know, it is very challenging to have over 20 students per teacher in continuation, getting diminished return in learning, so we hope to begin a discussion soon about a part time third teacher, focusing on science/math. It is a mid-term review WASC year and I believe it will be quite important to have the best program in place that is possible.
