- 1. Provide all required information and data for filing all forms with the SLD for Year 15 and Year 16 in a timely manner.
- 2. Take such official action, such as review of Consultants drafts and promptly sign and return all forms required for filing with a third party in a timely manner so that Consultant can perform its obligations under this Agreement.
- 3. Promptly pay Consultant its fee for services rendered. All payments are due and payable within 30 days after delivery to the District of the invoice.

### STUDENT TEACHING AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT entered into by and between the State of California through the Trustees of The California State University on behalf of the State University, noted below, all of which are hereinafter called State or State University, and the School District/School, noted below, hereinafter called the District:

### WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, The District is authorized to enter into agreements with the State, to provide teaching experience through practice teaching to students enrolled in teacher training curricula of the State University; and

WHEREAS, any such agreement may provide for the payment for the services rendered by the District of an amount not to exceed the actual costs to the District of the services rendered; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined between the parties hereto that the payments to be made to the District under this agreement do not exceed the actual cost to the District of the services rendered by the District; and

WHEREAS, the honorarium or payment provided herein is intended to be transmitted promptly by the District to the supervising teacher as compensation for and recognition to services performed for the student teacher in the supervisory teacher's charge;

NOW THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed between the State and the District as follows:

### **SPECIAL PROVISIONS**

The State University and the District are as follows:

The TERM of the Agreement is July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2014. Payment for SERVICES for subsequent fiscal years is contingent upon approval of the State Budget.

The SERVICES to be provided by District to State shall not exceed 200 semester units of Practice Teaching.

The State shall pay District for such services at the RATE AND AMOUNT of \$25.00 per semester unit, not to exceed a total payment of \$5,000.00.

### **GENERAL TERMS**

1. The District shall provide to State University students teaching experience through practice teaching in schools and classes of the District not to exceed the units of practice teaching set forth in the Special Provisions. Such practice teaching shall be provided in such schools or classes of the District and under the direct supervision and instruction of such employees of the District, as the District and the State through their duly authorized representatives may agree upon.

The District may, for good cause, refuse to accept for practice teaching any student of the State University assigned to practice teaching in the District, and upon request of the District, made for good cause, the State shall terminate the assignment of any student of the State University to practice teaching in the District.

Practice teaching as used herein and elsewhere in this agreement means active participation in the duties and functions of classroom teaching under the direct supervision and instruction of employees of the District holding valid life diplomas or credentials issued by the State Board of Education, other than emergency or provisional credentials, authorizing them to serve as classroom teachers in the schools or classes in which the practice teaching is provided.

2. The State will pay the District for the performance by the District of all services required to be performed under this agreement at the rates set forth in the Special Provisions for each semester or quarter unit of practice teaching.

A semester unit of practice teaching for elementary and secondary schools is approximately twenty (20) minutes of practice teaching daily for five (5) days a week for eighteen (18) weeks. A quarter unit of practice teaching is two-thirds (2/3) of a semester unit. For community colleges and/or adult schools, a semester unit is approximately 20 minutes of practice teaching daily three (3) days a week for eighteen (18) weeks during regular session.

3. An assignment of a student of the State University to practice teaching in schools or classes of the District shall be, at the discretion of the State, either for approximately nine (9) weeks or for approximately eighteen (18) weeks, but a student may be given more than one assignment by the State University to practice teaching in such schools or classes.

The assignment of a student of the State University to practice teaching in the District shall be deemed to be effective for purposes of this agreement as of the date the student presents to the proper authorities of the District the assignment card or other document given the student by the State University effecting such assignment, but not earlier than the date of such assignment as shown on such card or other document.

In the event the assignment of a student of the State University to practice teaching is terminated by the State University for any reason, the District shall

receive payment on account of such student except that if such assignment is terminated before the end of the ninth week of the term of the assignment. The District shall receive payment for an assignment for nine (9) weeks only. If a student is assigned by the State University to another teacher of the District after an assignment has become effective, this shall be considered for payment purposes as an entirely new and separate assignment.

Absences of a student from assigned practice teaching shall not be counted as absences in computing the semester units of practice teaching provided the student by the District.

- 4. Within a reasonable time following the close of each semester or quarter of the State University, the District shall submit an invoice, in triplicate, to the State University for payment, at the rate provided herein, for all units of practice teaching provided by the District under and in accordance with this agreement during said semester or quarter. The District shall attach to the invoice a certificate, in triplicate, executed by a duly authorized representative of the District certifying that the District expended or became obligated to expend in providing such practice teaching an amount not less than the amount of the invoice. The State will pay the amount of such invoice from moneys made available for such purpose by or pursuant to the laws of the State. All invoices for services for each fiscal year must be received by University Accounts Payable no later than August 31 following the close of that fiscal year. Any invoices received after this date will be returned unprocessed.
- 5. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this agreement, the State shall not be obligated by this agreement to pay the District any amount in excess of the total sum set forth in the Special Provisions.
- 6. All workers' compensation insurance shall be at the cost of the District unless otherwise provided herein, and all premiums therefore shall be paid by the District. State shall reimburse District for Workers' Compensation Insurance coverage in the amount of \$-0-- per student teacher semester, or \$-0-- per student teacher quarter, not to exceed a total payment of \$-0--. The second sentence of this paragraph 6 shall be operative and shall supersede the first sentence of this paragraph only if the amounts are filled in and are approved by both parties hereto.

ISSUE:		Shall the Board accept the recommendation of the District's Health Benefit Committee for 2011-12 employee medical, dental, and vision insurance coverage?
BACKGROU	ND:	As a long-standing practice and as prescribed by employee collective bargaining agreements, the Health Benefits Committee met this spring and into the summer to review and consider employee medical, vision and dental plans for the 2011-12 school year. The Committee is comprised of two employees each from OPTA, OPCA and the District.
		This June the Committee reviewed the proposed rate increases and plan offerings available from the current health benefits provider, California's Valued Trust (CVT). CVT has announced its 2011-12 rates, including an average increase of 2.5% for Blue Cross PPO plans, and 2.7% for Kaiser HMO plans. There was no increase to the VSP vision rates, and the rates for the Delta Dental plan declined by 3.3%. The District's current coverage offers a choice of six medical plans, including four Anthem Blue Cross PPO plans and two Kaiser plans, as well as Delta Dental and VSP Vision plans. After review of the rates and the plans offered by CVT, the Committee is recommending continuing with the existing CVT coverage in 2011-12, and the addition of three new medical plans. The new plans are the Wellness PPO Plan 1, PPO High Deductible Health Plan 1, and Kaiser Plan 1. 

### OAK PARK UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT RESOLUTION #11-17 CLASS SIZE REDUCTION – K-3

WHEREAS, The State of California, through Senate Bill 1777, has continued a Class Size Reduction Program for 2011-12 and

WHEREAS, The Class Size Reduction Program was established through legislation on July 15, 1996, and

WHEREAS, The Board of the Oak Park Unified School District signified its intent to participate in the program; and

WHEREAS, The administration has selected kindergarten, first, second and third grade classes to participate in the Class Size Reduction Program; and

WHEREAS, The Oak Park Unified School District is implementing the Class Size Reduction Program as set forth in Education Code, commencing with Section 52120, Part 28;

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Board of Education of the Oak Park Unified School District certifies that:

- 1. The number of classes listed on the application form under Option One and Option Two in each eligible grade level is correctly identified.
- 2. The pupil counts do not include special education students enrolled in special day classes, or pupils enrolled in independent study, and are not greater than enrollment as of October of the previous calendar year.
- 3. A certificated teacher has been hired by the school district and is providing direct instructional services to each class selected for the Class Size Reduction Program. It is the intent of the school district that each such certificated teacher will provide direct instructional services to each pupil enrolled in the separate class to which the teacher is assigned.
- 4. As part of the district's Class Size Reduction Program, the district will provide a staff development program for any teacher who will participate for the first time in the Class Size Reduction Program and provide direct instructional services for reduced-size classes in this program. Appropriate training to maximize the education advantages of class size reduction will be provided to such teachers. This training shall include, but not be limited to, methods for providing each of the following: (1) individualized instruction, (2) effective teaching, including classroom management in smaller classes, (3) identifying and responding to pupil needs, and (4) opportunities to build on the individual strengths of pupils.
- 5. The school district will collect and maintain data required by the Superintendent of Public Instruction for evaluation of the Class Size Reduction Program. The data shall include, but not be limited to, individual test scores or other records of pupil achievement. Any data collected will be protected in a manner that will not permit the personal identification of any pupil or parent.
- 6. Priority for reducing class size is according to the following order at each school site:
  - If only one grade level is reduced, the grade level will be 1<sup>st</sup> grade
  - If two grade levels are reduced, the grade levels will be 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grades
  - If three or four grade levels are reduced, the grade levels will be 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> and then any combination of kindergarten and/or 3<sup>rd</sup> grade.
- 7. The Class Size Reduction Program has been implemented for 2011-12.
- 8. The school district will submit final enrollment counts on the J-7CSR form to the School Facilities Planning Division by May 11, 2012.

The plan shall incorporate strategies for effective communications during a crisis or other emergency situation that may arise.

BACKGROU	ND:	Board Policy 1160 is being revised to reflect new court decision which details the appropriate use of district resources for election purposes. Consistent with the court's decision, the policy clarifies that it is a permissible informational activity for the Board to adopt a resolution in support of or in opposition to a ballot measure as long as the resolution and other materials do not urge voters to act in a certain way and as long as the distribution of the materials is consistent with regular district practice. Policy also outlines impermissible campaign activities by the district, such as the purchase of bumper stickers or the use of district email to disseminate campaign literature. In addition, policy contains updated language re: district lobbying and advocacy activities. Board Policy 1160 is being submitted with recommended changes from CSBA.

The Governing Board has a responsibility to actively advocate fiscal and public policy that supports the district's schools and the children in the community. To the extent possible, The Board shall be proactive in defining the district's advocacy agenda based on district's vision and goals and the needs of the district and community. The Board's advocacy efforts shall be conducted in accordance with legal requirements. the direction set forth in the district's vision and goals.

No district funds, services, supplies or equipment shall be used to urge the support or defeat of any ballot measure or candidate, including any candidate for election to the Board. (Education Code 7054)

The Board may discuss and study the potential effect of proposed or qualified ballot measures on the district's schools at an open and agendized Board meeting. Any Board The Board's discussion of the effect of such measures shall include an opportunity for Board members, staff and members of the public to speak on all sides of the issue. Following such study, At the meeting, the Board may adopt a positions or resolution in support of or in opposition to a ballot measures of importance to education. The language in any resolution adopted by the Board shall not urge the public to take any action regarding the measure.

The Superintendent or designee may use district resources to provide students, parents/guardians and community members with fair and impartial information related to ballot measures, including information about the impact of ballot measures on the district. (Education Code 7054)

In preparing or distributing such informational material, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the totality of the circumstances, including language, style, tenor and timing, analyze the material to help ensure that it is an appropriate informational activity, provides a fair analysis of the issues, and does not expressly advocate passage or defeat of a measure or candidate.

District resources, *including email or computer systems*, shall not be used to disseminate campaign literature. *In addition, district resources shall not be used* or to purchase advertisements, bumper stickers, posters or similar promotional items that advocate an election result *or urge voters to take any action in support of or in opposition to a measure*.

Policy activity related to district bond measures shall, in addition to the above, be subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The Superintendent or designee may research, draft and prepare a bond measure or other initiative for the ballot, but shall not use district resources to *influence voters or otherwise* campaign for the measure. secure signatures in order to qualify the measure for the ballot.
- 2. Upon request, Board members and district administrators may appear at any time before a citizens' group to explain why the Board called for an election on a bond measure and to answer questions. (Education Code 7054.1)

If the presentation occurs during working hours, the district representative shall not urge a citizens' group to vote for or against the bond measure.

3. The Board or any individual Board member may file a written argument for the ballot that is either for or against any school measure. (Elections Code 9501)

For informational purposes, the Superintendent or designee may conduct a poll related to a ballot issue. Such a poll shall not advocate a particular position on the issue.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a coordinated plan for carrying out the advocacy agenda, including specific activities, target groups or individuals, staff responsibilities and timelines.

In order to strengthen legislative advocacy efforts, the district may work with organizations and coalitions and may join associations whose representatives lobby on behalf of their members in accordance with Government Code 53060.5.

The Board district may provide fair and impartial information about legislative issues affecting schools and children and shall inform the community about its legislative advocacy activities. However, the Board informational materials about legislation shall not urge the public to lobby the legislature, Governor, or state agencies on behalf of the district.

### Food Service Operations/Cafeteria Fund

The Governing Board intends that, insofar as possible, school food services shall be a self-supporting, nonprofit program. To increase cost effectiveness, the Superintendent or designee shall centralize and direct the purchasing of food and supplies, the planning of menus, and the auditing of all food service accounts for the district.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that all food services administrators and personnel possess appropriate qualifications and receive ongoing professional development related to the effective management and implementation of the district's food services program.

### **Meal Sales**

Meals may be sold to students, district employees, Board members, and employees or members of the fund or association maintaining the cafeteria. (Education Code 38082)

In addition, meals may be sold to other individuals or organizations who are on campus during meal times for a legitimate purpose, such as classroom volunteers, parents/guardians, or student siblings.

The Superintendent or designee shall recommend meal prices, based on the costs of providing food services and consistent with Education Code 38084 and 42 USC 1760, for students and non-students for approval by the Board. Students who are enrolled in the free or reduced-price meals programs shall receive meals free of charge or at a reduced price in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

#### Free And Reduced Price Meals

The Governing Board recognizes that adequate nutrition is essential to child development, health, and learning of all students. The Superintendent or designee shall facilitate and encourage the participation of students from low-income families in the district's food service program.

The district shall provide at least one nutritionally adequate meal each school day, free of charge or at a reduced price for students whose families meet federal eligibility criteria. (Education Code 49550, 49552)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that meals provided through the free and reduced-price meal program meet applicable state and/or federal nutritional standards in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

The Board shall approve, and shall submit to the California Department of Education for approval, a plan that ensures that students eligible to receive free or reduced price meals and milk are not treated differently from other students. (Education Code 49557)

### Confidentiality/Release of Records

All applications and records related to eligibility for the free and reduced-price meal program shall be confidential except as provided by law. (Education Code 49558)

If a student transfers from the district to another district or to a private school, the Superintendent or designee may release the student's eligibility status or a copy of his/her free and reduced-price meal application to the other district or school to assist in the continuation of the student's meal benefits.

BACKGROU	ND:	Suggested amendment is to consider adding language as an option to existing policy to include filling a vacancy with a past board member who has chosen not to run again under the same terms as one chosen under the wider selection criteria, ie. until the next election, but with the added expectation that this former board member would not be running for re-election. This would enable the board to decide from the outset whether to just ask a former board member to fill in for the specified length of time or whether to go through the open selection process. Rationale: If a former board member were chosen they would be able to hit the ground running. The Board will write the amended language to insert into the Bylaw of the Board.

### Filling Vacancies

### Events Causing a Vacancy

A vacancy on the Governing Board may occur by a failure to elect or for any of the following events:

- 1. The death of an incumbent. (Government code 1770)
- 2. The adjudication pursuant to a quo warranto proceeding declaring that an incumbent is physically or mentally incapacitated due to disease, illness, or accident and that there is reasonable cause to believe that the incumbent will not be able to perform the duties of his/her office for the remainder of his/her term. (Government Code 1770)
- 3. A Board member's resignation. (Government Code 1779)

A vacancy resulting from resignation occurs when the written resignation is filed with the County Superintendent of Schools having jurisdiction over the district, except where a deferred effective date is specified in the resignation so filed, in which case the resignation shall become operative on that date. A Board member may not defer the effective date of his/her resignation for more than 60 days after he/she files the resignation with the County Superintendent.

Upon being filed with the County Superintendent, a written resignation, whether specifying a deferred effective date or otherwise, shall be irrevocable. (Education Code 5090)

A Board member may not defer the effective date of his/her resignation for more than 60 days after he/she files the resignation with the County Superintendent.

- 4. A Board member's removal from office, including recall. (Government code 1770; Elections Code 11384)
- 5. A Board member's ceasing to be an inhabitant of the state or resident of the district. (Government Code 1770)
- 6. A Board member's absence from the state beyond the period allowed by law without the permission required by law. (Government Code 1770)

No Board member shall be absent from the state for more than 60 days, except in any of the following situations: (Government Code 1064)

- a. Upon business of the school district with the approval of the Board
- b. With the consent of the Board for an additional period not to exceed a total absence of 90 days
- c. For federal military deployment not to exceed six months as a member of the armed forces of the United States or the California National Guard

If the absence of the Board member for this purpose exceeds six months, the Board may approve an additional six-month absence upon a showing that there is a reasonable expectation that the member will return within the second six-month period, and the Board may appoint an interim member to serve in his/her absence. If two or more members of the Board are absent by reason of these circumstances, and those absences result in the inability to establish a quorum at a regular meeting, the Board may immediately appoint one or more interim members, as necessary to enable the Board to conduct business and discharge its responsibilities.

d. In the case of illness or other urgent necessity, and upon a proper showing thereof, the time limit for absence from the state may be extended by the Board for an additional period not to exceed 30 days.

- 7. A Board member's ceasing to discharge the duties of his/her office for the period of three consecutive months, except when prevented by sickness or when absent from the state with the permission required by law. (Government Code 1770)
- 8. A Board member's conviction of a felony or any offense involving a violation of his/her official duties or conviction of a designated crime resulting in a forfeiture of office. (Government Code 1770 and 3000-3003)
- 9. A Board member's refusal or neglect to file his/her required oath or bond within the time prescribed. (Government Code 1770)

- 10. The decision of a competent tribunal declaring void a Board member's election or appointment. (Government Code 1770)
- 11. The making of an order vacating a Board member's office or declaring the office vacant when the officer fails to furnish an additional or supplemental bond. (Government Code 1770)

- 12. A Board member's commitment to a hospital or sanitarium as a drug addict, dipsomaniac, inebriate, or stimulant addict-by a court of competent jurisdiction, in which case, the office shall not be deemed vacant until the order of commitment has become final. (Government Code 1770)
- 13. A failure to elect when either no candidate or an insufficient number of candidates have filed to run for a Board seat(s) (Education Code 5090, 5326, 5328)

### Timelines for Filling a Vacancy

When a vacancy occurs, the Board shall take the following action, as appropriate:

- 1. When a vacancy occurs less than four months before the end of a Board member's term, the Board shall take no action. (Education Code 5093)
- 2. When a vacancy occurs four or more months before the end of a Board member's term, the Board shall, within 60 days of the date of the vacancy or the filing of the member's deferred resignation, either order an election or make a provisional appointment, unless a special election is mandated as described in item #3 below. (Education Code 5091, 5093)
- 3. When a vacancy occurs from six months to 130 days before a regularly scheduled Board election at which the position is not scheduled to be filled, a special election to fill the position shall be consolidated with the regular election. The person so elected shall take office at the first regularly scheduled Board meeting following the certification of the election and shall serve only until the end of the term of the position which he/she was elected to fill. (Education Code 5093)

When a special election is not required, the Board may make a provisional appointment. (Education Code 5091, 5093)

### Provisional Appointments

In order to draw from the largest possible number of candidates, the Board shall advertise in the local media to solicit candidate applications or nominations. A committee consisting of less than a quorum of the Board shall ensure that applicants are eligible for Board membership and announce the names of the eligible candidates. The Board shall interview the candidates at a public meeting, accept oral or written public input, and select the provisional appointee by a majority vote.

In order to serve on the Board, a person must meet the eligibility requirements specified in Education Code 35107.

Within 10 days after the appointment is made, the Board shall post notices of the actual vacancy, or the filing of a deferred resignation, and the provisional appointment. The notice shall be published in the local newspaper pursuant to Government Code 6061 and posted in at least three public places within the district. (Education Code 5092)

The notice shall contain: (Education Code 5092)

- 1. The date of the occurrence of the vacancy or the date of the filing of, and the effective date of, the resignation
- 2. The full name of the appointee
- 3. The date of appointment
- 4. A statement notifying the voters that unless a petition calling for a special election pursuant to Education Code 5091 is filed in the office of the County Superintendent of Schools within 30 days of the provisional appointment, it shall become an effective appointment

The person appointed shall hold office until the next regularly scheduled election for district Board members and shall be afforded all the powers and duties of a Board member upon appointment. (Education Code 5091)

#### Appointment Due to Failure to Elect

When a vacancy occurs because no person or an insufficient number of candidates have been nominated (i.e., a failure to elect), and a district election will not be held, the Board shall appoint a qualified person to the office. This appointment shall be made at a meeting prior to the day fixed for the election and the appointment shall be seated at the organizational meeting as if elected at the district election. (Education Code 5328)

When an appointment is being made because of a failure to elect, the district shall publish a notice once in a newspaper of general circulation published in the district, or if no such newspaper exists, in a newspaper having general circulation within the district. This notice

shall state that the Board intends to make an appointment and shall inform persons of the procedure available for applying for the appointment. (Education Code 5328.5)

The procedure for selecting and interviewing candidates shall be the same as the procedures for "Provisional Appointments," as specified above.

BACKGROU	ND:	Board Policy 3513.3 is being revised to reflect California Department of Education (CDE) requirements, as a condition for receipt of Tobacco-Use Prevention Education (TUPE) funding, related to certification of compliance with tobacco-free schools requirements. Policy adds definition of prohibited products, including nicotine delivery devices such as electronic cigarettes, and reflects new law (SB 882, 2010) which prohibits sales of electronic cigarettes to minors. #### Tobacco-Free Schools

The Governing Board recognizes the health hazards associated with smoking and the use of tobacco products, including the breathing of second-hand smoke, *are consistent with its goal* and desires to provide a healthy environment for students and staff.

(cf. 3514 – Environmental Safety)
(cf. 4159/4259/4359 - Employee Assistance Programs)
(cf. 5030 – Student Wellness)
(cf. 5131.62 - Tobacco)

The Board prohibits the use of tobacco products at any time in district-owned or lease buildings, on district property, and in district vehicles. (Health and Safety Code 104420; Labor Code 6404.5; 20 USC 6083)

This prohibition applies to all employees, students, and visitors at any school-sponsored instructional program, activity, or athletic event held on or off district property. Any written joint use agreement governing community use of district facilities or grounds shall include notice of the district's tobacco-free schools policy and consequences for violations of the policy.

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Prohibited products include any product containing tobacco or nicotine, including, but not limited to, cigarettes, cigars, miniature cigars, smokeless tobacco, snuff, chew, clove cigarettes, betel, and nicotine delivery devices such as electronic cigarettes. Exceptions may be made for the use or possession of prescription nicotine products.

The Board prohibits the use of tobacco products at any time in district-owned or leased buildings, on district property and in district vehicles. (Health and Safety Code 104420; Labor Code 6404.5; 20 USC 6083)

This prohibition applies to all employees, students and visitors at any instructional program, activity or athletic event.

Smoking or use of any tobacco-related products and disposal of any tobacco-related waste are prohibited within 25 feet of any playground, except on a public sidewalk located within 25 feet of the playground. (Health and Safety Code 104495)

The Governing Board desires to provide a safe, orderly working environment for all employees. As part of the district's comprehensive school safety plan, the Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies for protecting employees from potentially dangerous persons and situations and for *providing* assisting them with the necessary assistance and support when in the event of an emergency situations occur.

Any employee against whom violence or any threat of violence has been directed in the workplace shall notify the Superintendent or designee immediately. The Superintendent or designee shall initiate legal and security measures to protect the employee and others in the workplace. In addition, the Superintendent or designee may initiate legal proceedings against any individual to recover damages for injury caused by the willful misconduct of that individual to the person or property of an employee or another person on district premises. When violence is directed against an employee by any individual and the employee so notifies the Superintendent or designee, the Superintendent or designee shall take steps to ensure that appropriate legal measures are instituted. When the employee notifies the Superintendent or designee of a threat of bodily harm, the district shall take appropriate measures to enable the employee to request assistance if a threat occurs on school grounds.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that employees are trained in crisis prevention and intervention techniques in order to protect themselves and students. Staff development may include training in classroom management, effective communication techniques and crisis resolution.

The Superintendent or designee may make available at appropriate locations, including, but not limited to, district and school offices, gyms, and classrooms, Board recognizes that access to two way communications devices that would allows two-way communication with employees to eall for assistance from their supervisor or law enforcement and others when emergencies occur. in the event of a threat of violence or medical emergency. The district shall provide such communications devices in classrooms to the extent possible.

### Use of Pepper Spray

Employees may not carry or possess pepper spray on school property or at school activities. On a case-by-case basis, however, the Superintendent or designee may allow *an employee to possess* the possession of a pepper spray weapon that meets the requirements of Penal Code 12403.7 when justified by unusual dangerous circumstances. Any employee who is negligent or careless in the possession or handling of pepper spray shall be subject to appropriate disciplinary measures.

### Reporting of Injurious Objects

The Board requires school employees to take immediate action upon being made aware that any person is in possession of an *unauthorized* injurious object on school grounds or at a school-related or school-sponsored activity. The employee shall use his/her own judgment as to the *potential* dangerousness of the situation and *involved and*, based upon this analysis, shall do one of the following:

- 1. Confiscate the object and deliver it to the principal immediately
- 2. Immediately notify the principal, who shall take appropriate action
- 3. Immediately notify the local law enforcement agency call 911 and the principal

### Tobacco

The Governing Board recognizes that tobacco use presents serious health risks and desires to provide support and assistance in reducing the number of students who begin or continue to use tobacco. The Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive program that includes consistent enforcement of laws prohibiting tobacco possession and use by students, tobacco-use prevention education, and intervention and cessation activities and/or referrals. the prevention and intervention of tobacco use among youth.

The program shall be designed to meet a set of measurable goals and objectives and shall be periodically evaluated to assess progress.*

### Program Planning

The district's tobacco-use prevention and intervention program shall be based on an assessment of tobacco-use problems in district schools and the community, an examination of existing services and activities in the community, and a determination of high-risk student population that are most in need of district services.

The Superintendent or designee shall coordinate with the local health department and county office of education in program planning and implementation. He/she may establish an advisory council including students, parents/guardians, district staff, representatives of the local health department and community organizations, law enforcement professional, and/or others with demonstrated expertise in tobacco prevention and cessation.

He/she shall annually report to the Board, and to the CDE if required, the data specified in Health and Safety Code 104450.

### Actions By The Board

The Governing Board shall act by a majority vote of all of the membership constituting the Board, unless otherwise required by law. (Education Code 35164)

An "action" by the Board means: (Government Code 54952.6)

- 1. A collective decision by a majority of the Board members
- 2. A collective commitment or promise by a majority of the members to make a positive or negative decision
- 3. A vote by a majority of the members when sitting as the Board upon a motion, proposal, resolution, order or ordinance

The Board shall not take action by secret ballot, whether preliminary or final. (Government Code 54953)

### Action on Non-Agenda Items

- 1. When a majority of the Board determines that an emergency situation exists, as defined for emergency meetings pursuant to Government Code 54956.5. The Board, by majority vote of its members, determines that the action responds to an emergency situation.
- 2. When two-thirds of the members present, or if less than two-thirds of the members are present then by a unanimous vote of all members present, determine that the need to take immediate action came to the district's attention after the agenda was posted. The Board determines, either by a two-thirds majority vote of the members present at the meeting or, if less than two thirds of the members are present, by a unanimous vote of all members present,

that the need to take immediate action came to the district's attention after the posting of the agenda.

3. When an item appeared on the agenda of, and was continued from, a meeting that occurred The matter was properly posted for a previous meeting occurring not more than five days earlier and was continued to the meeting at which action is being taken.

(cf. 9320 - Meetings and Notices) (cf. 9322 - Agenda/Meeting Materials)

### **Challenging Board Actions**

Any interested person or the district attorney's office may present a demand that the Board cure and to-correct a Board action which he/she alleges is in violation of Government Code 54954.2 (agenda posting), Government Code 54953 (open meeting and teleconferencing), Government Code 54954.5 (closed session item descriptions), Government Code 54954.6 (new or increased tax assessments), Government Code 54956 (special meetings), or Government Code 54956.5 (emergency meetings). (Government Code 54960.1)

Any demand to "cure and correct" an alleged violation shall clearly describe the challenged action and the nature of the alleged violation *and* shall be presented to the Board in writing within 90 days of the date when the action was taken. If the alleged violation concerns action taken in an open session but in violation of Government Code 54954.2 (agenda posting), the written demand must be made within 30 days of the date when the alleged action took place. (Government Code 54960.1)

Such demand shall allege a violation of any of the following: (Government Code 54960.1)

- 1. Government Code 54953, regarding open meeting and teleconferencing
- 2. Government Code 54954.5, regarding closed session item descriptions
- 3. Government Code 54954.6, regarding new or increased tax assessments
- 4. Government Code 54956, regarding special meetings
- 5. Government Code 54956.5, regarding emergency meetings

Within 30 days of receiving the demand, the Board shall *do one of the following:* (Government Code 54960.1)

- 1. Cure or correct the challenged action and inform the demanding party in writing of its actions to cure or correct.
- 2. Determine If the Board decides to not to cure or correct the challenged violation and inform the demanding parting action, the demanding party shall be informed in writing of its decision to not cure or correct. that decision.
- 3. If the Board Takes no action. If the Board takes no action within the 30-day review period, its inaction shall be considered a decision not to cure or correct the action. (Government Code 54960.1)
