WHEREAS, school districts, community college districts and county boards of education are authorized by Sections 53850 to 53858, both inclusive, of the California Government Code (the "Act") (being Article 7.6, Chapter 4, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 of the Government Code) to borrow money by the issuance of temporary notes; and

WHEREAS, on the Original Note Resolution Adoption Date set forth above, the governing board (the "Board") determined, pursuant to a resolution (the "Original Note Resolution") that, in order to satisfy certain obligations and requirements of the school district, community college district or county board of education specified above (the "District"), a public body corporate and politic located in the County designated above (the "County"), it was desirable that a sum (the "Principal Amount"), not to exceed the Original Maximum Amount of Borrowing designated above, be borrowed for such purpose during its fiscal year ending June 30, 2011 ("Fiscal Year 2010-2011") by the issuance of its 2010-2011 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (the first series of which has been issued and shall be referred to herein as the "Series A Notes" and any subsequent series of which shall be referred to herein as "Additional Notes," and collectively with the Series A Notes, the "Notes"), in one or more series (each a "Series"), therefor in anticipation of the receipt by or accrual to the District during Fiscal Year 2010-2011 of taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys provided for such fiscal year for the general fund and, if so indicated in a Pricing Confirmation, capital fund and/or special revenue fund (or similarly named fund or funds as indicated in such Pricing Confirmation) of the District (capitalized undefined terms used in this Supplemental Resolution shall have the meanings ascribed thereto in the Original Note Resolution); and

WHEREAS, on the Series A Issuance Date set forth above, the District issued the Series A Note in the Series A Principal Amount set forth above; and

WHEREAS, the Original Note Resolution provides that the District (or the County on its behalf, as applicable) may at any time issue pursuant to the Original Note Resolution one or more Series of Additional Notes consisting of Senior Notes or Subordinate Notes (including Subordinate Notes that are further subordinated to previously issued Subordinate Notes, as provided in the applicable Pricing Confirmation), subject in each case to certain specific conditions set forth in Section 2(B) of the Original Note Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the Original Note Resolution provides that, whenever the District shall determine to issue, execute and deliver any Additional Notes pursuant to the Original Note Resolution, the Series Principal Amount of which, when added to the Series Principal Amounts of all Series of Notes previously issued by the District, would exceed the Original Maximum Amount of Borrowing authorized by the Original Note Resolution, the District shall adopt a Supplemental Resolution amending the Original Note Resolution to increase the Original Maximum Amount of Borrowing as appropriate; and

WHEREAS, the District desires to issue, pursuant to the Original Note Resolution, a Series of Additional Notes in a Series Principal Amount which, when added to the Series A Principal Amount, would exceed the Original Maximum Amount of Borrowing authorized by the Original Note Resolution; and

WHEREAS, because the District does not have fiscal accountability status pursuant to Section 42650 or Section 85266 of the California Education Code, it requests the Board of Supervisors of the County to borrow, on the District's behalf, said Series Principal Amount by the issuance of the Series of Additional Notes; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 53853 of the Act, if the Board of Supervisors of the County fails or refuses to authorize the issuance of the Series of Additional Notes within the time period specified in said Section 53853, following receipt of this Supplemental Resolution, and the Series of Additional Notes are issued in conjunction with tax and revenue anticipation notes of other Issuers within the meaning of Section 53853 of the Act, the District may issue the Series of Additional Notes in its name pursuant to the Original Note Resolution as supplemented by terms stated herein; and

WHEREAS, it appears, and this Board hereby finds and determines, that said Series Principal Amount of the Series of Additional Notes, when added to the interest payable thereon, does not exceed eighty-five percent (85%) of the estimated amount of the uncollected taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys provided for Fiscal Year 2010-2011 which will be received by or which will accrue to the District during such fiscal year for the general fund and, if so indicated in a Pricing Confirmation, capital fund and/or special revenue fund (or similarly named fund or funds as indicated in such Pricing Confirmation) of the District and which will be available for the payment of the principal of the Series of Additional Notes and the interest thereon;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board hereby finds, determines, declares and resolves as follows:

Section 1. Recitals. All the above recitals are true and correct and this Board so finds and determines.

<u>Section 2.</u> <u>Increased Maximum Amount of Borrowing.</u> The Original Note Resolution is hereby amended to increase the Original Maximum Amount of Borrowing set forth in the Original Note Resolution to the Increased Maximum Amount of Borrowing designated above.

Section 3. Issuance of Series B Notes. In accordance with the Original Note Resolution, this Board hereby determines to borrow, and hereby requests the Board of Supervisors of the County to borrow for the District, solely for the purpose of anticipating the receipt by or accrual to the District during Fiscal Year 2010-2011 of taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys provided for such fiscal year for the general fund and, if so indicated in the Pricing Confirmation for the Series of Additional Notes authorized hereby, capital fund and/or special revenue fund (or similarly named fund or funds as indicated in such Pricing Confirmation) of the District, and not pursuant to any common plan of financing of the District, by the issuance by the Board of Supervisors of the County, in the name of the District, of a Series of Additional Notes under Sections 53850 et seq. of the Act and to be designated generally as the District's "2010-2011 [Subordinate] ** Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes, Series B" (referred to herein as the "Series B Notes"). The Series B Notes shall be issued in a Series Principal Amount which, when added to the Series A Principal Amount, shall not exceed the Increased Maximum Amount of Borrowing designated above. If the conditions of the Original Note Resolution are met, the

^{**} The Series of Additional Notes shall bear the "Subordinate" designation if it is a Series of Subordinate Notes.

Series B Notes may be issued as Senior Notes. If not issued as Senior Notes, the Series B Notes shall be issued as Subordinate Notes.

In the event the Board of Supervisors of the County fails or refuses to authorize the issuance of the Series B Notes within the time period specified in Section 53853 of the Act, following receipt of this Supplemental Resolution, this Board hereby authorizes issuance of the Series B Notes, in the District's name pursuant to and in accordance with the Original Note Resolution as supplemented by the terms stated in this Supplemental Resolution. The Series B Notes shall be issued in conjunction with the note or notes of one or more other Issuers as part of the California School Cash Reserve Program (the "Program") and within the meaning of Section 53853 of the Act.

Section 4. Sale of Series B Notes. The Series B Notes shall be sold, under the Bond Pool Structure authorized in the Original Note Resolution, to the California School Cash Reserve Program Authority (the "Authority") in accordance with the Original Note Resolution. Each Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed, during the period commencing on the date of adoption of this Supplemental Resolution and ending on June 15, 2011, to execute and deliver the Pricing Confirmation applicable to the Series B Notes on a date within five (5) days (or such longer period of time as agreed by the Authority) of the negotiation of the interest rate or rates and the purchase price to be paid for the Series B Notes in accordance with Section 4 of the Original Note Resolution.

Section 5. Preliminary Official Statement and Official Statement. Each Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed to provide Piper Jaffray & Co., as underwriter for the Program (the "Underwriter") with such information relating to the District as the Underwriter shall reasonably request for inclusion in the preliminary official statement (the "Preliminary Official Statement") and official statement of the Authority relating to the Series of Pool Bonds to which the Series B Notes will be assigned. If, at any time prior to the execution of the Pricing Confirmation for the Series B Notes, any event occurs as a result of which the information contained in the Preliminary Official Statement or other offering document relating to the District might include an untrue statement of a material fact or omit to state any material fact necessary to make the statements therein, in light of the circumstances under which they were made, not misleading, the District shall promptly notify the Underwriter.

Section 6. Effect of Supplemental Resolution. The Original Note Resolution is hereby ratified and confirmed and shall continue in full force and effect in accordance with the terms and provisions thereof, as supplemented by the terms stated in this Supplemental Resolution, including the authority granted to the Authorized Officers named therein to take all actions therein authorized with respect to a Series of Additional Notes.

Section 7. Submittal of Resolution to County. The Secretary or Clerk of the Board of the District is hereby directed to submit one certified copy each of this Resolution to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the County, to the Treasurer of the County and to the County Superintendent of Schools.

CALIFORNIA SCHOOL CASH RESERVE PROGRAM Sponsored by CSBA Finance Corporation Mid-year TRAN Board Agenda Item Description

By passing the resolution before the Board, our District will have the opportunity to participate in the mid-year TRAN offering from the California School Cash Reserve Program sponsored by California School Boards Association Finance Corporation. In 2010-2011, over 139 school districts, community college districts, and county offices of education were involved in the issuance of more than \$612 million of notes issued through the Program. This participation represents a majority of schools that issue TRANs.

The 2010-11 mid-year TRAN offering is specifically designed to address cash flow deficits caused by the State's deferral of apportionment funding from February, April, May and June (across the end of the fiscal year) until July and August. Based on preliminary estimates, up to one-third of 2010-11 K-12 State apportionment funds will be deferred until next fiscal year. The deferral of these revenues can have a significant impact to cash balances at the end of the fiscal year. Issuance of this TRAN will provide funds to our District to address cash deficits caused by these deferrals.

Through participation in the Cash Reserve Program, our District will be able to issue a tax and revenue anticipation note as part of this cost-effective pooled structure. An overview of this cash management concept and the Program is provided below:

Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (TRANs): TRANs are short-term debt instruments issued by school districts throughout the State to create an additional reserve to the general fund. In our District, this reserve will act as a cushion to the general fund in the event that we experience temporary cash flow needs. These cash flow needs may occur as a result of the timing mismatch between the receipt of revenues (generally received in an uneven fashion) and the expenditure of general fund moneys (generally paid out in a more level fashion).

TRANs Economics: Through our participation in the Program, our District will issue a tax-exempt note. The proceeds from the sale of this note, while not needed for cash flow, are invested in a taxable investment. This may result in a positive spread between the borrowing rate and the investment return on the TRAN proceeds.

Cash Reserve Program Background: The first Cash Reserve Program was issued in June of 1988 for six districts with an aggregate issue amount of \$9.6 million. Since that time the Program has grown dramatically in size, servicing the majority of California school district TRAN issuers, issuing more than \$612 million for the 2010-2011 fiscal year. Each year the Program has resulted in a significant benefit to the participants. The highlights of the Program are as follows:

 Participants benefit from a cost-effective and administratively simple method to issue their TRANs

Cāsh Reserve Program Process:


The Cash Reserve Program involves the following key steps in order to participate:

- 1. Adoption of Resolution: Adoption of the resolution does not obligate the District to participate in the Program. The resolution simply delegates to the administration the right to decide on participation.
- 2. Cash Flow and Credit Background Process: Participants submit a completed credit questionnaire and financial information (including audits, budget, interim reports and cash flow projections) that is used to develop an initial pro-forma cash flow statement for 2010-2011 that extends up to the anticipated State deferment payment dates. Piper Jaffray works with the District to review, revise, and finalize the cash flow statement and TRAN issuance amount. The cash flows are reviewed by Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, the Program's Bond Counsel.
- 3. *Pricing*: The pricing of the issue is anticipated to occur in mid-February. At that time the interest rate on the notes will be locked-in. Our District is not obligated to participate until it acknowledges issuance prior to the sale of notes.
- 4. *Closing*: Closing of the issue will occur in February/March. Our District will have access to the proceeds of the TRAN available to meet our temporary cash flow needs.

We recommend that the Board adopt the resolution. This will allow administration to proceed to the next step in the process and take part in this beneficial Program for schools. Once again, our District is not obligated to participate as a result of resolution adoption. The Resolution simply delegates to the administration the right to decide on participation prior to the time of TRAN issuance.

BUDGET ADOPTION CALENDAR FOR FISCAL YEAR 2011-12

ACTION

ISSUE:

Shall the Board approve the Budget Adoption Calendar for fiscal year 2011-12?

BACKGROUND:

At its November 27, 1990 meeting, the Board granted its approval for participation in a July 1, Budget Adoption (single adoption) pilot program for fiscal year 1991-92. This timeline, used in all subsequent fiscal years, is now a requirement under AB 1200. The timeline more evenly distributes the Business Office workload throughout the year, allows the Budget to coincide with the fiscal year business cycle, and eliminates the duplication of effort involved in the preparation of the tentative Budget. It also allows the District to make budget revisions earlier in the school year and provide greater planning and study time by the Board, Superintendent, Fiscal Services, Human Resources, Leadership Team, and District Finance Committee.

A fiscal year, like the calendar year, is 12 months long. However, the actual life of a fiscal year budget, from development, to adoption, to closing the books, typically spans a 20 month period. Budget development and administration continue on a daily basis throughout the fiscal year. At any point in time, work and analysis is being performed on one or more fiscal years' budgets. There are five major phases in budget development and management, and the budget calendar is developed each year to ensure important financial legal timelines are met:

1) THE GOVERNOR'S JANUARY BUDGET PROPOSAL

JANUARY

- The Governor proposes the State budget for the upcoming fiscal year, including K-12 education revenue allocations.
- The District establishes its preliminary enrollment and staffing projections.
- The District establishes its preliminary budget assumptions and expenditure guidelines.

2) THE GOVERNOR'S MAY BUDGET REVISION

MAY

- In the May Revise, the Governor proposes the revisions to the January budget proposal, including K-12 education revenue allocations.
- Based on the May revise, the District revises its budget assumptions, enrollment and staffing projections, and expenditure guidelines.
- The District updates its projected beginning balance estimate.

3) ADOPTION OF THE DISTRICT BUDGET

(Assumes passage of State budget prior to July 1)

JUNE

- District revenue projections are updated to reflect the final State budget.
- District program and expenditure plans are updated to reflect the final State budget.
- The District updates its projected beginning balance estimate.
- The Board of Education approves the District's Adopted Budget for the new fiscal year.

ISSUE:

Should the Board of Education approve Resolution #11-01 - In Support of Full Funding of

County Mental Health Services for Students with Disabilities?

BACKGROUND:

Pursuant to IDEA, School districts are required to provide to qualifying students a free, appropriate public education, including mental health services. In 1984, the state passed AB 3632, mandating that county mental health agencies be responsible for assessment and mental health services of special education students. Based on the provisions of AB 3632, school districts have relied on county mental health to assess, diagnose, case manage, serve, and make residential placements for, students with mental health needs. On October 8, 2010, the Governor signed the Budget Act but exercised a line item veto of the \$133 million appropriated by the Legislature to fund the state mandate under AB 3632. In addition, the Legislature failed to provide funding in the budget of the Human Services Agency (HSA) to pay the room and board costs for special education students who require residential placement. (Until October 8, 2010, when students required residential placement, the district funded the educational portion of the program, mental health funded the mental health services, and HSA funded the room and board costs.) Under IDEA, if a public agency such as county mental health fails to provide or pay for the special education and related services necessary for the student, the local educational agency (i.e. school district) is required to provide or pay for those services.

Several lawsuits have been filed, and are pending, challenging the Governor's legal authority to suspend the AB 3632 mandate; CDE representatives continue to meet with legislative staff to determine a resolution to the veto of the state funding for these important services. The Ventura County SELPA has developed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the SELPA and Ventura County Behavioral Health. The MOU establishes the mental health services, and the cost for those services, that county mental health will provide, pending an outcome of the legal challenges.

Oak Park Unified School District currently has nine students receiving mental health services such as counseling, medication management, case management, etc. We have two students currently placed in residential treatment programs. The SELPA expects to be able to fund, through the end of the 2010-2011 school year, the mental health services for students with disabilities EXCEPT for those students in residential placement. The total cost (education, mental health services, and room and board) for the two Oak Park students is \$277,000.00 per year; \$89,000.00 had been budgeted to cover the educational portion of the students' placements, leaving a deficit of \$188,000.00.

School districts have been encouraged adopt a Board Resolution in support of full state funding of county mental health services for students with disabilities.

WHEREAS, our state cannot afford to wait for more students to face hardship before taking decisive action;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Oak Park Unified School District strongly urges the Governor and the State Legislature to immediately provide full funding for AB 3632/1984 county mental health services to children with disabilities.

OAK PARK HIGH SCHOOL CODE OF ETHICS CONTRACT FOR PARTICIPATION IN CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Co-curricular activities are an integral part of the school's total educational program. All school activities, curricular and extra-curricular, in the classroom and on the playing field, must be congruent with the school's stated goals and objectives established for the intellectual, physical, social and moral development of its students.

When Oak Park students participate in co-curricular activities, they represent not only themselves, but also their families and our school and community. They are expected to display appropriate and acceptable standards of sportsmanship and behavior — on and off the field, in and out of school, including nights and weekends, in or out of the season of sport or activity. They are further expected to do everything in their power to not be involved with or present at functions where any of the below mentioned prohibited activities are taking place.

- 1. Place academic achievement as the highest priority. This includes maintaining a 2.0 GPA with no "F's" in all subjects during the preceding marking period and during the season of sport/activity. Eligibility will be checked at the quarter and semester report card times. Students with 2.0 and one "F" may petition for probation. Scholastic probation may be granted to a student only once in his/her high school career.
- 2. Attendance Students must attend a minimum of 2 block periods the day of any co-curricular activity in order to participate in that activity, practice, contest or performance. If the activity takes place on a Saturday or holiday, then the student will be required to attend 2 block periods on the preceding school day. Exceptions must be cleared by an administrator. Truancy from any class or classes will result in suspension from the next contest/activity. Students on disciplinary suspension will not be allowed to participate in practices/ games during the period of suspension.
- 3. No athlete/participant may quit one co-curricular activity and go out during the same season for another.
- 4. Show respect for teammates, opponents, officials, coaches and all other participants.
- 5. Respect the integrity and judgment of activity officials.
- 6. Exhibit fair play, sportsmanship and proper conduct on and off the playing field.
- 7. Refrain from the use of profanity, vulgarity and other offensive language and gestures.
- 8. Adhere to the established rules and standards of the activity.
- Respect all equipment and use it safely and appropriately. Students are financially responsible for all equipment checked out to him/her. All equipment must be returned in a timely manner. A delinquent account will result in a "hold" on transcripts, report cards, yearbooks, and/or diplomas.
- 10. Know and follow all school rules, and CIF rules and regulations as they pertain to eligibility and sports participation.
- 11. Win/perform with character, and face challenges with dignity.
- 12. Athlete/participants must travel to and from contests in transportation provided for and arranged by the school. Any exception to this is rare and must be approved by an administrator at least 48 hours in advance.
- 13. Refrain from participation in hazing. Hazing is defined as any behavior that is physically, emotionally, or psychologically abusive to an individual, or selected group of individuals, for the purpose of gaining entrance or acceptance into an established group.
- 14. Refrain from the use of alcohol, tobacco, illegal and non-prescriptive drugs, anabolic steroids or any substance to increase physical development or performance that is not approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, Surgeon General of the United States or American Medical Association.
- 15. Refrain from being arrested or cited for any misdemeanor or felony at school or in the community.

DISCUSSION/ACTION

ISSUE:

To discuss and consider the concept of administering the 2011 Oak Park summer school for grades 6-12 as a private program through the Friends of Oak Park Educational Foundation.

BACKGROUND:

Due to the fact that the funding for all hourly programs (of which summer school is the largest) is continuing to be included in the Tier III flexibility category, the district will again receive a fixed amount of funding this year for our summer school regardless of whether or not the district offers a program. This dollar amount is capped based on a calculation of funding received for hourly programs in the 2007-08 school year. In the past the district has been required to provide programs beyond the normal school year for 1) students who are not meeting standards and are at risk of retention; 2) students who are going to be retained; 3) seniors in need of credits for graduation; 4) students who need to repeat courses required for graduation; 5) eligible special education students in an extended school year setting.

However, for this year many districts are considering no summer program, or a much reduced summer school that will only offer classes for seniors in need of credits for graduation. Districts are only required to run a program for their eligible special education students in an extended school year setting based on their IEP's.

Last year a special appeal was made to parents of students in the middle school and high school for voluntary donations to be able to run a cost-neutral summer school program and the parents responded by contributing enough money to do this without any encroachment on the district. In the past our parents have generously supplemented our reimbursement from the State through donations for summer school, and as a result our district has been able to offer an exceptional enrichment and remedial program at the elementary, middle and high school levels. However, with the State contributing less and less funding even this model is in jeopardy.

One option that many districts are moving to involves turning their summer school program over to a private non-profit educational foundation. Members of the board of the Friends of Oak Park Educational Foundation have discussed the possibility of this approach and their board has unanimously approved their leadership to pursue this with the district for 2011. A number of meetings have been held between district officials, Friends of Oak Park board members, high school administrators and counselors and representatives of the Las Virgenes Educational Foundation (the foundation who administers the summer school program for LVUSD).

Contingent upon district approval, the Friends of Oak Park are ready to move forward with organizing and developing the specifics of the program with the input of the district and secondary school sites. Since the Friends of Oak Park is not an accredited summer school program it will be necessary for the governing board of the Oak Park Unified School District to approve a resolution that states OPUSD will accept the credits for the courses taught in the summer program administered by the foundation. If the governing board elects to move the summer program to a private entity then this resolution and other pertinent information will be brought to the February board meeting for approval.

STATEMENT:

Recommend that the Friends of Oak Park Educational Foundation proceed with organizing a grades 6-12 summer school program for 2011.

Drug And Alcohol-Free Workplace

The Governing Board believes that the maintenance of drug- and alcohol-free workplace is essential to *staff and student safety and to help ensure a productive and safe work and learning environment.* school and district operations.

(cf. 4112.41/4212.41/4312.41 - Employee Drug Testing) (cf. 4112.42/4212.42/4312.42 - Drug and Alcohol Testing for School Bus Drivers)

No employee shall unlawfully manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess, use or be under the influence of any alcoholic beverage, drug or any controlled substance as defined in 21 USC 81 at any school district in the workplace. (Government Code 8355; 41 USC 701)

Employees are prohibited from being under the influence of controlled substances or alcohol while on duty. For purposes of this policy, on duty means while an employee is on duty during both instructional and non-instructional time in the classroom or workplace, at extracurricular or cocurricular activities or while transporting students or otherwise supervising them. Under the influence means that the employee's capabilities are adversely or negatively affected, impaired, or diminished to an extent that impacts the employee's ability to safely and effectively perform his/her job.

These prohibitions apply before, during and after school hours. A school district workplace is any place where school district work is performed, any school owned or school-approved vehicle used to transport students to and from school or school activities; any off-school sites when accommodating a school-sponsored or school-approved activity or function where students are under district jurisdiction; or during any period of time when an employee is supervising students on behalf of the district or otherwise engaged in district business.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify employees of these the District's prohibitions against drug use and the actions that will be taken for violation of such prohibition. (Government Code 8355; 41 USC 7021)

An employee shall abide by the terms of this policy and *shall* notify the district, within five days, of *his/her conviction for violation in the workplace of* any criminal drug or alcohol statute conviction which he/she receives for a violation occurring in the workplace. (*Government Code* 8355; 41 USC 7021)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the appropriate federal granting or contracting agencies within 10 days after receiving notification, from an employee or otherwise, of any conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace. (41 USC 701)

The Board may not employ or retain in employment persons convicted of a controlled substance offense as defined in Education Code 44011. If any such conviction is reversed and the person acquitted in a new trial or the charges dismissed, his/her employment is no longer prohibited. A plea or verdict of guilty, a finding of guilt by a court in a trial without a jury, or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere shall be deemed to be a conviction. (Education Code 44836, 45123)

A classified employee may be reemployed after conviction of such an offense if the Board determines, from the evidence presented, that the person has been rehabilitated for at least five years. (Education Code 45123)

In accordance with law and the district's collective bargaining agreements, the Superintendent or designee The Board may take appropriate disciplinary action, up to and including termination, against an employee for violating the terms of this policy and/or shall or require the employee to satisfactorily participate in and complete a drug assistance or rehabilitation program approved by a federal, state or local public health, or law enforcement or other appropriate agency.

Administering Medication and Monitoring Health Conditions

The Governing Board recognizes that during the school day, some students may need to take medication prescribed or ordered by an authorized a health care provider, to be functional at school and participate in the educational program. during the school day in order to be able to attend school. The Superintendent or designee shall develop processes for the administration of medication to these such-students. by school personnel. For any student with a disability, as defined under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, necessary medication shall be administered in accordance with the student's individualized education program or Section 504 services plan.

If the *a* parent/guardian so chooses, he/she may administer the medication to his/her child *at* school or—In addition, the parent/guardian may designate another individual who is not a school employee to administer the medication to *do so on his/her behalf* the student.

Self-Administration and Monitoring

In addition, upon written request by the parent/guardian and with the approval of the student's authorized health care provider, physician, a student with a medical condition that requires frequent monitoring, testing or treatment may be allowed to self administer, self-monitor, and/or self-test. The student shall observe universal precautions in the handling of blood and other bodily fluids.

Any medication prescribed by an authorized health care provider may be administered by the school nurse or other designated school personnel only when the Superintendent or designee has received written statements from both the student's parent/guardian and physician authorized health care provider. (Education Code 49423; 5 CCR 600)

School nurses and other designated school personnel shall administer medications in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation and shall be afforded appropriate liability protection.

Only a school nurse or other school employee with an appropriate medical license may administer an insulin injection to a student. In the event such licensed school personnel are unavailable, the district may contract with a licensed nurse from a public or private agency to administer insulin to the student. However, in an emergency situation such as a public disaster or epidemic, a trained, unlicensed district employee may administer an insulin injection to a student.

To the extent that the administration of School staff who administer medication to students, including such as epinephrine auto-injections or glucagon, is authorized by law, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that unlicensed personnel designated to administer it to students receive appropriate training from qualified medical personnel before any on how such medication should be administered. At a minimum, the training shall cover how and when such medication should be administered, the recognition of symptoms and treatment, emergency follow-up procedures, and as well as training in the proper documentation and storage of the medication. Such trained, unlicensed designed school personnel shall be supervised by and provided with emergency communication access to a school nurse, physician, or other appropriate individual.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain documentation of the training, ongoing supervision, as well as annual written verification of competency of such other designated school personnel.

The Governing Board recognizes that periodic health examinations of students may lead to the detection and treatment of conditions that impact learning. Health examinations also may help in determining whether special adaptations of the school program are necessary.

The Superintendent or designee shall verify In addition to verifying that students have complied with legal requirements for a comprehensive health screening, an oral health assessment, examinations and immunizations at school entry. In addition, before enrolling in school the district shall administer tests for vision, hearing and scoliosis as required by law.

This requirement does not apply to participants in occasional play day or field day activities.

Immunizations

To protect the health of all students and staff and to curtail the spread of infectious diseases, the Governing Board desires to shall cooperate with state and local health agencies to encourage immunization of all district students against preventable diseases.

Each student enrolling for the first time in a district elementary school or secondary school, preschool, Students entering a district school or child care and development program, or transferring between school campuses, shall present an immunization record from any authorized private or public health care provider certifying that he/she received all required which shows at least the month and year of each immunizations in accordance with law. Students shall be excluded from school or exempted from immunization requirements only as allowed by law.

Except to the extent otherwise authorized by law, each transfer student shall present evidence of immunization before he/she record certifying that he/she has received all required immunizations currently due before he/she is admitted to school. Such evidence may include the child's personal immunization record from his/her authorized health care provider or his/her cumulative file from his/her previous school.

The Superintendent or designee may arrange for an authorized health care provider qualified medical personnel to administer immunizations at school to any student whose parent/guardian has consented in writing. At the beginning of the school year, parent/guardians shall be notified of their right to provide consent for the administration of an immunization to their child at school (Education Code 49403)
