CREDENTIAL INFORMATION - 2009-2010

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Under the provisions of SB 435, the Board of Education receives a report of fully credentialed staff who are assigned to teach in academic areas for which they may not have a formal credential, but for which they have the requisite number of units required for knowledge of the subject and the ability to teach the subject in the classroom. The following credential assignments are brought to the Board of Education annually. These assignments are brought to the Board in accordance with the requirements of the Education Code and the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing.

Education Code section 44258.2 (grade 5-8) allows that the holder of a single subject standard secondary teaching credential may, with his or her consent, be assigned by action of the governing board, to teach classes in grades 5 through 8 in a middle school, provided that the teacher has a minimum of 12 semester units or 6 upper division or graduate semester units of coursework at an accredited institution in the subject to be taught.

WHEREAS, school districts, community college districts and county boards of education are authorized by Sections 53850 to 53858, both inclusive, of the California Government Code (the "Act") (being Article 7.6, Chapter 4, Part 1, Division 2, Title 5 of the Government Code) to borrow money by the issuance of temporary notes; and

WHEREAS, on the Original Note Resolution Adoption Date set forth above, the governing board (the "Board") determined, pursuant to a resolution (the "Original Note Resolution") that, in order to satisfy certain obligations and requirements of the school district, community college district or county board of education specified above (the "District"), a public body corporate and politic located in the County designated above (the "County"), it was desirable that a sum (the "Principal Amount"), not to exceed the Maximum Amount of

Borrowing designated above, be borrowed for such purpose during its fiscal year ending June 30, 2010 ("Fiscal Year 2009-2010") by the issuance of its 2009-2010 Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (the first series of which has been issued and shall be referred to herein as the "Series A Notes" and any subsequent series of which shall be referred to herein as "Additional Notes," and collectively with the Series A Notes, the "Notes"), in one or more series (each a "Series"), therefor in anticipation of the receipt of taxes, income, revenue, cash receipts and other moneys to be received by the District for the general fund and, if so indicated in a Pricing Confirmation, capital fund and/or special revenue fund (or similarly named fund or funds as indicated in such Pricing Confirmation) of the District attributable to Fiscal Year 2009-2010 (capitalized undefined terms used in this Supplemental Resolution shall have the meanings ascribed thereto in the Original Note Resolution); and

WHEREAS, on July 6, 2009, the District issued the Series A Note in the Series A Principal Amount set forth above; and

WHEREAS, the Original Note Resolution provides that the District (or the County on its behalf, as applicable) may at any time issue pursuant to the Original Note Resolution one or more Series of Additional Notes consisting of Senior Notes or Subordinate Notes (including Subordinate Notes that are further subordinated to previously issued Subordinate Notes, as provided in the applicable Pricing Confirmation), subject in each case to certain specific conditions set forth in Section 2(B) of the Original Note Resolution; and

WHEREAS, the District desires to issue, pursuant to the Original Note Resolution, a Series of Additional Notes in a Series Principal Amount which, when added to the Series A Principal Amount, will not exceed the Maximum Amount of Borrowing authorized by the Original Note Resolution; and

WHEREAS, because the District does not have fiscal accountability status pursuant to Section 42650 or Section 85266 of the California Education Code, it requests the Board of Supervisors of the County to borrow, on the District's behalf, said Series Principal Amount by the issuance of the Series of Additional Notes; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 53853 of the Act, if the Board of Supervisors of the County fails or refuses to authorize the issuance of the Series of Additional Notes within the time period specified in said Section 53853, following receipt of this Supplemental Resolution, and the Series of Additional Notes are issued in conjunction with tax and revenue anticipation notes of other Issuers within the meaning of Section 53853 of the Act, the District may issue the Series of Additional Notes in its name pursuant to the Original Note Resolution as supplemented by terms stated herein; and

WHEREAS, it appears, and this Board hereby finds and determines, that said Series Principal Amount of the Series of Additional Notes, when added to the interest payable thereon, does not exceed eighty-five percent (85%) of the estimated amount of the uncollected taxes, income, revenue (including, but not limited to, revenue from the state and federal governments), cash receipts and other moneys of the District attributable to Fiscal Year 2009-2010 and available for the payment of the principal of the Series of Additional Notes and the interest thereon;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board hereby finds, determines, declares and resolves as follows:

Section 1. Recitals. All the above recitals are true and correct and this Board so finds and determines.

Section 2. Issuance of Series B Notes. In accordance with the Original Note Resolution, this Board hereby determines to borrow, and hereby requests the Board of Supervisors of the County to borrow for the District, solely for the purpose of anticipating taxes, income, revenue, cash receipts and other moneys to be received by the District for the general fund and, if so indicated in the Pricing Confirmation for the Series of Additional Notes authorized hereby, the capital fund and/or special revenue fund (or similarly named fund or funds as indicated in such Pricing Confirmation) of the District attributable to Fiscal Year 2009-2010, and not pursuant to any common plan of financing of the District, by the issuance by the Board of Supervisors of the County, in the name of the District, of a Series of Additional Notes under Sections 53850 et seq. of the Act and to be designated generally as the District's "2009-2010 [Subordinate] ** Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes, Series B" (referred to herein as the "Series B Notes"). The Series B Notes shall be issued in a Series Principal Amount which, when added to the Series A Principal Amount, shall not exceed the Maximum Amount of Borrowing designated above. If the conditions of the Original Note Resolution are met, the Series B Notes may be issued as Senior Notes. If not issued as Senior Notes, the Series B Notes shall be issued as Subordinate Notes.

In the event the Board of Supervisors of the County fails or refuses to authorize the issuance of the Series B Notes within the time period specified in Section 53853 of the Act, following receipt of this Supplemental Resolution, this Board hereby authorizes issuance of the Series B Notes, in the District's name pursuant to and in accordance with the Original Note Resolution as supplemented by the terms stated in this Supplemental Resolution. The Series B Notes shall be issued in conjunction with the note or notes of one or more other Issuers as part of the California School Cash Reserve Program (the "Program") and within the meaning of Section 53853 of the Act.

Section 3. Sale of Series B Notes. The Series B Notes shall be sold, under the Bond Pool Structure authorized in the Original Note Resolution, to the California School Cash Reserve Program Authority (the "Authority") in accordance with the Original Note Resolution. Each Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed, during the period commencing on the date of adoption of this Supplemental Resolution and ending on June 30, 2010, to execute and deliver the Pricing Confirmation applicable to the Series B Notes on a date within five (5) days (or such longer period of time as agreed by the Authority) of the negotiation of the interest rate or rates and the purchase price to be paid for the Series B Notes in accordance with Section 4 of the Original Note Resolution.

Section 4. Preliminary Official Statement and Official Statement. Each Authorized Officer is hereby authorized and directed to provide Piper Jaffray & Co., as underwriter for the Program (the "Underwriter") with such information relating to the District as the Underwriter

shall reasonably request for inclusion in the preliminary official statement (the "Preliminary Official Statement") and official statement of the Authority relating to the Series of Pool Bonds to which the Series B Notes will be assigned. If, at any time prior to the execution of the Pricing Confirmation for the Series B Notes, any event occurs as a result of which the information contained in the Preliminary Official Statement or other offering document relating to the District might include an untrue statement of a material fact or omit to state any material fact necessary to make the statements therein, in light of the circumstances under which they were made, not misleading, the District shall promptly notify the Underwriter.

Section 5. Effect of Supplemental Resolution. The Original Note Resolution is hereby ratified and confirmed and shall continue in full force and effect in accordance with the terms and provisions thereof, as supplemented by the terms stated in this Supplemental Resolution, including the authority granted to the Authorized Officers named therein to take all actions therein authorized with respect to a Series of Additional Notes.

Section 6. Submittal of Resolution to County. The Secretary or Clerk of the Board of the District is hereby directed to submit one certified copy each of this Resolution to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the County, to the Treasurer of the County and to the County Superintendent of Schools.

CALIFORNIA SCHOOL CASH RESERVE PROGRAM Sponsored by CSBA Finance Corporation Midyear TRAN Board Agenda Item Description

By passing the resolution before the Board, our District will have the opportunity to participate in the Midyear TRAN offering from the California School Cash Reserve Program sponsored by California School Boards Association Finance Corporation. In 2009-2010, over 145 school districts, community college districts, and county offices of education were involved in the issuance of more than \$531 million of notes issued through the Program. This participation represents a majority of schools that issue TRANs.

Through participation in the Cash Reserve Program, our District will be able to issue a tax and revenue anticipation note as part of this cost-effective pooled structure. An overview of this cash management concept and the Program is provided below:

Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (TRANs): TRANs are short-term debt instruments issued by school districts throughout the State to create an additional reserve to the general fund. In our District, this reserve will act as a cushion to the general fund in the event that we experience temporary cash flow needs. These cash flow needs may occur as a result of the timing mismatch between the receipt of revenues (generally received in an uneven fashion) and the expenditure of general fund moneys (generally paid out in a more level fashion).

TRANs Economics: Through our participation in the Program, our District will issue a tax-exempt note. The proceeds from the sale of this note, while not needed for cash flow, are invested in a taxable investment. This may result in a positive spread between the borrowing rate and the investment return on the TRAN proceeds.

Cash Reserve Program Background: The first Cash Reserve Program was issued in June of 1988 for six districts with an aggregate issue amount of \$9.6 million. Since that time the Program has grown dramatically in size, servicing the majority of California school district TRAN issuers, issuing more than \$531 million for the 2009-2010 fiscal year. Each year the Program has resulted in a significant benefit to the participants. The highlights of the Program are as follows:

- Participants benefit from a cost-effective and administratively simple method to issue their TRANs
- Documentation is streamlined for governing board approval
- Participants benefit from year-round administrative assistance

Cash Reserve Program Process:

The Cash Reserve Program involves the following key steps in order to participate:

- 1. Adoption of Resolution: Adoption of the resolution does not obligate the District to participate in the Program. The resolution simply delegates to the administration the right to decide on participation.
- 2. Cash Flow and Credit Background Process: Participants submit a completed credit questionnaire and financial information (including audits, budget, and second period interim cash flow report) that is used to develop an initial pro-forma cash flow statement for 2009-2010 that extends up to the anticipated State deferment payment dates. Participants review, revise, and approve their cash flow statement. The cash flows are reviewed by Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe, the Program's Bond Counsel.
- 3. **Pricing**: The pricing of the issue is anticipated to occur in late March. At that time the interest rate on the notes will be locked-in. The Program will offer us the option of a fixed-rate investment for the Note proceeds. Our District is not obligated to participate until it acknowledges issuance prior to the sale of notes.
- 4. Closing: Closing of the issue will occur in mid April. Our District will have access to the proceeds of the TRAN available to meet our temporary cash flow needs.

We recommend that the Board adopt the resolution. This will allow administration to proceed to the next step in the process and take part in this beneficial Program for schools. Once again, our District is not obligated to participate as a result of resolution adoption. The Resolution simply delegates to the administration the right to decide on participation prior to the time of TRAN issuance.

WHEREAS, the Oak Park Unified School District is deeply concerned for adequate and stable funding to support student academic achievement and to promote programs for the health and safety of all students and employees; and

WHEREAS, California's school districts have lost over \$20 billion in revenue and deferrals the past two years and must prepare for significant additional cuts as the State faces continued budget deficits; and

WHEREAS, total spending on health care by California school districts exceeded \$5.3 billion in 2007-2008, and has been increasing by \$300 million each year for the past ten years, funded from at-risk and unstable state revenue; and

WHEREAS, District employees contributed over \$400 million out of their paychecks fro health insurance premiums in 2007-2008, while paying significant out-of-pocket costs as well; and

WHEREAS, the State budget portends dire consequences of dramatic reductions in support staff at schools as well as widespread teacher layoffs and increased class sizes, which will be exacerbated if health care expenditures continue to rise; and

WHEREAS, the cost of health care is an essential element of district expenditures.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Oak Park Unified School District acknowledges the service the health care industry provides the district employer and all employees; and

THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Oak Park Unified School District, has an expectation that health care plans and providers will do everything in their power to maintain current costs and levels of health care programs through increased efficiencies, pricing restraint, support of quality and appropriate care, and will, where possible, after thorough and joint analyses, managing premium costs for the foreseeable future.

The Governing Board believes that the district should utilize its facilities and resources in the most economical and practical manner. To that end, The Superintendent or designee shall periodically study the current and projected use of all district facilities in order to ensure the efficient utilization of space and the effective delivery of instruction in order to maximize student learning.

Resolution of Intention to Sell or Lease

Before ordering the sale or lease of any real property, the Board shall adopt a resolution by a two-thirds vote of all of its members at a regular, open meeting. The resolution shall describe the property proposed to be sold or leased in such a manner as to identify it, specify the minimum price or rent, describe the terms upon which it will be sold or leased, and specify the commission or rate, if any, which the Board will pay to a licensed real estate broker out of the minimum price or rent. The resolution shall fix a time, not less than three weeks thereafter, for a public meeting, held at the Board's regular meeting place, at which sealed proposals to purchase or lease will be received and considered. (Education Code 17466)

weeks before the meeting, in a newspaper of general circulation published in the county in which the district is located if such a paper exists. (Education Code 17469)

Acceptance/Rejection of Bids

At a public meeting specified in the resolution *of intention to sell or lease property*, the Board shall open, examine, and declare all sealed bids. Before accepting any written proposal, the Board shall call for oral bids in accordance with law. (Education Code 17472, 17473)

The Board may reject any and all bids, either written or oral, and withdraw the properties from sale when the Board determines that rejection is in the best public interest. If no proposals are submitted or the submitted proposals doe not conform to all the terms and conditions specified in the resolution of intention to lease, the Board may lease the property in accordance with Education Code 17477 (Education Code 17476, 17477)

Of the proposals submitted by responsible bidders which conform to all terms and conditions specified in the resolution of intention to sell or lease, the Board shall finally accept the highest bid after deducting the commission, if any, to be paid to a licensed real estate broker, unless the Board accepts a higher oral bid or rejects all bids. (Education Code 17472)

The final acceptance of the bid may be made either at the same meeting specified in the resolution or at any adjourned/continued meeting held within 10 days. Upon acceptance of the bid, the Board may adopt a resolution of acceptance that directs the Board president, or any other Board member, to execute the deed or lease and to deliver the document upon performance and compliance by the successful bidder of all the terms and conditions of the contract. Interdistrict Attendance

The Governing Board recognizes that students who reside in one district may choose to attend school in another district and that such choices are made for a variety of reasons.

The Board desires to communicate with parents/guardians and students regarding the educational programs and services that are available.

Prior to July 1, 2007, The Board has designated the district as a "school district of choice" and shall accept students who reside in other California districts but wish to attend a district school. Each year, the Superintendent or designee shall recommend to the Board The Superintendent or designee shall establish an interdistrict attendance selection process which ensures that transfer students are admitted to district schools through a random, unbiased process.

The Board shall annually determine the number of interdistrict transfer students *that* the district will *be able* accept *and* for the following school year. The Board shall also identify the schools, grade levels, and programs that will be able to accept these additional students.

Upon receiving the Superintendent's report, the Board shall annually determine the number of students who will be accepted for admittance into the district through this program. This number shall be reflected in the minutes of the Board meeting.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a selection process which ensures that students applying through the program are admitted to district schools through a random, unbiased process that prohibits evaluation of whether a student should be enrolled based upon his/her academic or athletic performance. If the number of student applications exceeds the number of transfers the Board has designated for acceptance under the program, the Superintendent or designee shall conduct a random drawing in public at a regularly scheduled Board meeting. (Education Code 48301)

Because the district admits students in accordance with the school district of choice program, the Superintendent or designee may admit a student based on an individual interdistrict attendance permit pursuant to Education Code 48300-48315 only in situations of extreme need and upon the request of the district of residence.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of requests for admittance under the

- 2. The number of students transferred out of and transferred into the district pursuant to this program.

- 4. The number of students in item #2 above who are classified as English learners or students with disabilities

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at a regularly scheduled meeting, the information specified in items #1-4 above. By May 15 of each year, the Superintendent or designee shall provide the same information, as well as information regarding the district's status as a school district of choice in the upcoming school year, to each geographically adjacent school district, the county office of education, the California Department of Education, and the Department of Finance. (Education Code 48313)

The reports to the Board and other agencies shall also include a summary of audit exceptions, if any, resulting from the compliance review of components of the district of choice program conducted as part of the annual district audit. (Education Code 48301, 48313)

The Superintendent or designee may deny applications for interdistrict transfer because of overcrowding within district schools, limited district resources or to maintain the following limits to special programs:

- a. Resource Specialist Program is at least five (5) under maximum caseload.
- b. Non-severe Special Day Class enrollment is under eight (8) students
- c. Speech/Language enrollment—total caseload under thirty (30)

The Governing Board desires to prepare *all students* each student to obtain a diploma of high school graduation *to enable them to take advantage of* in order to provide students with opportunities for postsecondary education and/or employment.

To obtain a diploma of graduation from high school, students shall complete at least the following courses in grades 9-12, with each course being one year unless otherwise specified:

- 1. Forty (40) semester credits in English
- 2. Thirty-five (35) semester credits of social science to include: ten (10) semester credits of United States history and geography; ten (10) semester credits of world history, culture, and geography; five (5) semester credits in American government and civics; five (5) semester credits in economics; and five (5) credits of world geography. (Education Code 51225.3)
- 3. Five (5) semester credits of health education.
- 4. Thirty (30) semester credits of science including biological and physical sciences ten (10) in life science, ten (10) in physical science, and ten (10) in earth science. (Education Code 51225.3)

5. Thirty (30) semester credits of mathematics including ten (10) semester credits of Algebra I (or twenty (20) semester credits of Algebra 1A and 1B ten (10) each) and ten (10) credits of geometry.

Beginning in the 2003-04 school year, At least one mathematics course, or a combination of the two mathematics courses required for completion in grades 9-12, shall meet or exceed state academic content standards for Algebra 1. (Education Code 51224.5)

Because the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students, the Board shall provide alternative means for the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.

DIFFERENTIATION UPDATE

Our site has been working to support our school goal of challenging each student and addressing their individual needs. We have committed to grouping students for appropriate instruction. Although teachers are also grouping students within their classes to meet individual needs, we have two programs that allow for more individualized instruction. In math, students have been grouped across the grade level for all math instruction based on a pre-test for each math unit. The instruction for each group is designed specifically based on their learning needs in that area. An aide is working with the lowest group for more individualized skill development. At the conclusion of each unit, the teachers assess the students in the next area and regroup them by need. In Language Arts, we have identified first through third grade students in need of additional instruction through the use of the DIBELS Assessment and SRI. Students in grades four and five have been identified based on the STAR scores, SRI and teacher recommendation. Each identified student will be served daily in the Literacy Center.

In addition, we have instituted monthly meetings for each grade level to meet with the Resource Center staff. These meetings will provide for articulation and planning to insure that all students' needs are being met.

SYMPHONIC ADVENTURES

All Oak Hills 3rd grade students attended the annual Symphonic Adventures Student Concert on Tuesday, January 13 at the Thousand Oaks Civic Arts Center. Maestro Brott and the musicians of the New West Symphony introduced the families of the orchestra to students.

Our WASC process continues as we have completed the three-year review document. We shared the information and data with the Site Council. Council parents are planning to participate in the one-day visit in March.

Two teachers are enrolled in VCOE subject training courses to meet the NCLB requirements for highly qualified teaching. Hope remains to achieve qualification through the HOUSSE, rather than the series of 5-10 all-day inservices at the county office.

Barbara Harrison has submitted her application for acceptance in the Columbia Writing Project for a second year. She is reporting great success using the skills and strategies she learned at Columbia with her students.

We have added access to an after-school enrichment program through our partnership with Parks and Rec. and Oak Hills. Our elementary families now can sign up and attend the sessions held at Oak Hills in the afternoons. Thank you to Leslie and to Parks and Rec. for facilitating this resource for OPIS. It is a very nice component to be able to share with prospective new families from outside our district.

Our faculty participated in very successful inservice presented by Vicki Vierra, VCOE math consultant. We are reviewing our math program's scope, sequence and curriculum and Vicki added a very useful perspective to our process.

On December 9th, students and parents enjoyed a very informative and fun trip to the Western Bagel Company in Van Nuys.
