# <u>California Lutheran</u>

## STUDENT TEACHING CONTRACT

This Agreement is made between California Lutheran University ("CLU") and Oak Park School District ("Facility").

#### **RECITALS**

- A. CLU has established an approved program of special training entitled the Student Teacher Program, to provide initial teaching experience through supervised teaching to students enrolled in teacher training curricula (the "Program"); multiple and single subject and educational specialist initial credentials.
- B. Program requires supervision and facilities where students can obtain the clinical learning experience required in the curriculum; and
- C. Facility has the clinical setting, supervision, and equipment needed by Program trainees as part of their practical learning experience.

#### **TERMS**

In consideration of the mutual promises and conditions in this Agreement and for good and valuable consideration, CLU and Facility agree as follows:

## 1.0 Obligations of Facility.

I.I Facility will provide suitable clinical learning experience and supervision consistent with the Program's curriculum and objectives in accordance with CLU's academic calendar. Clinical learning experience shall include supervised teaching in schools and classes of the Facility, not to exceed ten (10) semester units of supervised student teaching for up to 75 full time individual students during the academic year, and/or up to ten (10) CLU students possessing valid internship credentials and enrolled with CLU for supervised teaching in schools or classes of the Facility, and under the direct supervision and instruction of Facility's employees as agreed upon by duly authorized representatives of Facility and CLU. Professional development schools are exempt from the unit limitation.

- I.2 Facility will designate appropriate personnel to coordinate the students' clinical learning experience in the Program. This will involve working with CLU faculty and staff to assign students to specific clinical cases and experiences, and include the students in selected conferences, clinics, courses, and programs conducted under the direction of Facility. "Supervised teaching" as used in the contract means active participation in the duties and functions of classroom teaching under the direct supervision and instruction of tenured employees of Facility holding valid professional clear credentials, authorizing them to serve as classroom teachers in the school or classes in which the supervised teaching is provided. It is understood that in no case shall students in learning situations replace regular staff. CLU students enrolled in the clinical experience shall receive a minimum of fifteen (15) weeks of supervision, in conformity with Title 5, California Administrative Code, Sections 6130 (f) (2) and 6160 (f) (2). The clinical experience shall commence on the date the student presents the assignment card and attendant CLU documents to the designated Facility employee.
- 1.3 Facility will permit, on reasonable request, the inspection of clinical and related facilities by agencies charged with responsibility for accreditation of CLU's program.
- 1.4 Facility shall provide to the teacher candidate appropriate access to student records, including CELDT scores, IEP goals and objectives, and other student demographic data as required by CalTPA.
- 1.5 Facility will assist the teacher candidate in obtaining parent permission to use student work and the videotaping of lessons for the express purpose of CalTPA requirements.
- 1.6 Facility will recommend to CLU the withdrawal of a Program student if: (1) the achievement, progress, adjustment, or health of the student does not warrant continuation at Facility, or (2) the behavior of the student fails to conform to the applicable regulations of Facility. Facility will assist CLU, if necessary, in implementing this recommendation.
- 1.7 Facility reserves the right, exercisable in its discretion after consultation with CLU, to exclude any student from its premises in the event that such person's conduct or state of health is deemed objectionable or detrimental, having in mind the proper administration of said Facility.
- 1.8 Facility shall provide all equipment and supplies needed for clinical instruction at Facility.
- 1.9 Facility shall arrange for emergency care in case of illness or accident to any participating student.

## 2.0 Obligations of CLU.

2.1 CLU will provide and maintain the records and reports necessary for conducting the students' clinical learning experience.

- 2.2 CLU will withdraw a student from the clinical program at Facility if, after consultation with Facility personnel, CLU determines such action to be warranted.
- 2.3 CLU will prohibit the publication by the students, faculty, and staff members of any material relative to their clinical learning experience that has not been approved for release for publication by both Facility and CLU.
- 2.4 CLU, through Office of the Dean of the School of Education or Coordinator of Candidate Placement, after consultation with Facility, shall plan and oversee the educational program for student clinical experiences.
- 2.5 CLU will ensure that all candidates have passed subject matter competency, have been fingerprinted and issued a Certificate of Clearance, and have passed all state and university requirements prior to being placed in the classroom.
- 2.6 CLU will provide Facility with an annual announcement or description of the program, curriculum and objectives to be achieved at Facility, and the academic calendar of CLU.
- 2.7 Instructors and students at CLU will abide by the rules and policies of Facility while using its facilities.

## 3.0 Term.

3.1 This agreement will commence on September 15, 2010 and is valid for five years.

## 4.0 Application of Facility's Rules.

CLU students, during clinical training at Facility, will be under the jurisdiction of Facility officials for training purposes and will follow Facility rules to the extent that such rules directly relate to clinical training. CLU students will be expected to conduct themselves in a professional manner such that their attire and their appearance conform to the accepted standards of Facility.

## 5.0 Reservation of Rights: Placement.

CLU and Facility each reserve the right to withhold placement of Program students depending upon the availability of facilities and personnel to adequately provide a satisfactory field experience.

## 6.0 Insurance Hold Harmless.

- 6.1 CLU agrees to render a certificate of liability insurance to Facility indicating coverage of CLU and its agents, employees, and students for their acts, failure to act, or negligence arising out of or caused by the activity which is the subject of this Agreement.
- 6.2 Facility agrees that it will indemnify and hold harmless CLU, its servants, agents and employees, and any students acting as such, from any and all liability, damage, expense, causes of action, suits, claims, or judgments arising from injury to person(s) or personal property or otherwise which arises out of the act, failure to act, or negligence of Facility, its servants, agents, or employees, in connection with or arising out of the activity which is the subject of this Agreement.

## 7.0 Laws, Rules, and Regulations; Non-Discrimination.

- 7.1 Facility and CLU agree that neither will discriminate against any individual on the basis of age, sex, race, creed, color, sexual orienation, religious belief, national origin, disability, status as a disabled veteran, or veteran of the Vietnam era, and that Facility agrees to comply with all nondiscriminatory laws and policies that CLU promulgates and to which CLU is subject.
- 7.2 Facility agrees that it will abide by all applicable executive orders, federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations in effect as of the date of this Agreement, and as they may change or be amended from time to time, including, but not limited to, compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

#### 8.0 Remuneration.

- 8.1 CLU shall pay Facility's supervising teachers for the performance of all services required to be performed under this contract at the rate indicated on the annual cooperating teacher agreement (see Appendix A).
- 8.2 Facility will not provide remuneration either in the form of pay or in kind to any employees of CLU for any services performed or activity required in connection with matters associated with this Agreement.

## 9.0 Use of Name; Advertising.

Neither party shall use the other's name or any corporate or business name which is reasonably likely to suggest that the two parties are related, without first obtaining the written consent of the-other-party.

#### 10.0 Termination

Either party may terminate this agreement upon 30 day's written notice to the other party except that if CLU terminates this agreement based on lack of funding, the 30 days' notice shall not apply. The notice required under this clause shall be sent by registered mail.

# 11.0 Non-Assignment and Subcontracting.

Facility shall not assign, transfer, or contract for the furnishing of services to be performed under this Agreement without the written approval of CLU.

# 12.0 Entire Agreement; Modification.

This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and may be modified only by a writing signed by both parties.

## 13.0 Governing Law.

This Agreement shall be governed by and construed under the laws of the State of California, which shall be the forum for any lawsuit arising from or incident to this Agreement.

## 14.0 Consideration.

Under the terms of this Agreement, neither party provides any compensation to the other party for services rendered under this agreement.

## 15.0 Severability.

In the event one or more clauses of this Agreement are declared illegal, void or unenforceable, that shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Agreement.

## 16.0 Waiver.

The failure of either party to exercise any of its rights under this Agreement for a breach thereof shall not be deemed to be a waiver of such rights, and no waiver by either party, whether written or oral, express or implied, of any rights under or arising from the Agreement shall be binding on any subsequent occasion; and no concession by either party shall be treated as an implied modification of the Agreement unless specifically agreed in writing.

# Conflict of Interest

The Governing Board desires to maintain the highest ethical standards and help ensure that decisions are made in the best interest of the district and the public. In accordance with law, Board members and designated employees shall disclose any conflict of interest and, as necessary, shall abstain from participating in the decision.

(cf. 9005 - Governance Standards)

#### **Incompatible Activities**

Governing Board members shall not engage in any employment or activity which is inconsistent with, incompatible with, in conflict with or inimical to the Board member's duties as an officer of the district. (Government Code 1126)

#### Conflict of Interest Code

The district's conflict of interest code shall be comprised of the terms of 2CCR 18730 and any amendments to it adopted by the Fair Political Practices Commission, together with a district attachment specifying designated positions and the specific types of disclosure statements required for each position.

Upon direction by the code reviewing body, the Board shall review the district's conflict of interest code and submit any changes to the code reviewing body. in even numbered year. If no change in the code is required, the district shall submit by October 1 a written statement to that effect to the code reviewing body. If a change in the code is necessitated by changed circumstances, the district shall submit an amended code to the code reviewing body. (Government Code 87306.6)

When a change in the district's conflict of interest code is necessitated *due to* by changed circumstances, such as the creation of new designated positions, *changes to the duties assigned to existing positions*, amendments, or revisions, the <del>changed amended</del> code shall be submitted to the code reviewing body within 90 days. (Government Code 87306)

When reviewing and preparing the district's conflict of interest code, the Superintendent or designee shall provide officers, employees, consultants, and members of the community adequate notice and a fair opportunity to present their views. (Government Code 87311)

(cf. 9320 - Meetings and Notices)

Board members and designated employees shall annually file a Statement of Economic Interest/Form 700 in accordance with the disclosure categories specified in the district's conflict of interest code. A Board member who leaves office or a designated employee who leaves district employment shall, within 30 days, file a revised statement covering the period of time between the closing date of the last statement and the date of leaving office or district employment. (Government Code 87302, 87500)

(cf. 4117.2,4217.2/4317.2 – Resignation) (cf. 9222 – Resignation)

#### Conflict of Interest under the Political Reform Act

A Board member or designated employee shall not make, participate in making, or in any way use or attempt to use his/her official position to influence a governmental decision in which he/she knows or has reason to know that he/she has a disqualifying conflict of interest. A conflict of interest exists if the decision will have a "reasonably foreseeable material financial effect" on one or more of the Board member's or designated employee's "economic interests," unless the effect is indistinguishable from the effect on the public generally or the Board member's or designated employee's participation is legally required. (Government Code 87100, 87101, 87103; 2 CCR 18700-18709)

A Board member or designated employee makes a governmental decision when, acting within the authority of his/her office or position, he/she votes on a matter, appoints a person, obligates or commits the district to any course of action, or enters into any contractual agreement on behalf of the district. (2 CCR 18702.1)

A Board member who has a disqualifying conflict of interest on an agenda item that will be heard in an open meeting of the Board shall abstain from voting on the matter. He/she may remain on the dais, but his/her presence shall not be counted towards achieving a quorum for that matter. A Board member with a disqualifying conflict of interest shall not be present during a closed session meeting of the Board when the decision is considered and shall not obtain or review a recording or any other nonpublic information regarding the issue. (2 CCR 18702.1)

#### Additional Requirements for Boards that Manage Public Investments

A Board member who manages public investments pursuant to Government Code 87200 and who has a financial interest in a decision shall, upon identifying a conflict or potential conflict of interest and immediately prior to the consideration of the matter, do all of the following: (Government Code 87105; 2CCR 18702.5)

- 1. Publicly identify the financial interest that gives rise to the conflict or potential conflict of interest in detail sufficient to be understood by the public, except that disclosure of the exact street address of a residence is not required. (Government Code 87105)
- 2. Recuse himself/herself from discussing and voting on the matter, or otherwise acting in violation of Government Code 87100. This Board member shall not be counted toward achieving a quorum while the item is discussed

However, the Board member may speak on the issue during the time that the general public speaks on *it and may* the issue. The Board member shall recuse himself/herself-from voting on the matter and leave the dais to speak from the same area as members of the public. He/she may listen to the public discussion of the matter with members of the public

3. Leave the room until after the discussion, vote, and any other disposition of the matter is concluded, unless the matter has been placed on the portion of the agenda reserved for uncontested matters. (Government Code 87105)

If the item is on the consent calendar, the Board member must recuse him/herself from discussing or voting on that matter, but the Board member is not required to leave the room during the consent calendar. (2-CCR 18702.5)

4. If the Board's decision is made during closed session, the public identification may be made disclose his/her interest orally during the open session. before the Board goes into closed session, and This disclosure shall be limited to a declaration that his/her recusal is because of a conflict of interest pursuant to Government Code 87100. The Board member He/she shall not be present when the decision item is considered in closed session or and shall not knowingly obtain or review a recording or any other non-public information regarding the Board's decision. (2 CCR-18702.5)

(cf. 3430 – Investing)

#### Conflict of Interest under Government Code 1090

Board members, and designed employees, or district consultants shall not be financially interested in any contract made by the Board on behalf of the district, including in the development, preliminary discussions, negotiations, compromises, planning, reasoning, and specifications and solicitations for bids. or in any contract they make in their capacity as Board members or designated employees. (Government Code 1090)-If a Board member or designated employee determines that he/she has such a financial interest, the district is barred from

entering into the contract. (Government Code 1090; Klistoff v. Superior Court, (2007) 157 Cal.App. 4<sup>th</sup> 469 in a decision, as described in Government Code 87103, this determination shall be disclosed. The member shall be disqualified from voting unless his/her participation is legally required. (2 CCR 18700)

A Board member shall not be considered to be financially interested in a contract if his/her interest is a "noninterest" as defined in Government Code 1091.5. One such noninterest is when a Board member's spouse/registered domestic partner has been a district employee for at least one year prior to the Board member's election or appointment. (Government Code 1091.5)

A Board member shall not be deemed to be financially interested in a contract if he/she has only a "remote interest" in the contract as specified in Government Code 1091 and if the remote interest is disclosed during a Board meeting and noted in the official Board minutes. The affected Board member shall not vote or debate on the matter or attempt to influence any other Board member to enter into the contract. Remote interests are specified in Government Code 1091(b); they include, but are not limited to, the interest of a parent in the earnings of his/her minor child. (Government Code 1091)

Even if there is no prohibited *conflict of interest* or remote interest, a Board member shall abstain from voting on personnel matters that uniquely affect a *his/her* relatives of the Board member. *However*, a Board member may vote, however, on collective bargaining agreements and personnel matters that affect a class of employees to which the *his/her* relative belongs. "Relative" means an adult who is related to the *Board member* person by blood or affinity within the third degree, as determined by the common law, or an individual in an adoptive relationship within the third degree. (Education Code 35107)

A relationship within the third degree includes the individual's parents, grandparents and great-grandparents, children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, brothers, sisters, aunts and uncles, nieces and nephews, and the similar family of the individual's spouse/registered domestic partner unless the individual is widowed or divorced.

#### Common Law Doctrine Against Conflict of Interest

A Board member shall abstain from any official action in which his/her private or personal interest may conflict with his/her official duties.

#### Rule of Necessity or Legally Required Participation

On a case-by-case basis and upon advise of legal counsel, a Board member with a financial interest in a contract may participate in the making of the contract if the rule of necessity or legally required participation applied pursuant to Government Code 87101 and 2 CCR 18708.

#### **Incompatible Offices and Activities**

Board members shall not engage in any employment or activity or hold any office which is inconsistent with, incompatible with, in conflict with, or inimical to the Board member's duties as an officer of the district. (Government Code 1099, 1126)

(cf. 4136, 4236, 4336 - Nonschool Employment)

#### Gifts

Board members and designated employees may accept gifts only under the conditions and limitations specified in Government Code 89503 and 2 CCR 18730.

The limitations on gifts do not apply to wedding gifts and gifts exchanged between individuals on birthdays, holidays and other similar occasions, provided that the gifts exchanged are not substantially disproportionate in value. (Government Code 89503)

Gifts of travel and related lodging and subsistence shall be subject to the prevailing current gift limitation except as described in Government Code 89506.

A gift of travel does not include travel provided by the district for Board members and designated employees. (Government Code 89506)

#### Honoraria

Board members and designated employees shall not accept any honorarium, which is defined as any payment made in consideration for any speech given, article published, or attendance at any public or private gathering, in accordance with law. (Government Code 89501, 89502)

The term "honorarium" does not include: (Government Code 89501)

1. Earned income for personal services customarily provided in connection with a bona fide business, trade or profession unless the sole or predominant activity of the business, trade or profession is making speeches.

2. Any honorarium which is not used and, within 30 days after receipt, is either returned to the donor or delivered to the district for donation into the general fund without being claimed as a deduction from income for tax purposes.

Statements of economic interests submitted to the district by designated employees in accordance with the conflict of interest code shall be available for public inspection and reproduction. (Government Code 81008)

#### **Financial Interest**

A Board member shall not be considered to be financially interested in a contract if his/her interest-includes, but not limited to, any of the following: (Government Code 1091.5)

- 1. That of an officer who is being reimbursed for his/her actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of an official duty.
- 2. That of a recipient of public services generally provided by the public body or board of which he/she is a member, on the same terms and conditions as if he or she were not a member of the board.
- 3. That of a landlord or tenant of the contracting party if such contracting party is the federal government or any federal department or agency, this state or an adjoining state, any department or agency of this state or an adjoining state, or any public corporation or special, judicial or other public district of this state or an adjoining state unless the subject matter of such contract is the property in which such officer or employee has such interest as landlord or tenant in which even his/her interest shall be deemed a remote interest within the meaning of, and subject to, the provisions of Government Code 1091.
- 4. That of a spouse of an officer or employee of the district if his/her spouse's employment or office holding has existed for at least one year prior to his/her election or appointment.
- 5. That of a non-salaried member of a nonprofit corporation, provided that such interest is disclosed to the Board at the time of the first consideration of the contract, and provided further that such interest is noted in its official records.
- 6. That of a non-compensated officer of a nonprofit, tax exempt corporation which, as one of its primary purposes, supports the functions of the board or to which the school Board

has legal obligation to give particular consideration, and provided further that such interest is noted in its official records.

- 7. That of a person receiving salary, per diem, or reimbursement for expenses from a governmental agency, unless the contract directly involves the department of the governmental agency that employs the officer or employee, provided that such interest is disclosed to the Board at the time of consideration of the contract, and provided further that the interest is noted in its official records.
- 8. That of an attorney of the contracting party of that of an owner, officer, employee or agent of a firm which renders, or has rendered, service to the contracting party in the capacity of stockbroker, insurance agent, insurance broker, real estate agent, or real estate broker if these individuals have not received and will not receive remuneration, consideration, or a commission as a result of the contract and if these individuals have an ownership interest of less than 10 percent in the law practice or firm, stock brokerage firm, insurance firm or real estate firm.

In addition, a Board member or employee shall not be deemed to be interested in a contract made pursuant to competitive bidding under a procedure established by law if his/her sole interest is that of an officer, director, or employee of a bank or savings and loan association with which a party to the contract has the relationship of borrower or depositor, debtor or creditor. (Government Code 1091.5)

A Board member may enter into a contract if the rule of necessity or legally required participation applies as defined in Government Code 87101.

#### **Designated Positions and Disclosure Categories**

It has been determined that persons occupying the following positions manage public investments and shall file a full statement of economic interests pursuant to Government Code 87200:

    - 2. Are contractors or subcontractors which are or have been within the part two years engaged in work or services of the type used by the district, or
    - 3. Manufacture or sell supplies, books, machinery or equipment of the type used by the district.

- Designated persons in this category must report investments or business positions in or income from sources which:
  - a. Are contractors or subcontractors engaged in work or services of the type used by the department which the designated person manages or directs, or
  - b. Manufacture or sell supplies, books, machinery or equipment of the type used by the department which the designated person manages or directs. For the purposes of this category, a principal's department is his/her entire school.
- 3. Consultants are designated employees who much disclose financial interests as determined on a case by case basis by the Superintendent or designee. The Superintendent or designee's written determination shall include a description of the consultant's duties and a statement of the extent of disclosure requirements based

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upon that description. All such determinations are public records and shall be retained for public inspection along with this conflict of interest code.

A consultant is an individual who, pursuant to a contract with the district, makes a governmental decision whether to: (2 CCR 18701)

- a. Approve a rate, rule or regulation;
- b. Adopt or enforce a law;
- c. Issue, deny, suspend or revoke a permit, license, application, certificate, approval, order or similar authorization or entitlement;
- d. Authorize the district to enter into, modify or renew a contract that requires district approval;
- e. Grant district approval to a contract or contract specifications which require district approval and in which the district is a party;
- f.—Grant district approval to a plan, design, report, study or similar item; or
- g. Adopt or grant district approval of district policies, standards or guidelines.

A consultant is also an individual who, pursuant to a contract with the district, serves in a staff capacity with the district and in that capacity participates in madding a governmental decision as defined in 2 CCR 18702.2 or performs the same or substantially all the same duties for the district that would otherwise be performed by an individual holding a position specified in the District's Conflict of Interest Code. (2 CCR 18701)

SCHOOL SITE COUNCIL MEETING: Our first SSC meeting was September 14. Parent members: Statia Foresti, Jen Willet, Tanya Tong and EL Parent vacancy. Staff members are: Nicole Elsokary, Tawnya Watson, Virginia Standring and Debra Burgher. Jen Willet and Statia Foresti will serve as co-presidents. Brookside's API score of 947 again placed us in the top three elementary schools in Ventura County.

**TECHNOLOGY:** In the computer lab, students are using the formatting tools in Microsoft Word. They are using the center, bold, italics and underline functions along with changing font and adding color and borders. Students in grades 4 & 5 can take an image from the internet and insert it into their project. Kindergartners are learning to use a mouse and finding the letters in their first names. First graders are being introduced to touch typing and basic word building by labeling pictures they create.

MANDARIN CHINESE: Fifth grade students are being introduced to Mandarin Chinese and Chinese culture. Students receive thirty minutes a week of instruction provided by Ms. Charlotte Shih. Students have learned the class greeting ritual for the teacher, which includes standing and bowing, all prompted in Chinese. The American game of rock/paper/scissors is played by students to learn the Chinese names for the words.

FALL SERVICE LEARNING PROJECT: Kids Helping Kids – Money for Musanze. Musanze is a county in the country of Rwanda. Brooksiders will be raising money to help the children of Wisdom Primary School in Rwanda. Students are reading Sebgugugu the Glutton, a Rwandan folktale. A display of books is available to students in the library. All students attended an information assembly about Musanze on October 6<sup>th</sup>.

TEACHING AND LEARNING: Math and Literacy Intervention Aides are working with students. Fifth graders visited Santa Cruz Island on October 8<sup>th</sup>. Debbie West provided background learning and info the day before the island trip at a 5<sup>th</sup> grade assembly. Fourth grade is finishing geography and will soon make landform maps of California. Third grade is working on Launching the Notebook Unit for Writer's Workshop and the FOSS unit on matter. Second graders are being introduced to the Icons of Depth and Complexity. Students are writing about their lives as Writer's workshop is launched. FOSS science unit Pebbles, Sand and Silt will be taught this month. First graders are working on the Matter unit which will culminate with centers about solids and liquids at Halloween time. #### REGISTRATION DEBRIEF

All the staff and parents involved in organizing the registration process had a very productive meeting where we reviewed the processes to improve next year. Specifically, having all the new students register on their respective grade day and having a special freshman event day. Among other items, we also discussed more efficient methods of updating student and parent information in Zangle such as current emails and changes in contact information. This is an important element as it impacts our ability to conduct "all calls" and get important information out to all our families quickly and efficiently.

#### **FACILITIES**

All the lockers finally arrived and are now installed; we are in the process of assessing how they are being used.

The gym HVAC and roofing projects have begun. The corners of the gym containing the Spanish tiles have been demolished and the fences between the gym and the football field are installed to set the staging area for the interior gym demo. So far, our PE classes and fall athletics have not been impacted. Yet, once the interior demo begins, PE classes will meet elsewhere, usually outdoors unless it rains and we will then use the Pavillion and other available spaces.

We now have a Pavilion sound and light action committee and our first meeting is scheduled to move that project forward

We held the first meeting of our OPHS Garden committee to determine how to get our organic garden installed and running. Each member was tasked with investigating and researching various components of the project and a tour of Oak Hills Garden is scheduled for October 26<sup>th</sup>.

We are also looking into the feasibility of installing a substantial permanent shade structure between the gym and the Pavilion.

On a more serious note, we've had several incidents of vandalism, and some are taking a troubling turn and involve burning student ASB banners and graffiti. These are occurring late at night and are going a little beyond the usual high school pranks. We are meeting with District office technical, business, and facility folk to discuss getting security cameras installed with the intention of moving ahead on that project.

#### BACK TO SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

OPHS held a very successful back to school night with a great turnout and included quick a dramatic "trailer' for Julius Caesar. I got many very positive comments from parents and teachers did a great job of showcasing what students will be learning in their classes this year.

ASB held a very spirited Back to School rally, the highlight was a choreographed dance performed by the teachers and administration. It is on *Youtube*. We are reinstituting the School Song at assemblies as a tradition and a new arrangement was performed "a cappella" by the choir.

Club week was held in the Pavilion and the students were out in force with all sorts of clubs ranging from Beekeeping to Quiddich. Our Rocket Club is getting a private guided tour of JPL on October 29.

#### **ATHLETICS**

The recent heat-wave focused our attention on athletic practices and the need for administrative directives for when practices should be modified. We met with the football coaches and spoke with and provided all coaches with information on recognizing and treating the signs and symptoms of heat-related illnesses. We also provided them with statistics and information for the modification of practices to prevent the occurrence of heat related illnesses.

#### NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

This year, seven OPHS seniors were selected as Semi-finalists for the 2010-11 National Merit Scholarship Program. Thirteen students were also recognized as National Merit Commended Scholars. Semi-finalists represent the top one percent of each state's high school seniors, and Commended Scholars the top 3%.

#### COLLEGE KNOWLEDGE NIGHT

Through a collaborative effort between Calabasas, Oak Park, and Agoura PFCs, an evening of workshops ranging from financial aid and essay writing, to the application process of public and private colleges and universities was presented to parents and students from all local schools in the Calabasas High School gym on October 7.

#### **OPHS MAC REPRESENTATIVE**

The OPHS Student representative to the MAC was selected through an application process that included a written statement of intent and interview. Anisha Rajavel will continue for a second year in the position and is to be congratulated for having a firm understanding of school and community issues and a commitment to improvement on both fronts.

#### SCHOOL SITE COUNCIL

School Site Council held it's first meeting and has full representation and all spots are filled.

#### SAFE SCHOOL AMBASSADORS

OPHS Safe School Ambassadors held their annual Kick-Off event on October 5, and it was a very positive and promising start to this year's program.

#### SCHOOL SAFETY

We have focused our attention this October on school safety with several activities including a full review of our safety and disaster procedures. PFC has replenished the Black Boxes in classrooms and the perishables in disaster bins. We held a large meeting of our Disaster and Safety Team and informed the faculty of revised procedures. We've had one full evacuation drill and are preparing for the Great Shake Out on October 21<sup>st</sup>. The Principal's message in the PFC newsletter this month is also devoted to emergency preparedness and procedures.

#### **MATHEMATICS ARTICULATION**

The first in a series of dialogues is currently planned between OPHS and MCMS to increase collaboration, understanding, and articulation of mathematics between the middle and high school grades.

#### Oak View

We have increased enrollment to 49 students, leaving only two openings for additional students from both OPHS and permit students.

Back to School was held on Wednesday, September 15<sup>th</sup> at 6:30-8:00 PM. We had good attendance from our parents as we explained our program and the educational experiences planned for our students. A wonderful outcome of the meeting was a donation of \$1000 from a parent. We will fund our specialized chemical dependency counseling program with these funds. We also received a donation of a home gym from a neighbor that attended our graduation last year and was so impressed with our program that she chose Oak View rather than any other charity for her donation. Wendy Doheny is volunteering twice per week as a P.E. resource person.

The site council held our first meeting and we have several new, energetic parents on board.

Special education students are now enrolled with the SELPA Workability Program instructor once per week. We hope to place several students in part time jobs.

Our teachers and I attended the VCOE Alternative Education Conference on the 17<sup>th</sup>. We are quite excited about pursuing the development of several on line courses to fill some gaps in our course offerings. These courses will be interactive and require students to download, upload and utilize web-based research skills to complete the course. We are positioned well, with our 21<sup>st</sup> Century technology resources and a trained staff. We hope to explore Title II funds for support.

#### Independent School

Linda Roberts has done a wonderful job in covering the duties of our student services worker who has been ill since August. Jan Mieding has now resigned the position and we are exploring strategies to meet the clerical needs.

Our site council is up and running with several new parents.

The departmental meetings, chaired by an OPIS teacher, are really going well. It provides leadership opportunities for teachers as they address the curriculum goals for our school program.

Tutorial opportunities are well-attended each Wednesday, as we offer sessions in general academic support, specific assistance for Algebra and a writing workshop for our middle school students. The Naviance Career and College on line program is taking shape and will be available to our grade 7-12 students-coordinated by Dianne Large, school counselor.
