ISSUE:

Shall the Board of Education discuss various options pertaining to future

issuances of Measure R facilities repair and maintenance bonds?

BACKGROUND:

As the Board considers it approval of the Measure R Facilities Master Plan at this evening's meeting, the timing of priority projects is directly tied to the timing of bond issuances for funding. In recent months, with the deterioration of the State's economy and decline in assessed property valuation, the District has experienced a set-back in its original issuance and funding plans. Legislation recently signed into law by Governor Schwarzenegger now provides additional options in the issuance of general obligation bonds. District bond financial advisor, Tim Carty of Piper Jaffray, will be present at this evening's meeting to lead a discussion of the recent changes and the various options pertaining to future issuances of future Measure R bonds.

develop a bond issuance plan to fund repairs authorized by Measure R.



### Oak View
