- i. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 6146.4 Differential Graduation and Competency Standards for Students with Disabilities First Reading 91
 Policy revised to reflect new law (ABX4 2) which exempts, beginning with 2009-10 school year, students with disabilities from the requirement to pass the exit examination as a condition of receiving a diploma. Policy also revised to specify that students with disabilities will be provided with a course of study that provides them with a free appropriate public education in accordance with their individualized education program.
- j. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 6161.1 Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials First Reading 95
 Policy revised to reflect new laws (SBX3 4 and ABX4 2) which require that, during the hearing on sufficiency of instructional materials, the board must make a finding that students who are enrolled in the same course have "identical" standards-aligned instructional materials from the same adoption cycle. Material in policy re: "Textbook and Instructional Materials Incentive Account" deleted since this program is no longer funded.

Board Member Cindy Vinson reported she attended the Curriculum Council where they are preparing a list of all books used in the District that will be brought to the Board for approval. Ms. Vinson observed the installation of the Pavilion seating and it has already improved the acoustics in the room. She stated

she was very impressed with the repair work the Brookside parents did in their multi-purpose room and on their quad. Board Member Barbara Laifman reported she attended the Oak Park High School Band concert and was impressed with the Jazz Band and she also attended the Oak Park Neighborhood School program which was really cute. Ms. Laifman attended the ELL meeting where they discussed how to better serve students and how to get a better handle on which students to test. She also attended the EEAC meeting. Board Member Jan Iceland reported she attended the Finance Committee meeting and the Technology Committee meeting where they are already seeking next year's 21st Century Classroom Teacher applicants. Ms. Iceland stated she received favorable comments regarding the apples the Board gave to school staff for the holidays and enjoyed the District Office holiday lunch and the Administrators lunch. She attended the VCSBA meeting this month where two speakers gave two different ideas on changing the way the State operates. Ms. Iceland reported the VCSBA newsletter will run Rob Collins letter with our counterpoint in March and in April they will print three of the best responses. Ms. Iceland has a meeting planned with Mr. Collins. Board Member Marie Panec had no report. Board Member Mary Rees reported that Friends of Oak Park Schools is planning a major fundraising event on March 20 at Dole Headquarters. They will have wine tasting, food, silent auction and other events. Ms. Rees reported the Park & Rec is planning Earth Day programs in April and have gotten volunteers from Amgen to come to Oak Park. She emphasized the importance of setting limits to school capacity and allowing out of district students in Oak Park that will allow for the best educational programs and opportunities for all students including Oak Park students. Having out of district students does help to maintain property values because without them the school district would not be able to offer the classes and programs it now offers because more drastic cuts would have to be made.

Dr. Knight reported all Oak Park schools have been named 2009 Honor Roll schools by the California Business for Education Excellence and have each received a banner for acknowledge that honor. They recognize high performing schools and there were only 1300 schools in the state to receive this honor. It is also probably unprecedented that Oak Park would be the only district to have all of it's schools receive this honor.

- C. Consultant is duly qualified to provide the services called for in this Agreement in consideration for the fee stipulated in this Agreement.

I. CONSULTANT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- Shall provide to District, completed forms and processes related to all Priority One and Priority Two applications of the Federal Communications Commission E-Rate filings with the schools and library division ("SLD") for filing year 2010-2011 also known as Year Thirteen (13) and 2011-2012 also known as Year Fourteen (14).
- 2. Assess and process for District all issues with all prior E-Rate applications, SPIN changes, and other applicable processes.
- 3. Meet with District to assess technology and telecommunications needs as they relate to the upcoming application period.
- 4. File all required FCC forms for services District has requested including but not limited to Form 470, 471, and 486.
- 5. Act as District's main point of contact with the SLD.
- 6. File any service changes or SPIN changes for the District.
- 7. Advise District on any SLD appeals.
- 8. Prepare and present applicable audit documentation as required including (but not limited to) monthly bill reconciliation, copies of warrants, copies of related policies and other items as needed.

II. DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Provide all required information and data for filing all forms with the SLD for Year 13 and Year 14 in a timely manner.
- 2. Take such official action, such as review of Consultants drafts and promptly sign and return all forms required for filing with a third party in a timely manner so that Consultant can perform its obligations under this Agreement.

- 3. Promptly pay Consultant its fee for services rendered. All payments are due and payable within 30 days after delivery to the District of the invoice.
- 4. Sign, date and certify all forms filed by Consultant on District's behalf.

III. MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. Term. Until all issues with Year 13 and Year 14 E-rate are resolved.

The resolution shall fix a time, not less than three weeks thereafter, for a public meeting, held at the Board's regular meeting place, at which sealed proposals to purchase or lease will be received and considered. The final acceptance of the bid may be made either at the same meeting specified in the resolution or at any adjourned/continued meeting held within 10 days. Interdistrict Attendance

The Governing Board recognizes that students who reside in one district may choose to attend school in another district and that such choices are made for a variety of reasons.

(cf. 5116.1 - Intradistrict Open Enrollment)

The Board desires to communicate with parents/guardians and students regarding the educational programs and services that are available.

Prior to July 1, 2007, The Board has designated the Oak Park Unified School District as a "school district of choice" and shall accept students who reside in other California districts but wish to attend an Oak Park Unified School District school. Each year, the Superintendent or designee shall recommend to the Board The Superintendent or designee shall establish an interdistrict attendance selection process which ensures that transfer students are admitted to district schools through a random, unbiased process.

The Board shall annually determine the number of interdistrict transfer students *that* the district will *be able to* accept *and* for the following school year. The Board shall also identify the schools, grade levels, and programs that will be able to accept these additional students.

Upon receiving the Superintendent's report, the Board shall annually determine the number of students who will be accepted for admittance into the district through this program. This number shall be reflected in the minutes of the Board meeting.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a selection process which ensures that students applying through the program are admitted to district schools through a random, unbiased process that prohibits evaluation of whether a student should be enrolled based upon his/her academic or athletic performance. If the number of student applications exceeds the number of transfers the Board has designated for acceptance under the program, the Superintendent or designee shall conduct a random drawing in public at a regularly scheduled Board meeting. (Education Code 48301)

Because the district admits students in accordance with the school district of choice program, the Superintendent or designee may admit a student based on an individual interdistrict attendance permit pursuant to Education Code 48300-48315. only in situations of extreme need and upon the request of the district of residence.

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain a record of requests for admittance under the

program that contains all of the following: (Education Code 48313)

- 1. The number of requests granted, denied, or withdrawn and, for denied requests, the reason for the denial.
- 2. The number of students transferred out of and transferred into the district pursuant to this program.
- 3. The race, ethnicity, gender, self-reported socio-economic status, and the district of residence for each student in item #2 above
- 4. The number of students in item #2 above who are classified as English learners or students with disabilities

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at a regularly scheduled meeting, the information specified in items #1-4 above. By May 15 of each year, the Superintendent or designee shall provide the same information, as well as information regarding the district's status as a school district of choice in the upcoming school year, to each geographically adjacent school district, the county office of education, the California Department of Education, and the Department of Finance. (Education Code 48313)

The reports to the Board and other agencies shall also include a summary of audit exceptions, if any, resulting from the compliance review of components of the district of choice program conducted as part of the annual district audit. (Education Code 48301, 48313)

The Superintendent or designee may deny applications for interdistrict transfer because of overcrowding within district schools, limited district resources or to maintain the following limits to special programs:

- a. Resource Specialist Program is at least five (5) under maximum caseload.
- b. Non-severe Special Day Class enrollment is under eight (8) students
- c. Speech/Language enrollment total caseload under thirty (30)

Thirty-five (35) semester credits of social science to include: ten (10) semester credits of United States history and geography; ten (10) semester credits of world history, culture, and geography; five (5) semester credits in American government and civics; five (5) semester credits in economics; and five (5) credits of world geography. The district budget shall guide administrative decisions and actions throughout the year and serve as a tool for monitoring the fiscal health of the district.

Budget Development and Adoption Process

The Superintendent or designee shall establish an annual budget development process and calendar in accordance with the single budget adoption process described in Education Code 42127(i). In order to provide guidance in the development of the budget, the Board shall annually establish budget priorities based on identified district needs and goals and on realistic projections of available funds.

The budget review shall also identify supplemental information regarding contingent liabilities, use of one-time revenues for ongoing expenditures, use of ongoing revenues for one-time expenditures, contingent revenues, contributions, long-term commitments, unfunded liabilities, and the state of labor agreements. Extracurricular and Co-curricular Activities

The Governing Board recognizes that extracurricular and co-curricular activities enrich the educational and social development and experiences of students. The district shall encourage and support student participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities without compromising the integrity and purpose of the educational program.

No extracurricular or co-curricular program or activity shall be provided or conducted separately, and no district student's participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities shall be required or refused, based on the student's *sex*, gender, sexual orientation, ethnic group identification, race, ancestry, national origin, religion, color, or mental or physical disability. Requirements for participation in extracurricular and co-curricular activities shall be limited to those that are essential to the success of the activity. (5 CCR 4925)

To be eligible to participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities, students in grades 7 through 12 must demonstrate satisfactory educational progress in the previous grading period, including, but not limited to: (Education Code 35160.5)

- 2. Maintenance of minimum progress toward meeting high school graduation requirements

The Superintendent or designee shall have responsibility for the district interscholastic athletic program, while the principal or designee at each participating school shall be responsible for the site-level decisions, as appropriate.

Upon recommendation of the Superintendent, the Board shall annually designate an employee from each high school to serve as a representative to the local CIF league. Appointees shall represent the district in performing all duties required by the CIF league. In making this selection, the Board shall consider the employee's understanding of the district's goals for interscholastic and extracurricular activities, knowledge of the athletic programs, awareness of the implications of league decisions for the school and the district, and individual interpersonal communication and leadership skills.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district representatives to CIF report regularly to the Board on league, section and statewide issues, as well as activities and prospective actions related to athletics.

Student Eligibility

The first priority of student athletes shall be a commitment to their education and academic achievement. performing well in the classroom.

Differential Graduation and Competency Standards for Students with Disabilities

The Governing Board recognizes that students with disabilities are entitled to a course of study that provides them with a free appropriate public education (FAPE) and that modifications to the district's regular course may be needed on an individualized basis to provide FAPE. In accordance with law, each student's individualized education program (IEP) team shall determine the appropriate goals, as well as any appropriate individual accommodations necessary for measuring the academic achievement and functional performance of the student on state and districtwide assessments. The Individualized Education Program (IEP) team shall determine the appropriate standards and assessments, as well as the accommodations, that may be required for students with disabilities.

A student with disabilities may be awarded a high school diploma upon satisfactory completion of the course of study specified in his/her IEP and upon completion of the high school exit exam when required by state law. The Governing Board desires that district instructional materials, as a whole, present a broad spectrum of knowledge and viewpoints, reflect the diversity of our society, and enhance the use of multiple teaching strategies and technologies. Instructional Materials Funding Realignment Program

In accordance with the Instructional Materials Funding Realignment Program, the Board's priority in the selection of instructional materials is to ensure that all students in grades K-12 are provided with instructional materials that are aligned to state content standards in the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science and history/social science. Students in grades K-8 shall be provided with instructional materials adopted by the State Board of Education.

When the Board determines that standards aligned textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to all students in accordance with Education Code 60422, it shall so certify. A copy of the certification shall be kept on file in the district.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the district satisfies the criteria necessary to access funds under the state's Pupil Textbook and Instructional Materials Incentive Account pursuant to Education Code 60252.

The district may pilot instructional materials, using a representative sample of classrooms for a specified period of time during a school year, in order to determine how well the materials support the district's curricular goals and academic standards. Feedback from teachers piloting the materials shall be made available to the Board before the materials are adopted.

Public Hearing on Sufficiency of Instructional Materials

The Board shall annually conduct one or more public hearings on the sufficiency of the district's instructional materials. (Education Code 60119)

The hearing shall be held on or before the end of the eighth week from the first day student attend school for that year. (Education Code 60119)

The Board encourages participating by parents/guardians, teachers, interested community members, and bargaining unit leaders at the hearing. The Superintendent or designee shall post, 10 days prior to the hearing in three public places with the district, a notice containing the time, place and purpose of the hearing. The hearing shall not take place during or immediately

following school hours. (Education Code 60119)

At these hearings, the Board shall determine, through a resolution, whether each student in each school has, or will have before the end of that fiscal year, sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials that are aligned to the state content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605 in each of the following subjects:

- 1. Mathematics
- 2. Science
- 3. History-Social Science
- 4. English/language arts, including the English language development component of an adopted program.

The Board shall also make a written determination as to whether each student enrolled in a foreign language or health course has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials that are consistent with the content and cycles of the state curriculum frameworks. The Board shall determine the availability of science laboratory equipment, as applicable to science laboratory courses offered in for grades 9-12. (Education Code 60119)

For the 2008-08 through 2012-13 fiscal years, the Board shall also make a determination that all students within the district who are enrolled in the same course have "identical" standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials from the same adoption cycle, as defined in Education Code 1240.3, 60119, and 60422. (Education Code 1240.3, 42605)

If the Board determines that there are insufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials, the Board shall provide information to classroom teachers and the public setting forth, for each school in which an insufficiency exists, the percentage of students who lack sufficient standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials in each subject area, and the reasons that each student does not have sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials. The Board shall take any action, except an action that would require reimbursement by the Commission of State Mandates, to ensure that each student has sufficient materials within two months of the beginning of the school year in which the determination is made.
