ISSUE:

Shall the Board of Education approve the District's participation in the CALSTRS Reduced Workload Program for teachers for the 2011-2012 school year?

BACKGROUND:

The CALSTRS Reduced Workload Program allows eligible members to reduce their workload from full-time to part-time duties, defined as a minimum of 50 percent of full-time, for up to ten years before retirement. Normally, this is the last ten years before retirement. The opportunity to participate is available only if a school district approves the program.

Both member and employer retirement contributions are paid on the full-time earnable salary, rather than the actual part-time salary earned while participating in the program. As a result, the employer will be required to pay a slightly higher contribution rate for a member to participate.

Because the retirement contributions are based on the full-time earnable salary, the employee receives full-time service credit while working less than full time. At the time of retirement, the retirement benefit will be calculated as though the employee continued to work full time.

In order to participate, an employee must be age 55 or older, have been employed full time for a minimum of 10 years of credited service and have been employed full time performing creditable service five consecutive years immediately before entering the program.

There are penalties involved for employees who fall below the 50% threshold or who decide to retire mid-year.

RATIONALE:

The program has benefits for both the district and the employee. The District will save money with the salary reduction of a veteran teacher and the employee will have an opportunity to gain a full year of service credit for a reduced workload. In addition, the District will benefit by having veteran mentors able to work with newer teachers during a critical stage of a new teacher's career.

Drug And Alcohol-Free Workplace

The Governing Board believes that the maintenance of a drug- and alcohol-free workplace is essential to *staff and student safety and to help ensure a productive and safe work and learning environment.* school and district operations.

No employee shall unlawfully manufacture, distribute, dispense, possess, or use or be under the influence of any alcoholic beverage, drug or any controlled substance as defined in 21 USC 81 at any school district in the workplace. (Government Code 8355; 41 USC 701)

Employees are prohibited from being under the influence of controlled substances or alcohol while on duty. For purposes of this policy, on duty means while an employee is on duty during both instructional and non-instructional time in the classroom or workplace, at extracurricular or cocurricular activities or while transporting students or otherwise supervising them. Under the influence means that the employee's capabilities are adversely or negatively affected, impaired, or diminished to an extent that impacts the employee's ability to safely and effectively perform his/her job.

These prohibitions apply before, during and after school hours. A school district workplace is any place where school district work is performed, any school-owned or school-approved vehicle used to transport students to and from school or school activities; any off-school sites when accommodating a school-sponsored or school-approved activity or function where students are under district jurisdiction; or during any period of time when an employee is supervising students on behalf of the district or otherwise engaged in district business.

The Superintendent or designee shall notify employees of these the District's prohibitions against drug use and the actions that will be taken for violation of such prohibition. (Government Code 8355; 41 USC 7021)

An employee shall abide by the terms of this policy and **shall** notify the district, within five days, of **his/her conviction for violation in the workplace of** any criminal drug or alcohol statute conviction which he/she receives for a violation occurring in the workplace. (**Government Code 8355**; 41 USC 7021)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify the appropriate federal granting or contracting agencies within 10 days after receiving notification, from an employee or otherwise, of any conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace. (41 USC 701)

The Board may not employ or retain in employment persons convicted of a controlled substance offense as defined in Education Code 44011. If any such conviction is reversed and the person acquitted in a new trial or the charges dismissed, his/her employment is no longer prohibited. A plea or verdict of guilty, a finding of guilt by a court in a trial without a jury, or a conviction following a plea of nolo contendere shall be deemed to be a conviction. (Education Code 44836, 45123)

Chronic Absence and Truancy

The Governing Board believes that excess student absenteeism and tardiness, whether caused by excused or unexcused absences, may be an early warning sign of poor academic achievement and may put students at risk of dropping out of school. The Board desires to ensure that all students attend school in accordance with the state's compulsory education law and take full advantage of educational opportunities provided by the district.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a system to accurately track and monitor student attendance, including methods to identify students classified as chronic absentees and truants, as defined in law and administrative regulation.

To encourage school attendance, the Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies that focus on prevention and early intervention of attendance problems. Preventative strategies may include efforts to provide a safe and positive school environment, relevant and engaging learning experiences, and school activities that help develop students' feelings of connectedness with the schools. The Superintendent or designee also may provide incentives and rewards to recognize students who achieve excellent attendance or demonstrate significant improvement in attendance.

To improve student attendance, the Superintendent or designee shall implement positive steps to identify the reasons for a student's unexcused absences and to help resolve the problems caused by truancy. Such strategies shall focus on early intervention and may include, but not be limited to, communication with parents/guardians and the use of student study teams.

The Superintendent or designee shall work with students and parents/guardians to identify factors contributing to chronic absence and truancy. Based on this needs and assessment, he/she shall collaborate with community agencies, including, but not limited to, child welfare services, law enforcement, courts, and/or public health care agencies, to ensure that alternative educational programs and nutrition, health care, and other support services are available for students and families and to intervene as necessary when students have serious attendance problems.

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall cooperate with other agencies within the community to meet the needs of students who have serious school attendance or behavior problems and to maintain a continuing inventory of community resources, including alternative programs.

As required by law, habitually truant students may shall be referred to a school attendance review board, a truancy mediation program operated by the county's district attorney or probation officer, and/or juvenile court. in accordance with law.

For purposes of California's welfare system (CalWORKS), a student shall be determined to be regularly attending school unless he/she has been referred to the county district attorney or probation office pursuant to Education Code 48263.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly analyze data on student absence to identify patterns of absence districtwide and by school, grade level, and student population. Such data shall be used to identify common barriers to attendance, prioritize resources for intervention, and monitor progress over time. The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report this information to the Board for purposes of evaluating the effectiveness of strategies implemented to reduce chronic absence and truancy and making changes as needed. As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee also shall provide this information to key school staff and community agency partners to engage them in program evaluation and improvement.

Identification of Individuals For Special Education

The Governing Board recognizes the need to actively seek out and evaluate district residents from birth to age 21 who have disabilities in order to provide them with appropriate educational opportunities in accordance with state and federal law.

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The Superintendent or designee shall establish a comprehensive system that includes procedures for the develop processes to determine when an individual is eligible for special education services and shall establish systematic procedures for special education program identification, screening, referral, and regular and triennial assessment of individuals eligible for special education, as well as procedures for the planning, implementation, and review of the education and related services provided to such individuals. assessment, planning, implementation, review-and. (Education Code 56301)

The district's identification procedures shall include methods that utilizing referrals from Superintendent or designee shall establish a method whereby parents/guardians, teachers, appropriate professionals and others, and may refer an individual for assessment for special education services. Identification procedures shall be coordinated with school site procedures for referral of students with needs that cannot be met with modifications to the regular instructional program. (Education Code 56302)

The Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians, in writing, of their rights related to identification, referral, assessment, instructional planning, implementation, and review, including the *right to consent to any assessment concerning their child. In addition, the*Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of district's procedures for initiating a referral for assessment to identify individuals who need special education services. (Education Code 56301)

The Governing Board desires that district instructional materials, as a whole, present a broad spectrum of knowledge and viewpoints, reflect the *society's* diversity of our society, and enhance the use of multiple teaching strategies and technologies. The Board shall adopt instructional materials based on a determination that such materials are an effective learning resource to help students achieve grade-level competency *and* meet other criteria specified in law. aligned with the state content standards, , and are Textbooks, technology-based materials, other educational materials and tests shall be aligned with *state and district* the development and evaluation of the standards and the district's curriculum *in order* to ensure that instructional materials *they* effectively support the district's adopted courses of study. the selection of

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The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process by which instructional materials shall be reviewed for recommendation to the Board.

This process shall involve teachers in a substantial manner and shall also encourage the participation of parents/guardians and community members. (Education Code 60002)

All recommended instructional materials shall be available for public inspection at the district office.

The Board's priority in the selection of instructional materials is to ensure that all students in grades K-12 are provided with instructional materials that are aligned to state content standards in the core curriculum areas of reading/language arts, mathematics, science and history/social science. Students in grades K-8 shall be provided with instructional materials adopted by the State Board of Education.

The district may pilot instructional materials, using a representative sample of classrooms for a specified period of time during a school year, in order to determine how well the materials support the district's curricular goals and academic standards. Feedback from teachers piloting the materials shall be made available to the Board before the materials are adopted.

Public Hearing on Sufficiency of Instructional Materials

The Board shall annually conduct one or more public hearings on the sufficiency of the district's instructional materials. (Education Code 60119; 5 CCR 9531)

The hearing shall be held on or before the end of the eighth week from the first day students attend school for that year. (Education Code 60119)

The Board encourages participation by parents/guardians, teachers, interested community members, and bargaining unit leaders at the hearing. Ten days prior to the hearing *and* in three public places *within the district*, the Superintendent or designee shall post with the district a notice containing the time, place and purpose of the hearing. The hearing shall not take place during or immediately following school hours. (Education Code 60119)

At these hearing(s), the Board shall determine, through a resolution, whether each student in each school, *including each English learner*, has sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials in each of the following subjects that which are aligned to the state content standards adopted pursuant to Education Code 60605 and consistent with the content and cycles of the state's curriculum frameworks: (Education Code 60119)

- 1. Mathematics
- 2. Science
- 3. History-Social Science
- 4. English/language arts, including the English language development component of an adopted program.

The Board shall also make a written determination as to whether each student enrolled in a foreign language or health course has sufficient textbooks or instructional materials that are consistent with the content and cycles of the state curriculum frameworks. The Board shall determine the availability of science laboratory equipment, as applicable to science laboratory courses offered in grades 9-12. (Education Code 60119)

In making these determinations, the Board shall consider whether each student has sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. However, this does not require that each student have two sets of materials. The materials may be in a digital format as long as each student, at a minimum, has and can access the same materials in the class and to take home as all other students in the same class or course in the district and has the ability to use and access them at home. However, the materials shall not be considered sufficient if they are photocopied sheets from only a portion of a textbook or instructional materials copied to address a shortage. (Education Code 60119)

For the 2008-09 through 2012-13 fiscal years, the Board shall also make a determination that all students within the district who are enrolled in the same course have "identical" standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials from the same adoption cycle, as defined in Education Code 1240.3, 60119, and 60422. (Education Code 1240.3, 42605)

If the Board determines that there are insufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials, the Board shall provide information to classroom teachers and the public setting forth, for each school in which an insufficiency exists, the percentage of students who lack sufficient standards-aligned textbooks or instructional materials in each subject area, and the reasons that each student does not have sufficient textbooks and/or instructional materials. The Board shall take any action, except an action that would require reimbursement by the Commission of State Mandates, to ensure that each student has sufficient materials within two months of the beginning of the school year in which the determination is made. There is much to report from Oak Hills this month. On March 3rd we held a Family Science Night, sponsored by our fabulous PTA. The multipurpose room and cafeteria was packed full of hands-on science experiments, led by a dedicated group of volunteers. Many of the volunteers are Oak Park High School students who we recruited to assist with the event. They had a great deal of knowledge and patience to share with our very eager learners.

Spring parent conferences were held earlier this month. While not required for every student, many meetings were held throughout the week. In addition to the standards-based report card, teachers discuss the results of our ongoing reading assessments (SRI and DIBELS). This process provided an opportunity to reflect on the tremendous progress made since the beginning of the year, and to focus on individual goals for the last trimester.

At Oak Hills, we continue to enrich the curriculum with experiential learning, both on campus and off. Our second graders spent a morning with reptiles as our multipurpose room became a herpetologist's paradise. Not to be outdone, our fifth graders had a visit from Ben Franklin, who spoke with them about colonial life. He brought along his fully functional printing press and the students were able to produce copies of the Poor Farmer's Almanac the old fashioned way. They were all sure to mind their p's and q's. The fifth graders will also visit the Ronald Reagan Museum and tour several Revolutionary War exhibits. These hands-in interactive programs will include a Town Square, Military Camp, Craft Center, and 18th Century Game Center.

Our Spring Chorus program is up and running! We are pleased to welcome Darlynn Wilhelm to Oak Hills to run this popular after school program. There are about 60 students in two groups who are working hard after school. To help them prepare for our June concert, our singers have each been issued a CD to practice with at home or in the car.

Student Council has continued to be busy developing their leadership skills while serving others. The Manna food drive collected 329 non-perishable food items for families in need. Students are currently collecting slightly used shoes to donate to the earthquake relief effort for Japan where they are badly needed. Plans are in the works for a "Color Spirit Day" when each grade level wears the same color shirt to promote grade level spirit.

Finally, our Women in History program held this month was a great success. Our fifth grade girls researched the accomplishments of several women who have made outstanding contributions to our nation's history. Each girl took on the persona of the woman she studied, complete with costumes and props.
