REPORT FROM BOARD MEMBERS

Board Member Marie Panec reported she attended Facilities meetings this month. She wanted to mention again how much work the Facilities Planning Committee is putting in and how impressed she is with the management company and architects firm and the work they are doing on behalf of the district. Board Member Jan Iceland reported there have been no Finance Committee meetings since the last Board Meeting but they will be meeting this Thursday. The Technology Committee has chosen next year's 21st Century Teachers and the Technology Plan is being read by the State. Ms. Iceland reported she attended the Ventura County School Boards Association meeting where Chancellor Rush gave a good speech and she attended the TecEx workshop which was a wonderful community event sponsored by Conejo School District. She hopes that Oak Park can get involved in this event next year. Ms. Iceland served on the High School Principal selection committee and felt it was very worthwhile. She congratulated Brookside on their Distinguished School designation, all the Edison Challenge groups successes, and OPHS, OVHS and OPIS WASC efforts. Board Member Cindy Vinson offered thanks to Barry Myerson and his team at Friends of Oak Park Schools for their fundraising event and how much the district appreciates their efforts and financial support. Ms. Vinson attended the Safe Kids Task Force meeting and is pleased to report that a CERT course for teachers will be offered in the fall as 24 teachers have indicated an interest in taking the course. The fire department has also created curriculum for youth that will allow for a one semester course to be offered in the winter for students. Board Member Barbara Laifman reported the EEAC is working hard on the Earthfest which is April 24. It starts with a Clean Up from 8-11 which is being coordinated with Mike Greene from the MAC and then the festival from 11-3 at OPHS with recycling, music, booths, healthy food and more. Ms. Laifman stopped by the OVHS WASC visit, attended the MAC meeting where they discussed the possible increase in traffic due to interdistrict students. Dr. Knight attended and addressed the MAC about this and also about the environmental awareness activities at the schools. Ms. Laifman also attended the ROES Math/Science Olympiad and was impressed that Pennie Sullivan is constantly changing her program to keep up with the latest in science and technology. She attended the Longevity and Nutrition workshop which continues to reinforce OPUSD's effort to nurture the whole child by continuing to offer nutritious meals to students. Ms. Laifman also attended the ROES wax museum and found the student's work very creative. She attended the ELL meeting this morning where a representative from Rosetta Stone was there to present their program. They finalized a letter to parents regarding their child's CELDT results. Ms. Laifman also met with the WASC group at OPHS and found them to be very impressed with the students, teachers and the learning going on at OPHS.

REPORT FROM STUDENT BOARD REPRESENTATIVE

Dani Gold reported the students met with the WASC group to ask students how they felt about counselors, school safety, classes and 7th period study groups. The miniature golf fundraiser did not get the support they had hoped for. The powder puff football game between the senior girls and junior girls is this Friday and elections will be held next month.

REPORT FROM SUPERINTENDENT

Dr. Knight offered congratulations to Brookside Elementary for earning Distinguished School designation for the fourth time. He also congratulated Debby West for her work with the Edison Challenge groups who had six Oak Park teams of the twelve finalists. Dr. Knight thanked Supervisor Linda Parks for nominating the District for the Ventura County Climate Change Action Award in the schools division. We were a finalist, although we didn't win. Dr. Knight wanted to recognize Oak View, Oak Park Independent and Oak Park High Schools for their hard work on their WASC reports. He also wanted to thank all the schools for their Earth Week activities especially Oak Park High School who had an

unbelievable number of activities planned for the week culminating with Saturday's Earthfest which should be great.

SCHOOL SITE COUNCIL REPORTS

Brookside Elementary School – Debbie Burgher reported the School Site Council revised the School Handbook which will also be on-line, will be offering a Discovery Kindergarten class at Brookside in the fall and will have a Science exploratory day in June.

Medea Creek Middle School – Lori Byers reported the School Site Council discussed how the school was preparing for the STAR test, students are participating in the Ventura County Science Fair and in Earth Week activities, and the school is moving the computer lab to the library make way for a science lab classroom. Mr. Benioff reported enrollment in the fall would be at 1000 and they discussed the possibility of having a school bus to transport interdistrict students. They also revised the school handbook.

Borrowing shall occur only when the fund or account receiving the money will earn sufficient income, during the current fiscal year, to repay the amount transferred. No more than 75 percent of the maximum of monies held in any fund or account during a current fiscal year may be transferred.

WHEREAS, when there are insufficient funds to meet district obligations in the fund, and

WHEREAS, funds can be temporarily transferred from one or more funds to another fund of the district to be used for the payment of district obligations, and

WHEREAS, repayment of the temporary loan will be made from income received,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Education of the Oak Park Unified School District authorizes the temporary transfer of cash from one district fund to another in order to meet the financial obligations of the District as the need may arise during the 2010-11 fiscal year.

The Board also encourages community members to serve as mentors providing support and motivation to students.

As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee Volunteers shall be provided volunteers with information about school goals, programs and practices and shall receive an orientation and or other training related to their specific responsibilities as appropriate. Employees who supervise volunteers shall ensure that volunteers are assigned meaningful responsibilities that eapitalize on utilize their skills and expertise and maximize their contribution to the educational program.

Volunteer maintenance work shall be limited to those projects that do not replace the normal maintenance duties of classified staff. The Board nevertheless encourages volunteers to work on

short-term projects to the extent that they enhance the classroom or school, do not significantly increase maintenance workloads and comply with employee commitments and contracts.

Volunteer aides shall not be used to assist certificated staff in performing teaching or administrative responsibilities in place of regularly authorized classified employees who have been laid off. (Education Code 35021)

Volunteers shall act in accordance with district policies, regulations and school rules. At their discretion, employees who supervise volunteers may ask any volunteer who violates school rules to leave the campus. Employees also may confer with the principal or designee regarding any such volunteers. The Superintendent or designee shall be responsible for investigating and resolving complaints regarding volunteers.

Claims And Actions Against The District

The Governing Board desires to ensure intends that the district's operations are conducted in a manner that minimizes risk, protects district resources, and promotes the health and safety of students, staff, and the public. Any and all claims for money or damages against the district shall be presented to and acted upon in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation as well as the district's Joint Powers Authority (JPA) agreement or insurance coverage.

Any claim for money or damages not governed by the Governments Claims Act (Government Code 810-996.6) or excepted by Government Code 905 shall be presented consistent with the manner and time limitations in the Government Claims Act, unless a procedure for processing such claims is otherwise provided by state or federal law. Such compliance is a prerequisite to any court action consistent with the provisions of Government Code 945.4.

Upon notice to the district of a claim, the Superintendent or designee shall take all necessary steps to protect the district's rights under any applicable contractual agreements, including the right to indemnification from its insurance or other coverage provider.

In accordance with Government Code 935.4, the Board delegates to the Superintendent the authority to allow, compromise, or settle claims of \$50,000 or less pursuant to any conditions of coverage in the district's JPA agreement or insurance. (Government Code 935.4)

This policy is intended to apply applies retroactively to any existing causes of action and/or claims for money and/or damages.

Roster of Public Agencies

The Superintendent or designee shall file the information required for the Roster of Public Agencies with the Secretary of State and the County Clerk. This information shall include the name of the school district, the mailing address of the Board, and the names and addresses of the Board presiding officer, the Board clerk or secretary and other members of the Board. (Government Code 53051)

Any changes to such information shall be filed within 10 days after the change in facts. (Government Code 53051)

The Superintendent or designee shall provide for the prompt removeal from school-premises of any individual who, by his/her presence or action, disrupts or threatens to disrupt normal district or school operations, threatens the health and safety of anyone on district property, students or staff, or causes or threatens to cause damage to district property or to any property on school grounds.damage.

In developing such a plan, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with law enforcement to create guidelines for law enforcement support and intervention in the event of a disruption. District and school site safety plans shall specify action to be taken, including specific staff responsibilities, when an individual is causing a disruption. School staff shall be trained to recognize when an individual has committed acts that constitute a disruption in violation of Board policy.

Any employee or job applicant who believes that he/she has been or is being discriminated against or harassed in violation of district policy or regulation should immediately contact his/her supervisor, the Coordinator, or the Superintendent who shall advise the employee or applicant about the district's procedures for filing, investigating, and resolving any such complaints.

Any supervisory or management district employee who observes or has knowledge of an incident of unlawful prohibited discrimination or harassment shall report the incident to his/her supervisor, the Coordinator, the principal, district administrator or Superintendent as soon as practical after the incident. All other employees are encourage to report such incidents to their supervisor immediately. Failure of a district employee to report discrimination or harassment may result in disciplinary action.

Training and Notifications

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to employees about how to recognize harassment and discrimination, how to respond appropriately, and components of the district's policies and regulations regarding discrimination.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly publicize, within the district and in the community, the district's nondiscrimination policy and the availability of complaint procedures. Such publication shall be including in each announcement, bulletin or application form that is used in employee recruitment. (34 CFR 100.6)

The district's policy and administrative regulation shall be posted in all schools and offices including staff lounges and student government meeting rooms. (5 CCR 4960)

Other Remedies

An employee may, in addition to filing a discrimination complaint with the district, file a complaint with either the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH) or the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). The time limits for filing such

complaints are as follows:

- 1. To file a valid complaint with DFEH, the employee must file his/her complaint within one year of the alleged discriminatory act(s). (Government Code 12960)
- 2. To file a valid complaint directly with EEOC, the employee must file his/her complaint within 180 days of the alleged discriminatory act(s). To file a valid complaint with EEOC after filing a complaint with DFEH, the employee must file the complaint within 300 days of the alleged discriminatory act(s) or within 30 days after the termination of proceedings by DFEH, whichever is earlier. (42 USC 2000e-5)

Temporary Athletic Team Coaches

The Governing Board desires to employ recognizes the importance of hiring qualified temporary athletic team coaches for the district's sports and interscholastic athletic programs in order to enhance the knowledge, skills, motivation, and safety of student athletes. and to the success of students in sports and interscholastic athletic activities.

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The Superintendent or designee may employ a certificated or non-certificated employee, other than a substitute employee, to supervise or instruct interscholastic athletic activities as a temporary employee in a limited assignment capacity. (5 CCR 5590)

When hiring a person to fill a position as a temporary athletic team coach, the position shall first be made available to qualified certificated teachers currently employed by the district. (Education Code 44919)

The Superintendent shall establish qualification criteria for all athletic coaches in accordance with law and with district standards and priorities. These criteria shall ensure that all temporary coaches possess the proper credential or Activity Supervisor Clearance Certificate and an appropriate level of competence, knowledge and skill.

Any certificated teacher employed by the district who applies for a position as a temporary athletic team coach and who satisfies the qualification criteria established for the position shall first be offered the position. (Education Code 44919)

By December 31, 2008, all district coaches, including volunteer coaches, shall have completed a coaching education program that meets the standards developed by the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF). Coaches shall bear the expense of the program. (Education Code 49032)

All coaches shall be subject to Board policy, administrative regulation as well as CIF bylaws and codes of ethical conduct.
