School Counselors Tess Wilkoff, Randy McLelland, Carol Bailey, Julie Heeney, and Deborah King all addressed the Board about the importance of the counseling program in the District and urged the Board to replace the retiring counselor position instead of making it one of the budget cuts in the 2010-2011 budget.

## REPORT FROM BOARD MEMBERS

Board Member Barbara Laifman reported she attended the WASC findings meeting and felt the process was a great experience for the entire school. She attended the Food Inc. movie sponsored by the Wellness Council, and the Oak Hills recognition assembly where there were a record number of Presidential Fitness Awards presented. Ms. Laifman also reported she is continuing her Masters in Governance training at her own expense as she completed two more modules. She attended both the OPIS and OVHS Open House Nights and the Fiddler on Roof production at the High School. Board Member Marie Panec reported she also attended the Open House Nights at OPIS and OVHS which were well done and you could see the teachers were excited about the students accomplishments this year. She attended the SEAC luncheon honoring Cathy Skiba and Barb Semel Parkhurst, who will be retiring at the end of this school year. Ms. Panec also attended the Fiddler on the Roof production and commented it was great to have the new seating in the Pavilion. Board Member Jan Iceland reported the Finance Committee was waiting for the May Revise information and will be meeting this week. The Technology Committee reopened application for 21st Century Classroom Teachers. The Conejo/Las Virgenes Future Foundation is geared up for next year and Ms. Iceland reported she is going to Delegate Assembly next weekend and will be lobbying for school choice and if there are other matters Board Members would like her to bring up to legislators to let her know. Board Member Mary Rees presented gifts from the Board to Leslie Heilbron and Lynn McCormack who had been named ACSA Region XIII Elementary and High School Principal of the Year. She stated the Board had already given gifts to Linda Sheridan as Confidential Employee of the Year and Cliff Moore as Human Resources Employee of the Year at an earlier Board Meeting and Brad Benioff had been named Middle School Principal of the Year by COLVOP. Ms. Rees said the Board was now looking forward to graduations and the remaining open houses.

#### REPORT FROM SUPERINTENDENT

Dr. Knight introduced new Principals Kevin Buchanan who will be Principal at Oak Park High School and Erik Warren who will be Principal at Oak Hills Elementary School to the Board and asked them to say a few words.

#### SCHOOL SITE COUNCIL REPORTS

Medea Creek Middle School – Principal Brad Benioff reported the School Site Council discussed the validity of surveys distributed by parents and not by the school, enrollment numbers rumor control, instituting anti-bulling, drug prevention and internet safety assembly and parent nights again next school year and filling school site council openings at Back to School Night.

Oak Park High School – Doug Orens reported it was Senior week at the High School where each day the seniors had planned activities while it was STAR testing week for the rest of the grade levels. The School Site Council discussed the parking issue on Calle Rio Vista which will also be discussed at the MAC meeting. The Sit Council also discussed the new cum laude awards for seniors and voting in new members at Back to School Night in the fall.

Red Oak Elementary School – Marina Mann reported the School Site Council discussed one Discovery K classroom would be moved to Brookside Elementary School, the school garden, teachers retiring, getting married over the summer and the upcoming open house.

Oak Park Neighborhood School – Kim Gregorchuk reported on the many activities going on at the Neighborhood School. One classroom is working on robots, one is working on a scale model of their community and the third classroom has written a book that they will be publishing.

Facilities Planning Committee – Peter Kristensen reported on the ongoing work of the Facilities Planning Committee. Brookside the DSA approvals have been turned in. The digital control bids were over budget because the network was full and had to have its own network. The door lock work should be starting soon. They will begin investigating windows at Oak Hills and Red Oak to have it in place by July and also try to have some exterior painting done in conjunction with this work. At Medea Creek they will be getting bids for the air conditioner work and hope to have it to the Board in June for approval. At the High School they will also be getting bids for the air conditioner but they will not have to upgrade the electrical as originally thought. They are also getting bids for gym roof replacement and they hope to bring both these items to the Board in June for approval. The District Office/Oak View parking lot repaving will also include a widening of the entrance on Conifer and the roof work is almost complete at a savings of \$190,000 because the entire roof did not have to be replaced.

On May 14, 2010 Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger presented his May Revision to 2010-11 state budget. Although the Governor's proposed budget for K-12 education is essentially unchanged from January, some of the subtle revisions hold a significant impact for Oak Park. Further, how the Governor and Legislature ultimately negotiate a solution to the State's budgetary crisis, and the resulting impact of that solution on education funding remains to be seen. At this evening's meeting, staff will provide an update on the most current information available and provide recommendations pertaining to the District's 2010-11 budget, slated for adoption on June 21, 2010. Information will include budget assumptions, enrollment and staffing projections, and revenue and expenditure forecasts.

CREDENTIAL INFORMATION – 2009-2010 & Summer School

### BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Under the provisions of SB 435, the Board of Education receives a report of fully credentialed staff who are assigned to teach in academic areas for which they may not have a formal credential, but for which they have the requisite number of units required for knowledge of the subject and the ability to teach the subject in the classroom. The following credential assignments are brought to the Board of Education annually. These assignments are brought to the Board in accordance with the requirements of the Education Code and the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing

Education Code 44263 allows the holder of a teaching credential to serve by approval of the governing board and with the consent of the teacher, any single subject departmentalized class if the teacher has completed 18 semester units of coursework, or 9 semester units of upper division or graduate coursework in the subject to be taught.

Kathy Schultheis Geography

Education Code section 44258.2 (grade 5-8) allows that the holder of a single subject standard secondary teaching credential may, with his or her consent, be assigned by action of the governing board, to teach classes in grades 5 through 8 in a middle school, provided that the teacher has a minimum of 12 semester units or 6 upper division or graduate semester units of coursework at an accredited institution in the subject to be taught.

We have reviewed the bid package as submitted by the apparent low bidder, Tek Up Construction along with concerns expressed by JEC, Inc. related to subcontractor listing and licensing issues as follows;

 Apparent low bidder, Tek Up Construction, Inc., did not list a subcontractor for the asphalt paving scope of work.

The apparent low bidder, Tek Up Construction, did not list a subcontractor for the paving scope of work. In response, Tek Up Construction stated they intend to perform the asphalt paving scope of work and have referenced Public Contract Code Section 4106 which states "If a prime contractor fails to specify a subcontractor...., the prime contractor agrees that he or she is fully qualified to perform that portion himself.". Tek Up Construction has also referenced Contractors State License Board, under B-General Building Contractor, Business and Professions Code Division 3, Chapter 9, Contractor Article 4, Classifications Section 7507 (b) as additional evidence which would allow a General Contractor with a valid B license to perform the asphalt work in question.

We have reviewed the response with our legal staff and consider their response is valid and responsive.

Listed landscape contractor's license is less than 10 years.

The apparent low bidder, Tek Up Construction listed a landscape contractor who has maintained a current contractors license for less than 10 years as referenced in the Scope Of Work. We have

reviewed all subcontract listings for Tek Up, Taft and JEC and have found each to have listed subcontractors with less than the referenced 10 year maintenance of a contractor's license. As such, we would recommend this item not be considered a responsive issue but instead be considered as a listing issue which, if waived, would not provide advantage to any one bidder.

## Recommendation;

Based upon our review of the bid documents submitted by Tek Up Construction, along with review of issues of concerns raised by other bidders, we consider Tek Up Construction as the low responsive bidder and recommend the District and Board of Education award Project # 10-08R Site Work and Utilities for Relocatable Classroom Replacement at Oak Park High School to Tek Up Construction Inc..

**BACKGROUND:** 

The current Oak Park Unified School District Education Technology Plan expires on June 30, 2010. The purpose of the Education Technology Plan is to serve as the sextant for charting a district's course of technology leadership, renewal, reform and vision, all based on sound curricular goals "to promote improved student achievement within the context of the current system of standards, assessment, and accountability." (Education Technology Planning: A Guide for Schools) It is also a legal requirement tied to funding. "Education Code Section 51871.5, enacted by Assembly Bill 598, (Chapter 830, Statutes of 1999), requires school districts to have a three- to five-year technology plan as a condition of receiving any technology grant administered by the California Department of Education after January 1, 2002." (Education Technology Planning: A Guide for Schools). This streamlines the application process for many funding sources that once required individual applications containing a reiteration of the same information that is now centralized in the Education Technology Plan. Composing a comprehensive Education Technology Plan has benefits that go beyond providing a document for E-Rate eligibility. Going through the process of creating the plan will provide an avenue to assess the current state of technology in the district, identify current needs and then, based on curricular. goals, assess the future needs, define the necessary professional development needs to employ the plan, identify an implementation process, align funding with needs and create the assessment/ monitoring piece. "Beginning with the end in mind" insures prudent use of funding and resources by creating a strategic master plan.

Over the course of the last two years, Jane Mintz, Director of Educational Technology, and the Technology Committee have worked to revise the OPUSD plan to reflect the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Classroom initiative. The resulting plan, which covers July 1, 2010-June 30, 2013, has been approved by the state readers and by CDE. Once approved by the Board, the plan will be posted on the district website and in a wiki that will allow all stakeholders to continually amend, update and revise the plan so that it remains a living document that reflects the current OPUSD technology vision.

The full text of Education Technology Plan has been provided to the Board under separate cover.



## Claims And Actions Against The District

The Governing Board desires to ensure intends that the district's operations are conducted in a manner that minimizes risk, protects district resources, and promotes the health and safety of students, staff, and the public. Any and all claims for money or damages against the district shall be presented to and acted upon in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulation as well as the district's Joint Powers Authority (JPA) agreement or insurance coverage.

(cf. 3530 – Risk Management/Insurance) (cf. 5143 – Insurance)

Any claim for money or damages not governed by the Governments Claims Act (Government Code 810-996.6) or excepted by Government Code 905 shall be presented consistent with the manner and time limitations in the Government Claims Act, unless a procedure for processing such claims is otherwise provided by state or federal law. Such compliance is a prerequisite to any court action consistent with the provisions of Government Code 945.4.

Upon notice to the district of a claim, the Superintendent or designee shall take all necessary steps to protect the district's rights under any applicable contractual agreements, including the right to indemnification from its insurance or other coverage provider.

In accordance with Government Code 935.4, the Board delegates to the Superintendent the authority to allow, compromise, or settle claims of \$50,000 or less pursuant to any conditions of coverage in the district's JPA agreement or insurance. (Government Code 935.4)

This policy is intended to apply applies retroactively to any existing causes of action and/or claims for money and/or damages.

#### Roster of Public Agencies

The Superintendent or designee shall file the information required for the Roster of Public Agencies with the Secretary of State and the County Clerk. This information shall include the name of the school district, the mailing address of the Board, and the names and addresses of the Board presiding officer, the Board clerk or secretary and other members of the Board. (Government Code 53051)

Any changes to such information shall be filed within 10 days after the change in facts. (Government Code 53051)

# **Disruptions**

The Governing Board is committed to providing a safe environment for district students, staff and others while they are on district property or engaged in school activities. keeping the schools free from disruptions and to keeping unauthorized persons from entering school grounds.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide for the prompt removeal from school premises of any individual who, by his/her presence or action, disrupts or threatens to disrupt normal district or school operations, threatens the health and safety of anyone on district property, students or staff, or causes or threatens to cause damage to district property or to any property on school grounds.damage.

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a plan describing staff responsibility and actions to be taken when an individual is causing a disruption. In developing such a plan, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with law enforcement to create guidelines for law enforcement support and intervention in the event of a disruption. District and school site safety plans shall specify action to be taken, including specific staff responsibilities, when an individual is causing a disruption. School staff shall be trained to recognize when an individual has committed acts that constitute a disruption in violation of Board policy.

Any employee who believes that a disruption may occur shall immediately contact the principal. The principal or designee shall notify law enforcement in accordance with Education Code 48902 and 20 USC 7151 and in other situations, as appropriate.

#### Safe School Zone

Possession of a firearm within 1000 feet of any district school is prohibited except when authorized by law. (Penal Code 626.9)

Possession of any other unauthorized weapon or dangerous instrument is prohibited on school grounds or buses and at school-related or school-sponsored activities without the written permission of school authorities.

The Governing Board prohibits unlawful-discrimination against and/or harassment of district employees and job applicants at any district site and/or activity on the basis of actual or perceived race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, age, marital status, pregnancy, physical or mental disability, medical condition, *genetic information*, veteran status, gender, *sex*, or sexual orientation.

Prohibited discrimination or harassment consists of unwelcome conduct, whether verbal, physical, or visual, based on any of the prohibited categories of discrimination listed above that it is so severe and pervasive that it adversely affects an individual's employment opportunities or has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with his/her work performance or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work environment.

The Board also prohibits retaliation against any district employee or job applicant who complains, testifies, *assists*, or in any way participates in the district's complaint procedures instituted pursuant to this policy.

Any district employee who engages or participates in unlawful discrimination, *or harassment*, or who aids, abets, incites, compels or coerces another to *engage in such behavior shall be* discriminate, is in violation of this policy and is *shall be* subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal.

Any employee or job applicant who believes that he/she has been or is being discriminated against or harassed in violation of district policy or regulation should immediately contact his/her supervisor, the Coordinator, or the Superintendent who shall advise the employee or applicant about the district's procedures for filing, investigating, and resolving any such complaints.

Complaints regarding employment discrimination or harassment shall immediately be investigated in accordance with AR 4031 – Complaints Concerning Discrimination in Employment.

Any supervisory or management district employee who observes or has knowledge of an incident of unlawful prohibited discrimination or harassment shall report the incident to his/her supervisor, the Coordinator, the principal, district administrator or Superintendent as soon as practical after the incident. All other employees are encouraged to report such incidents to their supervisor immediately. Failure of a district employee to report discrimination or harassment may result in disciplinary action.

## **Training and Notifications**

The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to employees about how to recognize harassment and discrimination, how to respond appropriately, and components of the district's policies and regulations regarding discrimination.

The Superintendent or designee shall regularly publicize, within the district and in the community, the district's nondiscrimination policy and the availability of complaint procedures. The district's policy and administrative regulation shall be posted in all schools and offices including staff lounges and student government meeting rooms. (5 CCR 4960)

#### Other Remedies

An employee may, in addition to filing a discrimination complaint with the district, file a complaint with either the California Department of Fair Employment and Housing (DFEH) or the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). The time limits for filing such

1. To file a valid complaint with DFEH, the employee must file his/her complaint within one year of the alleged discriminatory act(s). (Government Code 12960)

To file a valid complaint with EEOC after filing a complaint with DFEH, the employee must file the complaint within 300 days of the alleged discriminatory act(s) or within 30 days after the termination of proceedings by DFEH, whichever is earlier. ## **Employee Safety**

The Governing Board is committed to maximizing employee safety and believes that *workplace* safety is every employee's responsibility. Working conditions and equipment shall *comply* be maintained in compliance with standards prescribed by federal, state and local laws and regulations.

No employee shall be required or permitted to be in any place of employment which is unsafe or unhealthful. (Labor Code 6402)

The Board expects all employees to use safe work practices and, to *the extent possible*, correct any unsafe conditions which may occur. If an employee is unable to correct an unsafe condition, he/she shall immediately report the problem to the Superintendent or designee.

The Superintendent or designee shall promote safety and correct any unsafe work practices through education, training and enforcement.

#### **Graduation Ceremonies And Activities**

High school graduation ceremonies shall be held to recognize those students who have earned a diploma by successfully completing the required course of study, satisfying district standards, and passing any required assessments. The Governing Board believes that these students deserve a public celebration that recognizes the significance of their achievement and encourages them to continue the pursuit of learning throughout their lives.

Their diploma will be issued from their school of attendance, Oak Park Independent School or Oak View High School

At the discretion of the Superintendent or designee, a student who will complete graduation requirements during the summer may participate in graduation exercises without receiving his/her diploma. When the requirements have been satisfied, a diploma shall be sent to the student.

High school students who have passed the California High School Proficiency Examination or the General Education Development Test must also meet district graduation requirements in order to participate in graduation ceremonies.

The school or district shall not direct invocations, prayers or benedictions at graduation ceremonies.

School rules shall ensure that prior to denial of the privilege(s), the student, and where practicable his/her parent/guardian, is made aware of the grounds for such denial and that the student is given an opportunity to respond to the proposed denial. If privilege(s) are to be denied, the student and parent/guardian shall receive written notice of the denied privilege and the means whereby he/she may appeal this decision.

#### Conduct

The Governing Board believes that all students have the right to be educated in a positive learning environment free from disruptions. Students shall be expected to exhibit appropriate conduct that does not infringe upon the rights of others or interfere with the school program on school grounds while going to or coming from school, while at school activities, and while on district transportation.

Conduct is considered appropriate when students are diligent in study, careful with school property, courteous, and respectful towards their teachers, other staff, students and volunteers.

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each school site develops standards of conduct and discipline consistent with district policies and administrative regulations. Students and parents/guardians shall be notified of district and school rules related to conduct.

Prohibited student conduct includes but is not limited to:

1. Conduct that endangers students, staff and others

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2. Conduct that disrupts the orderly classroom or school environment

"Cyberbullying" includes the transmission of communications, posting of harassing messages, direct threats, social eruelty, or other harmful texts, sounds or images on the internet, social networking sites, or other digital technologies, using a telephone, computer, or any wireless communication device. Cyberbulling also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation or

Prior to bringing a laser pointer on school premises, students shall first obtain permission from the principal or designee. The principal or designee shall determine whether the requested use of the laser pointer is for a valid instructional or other school-related purpose.

Employees are expected to provide appropriate supervision to enforce standards of conduct and, if they observe or become aware of a violation of these standards, to immediately intervene or call for assistance. If an employee believes a matter has not been resolved, he/she shall refer the matter to his/her supervisor or administrator for further investigation.

Students who violate district or school rules and regulations may be subject to discipline, including, but not limited to, suspension, expulsion or transfer to alternative programs, or denial of participation in extracurricular or cocurricular activities in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. The Superintendent or designee shall notify local law enforcement as appropriate.

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Students may also be subject to discipline, *in accordance with law, Board policy, or administrative regulation*, for any off-campus conduct during non-school hours which poses a threat or danger to the safety of students, staff, or district property, or substantially disrupts *school activities.* the educational program of the district or any other district in accordance with law, Board policy, or administrative regulation

#### Possession/Use of Cellular Phones and Other Mobile Communication Devices

Students may possess or use on campus personal electronic signaling devices, including but not limited to, pagers, beepers and cellular/digital telephones, as well as other mobile communications devices including, but not limited to, digital media players, personal digital assistants (PDAs), compact disc players, portable game consoles, cameras, digital scanners, and laptops computers, provided that such devices do not disrupt the educational program or school activity and are not used for illegal or unethical activities such as cheating on assignments or

tests. If the device has the capability to capture digital images and/or take photographs of any kind the student shall be prohibited from using this capability. Permitted devices shall:

- 1. Be turned off during the school day unless it is being used as part of an instructional activity or with the permission of the teacher.
- 2. Not disrupt the educational program or school activity.
- 3. May not utilize capability to capture digital images and/or take photographs of any kind at any time.

If disruption occurs or the student uses any mobile communications device for improper activities, the employee may direct the student to turn off the device and/or shall confiscate it. If a school employee finds it necessary to confiscate a device, he/she may either return it at the end of the class period or school day or activity, or keep it until the principal or designee has consulted with the student's parent/guardian.

In accordance with the Board's policy and administrative regulation on search and seizure, a school official may search a student's mobile communications device, including, but not limited to, reviewing messages or viewing pictures.

Students shall not use mobile communications devices, even in hands-free mode, while driving on school grounds or to or from a school-related activity.

A student who violates this policy may be prohibited from possessing a mobile communications device at school or school-related events and/or may be subject to further discipline in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation.

No student shall be prohibited from possessing or using an electronic signaling device that is determined by a licensed physician or surgeon to be essential for the student's health and the use of which is limited to health related purposes. (Education Code 48901.5)

## Bullying/Cyberbullying

The Board desires to prevent bullying by establishing a positive, collaborative school climate and clear rules for student contact.

The district may provide students instruction in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes communication, social skills, and assertiveness skills and educates students about appropriate online behavior and strategies to prevent and respond to bullying and cyberbullying. This instruction may involve parents/guardians, staff, and community members.

School staff shall receive related professional development, including information about early warning signs of harassing/intimidating behaviors and effective prevention and intervention strategies. Parents/guardians and students also may be provided with similar information.

Students may submit a verbal or written complaint of conduct they consider to be bullying to a teacher or administrator and may also request that their name be kept in confidence. The Superintendent or designee may establish other processes whereby students may submit anonymous reports of bullying. Complaints of bullying or harassment shall be investigated and resolved in accordance with site-level grievance procedures specified in AR 5145.7 — Sexual Harassment.

When a student is suspected of or reported to be using electronic or digital communications to engage in cyberbullying against other students or staff or to threaten district property, the investigation shall include documentation of the activity, identification of the source, and specific facts or circumstances that explain a determination of the impact or potential impact on school activity, or school attendance, or the targeted student's educational performance.

Students shall be encouraged to save and print any messages sent to them that they feel constitutes cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated.

Any student who engages in cyberbullying using district-owned equipment on school premises, or off- campus in a manner that causes or is likely to cause a substantial disruption of impacts a school activity or school attendance, shall be subject to discipline in accordance with district policies and regulations. If the student is using a social networking site or service that has terms of use that prohibit posting harmful material, the Superintendent or designee also may file a complaint with the Internet site or service to have the material removed.

### Weapons And Dangerous Instruments

The Governing Board desires recognizes that students and staff have a to be free from the danger presented by firearms and other weapons and recognizes that they have the right to a safe and secure campus free from psychological and physical harm and desires to protect them from the dangers presented by firearms and other weapons.

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### Possession of Weapons

The Board prohibits any *student* person other than authorized law enforcement or security personnel-from possessing weapons, imitation firearms, or dangerous instruments of any kind in school buildings, on school grounds or buses, or at a school-related or school-sponsored activities away from school, or while going to or coming from school..

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Unless he/she has obtained prior written permission as specified below, any student who is determined to have brought a firearm to school or possessed a firearm at school, as verified by a school employee, shall be expelled for not less than one year, except that the Board may set an earlier date for readmission on a case-by-case basis in accordance with Board policy and administrative regulation. (Education Code 48915; 20 USC 7151)

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Students possessing or threatening others with a weapon, dangerous instrument or imitation firearm *shall be* are subject to suspension and/or expulsion in accordance with law, Board policy and administrative regulations.

Under the power granted to the Board to maintain order and discipline in the schools and to protect the safety of students, staff, and the public, any school employee is authorized to confiscate a weapon, dangerous instrument, or imitation firearm from any *student* person on school grounds.

The principal or designee shall notify law enforcement authorities when any student possesses a *firearm, explosive, or other dangerous* weapon *or instrument* without permission, *sells, or furnishes a firearm,* or commits any act of assault with a firearm or other weapon. (20 USC 7151; Education Code 48902; Penal Code 245, 626.9, 626.10)

### Advance Permission for Possession of a Firearm Weapon for Educational Use

A student who desires to possess or transport a firearm, or imitation firearm, or other prohibited weapon on school grounds for an educational purpose shall request prior permission from the principal at least five school days in advance of the planned possession. The student's parent/guardian shall provide written permission explaining the planned use of the weapon and the duration. The student shall also submit a written explanation from the staff person responsible for the school-sponsored activity or class.

On a case-by-case basis, the principal shall determine whether to grant permission for such possession when necessary for a school-sponsored activity or class or as part of the educational program. Factors that shall be considered include, but are not limited to, the planned use of the weapon, the duration and location of the planned use, whether an audience is expected, and any perceived adverse effects to the safety and well-being of students or staff. If the principal grants such permission, he/she shall provide the student and staff person with a written explanation regarding any limitations and the permissible duration of the student's possession.

When the principal or designee grants permission, he/she shall take all necessary precautions to ensure the safety of all persons on schools grounds, including, but not limited to, inspecting a firearm to verify that no live ammunition is present. Any weapon allowed The principal and/or a staff member with knowledge of firearm safety shall inspect the weapon to ensure that necessary safety precautions have been taken, including inspection to ensure that no live ammunition is present. The firearm shall be stored in a locked vehicle or in an appropriate, locked container before and after the educational activity.

A student granted permission to possess a firearm weapon may be suspended and/or expelled if he/she possesses or uses the weapon inappropriately.

### Possession of Pepper Spray

Students age 16 or older may legally possess tear gas or tear gas weapons such as pepper spray for the purpose of self-defense. However, To prevent potential misuse that may harm students or staff, students are prohibited from carrying tear gas, or tear gas weapons such as pepper spray such items on campus or at school activities.

### Reporting of Dangerous Objects

The Board encourages students to promptly report the presence of weapons, injurious objects or other suspicious activity to school authorities. The identity of a student who reports such activity shall remain confidential to the extent permitted by law.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies designed to facilitate student reporting of the presence of injurious objects on school grounds, such as tip hotlines, electronic transmissions, or other methods that preserve the student's anonymity. Incident reports and records shall not identify the student who reported the possession. The *Superintendent or designee* strategy shall also provide a method of informing-staff, students and parents/guardians that students who report the presence of injurious objects on school campuses are to be protected and their identity shielded.

### **Questioning And Apprehension**

The Governing Board is committed to providing a safe learning environment and cooperating with law enforcement officials and peace officers as necessary to help ensure the safety of students, staff, and the community and in carrying out their official duties.

(cf. 0450 - Comprehensive Safety Plan)

(cf. 5141.4 - Child Abuse Prevention and Reporting)

In accordance with standards specified in law and court decisions, law enforcement officers may interview and question students on school premises. The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with local law enforcement agencies to develop parameters under which law enforcement officers will interview students at school.

(cf. 1400 – Relations Between Other Governmental Agencies and the Schools)

When any law enforcement official requests an interview with a student, the principal or designee shall request that the official provide verification of his/her identity and official capacity and certify the legal authority under which the interview is being conducted. If the officer refuses to provide certification of the legal authority for the interview, the principal or designee shall document such refusal and should consult with district legal counsel, as appropriate, before allowing the interview to proceed. The principal or designee shall maintain a record of all documentation relative to law enforcement interviews of students.

If the officer needs to interview or question the student immediately, the principal or designee shall accommodate the process in a way that causes the least possible disruption for the student and school, gives the student appropriate privacy, and models exemplary cooperation with law enforcement authorities.

Law enforcement officers have the right to interview and question students on school premises. When such an interview is requested, the principal or designee shall ascertain the officer's identity, official capacity, and the authority under which he/she acts. If the officer needs to interview or question the student immediately, the principal or designee shall accommodate the process in a way that causes the least possible disruption to the school, gives the student appropriate privacy, and models exemplary cooperation with community law enforcement authorities.

Except in cases of child abuse or neglect, the principal or designee shall attempt to notify the

student's parent/guardian as soon as practicable after when a law enforcement has interviewed the student officer requests an interview on school premises.

At the law officer's discretion and with the student's approval, the principal or designee may be present during the interview.

If a minor student is removed If the law officer finds it necessary to remove the student from school, the principal or designee shall immediately notify the parent/guardian or responsible relative regarding the student's release and the place to which he/she is reportedly being taken, except when the minor has been taken into custody as a victim of suspected child abuse. (Education Code 48906) first ascertain the reason for such action. Upon releasing the student, the principal or designee shall immediately attempt to inform the student's parent/guardian.

Personnel responsible for releasing a student from school custody shall exercise extreme diligence to prevent such release to any unauthorized or unidentified person.

### Subpoenas

Although subpoenas may legally be served at school on students age 12 or older,, the Board believes that serving officials should be strongly urged to serve subpoenas at the home of the student whenever possible. In these situations When served at school, the principal or designee shall take all reasonable steps should be taken to ensure a minimum of embarrassment or loss of class time for the student.

Any student who feels that he/she has been subjected to discrimination or harassment is being harassed should immediately contact either the Coordinator for Nondiscrimination, the principal or any other staff member. Any student or school employee who observes an incident of discrimination or harassment should report the incident harassment to the Coordinator or principal, a school employee, whether or not the victim files a complaint.

Employees who become aware of an act of harassment shall immediately report the incident to the Coordinator for Nondiscrimination. The Governing Board recognizes the positive benefits of physical activity for student health and academic achievement. The District shall Board desires to provide all students the opportunity to be physically active on a regular basis through high-quality a physical education instruction and may provide additional opportunities for physical activity throughout the school day. The district's physical education and activity programs shall support program that supports the district's coordinated student wellness program, provides an adequate amount of moderate to vigorous physical activity, builds interest and proficiency in movement skills and encourages students' lifelong fitness. through physical activity. Besides promoting high levels of personal achievement and a positive self-image, physical education activities should teach students how to cooperate in the achievement of common goals.

### Physical Fitness Testing

The Superintendent or designee shall annually administer the physical fitness test designated by the State Board of Education to students in grades 5, 7, and 9. (Education Code 60800)

## **Temporary Exemptions**

The Superintendent or designee may grant temporary exemption from physical education under either of the following conditions: (Education Code 51241)

- 1. The student is ill or injured and a modified program to meet his/her needs cannot be provided.
- 2. The student is enrolled for one-half time or less.

## **Two-Year Exemptions**

With a student's consent, the Superintendent or designee may exempt the students, from any two years of physical education courses during grades 10-12 provided that the student has satisfactorily met any five of the six standards of the state's physical fitness test in grade 9. (Education Code 51241)

Upon request by students and/or their parents/guardians, the Superintendent or designee may administer the physical fitness test to students in grade 10-12 who need to pass the test in order to qualify for a two-year exemption from physical education courses.

### Permanent Exemptions

The Superintendent or designee may grant a permanent exemption from physical education to a student under any of the following conditions: (Education Code 51241)

- 1. The student is age 16 years or older and has been enrolled in grade 10 for one or more academic years
- 2. The student is enrolled as a postgraduate student
- 3. The student is enrolled in a juvenile home, ranch, camp or forestry camp school with scheduled recreation and exercise

## Other Exemptions

The Superintendent or designee may grant an exemption from physical education under the following special circumstances:

- 1. The student in grades 10-12 is excused for up to 24 clock hours in order to participate in automobile driver training. (Education Code 51222)
- 2. The student in grades 10-12 attends a regional occupational center or program and attendance in physical education courses results in hardship because of the travel time involved. (Education Code 52316)
- 3. The student is in a high school and engaged in a regular school-sponsored interscholastic athletic program carried on wholly or partially after regular school hours. (Education Code 51242)

## **Program Evaluation**

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board the results of the physical fitness testing for each school and applicable grade level. He/she shall also report to the Board regarding the number of instructional minutes offered in physical education for each grade level, the number of two-year and permanent exemptions granted pursuant to Education Code 51241, as described below, and any other data agreed upon by the Board and the Superintendent or designee to evaluate the program quality and the effectiveness of the district's program in meeting goals for physical activity.
