A majority of her students were kids on Disney and Nickelodeon shows. Kate also served as my partner as student council advisor. She was very dedicated to having students give back to their community through philanthropic activities. She loved working with Casa Pacifica, a shelter for neglected and abused children. She had a magical way of helping students realize that they too had a responsibility to help others.

In closing, I am going to do my best to have more smiles and laughs than tears. I keep saying, I would rather hurt this badly, than not to have had Kate in my life. When trying to find an academic quote to read, I found myself thinking, what would Kate want? So, to quote Winnie the Pooh, "How lucky I am to have something that makes saying goodbye so hard. If there ever comes a day when we can't be together, keep me in your heart, I'll stay forever."

Field Trip News Food Share of Ventura County

What an education our families got while attending Ventura County's food bank in Oxnard! Not only did we learn about hunger locally, but we learned how extensive the hunger problem is worldwide. Nationally there are 49 million people, including 16 million children, who are "food insecure." This means that at times there is insufficient food for all household members to have active, healthy lives. We learned of the sacrifices people have to make due to a lack of access to food. In fact, 69% have to choose between buying food and paying utilities, and 66% have to choose between obtaining food or medical care. Unbelievably *a child dies from malnutrition or a preventable disease every 9 seconds*. That is over 9500 children a day!

Surprisingly, 49% of Ventura County's population may receive free food assistance. A staggering 21.5% of the children in Ventura County don't know when they will have their next meal. Fortunately, Food Share of Ventura County helps nearly 75,000 receive food assistance. On our tour of Food Share's enormous warehouses, we saw hundreds of pallets filled with food that will be distributed through 190 pantry locations and programs. Food is donated by local grocery stores, supermarket chains, food manufacturers and distributers, the government, foundations, local farmers, and food drives. Our group alone donated 200 pounds of food to the effort!

Food share depends on hundreds of volunteers to help carry out its mission to feed, nourish and educate the hungry in Ventura County. Volunteers can donate food, work in gardens on the property, box food at the warehouse, pick fruit at local orchards, etc. This trip was an eye-opener for our students and taught them how they can help those who are less fortunate.

Ventura County Hunger Banquet

As a follow up to the trip to Food Share, many OPIS students participated in the Ventura County Hunger Banquet. This was an amazing hands-on experience that illustrated how the unequal distribution of food and other resources affects individuals and communities. Here, seventh grader, Haley Gilchrist, shares her experience at the banquet.

The Hunger Banquet

Today, I learned many things about people, their economic and social backgrounds, and how their social class affects the food which they consume. There are many different social–economic groups in this world. There are low income families; the average they make is \$20,000 per year. There are average income families who make an average of \$70,000 per year, and there are high income families who can make \$100,000 to \$300,000 per year or more. The type of family that you are born into is not your choice. Therefore, the type of food that you typically eat is also not usually your choice since it is based on what you can afford.

I feel we can help these people by giving back. Even though the stories the class read today are just written on a piece of paper, the stories are all real and apply to people that live in the world today. People, like me, should be grateful. We don't go to bed hungry every night like some less fortunate people. When we see someone in need we should give back and try to help. It may not be much, but maybe you just show them kindness. Your kindness will make their day and, I believe, you will receive kindness in return from someone else.

December - Page Museum, La Brea Tar Pits



Thinking about the **La Brea Tar Pits** conjures up images of large saber toothed tigers, dire wolves, and giant wooly mammoths. Whereas we did see skeletons of these beasts, our docent introduced us to a much smaller and seemingly insignificant member of the pre-historic food chain - the lowly insect. He explained that many of the larger mammals not only lived in the area surrounding the tar pits, but their habitat spanned a much greater area. Not so with the insects, he explained. In fact, the insects found at the tar pits today may not be much different from the insects found in days past and are likely to be much more specific to the area than the larger animals found there. Understanding them can help scientists learn what the area was like long ago.

Our students were given nets and the task of capturing, drawing, and identifying a variety of small bugs and insects in the area surrounding the museum. Following that activity we watched an informative video about climate change. The trip ended with a fun visit to the museum gift shop.

Student Spotlight


