Messages from our Superintendent and School Board President

It's hard to believe that we are one month into the new school year. It has been a terrific start for our schools with many accomplishments to celebrate already. While we opened short on enrollment, we have made up for much of that in the last few weeks. We anticipated, budgeted, and staffed for 4250 students K-12, and we now have 4200, so we are short about 50 students. We will most likely continue to gain students over the course of the school year, so this is less of a budgetary concern than it was initially. Of course, any loss of revenues is a concern in these difficult times for schools.

You may have seen my emails touting our top rankings on the state API (Academic Performance Index). Our District score of 918 places us in the top 1% of school districts in California. Oak Park High School average SAT scores rose by 43 points to 1778. In the area of reading, which our primary grade teachers assess throughout the year, we showed that over 95% of our K-3 students are reading at or above grade level, including children with special needs.

Class sizes in Oak Park USD remain some of the smallest in the county and state. Averages are as follows (excluding physical education):

K-3 23.84-5 32.86-8 28.4

9-12 30.5

Thank you in advance for responding positively to the appeal letter from Friends of Oak Park Schools that you will be receiving this month. We are all working hard to ensure that your children receive a world-class education even in the midst of this state budget disaster. We need your support to make this happen and we need a 100% response from all parents. I'm sure you will all

give what you can. Many organizations are asking for support in these tough times. Remember, however, that this organization – Oak Park Schools - is the one that is responsible for educating your child and that we can't 'do-over' or make up for a year of missed or substandard learning opportunities. We are asking for your support and commit to deliver quality in return.

I am very excited to tell you about a new committee currently forming in the school district. In my September note I mentioned the work of the Board, as well as District and school site leadership, in regard to the District's moral imperatives and goals. We finalized them at our September board meeting and they are posted on our website. Please visit www.oakparkusd.org and go to "Moral Imperatives" under the "About Us" tab to view this hopefully more useable document as it is the framework for district leadership and guides much of the education that our children will be receiving.

This month's Partner In Education award

went to Jan Rosen, a parent and staff member in the OPUSD. Among other contributions, Jan does an incredible job with coordinating and running registration at MCMS. Please join us in congratulating her with this recognition. I encourage you to nominate those who you see offering their gift of time, ideas and talents purely for the sake of making the school district and the Oak Park community a better place. Nominations can be made by going to the OPUSD website at www.OakParkusd.org and clicking on the "Partner in Education Award" under the "District Office" tab.

Amongst other items of business, at our September Board meeting we held a public hearing and approved the flexibility to transfer otherwise categorical funding to the general fund. With the cuts in state revenue, the state has authorized school districts to use funding which is earmarked for certain purposes to be utilized at the discretion of the local education agencies. While this by no means corrects for the deteriorating budgets that public schools in California are experiencing, it does help to use the funds we have to best educate our children in Oak Park. We also approved the District's unaudited actuals for the fiscal year 2010-2011 and approved a resolution establishing the Gann appropriation limit for fiscal year 2011-2012. Thanks to the generosity of the Parent Teacher Organizations at the respective school sites, we were very happy, appreciative and grateful to be able approve and have full time librarians at each of our elementary schools and Medea Creek. We also held a hearing and approved the sufficiency of textbooks and instructional materials for 2011-2012.

I hope that you and your families have had a good start to the school year.




Back to School Night















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First Day of School — It Only Gets Better from Here!


