ventures – an Example of an 'Authentic' Learning Experience

In October I journeyed with 5th graders from each of our elementary schools to Santa Cruz Island. We have integrated these annual trips into the instructional program thanks to Debby West, our science specialist and Friends of Oak Park Schools, who support her position. I go along as an extra hand with many years of experience leading and participating in these trips to the islands. I am also a member of the Sanctuary Education Team for the Channel Islands National Marine Sanctuary, a division of NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration).

This program is an example of what we refer to as an 'authentic' learning experience. Providing more of these to our students has been and remains a major District-wide goal. Authentic learning is an approach to teaching and learning in which students work on realistic problems, participate in activities that solve real-life problems, or create products that have real-life purposes.

When learning activities are authentic, students see the significance of what they are learning because the tasks mirror real-life experiences - activities that personally relate to students and their world. Students explore, discover, discuss, and construct concepts that involve their world. They learn to think critically, analyze information, communicate ideas, reach logical conclusions, collaborate with others, and create multiple solutions. The true goal of authentic learning is to help students find relevance in their learning and to apply what they have learned in the world.

Again, this year, students were able to get a view of the Santa Cruz Island Fox and in doing so, learn about and have direct experience with natural selection, which is easier to understand when it comes to islands but

applies to all life on Earth. This species of fox lives only on Santa Cruz Island. During the last ice age, the distance to the island was shorter due to the drop in sea level and that was when some animals made it out to the island - most likely by accident through a process called 'rafting.' This involves animals being carried out to sea on floating debris that washes down rivers in heavy rainstorms and then some of these animals making it to the island. Maybe even just one pregnant animal on a raft makes it, establishing a new population on the island if conditions allow. This fox is genetically related but different than a species of fox that lives on the California mainland. After thousands of years of isolation on the island, the animal became different, smaller, differently colored, etc. I am attaching a photo I took of one we saw. Charles Darwin had his 'ah-ha' moment about natural selection when he visited the Galapagos Islands and made similar observations. Today, our Channel Islands are often referred to as the 'American Galapagos.' There are four 'endemic' species of mammals on Santa Cruz Island meaning that they live only there.

It is difficult for children, and in fact for most of us, to conceptualize the diversity of life on Earth. Having an authentic experience with it can provide the 'ah-ha' moment that is necessary to come to understand the concept and invite further study and investigation.

Board Happenings

Dear Parents and Community Members,

The school year is well under way although the weather has been more summer than fall. We have dealt with a norovirus at Medea Creek Middle School and I cannot compliment the school and district staff enough. They worked with Ventura County Public Health and the County Medical Officer and handled it beautifully. Medea Creek Middle School was also named a California Distinguished Schools "School To Watch" again this year. At our October Board meeting we approved the annual teacher assignment report and heard a report on student assessments. We discussed test results by grade level and subject area. Oak Park students outperformed the rest of Ventura County. We had the highest district, high school, middle school, and elementary school scores. The Oak Park USD mean API score was 928 for the 2011-2012 school year.

We also reviewed the California Healthy Kids Survey results. This assessment reviews key indicators of risk and wellbeing. It is administered every other year to students in grades 5, 7, 9, and 11. To have more valid results we need more participation by our elementary students. Written parental consent is required for 5th grade students to participate. In grades 7, 9, and 11 where parents who want their students excluded need to make a request our participation rate was much higher and therefore the results much more useful.

We also discussed and approved change orders and a notice of completion on more of the summer repair and modernization projects.

Board goals were reviewed and updated and we approved and now have for the first time a Board Governance Handbook to guide us in addition to District Policies.

Policies amended concerned student health and social services, use of school facilities, recruitment and selection (of employees), civil and legal rights (of employees), professional standards, employees with infectious diseases, and Bylaws of the Board, closed session purposes and agendas. We also adopted policies on employee notifications and temporary/substitute personnel.

I hope that everyone has a wonderful Thanksgiving, and until next month my best to all of you,
