


Principal's Corner

NOTES FROM THE SEPTEMBER SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

At the September 17th regular meeting of the OPUSD Board of Education, four OPHS students spoke during public comment about a non-agenda item of not receiving PE credit for sports played in 9th grade while at OPHS. In addition, four other members of the public spoke on another non-agenda item related to elementary gender diversity lessons in grades K-5. Since these items were not on the Agenda, per Board Bylaws, the Board did not discuss the matters nor were any decisions made regarding the issues raised during public comment at this meeting. Every person who submitted a speaker card wishing to address the Board on these topics was able to speak before the Board. The Board also heard reports from School Board Members and the Superintendent.

Discussion on Parent Opt-out Option Related to the K-5 Counselor Lessons on Gender Diversity

This item was placed on the Board's Agenda because a member of the community asked for it to be, and the Board President and Superintendent agreed to do so. Dr. Knight read a statement about opting-out, nine members of the public spoke, and the Board President read a statement.

Report on the 1:1 Chromebook Program

The Board received an update on the 1-to-1 Chromebook Program for Grades 5-12. Enoch Kwok, Director of Information Technology, and Ellen Chevalier, Lead Technology TOSA and 1:1 Chromebook Program Manager, shared this presentation and the following statistics on the Chromebook 1-1 program:

Grades 5-12 student population: 2829,
63% Borrowed (including gr 8 & 12),

24% New Lease To Own, 10% Previously Purchased/Leased, 2% Purchased New, Chromebooks leased by parents 691, +293 from prior year = 984 combined. Chromebooks purchased by parents 52 (for 2020 school year), Grades 8 and 12 were issued old district Chromebooks (all borrowed)

The Board held a Discussion on and/or approved the following items:

CONSENT AGENDA

Approved Resolution #19-19, Establishing the GANN Appropriation Limit for Fiscal Years 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 - The Gann Initiative (Proposition 4, 1979) created a constitutional requirement for school districts to annually adopt a resolution establishing its maximum appropriations limit. The completed appropriation limit forms are included in the District's Unaudited Actuals and will be submitted to the State Department of Education, and approved by the State Board of Education.

BUSINESS SERVICES

Approved District of Choice ("DOC") Reporting Requirements - This report summarized the information required of DOC school districts pursuant to Education Code 48313 in regard to students enrolled in OPUSD for the current school year. This information will now, and prior to October 15, be disseminated to local adjoining districts, the county office of education, the State Superintendent of Instruction and the Department of Finance.

Approved the Unaudited Actual Reve-

nues and Expenditures for the Fiscal Year 2017-2018 - The District's 2018-19 books were officially closed on September 12, 2019, and the fiscal year's revenues, expenditures, and year-end balances were finalized. The District has ended the 2018-19 fiscal year with an unrestricted General Fund ending balance that is sufficient to meet the Designated Amount for Economic Uncertainties required by Education Code.

Approved Spending Plan for 2019-20 Education Protection Account Funds - California voters approved Proposition 30, which established the Education Protection Account (EPA). The Board must approve the use of the EPA funds in an open session of a public meeting. District's spending plan allocates 100% of the revenue to go towards teachers' salaries..

CURRICULUM AND INSTRUCTION

Approved Out of State Travel for the following certificated employees from Oak View High School to attend the following conferences funded by a state grant specific to the continuation high school: Susan Allen - International Literacy Association - October 9-12, 2019, KC Kelem and Randi Liepman - National Alternate Education, October 28-30, 2019, Susan Allen - National Council of Teachers of English - November 21-24, 2019

Held a Public Hearing and Approved Resolution #19-20, Regarding Sufficiency of Textbooks and Instructional Materials, for 2019-2020 - Education Code 60119 requires that districts, in order to receive the textbook and instructional materials funding from the state, hold a public hearing regarding the sufficiency of core textbooks and instructional materials in the district. During the 2019-2020 school year, OPUSD has followed the state curriculum framework guidelines and all associated recommendations.




Chemistry





Getty Villa Field Trip






