Welcome to a new school year! Big changes are coming to Oak View as we continue to evolve to best meet the needs of students. Students will benefit from new course offerings, improved instructional practices, an expanded vocational program, and choice in building a course of study that best meets individual interests.

PROGRAM CHANGE

Ventura County Office of Education (VCOE) is spearheading a major upgrade in vocational offerings, and OVHS is right at the front of the line to obtain these opportunities for our students. Beginning quarter 2, students will partake of job shadows and internships in a variety of vocational paths including construction, education, and insurance. OVHS students will be vetted and matched with appropriate opportunities where they can be hands-on in learning what various jobs entail.

SCHEDULE CHANGE

Friday attendance for those not participating in the program will be optional IF: 1. all work has been completed, 2.

there are no disciplinary

issues, 3. the student has no absences or tardies

through

These options will occur on Fridays during the school day (and possible Thursday afternoons). Students who qualify for this program will not be required to come to school on Friday as they will be otherwise occupied.

Thursday.

Parents and students will know on Thursday whether attendance is required for Friday. A list will be posted on the office door. Parents of students who are eligible to skip Friday will be notified by email.

Students who are NOT required to attend on Friday may still do so to keep on track with the hours necessary to complete required classes.

One classroom will be set up as a study hall for students to quietly complete makeup work. One classroom will offer instruction and projects that will vary from week to week. Teachers will share responsibility for these classes, as well as in supervising students who are participating in the off-campus internships and job shadows.

INSTRUCTIONAL CHANGE

This is actually more of a further evolution. Two of our teachers (Mrs. Liepman and Ms. Allen) have been extensively trained in project-based instruction, and all staff will continue to develop course work that fosters critical thinking skills and provides for more choice and challenge in daily course

NEW COURSE OFFERINGS

Juniors will take a new course entitled Jobs that will walk them through the process of getting ready for, obtaining, and keeping a job. It will be taught by Ms. Allen who also teachers the senior requirement Careers.

Our computer applications requirement will now be met via an online course that will also offer students Microsoft certification in Word and (next year) Excel. This move is in conjunction with our focus on teaching students real world skills that will help them to get employment.

Physical education will become more aligned with state standards and will focus on developing lifelong habits of maintaining good health. Each teacher will be responsible for one quarter of PE. Students will also be offered the opportunity to become CPR and first aid certified.

A Message From Tony Knight, Superintendent

Dear parents,

In a few days we will be welcoming your child(ren) into our schools and classrooms in Oak Park and we do so with open arms and hearts. When school starts on Tuesday, August 11, the students will find that even though we are starting two weeks earlier this year with our new calendar in place, teachers and staff are ready to welcome them. I hope you had a good summer, even though this was the 'year of the short summer.' Being in an Oak Park classroom is a great experience but everyone works hard and I'm sure our students and staff will look forward to a full week off at Thanksgiving, ending the first semester at the high schools before winter break, giving our students a true work-free break, and getting out of school for next summer before Memorial Day weekend. I would again like to thank parents for your support of the new calendar, which was developed after participation by our secondary schools in the Stanford University Challenge Success program in order to find ways to help reduce stress on our high school students. However, I know not everyone is excited about the change but we are

confident it will end up being a positive one.

On the Crest of a Wave

As we begin the 2015-16 school year we are on the crest of a wave of historic reform in education that encompasses the curriculum, standards, instructional methodologies, materials, assessment, and the funding model. For the first time these components are aligning in a way that few thought would have ever been possible. These changes present major challenges for all of us as we need to invest time and resources in professional development, new materials, technology, and most importantly, look for new ways to provide more time for collaboration as we make these changes. Oak Park USD has been ahead of the curve on these issues as our philosophy has leaned toward a more holistic, projectbased, and experiential learning experience for our students. It seems that things are now catching up to what research has shown to be the most effective ways that people learn and what we have been practicing in our Oak Park schools for a long while. Nevertheless, much is new and these changes present wonderful opportunities for us to break new ground in the way we teach and our students learn. I like to refer to our work on these initiatives as A New Perspective on Teaching, Learning, and Collaboration and I look forward to writing to you more about it this year and also to speaking to you at school meetings that will be scheduled again this year.

Our SBAC testing results are arriving but we have not received all of them as yet. These will be mailed home. At first glance it appears that our students performed well on the new tests but we have not yet benchmarked them with similar districts. As we move to implement the New California Standards (new name in California for our version of the Common Core), and we align the curriculum, instructional materials, teaching methodologies, student learning activities including more infusion of technology, and classroom assessments, they will only improve.

I look forward to providing you with more information about the exciting things going on in Oak Park Schools and thank you for your continued support. It's going to be another great year!

Major Remodel!

Technology Changes

OPUSD is a leader in educational technology and its use in the classroom. OVHS continues to benefit from this, and the evidence is clear in our classrooms and curriculum.

Over the summer, Mrs. Liepman's Computer On Wheels (COW) was upgraded with newer Mac laptops. Ms. Allen's COW was replaced with Mac Airs that have a dual platform supporting use of the Microsoft Office suite. This changeover will enable her yearbooks staff to use Macs rather than the ancient Dells to create the yearbook and literary magazine. In addition, it will support student access to the new Computers curriculum that will facilitate students becoming certified in Word.

Teachers will work together to fully implement the new district technology standards into our curriculum. We are one of the pilot schools for this in the district. Mrs. Kelem will be serving as the school's techlite this year, supporting the use of iPads in the classroom. She will also work with the science department at OPHS to implement iPads in her laboratory assignments.

Finally, we will all explore the "cloud" this year as we move our documents into Google drive for more seamless storage and retrieval and to facilitate saving on the reams of paper we go through every year.

First Day Team Building

One of our primary goals is to foster group work skills in our students. Our project-based curriculum supports the growth of the ability to communicate, group-think, and work competently and cohesively with others. At right, Madison Giger, Chloe Hall, Kelvin Pereira, and Mrs. Kelem work together to create the innovative design incorporating spaghetti noodles, tape, string, and a marshmallow that made up the tallest tower (at 24.5"). 
