Board Policy and regulation deleted as federal program improvement requirements have been suspended for the 2017-18 school year and will, beginning in the 2018-19 school year, be replaced by a new system of comprehensive and targeted improvement established by the Every Student Succeeds Act.

b. <u>Approve Amendment to Board Policy BP 3280 Sale or Lease of District-Owned Real</u> <u>Property – First Reading</u>

Board Policy updated to delete the requirement to first offer surplus property to a charter school with at least 80 students. Material regarding the appointment of the district advisory committee expanded to specify the circumstances under which the district is not required to appoint a committee, including the exception for the sale, lease, or rental of excess property to be used for

teacher or other employee housing pursuant to NEW LAW (AB 1157, 2017). Policy expands section on "Use of Proceeds" to reflect additional legal requirements, and deletes the authority (repealed) to use the proceeds from the sale of surplus property for any one-time general fund purpose provided that the district adopted a plan and made certain certifications to the State Allocation Board

c. <u>Approve Amendment to Board Policy and Administrative Regulation BP 5113.1</u> <u>Chronic Absence and Truancy – First Reading</u>

Board Policy updated to reflect the inclusion of a chronic absence indicator in the California School Dashboard effective in the fall of 2018, add examples of interventions for attendance problems, and delete section on "School Attendance Review Board" since that material is now covered in BP/AR 5113.12 - District School Attendance Review Board. Regulation updated to delete references to 5 CCR 15497.5 (repealed), which formerly contained the LCAP template that is now available on the CDE web site, and to delete section on the appointment and general duties of attendance supervisors, now covered in AR 5113.11 - Attendance Supervision.

d. <u>Approve Adoption of Administrative Regulation AR 5113.11 Attendance Supervisor –</u> <u>First Reading</u>

New regulation addresses the appointment of a district attendance supervisor and reflects NEW LAW (AB 2815, 2016) which expresses the Legislature's intent that the attendance supervisor fulfill specified duties.

e. <u>Approve Amendment to Administrative Regulation 6112 School Day – First Reading</u>

Regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 99, 2017) which permits districts to maintain kindergarten or transitional kindergarten classes for different lengths of time during the school day, either at the same or different school sites. Regulation also reflects provision of AB 99 which allows districts to schedule classes in an early college high school or middle college high school so that students attend classes for at least 900 minutes during any five school day period or 1,800 minutes during any 10 school day period.

f. <u>Approve Amendment to Board Policy BP 6170.1 Transitional Kindergarten – First</u> <u>Reading</u>

Board Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 99, 2017) which permits districts to maintain transitional kindergarten classes for different lengths of time during the school day, either at the same or different school sites, provided that the length of the school day complies with legal requirements related to the minimum and maximum length of the school day.

AGREEMENT FOR LEGAL SERVICES

This agreement is by and between Oak Park Unified School District ("Client") and the law firm of Fagen Friedman & Fulfrost LLP ("Attorney"). In consideration of the promises and the mutual agreements hereinafter contained, Attorney agrees to provide legal services to Client on the terms set forth below effective July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2018:

1. <u>CONDITIONS</u>. This Agreement will not take effect, and Attorney will have no obligation to provide legal services, until Client returns a signed copy of this Agreement.

2. <u>SCOPE OF SERVICES.</u> Client hires Attorney as its legal representative/counsel with respect to matters Client specifically refers to Attorney. Attorney will provide those legal services reasonably required to represent Client. Attorney will take reasonable steps to keep Client informed of progress and to respond to Client's inquiries.

3. <u>CLIENT'S DUTIES.</u> Client agrees to cooperate with Attorney and to communicate with candor while keeping the Attorney apprised of any information or developments which may come to Client's attention, to abide by this Agreement, to pay Attorney's bills on time and to keep Attorney advised of Client's address and telephone number. Client will assist Attorney in providing information and documents necessary for the representation in the described matter.

4. <u>**CONSULTANT SERVICES.</u>** Attorney may provide consulting services in addition to or in support of the legal services provided pursuant to this Agreement, through qualified non-attorney Communication Services and Education Consultants. These services are intended to support Client with communications work or educational consultant services related to labor and employment matters, special education and student matters, high-profile litigation and settlement agreements, in addition to employee, community, inter-governmental and media relations.</u>

5. <u>EMAIL COMMUNICATIONS/CLOUD-BASED COMPUTING</u>. In order to provide Client with efficient and convenient legal services, Attorney will frequently communicate and transmit documents using e-mail. In addition, Attorney uses a cloud computing service with servers located in a facility other than Attorney's office. Most of Attorney's electronic data, including emails and documents, are stored in this manner. Although Attorney will take reasonable precautions to keep email and other electronic data confidential and secure, because technology and cyber threats continue to evolve, there may be risks communicating and storing electronic data in this manner, including risks related to confidentiality and security. By entering into this Agreement, Client is consenting to such e-mail transmissions with Client and Client's representatives and agents, as well as to having communications, documents and electronic data pertinent to Client's matter(s) stored through a cloud-based service.

6. <u>LEGAL FEES AND BILLING PRACTICES.</u> Client agrees to pay by the hour, in minimum units of one tenth (.1) of an hour, at Attorney's prevailing rates for all time spent on Client's matter by Attorney's legal personnel. Current hourly rates are noted in an attached rate schedule and the actual rate billed is based on the attorney's number of years of experience.

The rates on this schedule are subject to change on 30 days' written notice to client. If Client declines to pay any increased rates, Attorney will have the right to withdraw as Attorney for Client. The time charged will include the time Attorney spends on telephone calls relating to Client's matter, including calls with Client and other parties and attorneys. The legal personnel assigned to Client's matter may confer among themselves about the matter, as required and appropriate. When they do confer, each person will charge for the time expended, as long as the work done is reasonably necessary and not duplicative. Likewise, if more than one of the legal personnel attends a meeting or other proceeding, each will charge for the time spent.

7. <u>COSTS AND OTHER CHARGES.</u> (a) Attorney will incur various costs and expenses in performing legal services under this Agreement. Except as otherwise stated, Client agrees to pay for all costs, disbursements and expenses in addition to the hourly fees. These include fees fixed by law or assessed by public agencies, messenger and other delivery fees, out of office copying/reproduction costs, and travel costs (including mileage charged at the standard IRS rate, parking, transportation, meals and hotel costs, if applicable), and other similar items. The following costs shall not be charged:

(b) Out of town travel. Client agrees to pay transportation, meals, lodging and all other costs of any necessary out-of-town travel by law firm personnel. Client will also be charged the hourly rates for the time legal personnel spend traveling.

(c) Consultants and Investigators. To aid in the representation in Client's matter, it may become necessary to hire consultants or investigators. Client agrees to pay such fees and charges.

8. <u>BILLING STATEMENTS.</u> Attorney will send Client monthly statements for fees and costs incurred. Each statement will be payable within thirty (30) days of its mailing date. An interest charge of one percent (1%) per month shall be assessed on balances that are more than thirty (30) days past due. Client may request a statement at intervals of less than 30 days. If Client requests a bill, Attorney will provide one within 10 days. The statements shall include the amount, rate, basis of calculation or other method of determination of the fees and costs, which costs will be clearly identified by item and amount.

9. <u>DISCHARGE AND WITHDRAWAL.</u> Client may discharge Attorney at any time. Attorney may withdraw with Client's consent, for good cause or as allowed or required by law upon ten (10) days written notice. Good cause includes Client's breach of this Agreement, refusal to cooperate or to follow Attorney's advice on a material matter or any fact or circumstance that would render Attorney's continuing representation unlawful or unethical. When Attorney's services conclude, all unpaid charges will immediately become due and payable. Following the conclusion of Attorney's representation of Client, Attorney will, upon Client's request, deliver to Client the Client file(s) and property in Attorney's possession, whether or not Client has paid for all services. If Client has not requested delivery of the files, Attorney may destroy all such files in its possession seven (7) years after the conclusion of the representation.

10. <u>DISCLAIMER OF GUARANTEE AND ESTIMATES.</u> Nothing in this Agreement and nothing in Attorney's statements to Client will be construed as a promise or guarantee about the outcome of the matter. Attorney makes no such promises or guarantees. Attorney's comments

about the outcome of the matter are expressions of opinion only. Actual fees may vary from estimates given.

11. <u>ENTIRE AGREEMENT.</u> This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties. No other agreement, statement, or promise made on or before the effective date of this Agreement will be binding on the parties.

12. <u>MODIFICATION BY SUBSEQUENT AGREEMENT.</u> This Agreement may be modified by subsequent agreement of the parties only by an instrument in writing signed by both of them or an oral agreement only to the extent that the parties carry it out.

13. SEVERABILITY IN EVENT OF PARTIAL INVALIDITY. If any provision of this Agreement is held in whole or in part to be unenforceable for any reason, the remainder of that provision and of the entire Agreement will be severable and remain in effect.

14. <u>MEDIATION CLAUSE.</u> If a dispute arises out of or relating to any aspect of this Agreement between the Client and Attorney, or the breach thereof, and if the dispute cannot be settled through negotiation, Attorney and Client agree to use mediation before resorting to arbitration, litigation, or any other dispute resolution procedure.

15. <u>EFFECTIVE DATE.</u> This Agreement will govern all legal services performed by Attorney on behalf of Client commencing with the date Attorney first performed services. The date at the beginning of this Agreement is for reference only. - ISSUE: Shall the Board of Education approve a Resolution to continue participation in the State's District of Choice Program as approved in the Governor's Budget Bill of 2017.
- BACKGROUND: The District of Choice (DOC) program grew out of an effort in the early 1990's to increase the choices available to all students within the public school system. The 1993 legislation (AB19) that implemented the District of Choice program provided for a five-year pilot with the first transfers to begin in the 1995-96 school year. Since that time the state has extended the program through a number of renewals with the latest extension authorized in the Education Omnibus Trailer Bill (SB83) of the Governor's budget signed in June, 2017. This bill extends the program through June 30, 2023 (with a repeal date of January 1, 2024) and adds some new reporting requirements to Education Code 48300 *et seq.* In addition, the Education Code requires that participating school districts annually adopt a resolution and communicate their intent to participate to surrounding school districts.

The Legislative Analyst's Office completed a comprehensive study of the District of Choice program in 2016 and produced a report outlining recommendations to the State Legislature as it considered the future of the program. Most of the recommendations from the report were incorporated into the current legislation. Oak Park Unified has participated in the District of Choice program since the 2004-05 school year and, as a result, has been able to mitigate the effects of declining enrollment and reduced state funding. Staff recommends that the Governing Board adopt this resolution to continue the district's participation in the District of Choice program and accept new students for the 2018-19 school year.

Dear Martin and Tony:

Thank you for the opportunity to submit this proposal agreement for professional master plan and planning services for OPUSD to make the most of your Measure S funds and matching funds. We appreciate your confidence in our firm to serve your planning needs and look forward to executing this proposal agreement with you.

We have carefully reviewed your list of projects for each campus and toured all of the sites. During our scope brainstorm sessions with you, Julie Suarez and Keith Henderson we gained a specific understanding of the scope of your project and the services we are to provide in order to meet your goals. We are confident that we have the qualified staff and experience necessary to complete your project.

Scope of Services

This proposal agreement is based upon our understanding of the scope of the master plan and planning services OPUSD needs at this time. Harley Ellis Devereaux (HED) proposes to provide the following professional master planning services to meet your goals:

- 1) Assign soft costs, construction costs, design time duration and construction duration time to all projects listed on Exhibit A for (5) campuses. Costs to account for FF&E, technology infrastructure, graphic design such as wayfinding and interpretive signs to explain some of the environmental features of the campuses.
- 2) Create a schedule for all projects listed on Exhibit A for (5) campuses that shows the phasing the OPUSD team and HED team settle on for Phase 1B (current



funds), Phase 1C (second bond issuance), Phase 2 (state matching funds in about 2 years)

- 3) Assessment of restrooms shown in Exhibit A that do not meet code by marking up as built drawings with the solutions to bring them up to code
- 4) Draw conceptual site plan diagrams for all sites listed in Exhibit A (5 campuses) to show options for best placement of new modular buildings when portables are removed, spaces for shaded outdoor learning, storage and re-shuffling program and renovations.

- As-Builts / Base Drawings (in digital format): We do not know what the state of documentation is in. Fees are generally reasonable for this kind of work and it would depend on what exactly was needed.
- Site survey update: We would expect OPUSD to furnish adequate survey information and to update it if it was deemed necessary.

Fee Proposal

Basic Services Fee

Reimbursable Expenses

4) Describe the program(s), grade levels, students, etc. impacted by this technology acquisition and how it will be used to enhance instruction.

OPHS Journalism is both a 35+ student class (actually two classes in one room --Journalism 1 and 2), and a 80+ student club. Students come from all grades 9 - 12. Additionally, we have an outreach program/club for Medea Creek students.

We produce a 24 page printed paper using the Adobe Suite (InDesign, Photoshop and Illustrator) as well as maintain a digital paper using Wordpress. We also produce podcasts and broadcasts using Adobe Premiere. Other programs we use include Garageband, iMovie and Audacity. All of these programs are HUGE and unavailable on Chromebooks because the reside (at least in part) on hard drives.

We NEED these computers for layout of the current paper and for content creation. The current machines are much too old and slow to run multiple Adobe programs and Adobe is not accable on Chromebooks. Also, they don't even support the new Apple operating system which is necessary in order to run the new Adobe Suite. The district already has the licence for the newest Adobe products -- we just don't have the machines to run it.

5) Describe any pre-existing resources, technologies, that this technology will replace, refresh, or augment.

Currently, we have 7 iMacs. 6 of them are from 2009 -- iMacs 20 inch, 4GB, 1067 MHz. 1 is from 2013 and is a 21.5 inch, 8GB, 2.7 Ghz. These are NOT able to run the latest versions of Adobe Creative Cloud (InDesign, Photoshop) needed for page layout.

We also have a Chromebook cart and 10 iPads.

6) Provide an estimate of the total cost of acquiring this technology resource.

6 iMacs with 27 inch screens with retina 5K display, 16GB RAM, 1TB storage \$3000 per machine for a total of \$18,000

7) Identify who will be responsible to manage and take care of this equipment once it is received and put into operation.

Caitlin Fowler -- Journalism Adviser, English teacher and NextTech

8) What is the requested time frame for acquiring these resources?

<u>As soon as possible</u>. Students are spending an inordinate time at home laying out the paper, as well as money paying for Adobe Cloud accounts because the machines we have now are too old and slow. This is really not ok.

The class is based on digital journalism, which means I cannot fully teach content without new(er) computers.

The legislation further define LCFF continues to evolve in Sacramento and it remains important for suburban school districts such as Oak Park Unified to have a voice in the process. The Administration recommends the renewal of the District's MDA, the annual dues are \$2,500, which is included in the Business Administration department budget. More information on CSFC its purpose, achievements, and legislative priorities follows this recommendation.

The Challenge

POST-LOCAL CONTROL FUNDING FORMULA REQUIRES AN ASPIRATIONAL TARGET

California is the nation's most populous and wealthiest state. Few can argue it is the most progressive and technologically advanced. It is rated third by US News & World Report in economic stability and potential and tenth in providing health care and access.

One ranking, however, is not so laudable – how it funds its public education system. Depending with which ranking system you agree, California ranks as high as 23rd to as low as 46th in the nation in how it funds the education of its six million schoolchildren. California is failing to fund education commensurate with its status among the nation's wealthiest and most economically stable states.

The Proposal

SCHOOL FUNDING COALITION MEMBERS WILL URGE STATE LAWMAKERS TO:

- Boost the LCFF base grant and honor the state Constitution by establishing an aspirational funding target that will move California public education funding into the top ten states.
- Resist the creation of new categorical programs.
- Protect and maintain the Local Control Funding Formula's (LCFF) principles of local control and accountability.

Why the School Funding Coalition?

An effort of this magnitude will require a multi-year approach. We will work together and utilize our advocates from School Services of California to mobilize education stakeholders, legislators, and others to garner support for legislation to accomplish these goals.

Proposition 98's Constitutional Promise

In 1988, California voters enacted Proposition 98, which was intended to establish a minimum funding level guarantee for its public education system. The law explicitly added two fiscal and policy goals to the State Constitution:

- California would provide its public education system with funding levels commensurate with the top 10 states in the nation.
- Average class sizes in California would be equal to or less than the average class size of the 10 states with the lowest class sizes for elementary and high schools.

How does California compare?

Education Week's Quality Counts 2017, ranked California 46th in the nation on per-student funding.

US Department of Education data ranks California:

- Third highest student-to-staff ratio
- Second highest student-to-counselor ratio
- Highest student-to-teacher ratio in the nation

Since Prop 98 became law, the state has fallen short on both of these goals. In the last 30 years, rarely has the state provided funding above the Prop 98 minimum guarantee. Rather, it has manipulated the formula resulting in the underfunding of public education over time and minimal progress toward attainment of the state Constitution's goals.

Local Control Funding Formula – Past, Present and Future

In 2013, after years of devastating funding cuts to public education, and as the result of California's improving economy, the state overhauled its school finance system and enacted the LCFF. In addition to establishing an eight-year goal to restore school district funding to its 2007-08 funding level, the law provided enhanced funding for the state's vulnerable student populations and granted greater discretion over how LEAs can allocate funding. Since its inception, the state has aggressively pursued its goal of achieving full funding of the LCFF and the Department of Finance projects the LCFF will reach 97% of the targets in 2017-18.

The Legislative Analyst's Office (LAO) projects that under a state revenue growth scenario, the state could fully fund the LCFF as soon as 2018-19. The LAO further notes:

- "In this and subsequent years, growth in Prop 98 funding would be more than sufficient to cover the LCFF targets as adjusted for changes in attendance and cost of living."
- "Under the growth scenario, after supporting LCFF, the Legislature would have an additional \$1.5 billion to \$2.5 billion per year to spend on other Prop 98 priorities."

Post LCFF Funding Challenges – New and Mandated Fixed Costs

LEAs across the state are once again making deep cuts, resulting from inadequate base funding to pay for new and mandated fixed costs such as:

CalSTRS/CalPERS: Compared with 2013-14 levels, total LEA contributions are anticipated to be nearly \$6 billion higher by 2020-21. LCFF base funding is the only source of funding to pay for these fixed costs.

Special Education: The fast growing cost of special education is also eroding LEA base funding and the state has not increased funding for this federally-mandated program since the late nineties. Over the past ten years, on average, special education expenditures by school districts are rising 6% annually, primarily due to the increase of students who require costly interventions. LCFF base funding is used to backfill increased expenditures. Adequate Special Education funding requires work at the state and federal levels.

Aspirational Funding Target for LCFF

Once the LCFF is fully implemented, there is no plan for how Prop 98 funding increases will be allocated to schools.

A new model with an aspirational growth target is required to:

- Attain Prop 98's Constitutional promise
- Fund the new fixed costs

Other Increasing Fixed Costs Pressing on LCFF Base Funds:

- Costs linked to educational reforms such as, but not limited to: Common Core State Standards, Smarter Balanced Assessments, and Next Generation Science Standards
- Health care premiums
- Minimum wage increases as required by state and federal statutes
- Technology required to support new standards and assessments
- Class size reduction and related facility costs

Partner with us to mobilize education stakeholders toward aspirational funding of California schools.



Who We Are

The School Funding Coalition (SFC), formed in March 2013 when school districts across the state united around a common goal of increasing the LCFF's base grant.

The advocacy efforts of the SFC members were rewarded, as well as every district in California when the final LCFF legislation increased the base grant target allocation by \$500 per ADA. This was significantly higher than originally proposed.



What We Have Accomplished

Since 2013 member districts have been active participants in the legislative and regulatory process. Our efforts are having an impact:

- LCFF Base Grant Increase 2013 Successfully proposed and led an advocacy campaign which resulted in a \$500 per ADA increase in the base grant target.
- Economic Recovery Target 2013 Successfully proposed, advocated for, and saw implemented a hold harmless provision within the LCFF for districts who would have received less funding under the LCFF than the former funding system.
- Career Technical Education 2014 Convened a stakeholder group to develop legislation to establish a new and ongoing state and district funded CTE incentive grant program. In 2015, this legislation became the blueprint for the Governor's three year, \$900 million CTE Incentive Grant program. The SFC continues to work on this legislation to make it an ongoing program, as the Governor's plan will sunset in 2018.
- Erosion of LCFF Base Funding 2015 to current Initiated a statewide campaign to educate and illustrate how the increased cost of "must fund" expenditures, such as STRS/PERS, Special Education, and minimum wage are impacting local school budgets and eroding the purchasing power of LCFF base funding.

Aspirational Funding For a Post-LCFF Model

The SFC's work continues as the current LCFF model will soon be fully implemented and there is no specific plan as to how Prop 98 funding increases will be allocated to schools.

All school districts will need to work together to propose and support legislation that will establish a new aspirational funding target for the LCFF. **We invite you to partner with us in this critical initiative to build an aspirational LCFF funding target that will fund California schools commensurate with the top 10 states in the nation.**

The SFC has become a valuable resource for legislators, state departments and research organizations. Guided by its legislative advocates from School Services of California, the SFC works closely with policymakers and statewide education organizations to ensure its core message is being shared and supported.

Dear Legislator and Governor:

As a **<parent>** in the **Oak Park Unified School District**, I am writing to express my strong support for fully funding the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) now, and to urge that the *LCFF base grant funding levels be increased* once the current LCFF is fully funded.

In 1988, voters enacted Proposition 98, establishing a minimum funding level guarantee for public schools. *That law added* goals to the State Constitution:

- California would provide public schools with funding matching the top 10 states.
- Average class sizes would be equal to or lower than the average class size of the 10 states with the smallest class sizes.

In 2015-16, the top ten states spent \$20,909 per average daily attendance (ADA), while California spent \$11,357 per ADA*, a deficit of nearly \$10,000. *California is failing to fund education* commensurate with its status among the nation's wealthiest and most economically stable states.

We call on California policy makers **to establish an aspirational funding level** based on those top ten states and financed over time using the growth in Proposition 98 funds.

- An aspirational model ensures that Oak Park Unified School District can grow and enrich its "best, first instructional programs" to provide an exceptional education for ALL students.
- Increasing the base grant allows Oak Park Unified School District to keep pace with otherwise crippling growth in fixed costs: STRS/PERS; special education; new textbooks; health care; minimum wage; and other "must fund" expenditures.

We also support maintaining and increasing funding for existing high-quality Career Technical Education programs, and urge the Legislature and future governors to resist creating any new categorical programs.

For 4th grade classrooms: *This on-level collection contains texts on the broader topic of civil rights in the United States, including the women's suffrage movement as well as the 1960s civil rights movement. Including texts on a range of topics and reading levels, this collection includes broad surveys to provide students with an overview of the topic, as well as books on more specialized subtopics. In addition to straightforward expository nonfiction, you'll find picture books as well as several issues of Cobblestone magazine, which provide opportunities for cross-text synthesis.*

For 5th grade classrooms: *This on-level collection contains sets of books on debatable issues. For each issue, the selection of books offers different perspectives, encouraging students to remain open to multiple perspectives and to complexity.*

At Medea Creek Middle School, teachers have requested the addition of *Units of Study in Reading: Social Justice.* From the Teachers College Reading and Writing Project: *The topic of social issues, the lens for reading in this unit, is a topic that matters greatly to the young human beings who enter our classrooms every day. In middle school, many kinds of issues start to weigh more heavily on students: relationship issues, school issues, and a growing awareness of larger societal pressures. There can be serious consequences to the spiraling troubles that surround middle school kids.*

Memorandum of Understanding Between OPUSD and OPTA Regarding Retirement Incentive for the 2017-2018 School Year Under Article 26

Whereas the Oak Park Unified School District ("District") desires to recognize the contributions of longtime employees of the District, minimize reduction of newly hired staff and promote the cost savings that can potentially support future compensation increases, the following retirement incentive is agreed to for the 2017-2018 school year.

- 1. Eligibility requirement for participating in the retirement incentive:
 - a. Bargaining unit members must have attained the age of 55 by June 30, 2018.
 - b. Bargaining unit members must retire from the California Retirement System.
 - c. Bargaining unit members must have served a minimum of twelve (12) years of permanent employment with the Oak Park Unified School District.
 - d. Bargaining unit members must commit to retirement, and inform the District of their decision to retire no later than February 9, 2018.
- 2. Retirement Incentive for the 2017- 2018 school year:
 - a. Eligible permanent bargaining unit members may elect either a one-time cash incentive of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), <u>or</u>
 - b. A single HMO health benefits package, including vision and dental (at the prevailing District's rate for retirees), not to exceed \$10,000 annually, for up to five years, or until the retiree reaches his/her 65th birthday, whichever occurs first.
- 3. If an eligible permanent bargaining unit member selects the single HMO coverage, the amount of the premium for single health coverage (not to exceed \$10,000) will be paid by the District for up to five (5) years, or until the retiree attains the age of 65.
- 4. An eligible permanent bargaining unit member may elect to use the single HMO incentive as credit to either a dual or family plan (including any PPO plan offered by-the District), with any additional premium cost for such coverage being paid for by the retiree.
- 5. Eligible permanent part-time bargaining unit members will receive a pro-rated amount of the cash incentive, or the single HMO incentive based on their full-time equivalency percentage at the time of their retirement.

This Memorandum of Understanding will be in force until June 30, 2018, unless extended by mutual agreement between the Association and the District.

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Title I Program Improvement Schools

The Governing Board is committed to enabling all district students to meet state academic achievement standards and to narrowing the achievement gap among student groups. To that end, the district shall provide support and assistance to increase student achievement in any school that receives federal Title I funding and has been identified by the California Department of Education as a program improvement (PI) school.

(cf. 6011 - Academic Standards) (cf. 6162.5 - Student Assessment) (cf. 6162.51 - State Academic Achievement Tests) (cf. 6171 - Title I Programs)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that school improvement strategies developed for any PI school are coordinated, aligned, and effectively implemented in accordance with administrative regulation and the Board-approved school improvement plan.

As necessary, the Board shall determine corrective actions for schools in Year 3 of PI and/or restructuring options for schools in Year 4 of PI or beyond.

Whenever a school is identified for Year 4 PI but is not identified as a "persistently lowest achieving school" pursuant to Education Code 53201, the parents/guardians of students attending that school may petition the Board to implement an intervention for the purpose of improving academic achievement or student safety, provided that the state limit on the number of such schools has not yet been reached. To be considered by the Board, the petition shall contain all required content and signatures and specify one of four intervention models (i.e., turnaround model, restart model, school closure, or transformation model) or an alternative governance arrangement, as described in 5 CCR 4803-4807. The district shall implement the option requested by the parents/guardians unless, at a regularly scheduled public hearing, the Board makes a finding in writing stating the reason it cannot implement the recommended option and instead designates one of the other options to be implemented. (Education Code 53300-53303; 5 CCR 4800-4808)

Program Evaluation

The Superintendent or designee shall develop an annual report card that includes the information

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specified in 20 USC 6311 for each district school and for the district as a whole. The required information may be incorporated into each school's school accountability report card. (20 USC 6311)

The report card shall be concise, presented in an understandable and uniform format and, to the extent practicable, in a language that parents/guardians can understand. It shall be made accessible to the public on the district's web site. (20 USC 6311)

As necessary based on the results of this evaluation, the Board may require the Superintendent or designee to review and revise any of the school's reform plans, including the school's Single Plan for Student Achievement, allocate additional resources toward the implementation of the plan, and/or require more frequent monitoring of the school's progress in order to raise student achievement.

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Title I Program Improvement Schools

Year 1 Program Improvement

For any district school in its first year of program improvement (PI), the Superintendent or designee shall implement a school improvement plan that was approved by the Governing Board.

(cf. 6171 Title I Programs)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the school receives technical assistance from the district, California Department of Education (CDE), an institution of higher education, a private organization, an educational service agency or another entity with experience in helping schools improve academic achievement, including assistance in:

- 1. Analyzing data from state assessments and other examples of student work to identify and address problems in instruction and/or problems in implementing Title I requirements pertaining to parent involvement, professional development, or school and district responsibilities identified in the school plan
- 2. Identifying and implementing professional development, instructional strategies and methods of instruction that are derived from scientifically based research and that have proven effective in addressing the specific instructional issues that caused the school to be identified for PI
- Analyzing and revising the school's budget so that the school's resources are more effectively allocated to the activities most likely to increase student achievement and remove the school from PI status

(cf. 3100 - Budget)

Year 2 Program Improvement

For any district school in its second year of PI, the Superintendent or designee shall continue to implement the school improvement plan and to provide for technical assistance in accordance with the section "Year 1 Program Improvement" above.

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall arrange for the provision of alternative supports to eligible students from low-income families, as described below in the section "Alternative Supports."

Year 3 Program Improvement: Corrective Action

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After the second full school year after identification for PI, the Superintendent or designee shall continue to implement all elements of Year 1 and Year 2 PI specified above, as well as the corrective action(s) determined by the Board, which may include:

1. Replacing school staff relevant to the failure

(cf. 4113 Assignment) (cf. 4114 Transfers) (cf. 4314 Transfers)

2. Implementing a new curriculum and related professional development

(cf. 4131 Staff Development) (cf. 4231 Staff Development) (cf. 4331 - Staff Development) (cf. 6141 - Curriculum Development and Evaluation)

3. Significantly decreasing management authority at the school level

4. Appointing an outside expert to advise the school

5. Extending the school year or school day for the school

(cf. 6111 - School Calendar) (cf. 6112 - School Day)

6. Restructuring the internal organization of the school

Year 4 Program Improvement and Beyond: Restructuring

For any school in Year 4 of PI or beyond, the Superintendent or designee shall continue to implement all elements of Year 1 and Year 2 PI specified above, as well as one of the following options for alternative governance and restructuring, as determined by the Board:

1. Reopening the school as a charter school

2. Replacing all or most of the school staff relevant to the failure

3. Entering into a contract with an entity with a demonstrated record of effectiveness to operate the school

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4. Turning the operation of the school over to the CDE

5. Instituting any other major restructuring of the school's governance arrangements that makes fundamental reforms

Alternative Supports

In any school identified for Year 2 PI or beyond, eligible students from low-income families shall be offered district-selected alternative supports designed to improve their academic achievement. Alternative supports may include, but are not limited to, any of the following:

1. Academic support offered during school hours, before school, after school, during intercession, and/or during summer learning programs

(cf. 5148.2 Before/After School Programs) (cf. 6176 - Weekend/Saturday Classes) (cf. 6177 - Summer Learning Programs) (cf. 6179 Supplemental Instruction)

2. Small group instruction and/or pull-out interventions offered during the regular school day

3. Interventions offered during After School Education and Safety or 21st Century Community Learning Center programs

4. High quality academic tutoring

5. Provision of supplemental materials that support alternative support services

6. Provision of a crisis, intervention, and/or academic counselor to meet with eligible students

7. Services and programs that remove barriers to promote academic achievement of eligible students

The types of alternative supports and the criteria used to identify eligible students may be included in the district's local control and accountability plan and shall be consistent and aligned with local priorities.

(cf. 0460 Local Control and Accountability Plan)

If the district contracts with outside entities or community partners to provide alternative supports to eligible students, the Superintendent or designee shall ensure that no electronic

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device or other items of value are given, retained, or used as an incentive or achievement award and that funds are expended only on direct services to eligible students.

The district shall set aside a reasonable amount of Title I, Part A funds for alternative supports. Whenever the district does not have sufficient funds to serve all eligible students, it may give priority to the lowest achieving PI schools or the lowest achieving eligible students attending a PI school. The Superintendent or designee may identify the lowest achieving eligible students based on assessment scores, grades, teacher evaluations, or another locally defined measure.

Material regarding the appointment of the district advisory committee expanded to specify the circumstances under which the district is not required to appoint a committee, including the exception for the sale, lease, or rental of excess property to be used for teacher or other employee housing pursuant to NEW LAW (AB 1157, 2017). Policy expands section on "Use of Proceeds" to reflect additional legal requirements, and deletes the authority (repealed) to use the proceeds from the sale of surplus property for any one-time general fund purpose provided that the district adopted a plan and made certain certifications to the State Allocation Board.
- ALTERNATIVES: 1. Approve the amendment to Board Policy 3280 Sale or Lease of District-Owned Real Property.
 - 2. Do not amend Board Policy 3280 Sale or Lease of District-Owned Real Property.

Sale or Lease of District-Owned Real Property

The Governing Board believes that the district should utilize its facilities and resources should be utilized in the most an economical and practical manner. The Superintendent or designee shall periodically study the current and projected use of all district facilities in order to ensure the efficient utilization of space and for the effective delivery of instruction.

(cf. 1330 – Use of School Facilities) (cf. 7110 – Facilities Master Plan) (cf. 7111 – Evaluating Existing Buildings) (cf. 7160 - Charter School Facilities)

Prior to the sale or lease of any surplus real property, tThe Board shall appoint a district advisory committee prior to the sale or lease of any surplus real property to advise the Board in-regarding the use or disposition of schools or school building space which is not needed for school purposes. (Education Code 17388) Rentals of surplus property not exceeding 30 days are exempted from this requirement. When the sale, lease, or rental of surplus property is for the purpose of teacher or other employee housing or for the offering of summer school by a private educational institution, the Board may elect not to appoint a district advisory committee. (Education Code 17387-17391)

Upon determination-If the local planning agency has adopted a general plan that district-affects or includes the area where the surplus property is no longer needed, or may not be needed until some future time located, the Board shall first-submit a report to the local planning agency as to what real-describing the location of the surplus property the district intends to offer for and the purpose and extent of the proposed sale or lease. Not less than 40 days after issuance of the report to the local planning agency, and prior to entering into any agreement for sale or lease of district real property, the Board shall offer to sell or lease district-owned real property in accordance with priorities and procedures specified in applicable law. (Education 17230, 17387-17391, 17457.5, 17464, 17485-17500, Government Code 54222, 65402) (Government Code 65402)

The Board shall determine whether the sale or lease of the surplus property, is subject to review under the California Environmental Quality Act. (Public Resources Code 21000-21177; 14 CCR 15061-15062)

When selling or leasing district real property, the Board shall comply with the priorities and procedures specified in applicable law. (Education Code 17230, 17464, 17485-17499; Government Code 54222)

In addition, when selling real property purchased, constructed, or modernized with funds received within the past 10 years from a state school facilities funding program, the Board shall consider whether any of the proceeds from the sale will need to be returned to the State Allocation Board (SAB) pursuant to Education Code 17462.3.

Resolution of Intention to Sell or Lease

Before ordering the sale or lease of any real property, the Board shall adopt a resolution by a two-thirds vote of all of its members at a regularly scheduled open meeting. The resolution shall describe the property proposed to be sold or leased in such a manner as to identify it, specify the minimum price or rent, describe the terms upon which it will be sold or leased, and specify the commission or rate, if any, which the Board will pay to a licensed real estate broker out of the minimum price or rent. The resolution shall fix a time, not less than three weeks thereafter, for a public meeting, held at the Board's regular meeting place, at which sealed proposals to purchase or lease will be received and considered. (Education Code 17466)

The Superintendent or designee shall provide notice of the adoption of the resolution and of the time and place of the meeting that will be held to consider bids by posting copies of the resolution, signed by the Board, in three public places not less than 15 days before the date of the meeting. In addition, the notice shall be published at least once a week for three successive weeks before the meeting, in a newspaper of general circulation published in the county in which the district is located, if such a newspaper exists. (Education Code 17469)

In accordance with Education Code 17470, the Superintendent or designee shall take reasonable steps to provide notification to the former owners of the property of the district's intent to sell it.

Acceptance/Rejection of Bids

At a public meeting specified in the resolution of intention to sell or lease property, the Board shall open, examine, and declare all sealed bids. Before accepting any written proposal, the Board shall call for oral bids in accordance with law. (Education Code 17472, 17473)

The Board may reject any and all bids, either written or oral, and withdraw the properties from sale when the Board determines that rejection is in the best public interest. If no proposals are submitted or the submitted proposals do not conform to all the terms and conditions specified in the resolution of intention to lease, the Board may lease the property in accordance with Education Code 17477 (Education Code 17476, 17477)

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Business and Non-Instructional Operations

BP 3280(c)

Of the proposals submitted by responsible bidders which conform to all terms and conditions specified in the resolution of intention to sell or lease, the Board shall finally accept the highest bid after deducting the commission, if any, to be paid to a licensed real estate broker, unless the Board accepts a higher oral bid or rejects all bids. (Education Code 17472)

The final acceptance of the bid may be made either at the same meeting specified in the resolution or at any adjourned/continued meeting held within 10 days. Upon acceptance of the bid, the Board may adopt a resolution of acceptance that directs the Board president, or any other Board member, to execute the deed or lease and to deliver the document upon performance and compliance by the successful bidder of all the terms and conditions of the contract. (Education Code 17475-17478)

Use of Proceeds

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the proceeds from the sale or lease with an option to purchase of surplus district surplus property are used in accordance with law. for one-time expenditures and not for ongoing expenditures such as salaries and general operating expenses. Pursuant to the authorization in Education Code 17463.7, the district may expend proceeds from the sale of surplus real property, along with the proceeds from any personal property located on that real property, for any one-time general fund purpose(s). 1. The Board shall submit documents to the SAB certifying that:

- a. The district has no major deferred maintenance requirements not covered by existing capital outlay resources.

b. The sale of real property pursuant to Education Code 17463.7 does not violate the provisions of a local bond act.

- c. The real property is not suitable to meet projected school construction needs for the next 10 years.

Proceeds from the sale or lease with option to purchase of district property may also be deposited in a special reserve fund for capital outlay or maintenance costs of district property that the Board determines will not recur within a five-year period. Chronic Absence Aand Truancy

The Governing Board believes that excessive student absenteeism, whatever the cause-and tardiness, whether caused by excused or unexcused absences, may be an early warning sign of poor academic achievement and may put students at risk of dropping out of school. The Board desires to ensure that all students attend school in accordance with the state¹²s compulsory education law and take full advantage of educational opportunities provided by the district.

(cf. 5113 - Absences and Excuses) (cf. 5113.11 - Attendance Supervision)

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a system to accurately track student attendance; in order to identify individual students who are chronic absentees and truants, as defined in law and administrative regulation, and to identify patterns of absence throughout the district. -He/she shall provide the Board with data on school attendance, chronic absence, and truancy rates districtwidefor all district students, for each school, and disaggregated for each numerically significant student subgroup as defined in Education Code 52052. Such data shall be disaggregated and used in the development of annual goals and specific actions for student attendance and engagement to be includedand for inclusion in the district'a local control and accountability plan and other applicable school and district plans.

The Superintendent or designee shall develop strategies that focus on prevention of attendance problems, which may include, but are not limited to, efforts to provide a safe and positive school environment, relevant and engaging learning experiences, school activities that help develop students'² feelings of connectedness with the school, schools, and school-based health services, and incentives and rewards to recognize schools who that achieve excellent attendance or demonstrate significant improvement in attendance. The Superintendent or designee also shall develop strategies that enable early outreach to students as soon as they show signs of poor attendance.

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The Superintendent or designee shall consultwork with students, parents/guardians, school staff, and community agencies, as appropriate, to identify factors contributing to chronic absence and truancy.

Interventions for students with serious attendance problems shall be designed to meet the specific needs of the student and may include, but are not limited to, health care referrals, transportation assistance, counseling for mental or emotional difficulties, academic supports, efforts to address school or community safety concerns, discussions with the student and parent/guardian about their attitudes regarding schooling, or other strategies to remove identified barriers to school attendance. The Superintendent or designee He/she may collaborate with child welfare services, law enforcement, courts, public health care agencies, other government agencies, and/or medical, mental health, and oral health care providers to makeensure that alternative educational programs and nutrition, health care, and other support services are available for students and families and to intervene as necessary when students have serious attendance problems.

Students who are identified as truants shall be subject to the interventions specified in law and administrative regulation.

A student'²s truancy, tardiness, or other absence from school shall not be the sole basis for his/her out-of-school suspension or expulsion. -Alternative disciplinary strategies and positive reinforcement for attendance shall be used whenever possible.

(cf. 5144 -- Discipline) (cf. (cf. 5144.1 -- Suspension and Expulsion/Due Process)

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The Superintendent or designee shall periodically report to the Board regarding the district'²s progress in improving student attendance rates for all students and for each numerically significant student population. -Such information shall be used to evaluate the effectiveness of strategies implemented to reduce chronic absence and truancy and to make changes as needed. As appropriate, the Superintendent or designee also shall engage school staff in program evaluation and improvement and in the determinationidentification of how to best allocate available community resources.

School Attendance Review Board

In accordance with law and administrative regulation, habitual truants may be referred to a school attendance review board (SARB).

The Board may submit a nomination to the County Superintendent of Schools for a person who will serve on the county SARB as a representative of school districts. (Education Code 48321)

The Superintendent shall appoint members of the district's SARB/SART, who may include, but are not limited to, a parent/guardian as well as representatives of the district, teachers, administrators, county probation department, county welfare department, county office of education, law enforcement agencies, community-based youth service centers, school guidance personnel, child welfare and attendance personnel, school or county health care personnel, school, county, or community mental health personnel, and the county public defender's office. (Education Code 48321)

Chronic Absence Aand Truancy

Definitions

Chronic absentee means a student who is absent for any reason on 10 percent or more of the school days in the school year, when the total number of days the student is absent is divided by the total number of days the student is enrolled and school was actually taught in the regular schools of the district, exclusive of Saturdays and Sundays. (Education Code 60901)

Truant means a student who is absent from school without a valid excuse three full days in one school year, or tardy or absent for more than any 30-minute period during the school day without a valid excuse on three occasions in one school year, or any combination thereof. (Education Code 48260)

Habitual truant means a student who has been reported as a truant three or more times within the same school year, provided the district has made a conscientious effort to hold at least one conference with the student and his/her parent/guardian after either of the two previous reports. (Education Code 48262, 48264.5)

Chronic truant means a student who has been absent from school without a valid excuse for 10 percent or more of the school days in one school year, from the date of enrollment to the current date, provided the district has met the requirements of Education Code 48260, 48260.5, 48261, 48262, 48263 and 48291. (Education Code 48263.6)

For purposes of classifying a student as a truant, valid excuse includes, but is not limited to, the reasons for which a student shall be excused from school pursuant to Education Code 48205 and 48225.5. A valid excuse-also may include other reasons that are within the discretion of school administrators and, based on the facts of the student'2s circumstances, are deemed to constitute a valid excuse. (Education Code 48260)

Addressing Chronic Absence

When a student is identified as a chronic absentee, the Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor shall communicate with the student and his/her parents/guardian to determine the reason(s) for the excessive absences, ensure the student and parents/guardian are aware of the adverse consequences of poor attendance, and jointly develop a plan for improving the student's school attendance.

Addressing Truancy

An attendance supervisor or designee, peace officer, probation officer, or school administrator or

designee may, as applicable, arrest or assume temporary custody during school hours of any minor student found away from his/her home who is absent from school without a valid excuse. Any person arresting or assuming temporary custody of a minor student shall deliver the student and make reports in accordance with Education Code 48265 and 48266. (Education Code 48264, 48265, 48266)

The Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor shall investigate a complaint from any person that a parent/guardian has violated the state compulsory education laws contained in Education Code 48200-48341. (Education Code 48290)

When a student has been identified as a truant, as defined above, the following steps shall be implemented based on the number of truancies he/she has committed:

1. -Initial truancy

a. The A student who is initially classified as truant shall be reported to the Superintendent or designee. attendance supervisor. (Education Code 48260)

b. -The student's parent/guardian shall be notified by the most cost-effective method possible, which may include email or a telephone call, that: (Education Code 48260.5)

(1) - The student is truant.

(2) -The parent/guardian is obligated to compel the student to attend school. If the parent/guardian fails to meet this obligation, he/she may be guilty of an infraction of the law and subject to prosecution pursuant to Education Code 48290-48296.

(3) -Alternative educational programs are available in the district.

(4) -The parent/guardian has the right to meet with appropriate school personnel to discuss solutions to the student's truancy.

(5) -The student may be subject to arrest or held in temporary custody by a probation officer, a peace officer, a school administrator or designee, or attendance supervisor or his/her designee pursuant tounder Education Code 48264 if found away from home and absent from school without a valid excuse.

(6) -The student may be subject to suspension, restriction, or delay of his/her driving

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privilege pursuant to Vehicle Code 13202.7.

(7) -It is recommended that the parent/guardian accompany the student to school and attend classes with the student for one day.

c. -The student may be required to attend makeup classes on one day of a weekend pursuant to Education Code 37223. (Education Code 48264.5)

d. -The student and, as appropriate, his/her parent/guardian may be requested to attend a meeting with a school counselor or other school designee to discuss the root causes of the attendance issue and develop a joint plan to improve the student'2s attendance. (Education Code 48264.5)

e. -The Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor may notify the district attorney and/or probation officer of the student'-s name and the name and address of his/her the student's parents/guardians. (Education Code 48260.6)

2. -Second truancy

a. -Any student who has once been reported as a truant shall again be reported to the Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor as a truant if he/she is absent from school without a valid excuse one or more days or is tardy on one or more days during the school year. - (Education Code 48261)

b. -The student may be required to attend makeup classes on one day of a weekend pursuant to Education Code 37223. (Education Code 48264.5)

c. -The student may be assigned to an after-school or weekend study program within the county. If the student fails to successfully complete this study program, he/she shall be subject to item #3 below. (Education Code 48264.5)

d. -An appropriate district staff member shall make a conscientious effort to hold at least one conference with the student and his/her parent/guardian by communicating with the parent/guardian at least once using the most cost-effective method possible, which may include email or a telephone call. (Education Code 48262)

e. -The student may be given a written warning by a peace officer.- A record of that warning may be kept at the school for not less than two years or until the student graduates or

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transfers from the school. -If the student transfers, the record may be forwarded to the new school. (Education Code 48264.5)

f. -The Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor may notify the district attorney and/or probation officer when the student continues to be classified as a truant after the parents/guardians have been notified in accordance with item #1b above. (Education Code 48260.6)

3. -Third truancy (habitual truancy)

a. -A student who is habitually truant, irregular in school attendance, or habitually insubordinate or disorderly during attendance at school may be referred to, and required to attend, a school attendance review board (SARB) program, a truancy mediation program established by the district attorney or the probation officer, or a comparable program deemed acceptable by the Superintendent or designee. district's attendance supervisor. (Education Code 48263, 48264.5)

b. -Upon making a referral to the SARB or the probation department, the Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor shall provide the student and parent/guardian, in writing, the name and address of the SARB or probation department and the reason for the referral. This notice shall indicate that the student and parent/guardian shall be required, along with the district staff person making the referral, to meet with the SARB or a probation officer to consider a proper disposition of the referral. (Education Code 48263)

c. -If the student does not successfully complete the truancy mediation program or other similar program, he/she shall be subject to item #4 below. (Education Code 48264.5)

d. -If the Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor determines that available community services cannot resolve the problem of the truant or insubordinate student or if the student and/or his/herstudent's parents/guardians have failed to respond to the directives of the district or to services provided, the Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor may so notify the district attorney and/or the probation officer. (Education Code 48263)

4. -Fourth truancy

a. -Upon his/her fourth truancy within the same school year, the student may be referred to the jurisdiction of the juvenile court. (Education Code 48264.5; Welfare and Institutions Code 601)

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b. -If a student has been adjudged by the county juvenile court to be a habitual truant, the Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor shall notify the juvenile court and the student's probation or parole officer whenever the student is truant or tardy on one or more days without a valid excuse in the same or succeeding school year, or is habitually insubordinate or disorderly at school. The juvenile court and probation or parole officer shall be notified within 10 days of the violation. (Education Code 48267)

5. Chronic truancy (unexcused Aabsence for 10 percent of school days) (chronic truancy)

a. -The Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor shall ensure that the student's parents/guardians are offered language-accessible support services to address the student's truancy.

b. -If a chronically truant student is at least age six6 years and is in any of grades K-8, the Superintendent or designeeattendance supervisor shall notify the student'2's parents/guardians that failure to reasonably supervise and encourage the student's school attendance may result in the parent/guardian being found guilty of a misdemeanor pursuant to Penal Code 270.1.

Records

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain accurate attendance records for students identified as habitual or chronic truants. The Superintendent or designee also shall document all contacts with a student and his/her parent/guardian regarding the student's attendance, including a summary of all conversations and a record of all intervention efforts.-

The Superintendent or designee shall gather and transmit to the County Superintendent of Schools the number and types of referrals made to the SARB and of requests for petitions made to the juvenile court. (Education Code 48273)

The Superintendent or designee shall appoint an attendance supervisor and any assistant attendance supervisor(s) as may be necessary to supervise the attendance of district students. (Education Code 48240)

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any person appointed as an attendance supervisor has been certificated for the work by the County Board of Education. (Education Code 48241, 48245)

Such supervisors shall perform duties related to compulsory full-time education, truancy, compulsory continuation education, work permits, and any additional duties prescribed by the Superintendent or designee. (Education Code 48240)

ISSUE: Should the Board of Education approve the proposed amendment to Administrative Regulation 6112 – School Day?

- BACKGROUND: Regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 99, 2017) which permits districts to maintain kindergarten or transitional kindergarten classes for different lengths of time during the school day, either at the same or different school sites. Regulation also reflects provision of AB 99 which allows districts to schedule classes in an early college high school or middle college high school so that students attend classes for at least 900 minutes during any five school day period or 1,800 minutes during any 10 school day period. Administrative Regulation 6112 is being submitted with recommended changes from CSBA.
- ALTERNATIVES: 1. Approve the amendment to Administrative Regulation 6112 School Day.
 - 2. Do not amend Administrative Regulation 6112 School Day.

Kindergarten/Transitional Kindergarten

The minimum school day for kindergarten students shall be 180 minutes, excluding noon intermissions but including recesses. (Education Code 46115, 46117)

The maximum school day for kindergarten students shall be four hours (240 minutes) excluding recesses. (Education Code 46111)

Kindergarten and transitional kindergarten (TK) classes in district schools may be maintained for different lengths of time, either at the same or different school sites. (Education Code 37202)

Except as otherwise permitted by law, the average school day established for kindergarten and TK students shall be at least three hours, including recesses but excluding noon intermissions, but no longer than four hours, excluding recesses. (Education Code 46111, 46114, 46115, 46117)

Recess may be counted as instructional minutes for purposes of determining the maximum school day if it occurs under teacher supervision.

The maximum school day for kindergarten students may be longer than four hours under the following circumstances:

1. The maximum school day for multitrack year-round schools operating pursuant to Education Code 37670(a) shall be 265 minutes excluding recesses. (Education Code 46111)

2. The kindergarten school day may exceed four hours if the district has established In any district school operating an early primary program pursuant to Education Code 8970-8974, the kindergarten school day may exceed four hours, excluding recess, if both of the following conditions are met: and meets the following conditions: (Education Code 8973)

a.1. The Governing Board has declareds that the extended-day kindergarten program does not exceed the length of the primary school day.

b.2. The extended-day kindergarten program includes ample opportunity for both active and quiet activities within an integrated, experiential and developmentally appropriate educational program.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the California Department of Education

as to whether the district's kindergarten and TK programs are offered full day, part day, or both. (Education Code 48003)

Elementary Schools

Grades 1-8

Except as otherwise provided by law, the school day for elementary and middle school students shall be:

The minimum school day for students in elementary schools shall be:

1. At least 230 minutes for students in grades 1-3 through 3 unless the Board has prescribed a shorter school day because of lack of school facilities requiring double sessions, in which case the minimum school day shall be 200 minutes (Education Code 46112)

2. At least 240 minutes for students in grades 4-8 through-8 (Education Code 46113, 46142)

In determining the number of minutes for purposes of compliance with **the minimum school day F**for students in grades 1-8, through 8, the minimum school day excludes both noon intermissions and recesses shall be excluded. (Education Code 46115)

The above minimum days do not apply to situations in grades 1 through 3 in which the Board has prescribed a shorter school day because of lack of school facilities requiring double sessions. (Education Code 46112, 46113)

Secondary Schools

Grades 9-12

The minimum school day for junior high and high school students shall be 240 minutes unless otherwise provided by law. The school day for students in grades 9-12 shall be at least 240 minutes. (Education Code 46141-46147)

The minimum school day shall be 180 minutes for students enrolled in a continuation high school, continuation education classes, opportunity school or classes, adult education classes, special day or Saturday vocational training program, or specified work experience program. (Education Code 46144, 46170, 46180, 46190)

However, the school day may be less than 240 minutes when authorized by law. Programs that have a minimum school day of 180 minutes include, but are not necessarily limited to:

1. Continuation high school or classes (Education Code 46141, 46170)

2. Work experience education program approved pursuant to Education Code 51760-51769.5 (Education Code 46141, 46144)

The Board may authorize any student to attend fewer school days per week than scheduled as long as the student attends classes for at least 1,200 minutes during any five school days. (Education Code 46160)

A student in grade 12 who is enrolled in work experience education and is in his/her last semester or quarter before graduation may be permitted to attend school for less than 180 minutes per school day if he/she would complete all requirements for graduation, except physical education courses, in less than 180 minutes each day. (Education Code 46147)

Transitional Kindergarten

The Governing Board desires to offer a high-quality transitional kindergarten (TK) program for eligible children who do not yet meet the minimum age criterion for kindergarten. The TK program shall assist TK childrenstudents in developing the academic, social, and emotional skills they need to succeed in kindergarten and beyond.

The district's TK program shall be the first year of a two-year kindergarten program. (Education Code 48000)

The Board encourages ongoing collaboration among district preschool staff, other preschool providers, elementary teachers, administrators, and parents/guardians in program the development, implementation, and evaluation of the district's TK program.

(cf. 1220 - Citizen Advisory Committees) (cf. 6020 - Parent Involvement)

Eligibility

The district's TK program shall admit children whose fifth birthday is from September 2 through December 2. (Education Code 48000)

Immunizations

Parents/guardians of eligible children shall be notified of the availability of the TK program and the age, residency, immunization, and any other enrollment requirements. Enrollment in the TK program shall be voluntary.

Upon request of a child's parents/guardians, the district may, on a case-by-case basis after the Superintendent or designee determines that it is in the child's best interest, admit into the district's TK program a child whose fifth birthday is on or before September 1 and who is therefore eligible for kindergarten.

At any time during the school year, T the district may admit into the TK program a child

whose fifth birthday is after December 2 of that same school year, provided that the child is admitted during the school year on or after his/her fifth birthday and the Superintendent or designee recommends that enrollment in a TK program is in the child's best interest- and the child's parents/guardians approve. Prior to such enrollment, the child's parents/guardians shall be provided information regarding the advantages and disadvantages and any other explanatory information about the effect of early admittance. (Education Code 48000)

Curriculum and Instruction

The district's TK program shall be based on a modified kindergarten curriculum that is age and developmentally appropriate. (Education Code 48000)

(cf. 6141 - Curriculum Development and Evaluation) (cf. 6161.1 - Selection and Evaluation of Instructional Materials)

The program shall be aligned with the preschool learning foundations and preschool curriculum frameworks developed by the California Department of Education. It shall be designed to facilitate students' development in essential skills related to language and literacy, mathematics, physical development, health, visual and performing arts, science, history-social science, English language development, and social-emotional development.

(cf. 5148.3 - Preschool/Early Childhood Education) (cf. 6011 - Academic Standards) (cf. 6174 - Education for English Language Learners)

The Board shall fixestablish the length(s) of the school day in the district's TK program, which shall be. TK programs may be maintained for different lengths of time either at the same or different school sites, as long as the school day is at least three hours but no more than four hours. The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the California Department of Education as to whether the district's TK programs are offered full day, part day, or both. (Education Code 37202, 46111, 46117, 48003)

TK assignments are subject to assignment monitoring and reporting by the County-Superintendent of Schools in accordance with Education Code 44258.9.

Staffing

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that teachers assigned to teach in TK classes possess a teaching credential or permit from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC) that authorizes such instruction.

A credentialed teacher who is first assigned to a TK class after July 1, 2015, shall, by August 1, 2020, have at least 24 units in early childhood education and/or child development, comparable experience in a preschool setting, and/or a child development teacher permit issued by the CTC. (Education Code 48000)

The Superintendent or designee may provide professional development as needed to ensure that TK teachers are knowledgeable about the standards and effective instructional methods for teaching young children.

(cf. 4131 - Staff Development)

Continuation to Kindergarten

Students who complete the TK program shall be eligible to continue in kindergarten the following school year. Parents/guardians of such students shall not be required to submit a signed Kindergarten Continuance Form for kindergarten attendance.

However, whenever children who would otherwise be age-eligible for kindergarten are enrolled in TK, the Superintendent or designee shall obtain a Kindergarten Continuance Form signed by the parent/guardian near the end of the TK year consenting to the child's enrollment in kindergarten the following year.

A student shall not attend more than two years in a combination of TK and kindergarten. (Education Code 46300)

The Superintendent or designee may develop or identify appropriate formal and/or informal assessments of TK students' development and progress. He/she shall monitor and regularly report to the Board regarding program implementation and the progress of students in meeting related academic standards.

They first learned from experts working with the Red Cross about the importance of blood and how having an emergency blood supply saves many lives.
