a. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 1431 - Waivers - First Reading

Board policy updated to add the requirement, when submitting a general waiver request to the State Board of Education, to include a written summary of any objections to the request by school site councils or advisory committees, as applicable. Policy adds the requirement that a request pertaining to a regional occupational center or program operated by a joint powers agency be submitted as a joint waiver request with other participating districts. Policy reflects guidance in CDE's General Waiver Instructions regarding proper notice for a public hearing on a waiver request proposal.

b. Approve Amendment to Board Policy 3600 – Consultants – First Reading
Board Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 5) which codifies a three-part test, established in
Dynamex Operations West Inc. v. Superior Court of Los Angeles, to determine whether a person
providing services for remuneration should be classified as an employee or an independent
contractor. Policy also updates the statement on nondiscrimination to include additional
protected categories, and reflects law regarding harassment of or by an independent contractor.

c. <u>Approve Amendment to Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 5116.1 – Intradistrict Open Enrollment – First Reading</u>

Board Policy and regulation updated to delete material related to transfers under the state Open Enrollment Act and federal Program Improvement, as those programs are no longer operational. Policy also reflects NEW LAW (AB 1127) which requires districts to approve an intradistrict transfer request for a student who is a victim of bullying, as defined. Optional item added for districts electing to offer intradistrict transfers to all students in a school identified by the California Department of Education (CDE) for comprehensive support and improvement (CSI), in which case priority must be given to the lowest achieving students from low-income families. Regulation revised to clarify timelines for transfers out of schools identified by CDE as "persistently dangerous." For districts that offer transfers out of CSI schools, regulation allows a transfer student the opportunity to remain in the school of enrollment until completing the highest grade offered at that school.

d. <u>Approve Amendment to Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 5117 – Interdistrict Attendance– First Reading</u>

Board Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 1127) which requires districts to provide transportation assistance to transfer students who are victims of bullying or are children of active duty military parents/guardians, if they are also eligible for free or reduced-priced meals. Regulation updated to reflect provisions of AB 1127 which (1) prohibit consideration of specified characteristics when selecting students for transfer who are victims of bullying or children of active duty military parents/guardians and (2) require a district to accept a transfer out of the district for a victim of bullying if the district has only one school offering the student's grade level.

e. <u>Approve Amendment to Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 5131.2 – Bullying – First Reading</u>

Board Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 1127) which requires a district to approve an intradistrict transfer request for a victim of bullying and, if the district does not have another school with the same grade level, allows a victim of bullying to transfer out of the district. Regulation updated to reflect NEW LAW (AB 34) which requires districts to make specified information on bullying and harassment prevention readily accessible on their web sites beginning in the 2020-21 school year.

- f. Approve Amendment to Board Policy and Administrative Regulation 5141.21 Administering Medication and Monitoring Health Conditions First Reading

 Board Policy updated to reflect NEW LAW (SB 223) which authorizes the board to adopt policy whether to allow a parent/guardian, but not school personnel, to administer medicinal cannabis in a nonsmokeable, nonvapeable form at a school site to a student who is a qualified patient. Policy explains the conflict between state and federal law and provides options for districts to authorize or not authorize administration of medicinal cannabis at a school site. Regulation reflects NEW LAW (AB 743) which requires districts to accept a physician statement for inhaled asthma medication from a health plan operating under the laws of Mexico that is licensed in California.

STUDENT TEACHING AND PRACTICUM AGREEMENT

This agreement, effective on February 7, 2020, made by and between National University, a California non-profit public benefit corporation (the "University") and Oak Park Unified School District, a public entity (the "District"), with reference to the following facts:

ARTICLE 1 RECITALS

- 1.1 Section 35160 of the California Education Code provides that the governing board of any school district may initiate and carry on any program or activity, or may otherwise act in any manner which is not in conflict with, or inconsistent with, or pre-empted by, any law and which is not in conflict with the purposes for which school districts are established.
- 1.2 An agreement by a school district to provide student teaching or practicum experience to students enrolled in an education credential program offered by an institution of higher education approved by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (the "Commission") is not inconsistent with the purposes for which schools districts are established.
- 1.3 The University is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges, and its education credential programs have been approved by the Commission.
- 1.4 The University desires that the District provide student teaching to students enrolled in the University's teacher training curricula and/or practicum experience to students enrolled in the University's student counseling and other credential curricula. The District agrees to provide such student teaching and/or practicum experience on the terms and conditions specified in this Agreement.

ARTICLES 2 DEFINITIONS

- 2.1 "Student" shall refer to a student enrolled in a program at the University which is approved by the commission and which leads to an education credential
- 2.2 "Master Teacher" shall refer to an employee of the District holding a valid, clear teaching credential issued by the Commission typically with three or more years teaching experience.
- 2.3 "Student Teaching" shall refer to the active participation by a Student in the duties and functions of classroom teaching under the direct supervision and instruction of one or more Master Teachers.

- 2.4 "Student Teaching Assignment" shall typically refer to a full day of Student Teaching, five days a week for 12 to 18 weeks, dependent upon program. Student Teaching Assignments shall satisfy all requirements of the Commission.
- 2.5 "Practicum Supervisor" shall refer to an employee of the District holding a valid Pupil Personnel Services or other credential issued by the Commission or equivalent certification recognized by the District typically with three or more years experience as a school counselor, school psychologist, school social worker, or other education specialist.
- 2.6 "Practicum" shall refer to the participation by a Student in the duties and functions of a school counselor, school psychologist, school social worker, or school attendance worker under the direct supervision and instruction of one or more Practicum Supervisors.
- 2.7 "Practicum Assignment" shall consist of between 90 and 600 hours of Practicum depending upon the specific program requirements.
- 2.8 "Quarter Unit" shall refer to the amount of academic credit earned by a Student through the successful completion as determined by the University of approximately 25 hours of Student Teaching or between 20 to 40 hours of Practicum.
- 2.9 School Site-employed supervisors must complete an orientation to the program's expectations to be knowledgeable regarding program curriculum and assessments, including the TPEs and the California Teaching Performance Assessment (CAL TPA). School Site employed supervisors are required to complete a minimum of 10 hours of initial orientation provided through National University on the program curriculum, effective supervision approaches such as cognitive coaching, adult learning theory, and current content-specific pedagogy and instructional practices, program curriculum and assessments, including the TPEs and the CAL TPA.
- 2.10 School Site with Student Teachers must have a fully qualified administrator.
- 2.11 University may request use of video capture for candidate reflection and CAL TPA completion to reflect to the extent possible Student Teacher's knowledge, skills, and abilities to instruct TK-12 students while meeting state-adopted academic standards for their program. School Site shall inform Credential Student Teachers of video recording policies in place for the CAL TPA task video capture requirement.

ARTICLE 3 TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- 3.1 <u>Student Teaching or Practicum</u>. The District shall provide University students with Student Teaching and/or Practicum in schools and classes of the District under the direct supervision and instruction of a Master Teacher or Practicum Supervisor. The University and the District from time to time shall agree as to the number of students assigned to the District for Student Teaching and/or Practicum.
- 3.2 <u>District Determination</u>. The District at their sole discretion may refuse to accept, or may terminate, any Student assigned to the District for Student Teaching or Practicum based upon its good faith determination that the Student is not performing to the standards of the District. Upon written notification by the District, the University shall promptly terminate the Student's assignment to the District.
- 3.3 University Determination. The University shall determine the number of units of

Student Teaching or Practicum each Student shall receive. Students shall be able to be eligible for more than one Student Teaching Assignment and/or Practicum Assignment at the District.

- 3.4 <u>District Reimbursement</u>. University shall provide the District for supervision of Student Teaching or Practicum at the completion of each semester or quarter, based on the number of units earned by the student teacher or by a predetermined amount. The University determines the rate, as set forth in "Exhibit A". The University will make such payment directly to the District. District acknowledges University Payment depends on the length of supervision where long and/or short assignments are assessed on a pro-rated basis, as set forth in "Exhibit A". District shall submit an invoice based on generated report received from the University Honorarium Specialist. Stipend provided is based on the amount set forth in "Exhibit A" for supervision of University Candidate(s). The total stipend amount for supervision per student shall not exceed six hundred (\$600). Upon receipt of invoice correlating to the University's Honorarium Specialist report, University shall pay the District at earliest convenience following the date the District's invoice is received.
- 3.5 <u>Insurance</u>. The District will obtain and maintain a broad form commercial general liability insurance policy with coverage of at least \$1,000,000 (one million) for each occurrence and \$2,000,000 (two million) in the aggregate, with no exclusion for molestation or abuse. The District will provide the University with proof of such insurance upon execution of this Agreement. For purposes of this Agreement, each of the District and the University will provide workers' compensation insurance coverage for their own employees, and Students are not employees of either the District or the University.

University agrees to maintain at least \$1,000,000 (one million) per occurrence and \$2,000,000 (two million) in General Aggregate Liability Insurance coverage, with no exclusion for molestation or abuse. University agrees to provide District with a Certificate of Insurance including an Endorsement/Additional Covered Party Amendatory Endorsement/Additional Insured naming Oak Park Unified School District as an additional insured party in conjunction with this Student Teaching and Practicum Agreement.

University agrees that all Students are not employees of the District and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the District and/or to which employees are normally entitled, including but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Students' primary coverage for Student injuries shall be Students' personal medical insurance.

- 3.6 <u>Termination of Assignment</u>. In the event a Student Teaching Assignment or Practicum Assignment is terminated before it is completed, the District shall receive reimbursement of costs at the rate provided in Article 3.4 pro-rated to the nearest completed Quarter Unit.
- 3.7 Representations. The University represents that all Students assigned to the District for Student Teaching or Practicum are validly enrolled in a University credential program approved by the Commission. The University makes no other representation, express or implied, about, or assumes any responsibility for, the Student's fitness or qualification to participate in the Student Teaching or Practicum. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as a delegation by the District to the University of any of the District's duties and responsibilities for operation or supervision of the schools or classes of the District.

- 3.8 <u>Certificate of Clearance</u>. In accordance with California Education Code Section 44320, each credential candidate prior to assignment to District must obtain at their sole expense a "Certificate of Clearance," which includes a complete Live Scan Service. The University will ensure that student's receive a Certificate prior to beginning their assignment in the district or hold a valid document issued by the CTC accounting for fingerprint clearance.
- 3.9 <u>Tuberculosis Clearance</u>. In accordance with California Education Code Section 49406, each credential candidate prior to assignment to District must obtain at the candidate's sole expense an examination by a licensed physician or surgeon within the past 60 days to determine that he or she is free of active tuberculosis, prior to beginning the candidate's assignment in the District.
- 3.10 <u>Video Assessment.</u> District and University agree the use of video recording equipment on any District property, including but not limited to, District classrooms, is solely for the purpose of assessing student teachers as part of the credentialing process. The District shall provide University Site Support Providers with any or all applicable rules, regulations, and instructions relating to the assessment of student teachers. The University and District agree no video recording of any student teacher will occur without prior written notification of the name of the student teacher as well as date, time, and location of the video recording to the principal of the school where the video recording is to take place. Principal of the school within the District shall provide written approval of said recording; subject to the parent/guardian authorizations set forth in section 3.12 of this agreement.
- 3.11 <u>Control, Supervision, Evaluation of Video Recording.</u> The control, supervision, evaluation, and/or direction of all student teachers and any other University personnel in connection with the assessment of the student teachers, including, but not limited to, all classroom video recording of the student teachers, shall be at the University's sole discretion.

The University and District agree no video recording of any District student shall be permitted to occur without the express written approval and authorization from the students' parent/guardian.

- 3.12 Confidentiality of Student Records. For purposes of this Agreement and any University Program Agreement, pursuant to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA), University designates District and its Facilities/Educational Sites as having a legitimate educational interest in the educational records of any student who participates in the Student Teaching and Practicum experience to the extent that access to the records is required by District programs or facilities to which the student is assigned to carry out the relevant educational experience. District and its organizational components (i.e., programs) agree to maintain the confidentiality of each Student's educational record in accordance with the provisions of FERPA.
- 3.13 Confidentiality of District Pupil Records. No Student will have access to or have the right to receive any District pupil records, except to the extent necessary in the regular course of assisting in providing services to pupils as part of the Student Teaching or Practicum experience. The discussion, transmission, or narration in any form by Students of any individually identifiable pupil information, educational, medical or otherwise, which is obtained in the course of the Student Teaching or Practicum experience, is forbidden except as a necessary part of the practical experience. To the extent a Student is given access, they are subject to the privacy regulations outlined in the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, 20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 C.F.R. Part 99, as amended ("FERPA").

Otherwise, Students shall use de-identified information only (and not personally identifiable pupil information) in any discussions about the Student Teaching or Practicum experience with University, its employees, agents or others.

- 3.14 <u>Publicity</u>. Neither University nor District shall cause to be published or disseminated any advertising materials, either printed or electronically transmitted, which identifies the other party or its facilities with respect to this Agreement, without the prior written consent of the other party. In addition, neither party may use the names, logos, or trademarks of the other party without its prior written consent.
- 3.15 <u>Unpaid Student Teaching and Practicum Parameters</u>. University and District agrees and understand that Unpaid Students/Candidates are not employees of the District and are not entitled to benefits of any kind or nature normally provided employees of the School and/or to which employees are normally entitled, including but not limited to, State Unemployment Compensation or Workers' Compensation. Students' primary coverage for Student injuries shall be Students' personal medical insurance. School further understands and agrees to the following pursuant to the Fair Labor and Standards Act ("FLSA"):
 - (1) Student and District understand that there is no expectation of compensation;
- (2) The Field Experience is similar to that which would be given in an educational environment;
- (3) The Field Experience is tied to the Student's formal education program by integrated coursework or the receipt of academic credit;
- (4) The Field Experience timeframe with the Student and District corresponds to program in which the student is enrolled;
- (5) The duration of the Field Experience for each student is limited to the duration of time either to complete the practicum hours or the end of the course;
- (6) The student's Field Experience compliments, rather than displaces, the work of paid employees while providing significant educational benefits to the Student; and
- (7) District understands that Student is participating in the Field Experience for experience and is not entitled to a job at the conclusion of the Field Experience.

ARTICLE 4 GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 4.1 Term. This Agreement shall commence as of the date hereof and shall continue until such time as either party gives the other party 30 days' written notice of its intent to terminate the Agreement. The termination of the Agreement shall be effective upon the date specified in such written notice. Provided, however, all Students receiving Student Teaching or Practicum from the District as of the date of such notice shall be permitted to complete their Student Teaching Assignment or Practicum Assignment so long as said student is not the cause of the termination of the agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Attorney's Fees</u>. In the event any party hereto commences litigation for the interpretation, specific performance, or damages for the breach of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to a judgment or award against the other in an amount equal to reasonable attorney's fees and expenses incurred, together with all other appropriate legal or equitable relief.
- 4.3 <u>Notices</u>. All notices, demands, or other communications given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given as of the second business day after mailing by United States mail, postage pre-paid addressed to the addresses on page four

hereof, or to such other address or to such other person as any party hereto shall designate to the other for such purposes in the manner hereinabove set forth. Personal delivery of such notice, demand, or communication may also be made to the above-described addressees and shall be deemed given as of the date of such delivery.

- 4.4 <u>Integration Clause</u>. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties relating to the transactions contemplated hereby and all prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, representations, and statements, whether oral or written, are merged herein. No modification, waiver, amendment, discharge, or change to the Agreement shall be valid unless the same is in writing and signed by the party against which the enforcement of such modification, waiver, amendment, discharge, or change is or may be sought.
- 4.5 <u>General Provisions</u>. This Agreement (i) shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit and be enforceable by the parties hereto and their respective legal representatives, successors, or assigns, (ii) may be executed in any number of counter-parts, each of which may be deemed to be an original, but all of which together shall constitute one and the same instrument, (iii) shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of California, and (iv) has been executed at San Diego, California as of the last date set forth below.
- 4.6 <u>Mutual Indemnification</u>. University shall defend, indemnify and hold District, its Board, officers, employees, agents, and volunteers harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees) or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of University its Board, officers, agents, or students.

District shall defend, indemnify and hold University, its Board, its officers, employees and agents harmless from and against any and all liability, loss, expense (including reasonable attorney's fees) or claims for injury or damages arising out of the performance of this Agreement but only in proportion to and to the extent such liability, loss, expense, attorneys' fees, or claims for injury or damages are caused by or result from the negligent or intentional acts or omissions of District, its Board, officers, agents, employees or volunteers.

4.7 <u>Arbitration</u>. In the event of any dispute, claim, question, or disagreement arising from or relating to this agreement or the breach thereof, the parties hereto shall use their best efforts to settle the dispute, claim, question, or disagreement. To this effect, they shall consult and negotiate with each other in good faith and, recognizing their mutual interests, attempt to reach a just and equitable solution satisfactory to both parties. If they do not reach such solution within a period of 60 days, then, upon notice by either party to the other, all disputes, claims, questions, or differences shall be finally settled by arbitration administered by the American Arbitration Association in accordance with the provisions of its Commercial Arbitration Rules.

Resolution Calling for Support to Increase Local Control Funding for California's Public Schools

- WHEREAS, California is the nation's most populous and wealthiest state and has the fifth largest economy in the world, and the largest Gross Domestic Product of any state in the nation; and
- **WHEREAS**, despite California's leadership in the global economy, the state falls in the nation's bottom quintile on nearly every measure of public K–12 school funding and school staffing; and
- **WHEREAS**, California ranks 40th nationally in the percentage of taxable income spent on education, 41st in per-pupil funding, 45th in pupil–teacher ratios and 48th in pupil–staff ratios; and
- **WHEREAS**, under the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), state funding for K–12 schools has only recently returned to levels predating the Great Recession of 2007; and
- **WHEREAS**, now that the LCFF has reached its original goal of returning to pre-recession funding levels, core student funding is now expected to receive minimal increases; and
- **WHEREAS**, the revenue increases since the creation of the LCFF have been eroded by rapidly increasing costs for health care, pensions, special education, transportation and utilities; and
- WHEREAS, school districts are struggling to maintain the programs created with additional LCFF dollars; and
- WHEREAS, 58% of California's public school students are eligible for free or reduced-price lunch—13% above the national average—and 23% of California students are English learners, more than twice the national average; and
- **WHEREAS**, California's investment in public schools is out of alignment with its wealth, its ambitions, its demographics, and the demands of a 21st-century education; and
- WHEREAS, California funds schools at roughly \$2,500 per student less than the national average, as adjusted for regional cost differences; and
 - WHEREAS, California trails the average of the top ten states by almost \$7,000 in per-pupil funding; and
- WHEREAS, in order to prepare our students for participation in a democratic society and an increasingly competitive, technology-driven global economy, California must fund schools at a level sufficient to support student success; and
- WHEREAS, if California is to close opportunity and achievement gaps and create a public school system that offers consistently high levels of education, the state must provide schools with the resources to meet the needs of their specific populations; and,
- WHEREAS, Assemblymember Al Muratsuchi has introduced Assembly Bill (AB) 39, which would create aspirational LCFF base, supplemental, and concentration grant funding targets to a level that is based on

the national average and makes strides toward funding equal to or above the average of the top ten states, as called for in the State Constitution; and,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the governing board of the Oak Park Unified School District supports creating aspirational LCFF base grant targets through AB 39 or the State Budget and urges the State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign, this critical legislation that would create a roadmap to significantly increase funding to the LCFF through Proposition 98 growth.

CSBA Cash Reserve Program is now in its 33rd year. In the 2019-20 fiscal year, over 200 school districts, community college districts, and county offices of education were involved in the issuance of more than \$1.5 billion of notes issued through the Program. It is recommended that the Board adopt Resolution #2020-08, allowing administration to proceed to the next step in the process and take part in this beneficial cash program for schools. As a reminder, the District is not obligated to participate as a result of resolution adoption. The Resolution simply delegates to the administration the right to decide on participation at the time of pricing when the interest cost and reinvestment rates are known.

CALIFORNIA SCHOOL CASH RESERVE PROGRAM Sponsored by CSBA Finance Corporation

By passing the resolution before the Board, the District will have the opportunity to participate in the California School Cash Reserve Program sponsored by California School Boards Association Finance Corporation. The Program consistently issues TRANs for more than half of all California school districts, community college districts, and county offices of education that issue TRANs.

Through participation in the Cash Reserve Program, the District will be able to issue a tax and revenue anticipation note as part of this cost-effective pooled structure. An overview of this cash management concept and the Program is provided below:

Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes (TRANs): TRANs are short-term debt instruments issued by school districts throughout the State to create an additional reserve to the general fund. This reserve will act as a cushion to the general fund in the event that the District experiences temporary cash flow needs. These cash flow needs may occur as a result of the timing mismatch between the receipt of revenues (generally received in an uneven fashion) and the expenditure of general fund moneys (generally paid out in a more level fashion).

TRANs Economics: Through its participation in the Program, the District will issue a taxexempt note. The proceeds from the sale of this note, while not needed for cash flow, are invested in a taxable investment. This may result in a positive spread between the borrowing rate and the investment return on the TRAN proceeds.

Cash Reserve Program Background: The first Cash Reserve Program was issued in June of 1988 for six districts with an aggregate issue amount of \$9.6 million. Since that time the Program has grown dramatically in size, servicing the majority of California school district TRAN issuers. Each year the Program has resulted in a significant benefit to the participants. The highlights of the Program are as follows:

- Participants benefit from a cost-effective and administratively simple method to issue their TRANs
- Documentation is streamlined for governing board approval
- Participants benefit from year-round administrative assistance

Cash Reserve Program Process:

The Cash Reserve Program involves the following key steps in order to participate:

- 1. **Adoption of Resolution**: Adoption of the resolution does not obligate the District to participate in the Program. The resolution simply delegates to the administration the right to decide on participation.
- 2. Cash Flow and Credit Background Process: Participants submit a completed credit questionnaire and financial information (including audits, budget, and second period interim cash flow report) that is used to develop an initial pro-forma cash flow statement for the upcoming budget year. Participants review, revise, and approve their cash flow statement in consultation with Dale Scott & Company, the Program's Financial Advisor. The cash flows are reviewed by the Program's Bond Counsel.

- 3. **Sale of TRANs**: The pricing of the issue is anticipated to occur in mid-June. At that time the interest rate on the notes will be locked-in. The District is not obligated to participate until it acknowledges issuance after the sale of the TRANs.
- 4. *Closing*: Closing of the issue will occur in early July. The District will have access to the proceeds of the TRAN available to meet it temporary cash flow needs.

It is recommended that the Board adopt the resolution. This will allow administration to proceed to the next step in the process and take part in this beneficial Program for schools. Once again, the District is not obligated to participate as a result of resolution adoption. The Resolution simply delegates to the administration the right to decide on participation prior to the time of TRAN issuance.

BACKGROUND:

The Board of Education is respectfully requested to Authorize Measure S Project 20-09S, District Network Firewall Refresh and Award Related Equipment Purchase and Installation with extended warranty services contract. The district's current network firewall is 6 years old and has reached its capacity trying to serve the internet bandwidth needs of our district which have grown exponentially with the deployment of the 1:1 Chromebook program. A larger firewall is needed in order to more fully utilize the 10Gbps bandwidth provided by the Ventura County Office of Education, as our current Firewall is limited to a little less than 1.5Gbps in capacity. As a result, students and teachers are subject to intermittent congestion while accessing the internet and using online resources.

The Tech Department used the Federal ERATE process to solicit bids for the firewall appliance, and the vendor selected provided the best proposal at the lowest price. The proposal relies on CMAS CONTRACT #3-08-70-2626A and NASPO CONTRACT #AR626, both of which are piggybackable pre-bid contracts. Additional details, rationale, and price quote for the purchase are outlined in the Technology Resource Request that follows this report. The request has been reviewed and approved by both the District Technology Committee and the Measure S Subcommittee, who recommend establishing a budget of \$300,000 for this project to be paid for out of Measure S. The Firewall refresh was an expected expenditure that has been accounted for in the Measure S budget. Because of strict timeline requirements regarding applying for ERATE discounts for this purchase, it is respectfully requested that the Board approve this action immediately as recommended to qualify for those discounts. The discounts received may be around \$20,000-\$30,000 if approved and awarded by ERATE.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Included in the Measure S Master Plan, the proposed contract will be funded from the Measure S bond fund.

Re: The Adoption of Wuthering Height into the AP English curriculum

Background: Why Wuthering Heights?

Emily Bronte published <u>Wuthering Heights</u> in 1844. Her only novel is considered one of the finest in English. <u>Wuthering Heights</u> tells the story of two star-crossed lovers, Catherine Earnshaw and Heathcliff, who began life as childhood playmates on the English moors. Because of the insurmountable class barrier, "Cathy," as she is called, confesses her love for Heathcliff only to acknowledge her inability to marry him. Heathcliff leaves Cathy's family estate of Wuthering Heights to journey to London where he makes his fortune and returns many years later to buy the Earnshaw family seat.

There is a strong social class critique in Bronte's novel, but the emotional force of the work is what has rendered the tale immortal for many generations of readers. It is the haunting emotional attachment that characterizes the relationship of the two lovers that has inspired over eight cinematic treatments of the novel. Bronte is a superb critic of society, but ultimately it is the emotional complexity of her characters that has conferred immortality upon her tragic tale.

Wuthering Heights in AP English:

The summer I will attend Oxford University to study Emily Bronte in a course that focuses exclusively on her work and that of her two sisters, Ann and Charlotte. I plan to spend much of the next few months preparing for the Oxford course by reading extensively in Bronte's biography, the Victorian age of which she was a part, and the era of the Pre-Raphaelite writers that followed in the last part of the Nineteenth Century. At Oxford, the focus of my work will be on the part the poet Shelley played in the development of Bronte's imagination. I plan to write my seminar paper on Shelley's influence on Emily Bronte and the Pre-Raphaelites like Christina Rossetti and William Rossetti.

If Wuthering Heights is approved by the Curriculum Committee, I will introduce the novel to my AP students during the second semester. I plan to have the students read Bronte's novel, after we study Ethan Frome by American writer, Edith Wharton. Wuthering Heights presents a dramatic contrast to Wharton's similar own tale of lovers separated by fate. My hope is to have the students undertake a comparative study of the different social fabrics depicted in the two narratives -- Bronte's landed gentry of Victorian England and Wharton's agrarian poor of the New England seaboard.

Having read <u>Wuthering Heights</u> for the first time in my own eleventh-grade year and having spent a lifetime returning to this rich work, I am confident that <u>Wuthering Heights</u> will provide AP students with an extraordinary perspective on the complexities of love and desire, as well as the role of social class in shaping human life.

The purpose of Environmental Science CP is to provide students with an in-depth look into the natural world and its processes with an emphasis on environmental science. The geologic record demonstrates that our environment that changed over a variety of time scales from seconds to billions of years. This course explores the many ways in which geologic processes have controlled and modified Earth's environment since Earth was formed and will continue to evolve as shown through computer modeling. Interrelationships between physical, biological, and chemical processes at Earth's surface are emphasized. Topics such as geology, ecology, water, soil, air, atmosphere, population, climate change, land uses, mineral resource, energy resource, geochemical cycles, waste, and solutions, will be used to teach a curriculum that gives students a comprehensive understanding of the universe, the natural world, and how everything is connected. Students will have an opportunity to evaluate environmental problems and propose solutions for a sustainable future.

This class meets the requirements for "d" laboratory science requirement. The Environmental Earth Science CP class curriculum is NGSS based so that more science and engineering practices are used, disciplinary core ideas are incorporated to promote essential ideas from all the major science disciplines, and cross cutting concepts are reinforced. This course will focus on the overarching NGSS performance expectations based on the four main topics which are Space Systems, History of the Earth, Earth's Systems, Weather and Climate, Human Sustainability, and Engineering Design. The course will also incorporate California's Environmental Principles and Concepts (EP & C's) through a broad curriculum that includes in-classroom and out-of-classroom education so that students will become environmentally literate and able to address current environmental challenges and prevent new ones.

This course is influenced by the EP & C's, NGSS standards, and the AP Environmental Science Curriculum. It is designed using the already approved Environmental Earth Science CP curriculum at Thousand Oaks High School. It also contains parts from the already approved Advanced Environmental Science at Thatcher School and Advanced Studies Environmental Science at Covina High School.

Course Content

Unit 1: Introduction into Environmental, Ecosystems

Lab: Tragedy of the Commons

The "tragedy of the commons" is one of the most important topics in environmental science. Many resources (ex. clean air, biodiversity, fresh water) are available to many people, and when resources are shared and limited (though potentially renewable), they are often exploited. This is due to the fact that the benefit to one person of using more of the resource outweighs the cost to that individual of the resource's overuse. each person looks out only for his own interests, and succumbs to the logic that, "If I don't use the resource, then someone else will. I might as well get the benefit." Learning to overcome our natural tendency to overuse common resources is one of the most significant challenges we face in working to improve the environment. In completing this activity, students will learn to recognize situations that lead to a "tragedy of the commons" and how to prevent resource exploitation in these situations.

Unit 2: Biodiversity

Activity: Theory of Island Biodiversity

Students will determine the effects of habitat fragmentation on biodiversity. Students will use a "game board" and beans to explore how the size of an island habitat and it's distance from the main ecosystem affects its biodiversity. Students will analyze how likely it is for migrants from the main ecosystem to reach the various habitat islands

Activity: Squirrelling Away

Students engage in an activity on the grass outside of class. Students will be split into four groups and each group will represent a different species of squirrel. Students will be given a tool (spoon, tweezers, etc...) that they will use to forage for food. The actual process of obtaining food (beans) will represent how different species interact in an ecosystem in order to survive. Students will be able to understand species interactions, generalist species, and specialist species. Students will use class data to calculate which species was most/least likely to reproduce and which species was most/likely to survive.

Unit 3: Populations

Lab: Cemetery Lab

Students analyze real cemetery data to study human demography. Students look at 100 different gravestones to record birth and death years. They use this information to death rates and survivorship curves. Students will be able to understand how factors such as advances in medicine and environmental protection may have affection human demography over the past 150 years. Students will predict how human demography might change in the future, based on the current socio-political reality and the presence of incurable disease.

Unit 4: Geology, Atmosphere, and Climate

Lab: Soil Analysis Lab

Students will bring in soil samples to measure porosity and permeability of soil from different regions. Students will observe soil texture and examine the nutrients in each sample. They will draw conclusions about why the region in which they obtained the soil has that specific porosity, permeability, and nutrient level.

Activity: Geology Simulation

Students will use an interactive computer program to observe the characteristics of the the different layers of the earth. Students will observe how tectonics plates have changed over time. Using the computer simulation, students will understand what plate boundaries lead to volcanoes and earthquakes.

Unit 5: Land and Water Use

Activity: World Hunger Banquet

This in-class simulation about world hunger encourages a deeper understanding of world food distribution and poverty. Each student, representing a different country, sits in the classroom according to their country's average income. Students receive food similar to what they would eat in the country they are representing. Students watch the TED "Hunger isn't a food issue. It's a logistics issue" by Ester Ndichu. Students write a short reflection about their feelings about the class simulation and explain what they learned about world hunger.

Lab: Water Quality Analysis

Students bring in their own water sample to determine the quality of water. Using tools in the classroom, students test the level of Nitrogen, Phosphorus, Copper, Turbidity, pH, temperature, conductivity, and dissolved solids.

Unit 6: Energy Resources & Consumption

Activity: Kill a Watt

Students will identify ways in which electricity is consumed in their household by collecting data about appliances in their home, organizing it in a data table, and computing the energy consumption of their household. Students will interpret an electric utility bill and an electric meter to help them calculate their energy consumption. Students will analyze their results by comparing the daily energy consumption that they calculated from their home survey with the average calculated from their electric bill and draw conclusions about how they can reduce the energy consumption in their home.

Unit 7: Solid Waste, Air Pollution, Human Health Hazards

Lab: Car Exhaust Lab

Students analyze the amount and pollution released from different car make and models. Students will go to the parking lot to collect car exhaust from a variety of cars and bring back exhaust to analyze in the lab by measuring the level of carbon.

Unit 8: Global change

Lab: Environmental Models

Each lab group will be assigned a specific environmental phenomena (temperature inversion, ocean acidification, albedo, buffered lakes, sea level rise, urban heat islands) that they will model. Each group will video tape themselves modeling the environmental phenomena. They will add captions and information to the video so it can become an educational video. They will share the video with the rest of the class. Students will watch other group's videos and record what they learned on a google document. Finally, students will brainstorm with their group to

come with a new environmental phenomena to model. They will decide what materials they will need and write the procedure well enough for scientific replication.

Unit 9: A Sustainable Future

Project: Sustainable City

This cross-curricular group project will be completed in this class as well as Geopolitics and the World Today. The purpose of this project is to establish confidence, knowledge, and determination in students so they can become agents of change towards a sustainable future. Students' task will be to create a model of a sustainable city using only recyclable material. There will be environmental and economic restrictions that they must follow while building their city. For example, there will be a finite amount of "money" that they will be allowed to use to build their city and they will only be allowed to produce a certain amount of air, water, and solid pollution. After completion, students will better understand how to create an environmentally-friendly sustainable future.

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Spanish 3 or higher

Course Description:

The purpose of this course is to provide students with an analytical perspective of Latin American culture and historical events through the use of films and documentaries. The course focuses on major political, social and cultural aspects of given regions within the confines of modern history.

All students are expected to participate in class discussions, research topics and present several in-depth investigations over various topics including political, social and/or cultural aspects of a given country or region. Religion, economics, government, politics, geography, gender, ethnicity, art, literature and philosophy are just a few of the areas of social studies that will be utilized and explored to aid discussions. The medium of film will be used to generate discussion and increase comprehension and understanding of specific events and/or cultural awareness of the living standards of Hispanic American citizens.

Through the exploration of the topics above, students will be required to participate fully in Spanish so that all four forms of communication (speaking, listening, reading, and writing) can be enhanced, furthering their fluency of the language.

Course Content

Unit 1: Immigration

Films:

- ¿Cuál es el camino a casa? (Documentary: US/Mexico/Honduras)
- La misma luna (US/Mexico)
- Vuentos de Agua (Netflix Series)

Essential Question: Why do we, as a society in the US, need movies like, "La misma luna" to feel sympathy towards immigrants?

Objectives: In this unit students will explore and analyze the history of immigration, the reforms, the hardships, the conflicts and perspectives.

Unit 2: Music

Films:

• Danzón (Mexico)

Essential Question: How does music reflect the culture of its people?

Objectives: Students will define culture and the different aspect of it. They will identify, see and hear different genres of music, instruments, dance, customs and costumes of Spanish speaking countries. Students will analyze how culture and music are intertwined.

Unit 3: Environment

- Landfillharmonic (Documentary: Paraguay)
- Maquílapolis (Documentary: Tijuana, México)

Essential Question: How does the lack of resources motivate people to be creative?

Objectives: Students will analyze how the historical and cultural background of Paraguay and Mexico have had an impact on the environment of these two countries. Students will evaluate the need of protecting the environment and creating solutions.

Unit 4: Poverty

Essential Question: How does poverty force people to violate their ethical and family values?

Objectives: Students will define poverty, will analyze different definitions of poverty, research the poverty levels of Spanish speaking countries and create a list of the different aspects of life it affects. Students will then analyze and make inferences on how these aspects play a role in the lives of the characters in the movie.

Unit 5: Human Rights

Essential Question(s): How does the polarization of a country affects its people? How did the Argentinean Dirty War change the victims' identities? Were the goals of the military in Argentina's Dirty War important enough to justify the sacrifices in human rights that it entailed?

Objectives: Students define and identify human rights in their own words, will study the Dirty War of Argentina and make judgments on the perspectives of all sides of the realm, victims, government, and general public.

Unit 6: Political Issues

Essential Question: How does the politics of a country play an important role in the polarization of its citizens?

They will analyze and make judgments on how the political issues shape the lives of the characters in the movies, they will relate the archetypes presented in the movie and how these form part of their lives as well.

Unit 7: Alienation/Prejudice

The California Healthy Youth Act has five primary purposes:

- To provide pupils with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect their sexual and reproductive health from HIV and other sexually transmitted infections and from unintended pregnancy;
- To provide pupils with the knowledge and skills they need to develop healthy attitudes concerning adolescent growth and development, body image, gender, sexual orientation, relationships, marriage, and family;
- To promote understanding of sexuality as a normal part of human development;
- To ensure pupils receive integrated, comprehensive, accurate, and unbiased sexual health and HIV prevention instruction and provide educators with clear tools and guidance to accomplish that end;
- To provide pupils with the knowledge and skills necessary to have healthy, positive, and safe relationships and behaviors

While this legislation requires sexual health instruction for schools that serve students in grades 7-12, school districts may opt to instruct students younger than 7th grade, so long as the information is "age appropriate and medically accurate."

Parents may, by written request, opt-out their children from comprehensive sexual health education. Students who are opted out from this instruction must be given an alternative assignment. The attached document outlines an alternative assignment that may be used for students in 5th-7th grade who are opted out of sexual health instruction. The lesson emphasizes healthy behaviors through the development of knowledge and skills related to healthy eating and lifestyle choices.

The lesson plans may be modified to meet the specific needs of students, as well as the number of students opted out at a specific school.

Level: Primary/Junior

Duration: 40 minutes

Looking at Food Advertising

Overview

This lesson introduces students to the ways in which advertising can affect their food choices. Working from television and magazine ads, students discuss the techniques used by advertisers to engage kids with products. Specifically, they assess the importance of "spokescharacters" and jingles as effective ways to build relationships with kids. As a class exercise, they create jingles and spokescharacters themselves for the foods they enjoy.

Learning Outcomes

Students demonstrate:

- awareness of the methods used by advertisers to sell food products.
- beginning awareness of how they are affected by food advertising.

Preparation and Materials

- Tape TV commercials targeted towards children. (Saturday mornings usually offer a wide variety of snack and cereal ads.)
- Collect food ads from magazines.

The Lesson

Guided Discussion: Advertisements

A good way to begin evaluating food advertising messages is to point out products in television and magazine ads. While discussing the ads ask:

- How many different techniques can you spot in these advertisements? For example, do the manufacturers
 use animation, filming tricks, music, bright colours or celebrities?
- How do these techniques make you feel about the product? Do they make you want to have it? (One way
 they do this is to imply that the product gives children 'power'.)
- Why is it good for the manufacturers if their advertisements make you want to buy their product?

Activity 1

Brand Characters

One method used by food companies to attract kids is to create characters that are associated with their product or brand. On the blackboard, have the children come up with a list of their favourite "food" characters, such as *Tony The Tiger, The Honey Comb Kid, The Nestle Quick Bunny*.

- Why might companies create "spokescharacters" like Captain Crunch or Toucan Sam? (They give products
 a friendly face that kids can relate to; they make a product appear fun and exciting.)
- Have your students ever wanted to try a product because they like its "spokescharacter?"

Using the list on the board, ask students to identify what they like best about each of these characters. Have them vote on which is their favourite.

Have students think of their favourite food and ask them create and name their own food character. Let them draw or paint a picture of their new character with their favourite food.

Activity 2

Jingles

Explain that manufacturers create *jingles*, or catchy sayings, to encourage customers to think of their products. See how many students can complete the following food jingles and identify the food product that is connected to:

"Betcha can't eat just one....." (Frito Lay) "It's a honey of an O, its....." (Honey-nut Cheerios) "Good, good, whole wheat...." (Shreddies) "You can't drink it slow, if it's...." (Quick) "Leggo my...." (Eggo) "I gotta have my...." (Corn Pops) "Silly Rabbit,.......Are for kids!" (Trix) "When you've got the munchies, nothing else will do...." (Hostess Potato Chips)

Ask students what makes these jingles so effective. (Answers may include: short, catchy phrases and simple music that make them easy to remember; continual repetition of the jingle in television and radio ads.)

- Tell students to record other popular food jingles (or jingles for other products) in their media journals or, have them create a food jingle of their own.
- As an extension activity, have children record their original jingles for their favorite foods and play them to the class.

Waivers

The Governing Board recognizes that strict compliance with circumstances may arise in the law—may sometimes hinderoperation of the district's ability to provide its students with an effective, well-rounded educational program. district that require a waiver from state law or regulation. When it is in the interest of district students, the Board may request that the State Board of Education (SBE) waive any provision of state or federal law or regulation which itSBE has authority to waive pursuant to Education Code 33050.

Any waiver request to be submitted to the SBE shall first be approved by the Board. The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each proposed waiver request includes all information necessary for the Board to analyze the need for the waiver and make an informed decision. Prior to presenting the proposed request for Board approval, the Superintendent or designee shall consult with and obtain the approval of any advisory committee or site council when required by law.

If the proposed waiver request affects a program that requires the existence of a school site council, the Superintendent or designee shall obtain the school site council's approval of the request before presenting it to the Board. As appropriate, other councils or advisory committees, including bilingual advisory committees, shall be provided adequate opportunity to review a proposed waiver request, and the request shall include a written summary of any objections to the request by the councils or advisory committees. (Education Code 33051)

The notice, which shall state the time, date, location, and subject of the public hearing and invite public testimony, may be printed in a newspaper of general circulation and/or posted at each school and three public places in the district.

When the district Board has requested and received the same general waiver from the SBE for two consecutive years, the Board is does not required subsequently need to reapply annually if provided that the information contained on the request remains current. Individuals, firms, or organizations employed as consultants independent contractors may assist management with decisions and/or project development related to financial, economic, accounting, engineering, legal, administrative, instructional, or other matters.

Intradistrict Open Enrollment

The Governing Board desires to provide enrollment options that meet the diverse needs and interests of district students and parents/guardians, while also maximizing the efficient use of district facilities- and resources. The Superintendent or designee shall establish procedures for the selection and transfer of students among district schools in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation.

No student currently residing within a school's attendance area shall be displaced by another student transferring from outside the attendance area. (Education Code 35160.5)

Application and Selection Process

In order to ensure that priorities for enrollment in district schools are implemented in accordance

with law and Board policy, applications for intradistrict open enrollment shall be submitted between May 1 and June 1 of the school year preceding the school year for which the transfer is requested.

The Superintendent or designee shall calculate each school's capacity in a nonarbitrary manner using student enrollment and available space. (Education Code 35160.5)

Except for the enrollment priorities listed above, the Superintendent or designee shall use a random, unbiased selection process to determine who which students shall be admitted whenever the district school receives admission requests that are in excess of the school's capacity. (Education Code 35160.5)

Enrollment decisions shall not be based on a student's academic or athletic performance, except that. However, existing entrance criteria may be used for enrolling students in specialized schools or programs may be used, provided that the criteria are uniformly applied to all applicants. Academic addition, academic performance may be used to determine eligibility for, or placement in, programs for gifted and talented students. (Education Code 35160.5)

Intradistrict Open Enrollment

Transfers for Victims of a Violent Criminal Offense

Within a reasonable amount of time, not to exceed 14 calendar days, after it has been determined that a student has been the victim of a violent criminal offense while on school grounds, the student's parents/guardians shall be offered an option to transfer their child to an eligible school identified by the Superintendent or designee. In making the determination that a student has been a victim of a violent criminal offense, the Superintendent or designee shall consider the specific circumstances of the incident and consult with local law enforcement as appropriate. Examples of violent criminal offenses include, but are not limited to, attempted murder, battery with serious bodily injury, assault with a deadly weapon, rape, sexual battery, robbery, extortion, or hate crimes.

The Superintendent or designee shall consider the needs and preferences of the affected student and his/her parent/guardian in making the offer. If the parent/guardian elects to transfer his/her childthe student, the transfer shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Transfers from a "Persistently Dangerous" School

Upon receipt of notification from the California Department of Education (CDE) that a district school has been designated as "persistently dangerous," intradistrict transfers shall be granted as follows:

- 1. Within 10 days of receipt of the notification from CDE, the Superintendent or designee shall provide parents/guardians of students attending the school with the following notifications: notice of the school's designation. Along with this notification, or at least 14 calendar days before the start of the school year, the Superintendent or designee shall provide a list of other district schools to which any student of the school that is designated as persistently dangerous may transfer.
- 1. Within 10 days of receipt of the notification from CDE, notice of the school's designation
- 2. Within 20 days of receipt of the notification from CDE, notice of the option to transfer their child

Parents/guardians who desire to transfer their child out of a "persistently dangerous" the school shall provide a written requestresponse to the Superintendent or designee and shall rank-order their preferences from among all schools identified by the Superintendent or designee as eligible to receive transfer students. The Superintendent or designee may

establish a reasonable timeline, not to exceed seven school days, for the submission of parent/guardian requests.

- 3. The Superintendent or designee shall consider the needs and preferences of students and parents/guardians before making an assignment, but is not obligated to accept the parent/guardian's preference if the assignment is not feasible due to space constraints or other considerations. The Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of the assigned school.considerations.
- 4. For students whose parents/guardians accept the offer, the transfer shall generally be made within 30 school days of receiving as quickly as possible. If the notice of the school's designation from the CDE. If parents/guardians decline the assigned school, the student may remain in his/her the current school.

The transfer shall remain in effect as long as the student's school of origin is identified as "persistently dangerous." The Superintendent or designee may choose to make the transfer permanent based on the educational needs of the student, parent/guardian preferences, and other factors affecting the student's ability to succeed if returned to the school of origin.

The Superintendent or designee shall cooperate with neighboring districts to develop an interdistrict transfer program in the event that space is not available in a district school.

(cf. 5117 - Interdistrict Attendance)

Other Intradistrict Open Enrollment

Except for transfers for victims of a violent crime and from a "persistently dangerous school," the following procedures shall apply to intradistrict open enrollment:

- 1. The Superintendent or designee shall identify those schools which may have space available for additional students. A list of these those schools and open enrollment applications shall be available at each school site, the district office, and on the district's web site.
- 2. After the enrollment priorities have been applied in accordance with Board policy, if there are more requests for a particular school than there are spaces available, a random drawing shall be held from the applicant pool. A waiting list shall be established to indicate the order in which applicants may be accepted if openings occur during the year. Late applicants shall not be added to the waiting list for the current year but shall instead wait for a subsequent lottery.
- 3. The Superintendent or designee shall provide written notification to applicants as to

whether their applications have been approved, denied, or placed on a waiting list. If the application is denied, the reasons for denial shall be stated.

4. Approved applicants must confirm their enrollment within 10 school days.

Any student who, prior to the 2016-17 school year, was is granted a transfer out of a Title I school that had been identified by CDE for program comprehensive support and improvement shall be allowed to remain in the school of enrollment until he/she completes completing the highest grade offered at that school. (20 USC 6311)

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A student granted intradistrict enrollment under other circumstances shall not be required to reapply for readmission but may be subject to displacement due to excessive enrollment.

Any complaints regarding the open enrollment process shall be submitted in accordance with the applicable complaint procedure.

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Notifications

Notifications shall be sent to parents/guardians at the beginning of each school year describing all current statutory attendance options and local attendance options available in the district. Such notification shall include: (Education Code 35160.5, 48980)

1. All options for meeting residency requirements for school attendance

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- 2. Program options offered within local attendance areas
- 3. A description of any special program options available on both an interdistrict and intradistrict basis

- 5. A district application form for requesting a change of attendance

Interdistrict Attendance

The Governing Board recognizes that parents/guardians of students who reside within the geographic boundaries of one district may, for a variety of reasons, desire to enroll their children in a school in another district.

(cf. 5111.1 - District Residency) (cf. 5116.1 - Intradistrict Open Enrollment)

School District of Choice Program

The Board has designated the Oak Park Unified School district as a "school district of choice" and shall accept students who reside within other California school districts who wish to attend a district school.

The Board shall, by resolution, annually establish the number of students who will be accepted into the district through this program based on recommendations by the Superintendent or designee as to the number of transfer students the district will be able to accept and the schools, grades, and programs that will be able to accept the students. Once established, the district shall accept all students who apply to transfer into the district until the district is at maximum capacity, as required pursuant to Education Code 48301.

Students shall be admitted to district schools through an unbiased process that prohibits an inquiry into or evaluation or consideration of whether or not a student should be enrolled based upon the student's academic or athletic performance, physical condition, proficiency in English, any of the individual characteristics set forth in Education Code 200, or family income. (Education Code 48301)

If the number of transfer applications exceeds the number of transfers the Board has elected to accept, approval for transfer shall be determined by a random drawing held in public at a regularly scheduled Board meeting. (Education Code 48301)

After the district admits students in accordance with the school district of choice program, provided space is available at particular grade levels, the Superintendent or designee may admit students based on individual interdistrict attendance permits pursuant to Education Code 46600.

The Superintendent or designee shall keep an accounting of all requests for admittance and a record of their disposition, including, but not limited to, all of the following: (Education Code 48313)

- 1. The number of requests granted, denied, or withdrawn and, for denied requests, the reason for the denial
- 2. The number of students transferred into and out of the district pursuant to this program
- 3. The race, ethnicity, gender, self-reported socioeconomic status, eligibility for free or reduced-price meals, and the district of residence for each student transferred into or out of the district pursuant to this program
- 4. The number of students transferred into or out of the district pursuant to this program who are classified as English learners or students with disabilities

The Superintendent or designee shall report to the Board, at a regularly scheduled meeting, the information specified in items #1-4 above. No later than October 15 of each year, the Superintendent or designee shall provide the same information for the current school year, as well as information regarding the district's status as a school district of choice in the upcoming school year, to each geographically adjacent school district, the county office of education, and the Superintendent of Public Instruction. (Education Code 48313)

The district's compliance with specified program requirements shall be reviewed as part of the annual district audit conducted pursuant to Education Code 41020. (Education Code 48301)

(cf. 3460 - Financial Reports and Accountability)

Interdistrict Attendance Agreements and Permits

The Board may enter into an agreement with any other school district, for a term not to exceed five school years, for the interdistrict attendance of students who are residents of the districts. (Education Code 46600)

The agreement shall specify the terms and conditions under which interdistrict attendance shall be permitted or denied. It also may contain standards agreed to by both districts for reapplication and/or revocation of the student's permit. (Education Code 46600)

Upon receiving a permit for transfer into the district that has been approved by the student's district of residence, or upon receiving a written request from the parent/guardian of a district student who wishes to enroll in another district, the Superintendent or designee shall review the request and may approve or deny the permit subject to the terms and conditions of the interdistrict attendance agreement.

Transportation

Upon parent/guardian request, the district shall provide transportation assistance to a student receiving an interdistrict transfer who is eligible for free and reduced-price meals and is the child of an active duty military parent/guardian or a victim of bullying, as defined in Education Code 46600. (Education Code 46600)

(cf. 3553 - Free and Reduced Price Meals)

In addition, upon request of a student's parent/guardian, the Superintendent or designee may authorize transportation for any interdistrict transfer student to and from designated bus stops within the attendance area of the school that the student attends if space is available.

Interdistrict Attendance

School District of Choice Program

The Superintendent or designee shall communicate with parents/guardians regarding transfer opportunities under the school district of choice program. Communications sent to parents/guardians shall be available in all languages for which translations are required pursuant to Education Code 48985, shall be factually accurate, and shall not target particular neighborhoods or individual parents/guardians on the basis of a child's actual or perceived academic or athletic skill or any other personal characteristic. (Education Code 48301, 48980)

The Superintendent or designee shall also make public announcements regarding district schools, programs, policies, and procedures, including transportation options if applicable, during the enrollment period. (Education Code 48312)

The Superintendent or designee may hold informational meetings on the district's current educational programs, so that parents/guardians can provide input to the district on methods to improve current programs and make informed decisions regarding their children's education. (Education Code 48302)

The process for student transfers into the district under the school district of choice program, including, but not limited to, any applicable form, the timeline for a transfer, and an explanation of the selection process, shall be posted on the district's web site. (Education Code 48301)

(cf. 1113 - District and School Web Sites)

Parents/guardians shall submit applications for interdistrict attendance to the district office before January 1 of the school year preceding the school year for which the student is requesting to be transferred. The application deadline may be waived upon agreement between the district and the student's district of residence. (Education Code 48308)

The application deadline shall not apply to an application requesting a transfer if the parent/guardian with whom the student resides is enlisted in the military and was relocated by the military within 90 days prior to submitting the application. (Education Code 48308)

(cf. 6173.2 - Education of Children of Military Families)

Any existing entrance criteria for specialized schools or programs shall be uniformly applied to all applicants. (Education Code 48305)

Series 5000 Students AR 5117(b)

The district may deny a transfer into the district under the school district of choice program if the transfer would require the district to create a new program to serve that student, except that the district shall not reject the transfer of a student with disabilities or an English learner. (Education Code 48303)

Whenever the number of transfer applications exceeds the number of interdistrict transfers that may be accepted as annually determined by the Governing Board, students accepted for transfer shall be selected by a random drawing held in public at a regularly scheduled Board meeting before February 15 of the school year preceding the school year for which the transfer is sought. (Education Code 48301)

Priority for transfer under the school district of choice program shall be granted as follows: (Education Code 48306)

- 1. First priority shall be given to siblings of students already in attendance in the district.
- 2. Second priority shall be given to students eligible for free or reduced-price meals.

(cf. 3553 - Free and Reduced Price Meals)

3. Third priority shall be given to children of military personnel.

No later than February 15 of the school year preceding the school year for which the student is requesting to be transferred, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parent/guardian in writing whether the application has been provisionally accepted or rejected or of the student's position on any waiting list. (Education Code 48308)

If a student's application for transfer is accepted, the Superintendent or designee shall so notify the student's district of residence no later than February 15 of the school year preceding the school year for which the student is requesting to be transferred. (Education Code 48308)

The number of students accepted for transfer into the district, by school and grade level, shall be reported to the district of residence on or before February 15. (Education Code 48308)

If a student's application is denied, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the student's parents/guardians that the number of students requesting to transfer exceeded the district's capacity and that the student was not selected during the random drawing. Such determination shall be accurately recorded in the minutes of the Board meeting at which the determination was made. (Education Code 48308)

Series 5000 Students AR 5117(c)

For a student whose parent/guardian was relocated by the military less than 90 days prior to the submission of the application, the district shall make a final decision to accept or reject the application within 90 days of its receipt. If the student's application has been submitted less than 90 days prior to the beginning of the school year, then the district shall accept or deny the application before the school year begins. Upon acceptance, the student may immediately enroll in a district school. (Education Code 48308)

Vacancies may be filled from the waiting list until May 1 of the school year preceding the school year for which students are requesting to be transferred. (Education Code 48308)

The final number of students enrolled in the district through the school district of choice program, by school and grade level, along with the names of the students, shall be reported to the district of residence on or before May 2. (Education Code 48308)

Students admitted through the school district of choice program are deemed to have fulfilled district residency requirements pursuant to Education Code 48204. (Education Code 48301)

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Final acceptance of the transfer is applicable for one school year and shall be renewed automatically each year unless the Board, by adoption of a resolution, withdraws from participation in the program and no longer accepts transfer students from other districts. Even if the district withdraws from participation in the program, students who attended or received a notice of acceptance into the district before the Board's resolution of withdrawal shall be permitted to attend school in the district, and admitted high school students may continue attending school in the district until they graduate from high school. (Education Code 48307, 48308)

The district may accept any completed coursework, attendance, and other academic progress credited to an accepted student by any district(s) the student has previously attended and may grant academic standing to the student based upon the district's evaluation of the student's academic progress. (Education Code 48309)

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The district may revoke a student's enrollment if the student is recommended for expulsion pursuant to Education Code 48918. (Education Code 48309)

Interdistrict Attendance Permits

In accordance with an agreement between the Governing Board and the board of another district, a permit authorizing a student's attendance outside his/her-the student's district of residence may be issued upon approval of both the districts

The district shall post on its web site the procedures and timelines for requesting an interdistrict transfer permit, including a link to BP 5117 - Interdistrict Attendance. The posted information shall include, but is not limited to: (Education Code 46600.1, 46600.2)

- 1. The date upon which the district will begin accepting and processing interdistrict transfer requests for the following school year
- 2. The reasons for which the district may approve or deny a request, and any information or documents that must be submitted as supporting evidence
- 3. If applicable, the process and timelines by which a denial of a request may be appealed within the district before the district renders a final decision
- 4. A statement that failure of a parent/guardian to meet any timelines established by the district shall be deemed an abandonment of the request
- 5. Applicable timelines for processing a request, including the following statements:
 - a. For an interdistrict transfer request received by the district 15 or fewer calendar days before the commencement of instruction in the school year for which the transfer is sought, the district will notify the parent/guardian of its final decision within 30 calendar days from the date the request was received.
 - b. For an interdistrict transfer request received by the district more than 15 days before the commencement of instruction in the school year for which the interdistrict transfer is sought, the district will notify the parent/guardian of its final decision as soon as possible, but no later than 14 calendar days after the commencement of instruction in the school year for which transfer is sought.
- 6. The conditions under which an existing interdistrict transfer permit may be revoked or rescinded

Priority for interdistrict attendance shall be given to a student who has been determined by staff through an investigation by of either the district of residence or district of proposed enrollment to be a victim of an act of bullying, as defined in Education Code 48900(r), committed by a student of the district of residence. (Education Code 46600)

Series 5000 Students AR 5117(e)

(cf. 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures) (cf. 5131.2 - Bullying)

Until the district is at maximum capacity, the district shall accept any student whose interdistrict transfer application is based on being the victim of an act of bullying or a child of an active duty military parent/guardian. The district shall ensure that such students are admitted through an unbiased process that prohibits an inquiry into or evaluation or consideration of whether or not a student should be enrolled based on academic or athletic performance, physical condition, proficiency in English, family income, or any of the individual characteristics set forth in Education Code 220, including, but not limited to, race or ethnicity, gender, gender identity, gender expression, and immigration status. (Education Code 46600)

In addition the Superintendent or designee may approve an interdistrict attendance permit for a student for any of the following reasons when stipulated in the agreement:

1. To meet the child care needs of the student, only as long as he/she the student continues to use a child care provider within district boundaries.

(cf. 5148 - Child Care and Development)

2. To meet the student's special mental or physical health needs as certified by a physician, school psychologist, or other appropriate school personnel.

(cf. 6159 - Individualized Education Program)

- 3. When the student has a sibling attending school in the receiving district, to avoid splitting the family's attendance.
- 4. To allow the student to complete a school year when his/her the student's parents/guardians have moved out of the district during that year.
- 5. To allow the student to remain with a class graduating that year from an elementary, middle, or senior high school.
- 6. To allow a high school senior to attend the same school he/she the student attended as a junior, even if his/her the student's family moved out of the district during the junior year.
- 7. When the parent/guardian provides written evidence that the family will be moving into the district in the immediate future and would like the student to start the year in the district.
- 8. When the student will be living out of the district for one year or less.

Series 5000 Students AR 5117(f)

9. When recommended by the school attendance review board or by county child welfare, probation, or social service agency staff in documented cases of serious home or community problems which make it inadvisable for the student to attend the school of residence.

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(cf. 5113.1 - Chronic Absence and Truancy)
(cf. 5113.12 - District School Attendance Review Board)
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- 10. When there is valid interest in a particular educational program not offered in the district of residence.
- 11. To provide a change in school environment for reasons of personal and social adjustment.

The Superintendent or designee may deny initial requests for interdistrict attendance permits due to limited district resources, overcrowding of school facilities at the relevant grade level, or other considerations that are not arbitrary. However, once a student is admitted, the district may not deny <a href="https://hitth.com/hitth.

(cf. 0410 - Nondiscrimination in District Programs and Activities)

If the transfer request is for a school year that begins within 15 calendar days of the receipt of the request, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the parents/guardians of a student of the final decision within 30 calendar days of receiving the request. If the transfer request is for a school year that begins more than 15 calendar days after the receipt of the request, the parent/guardian shall be notified of the final decision as soon as possible, but no later than 14 calendar days after the commencement of instruction during that school year. (Education Code 46600.2)

If a student's interdistrict transfer request is denied, the Superintendent or designee shall, in writing, notify the parents/guardians of their right to appeal to the County Board of Education within 30 calendar days from the date of the final denial. (Education Code 46600.2)

(cf. 5145.6 - Parental Notifications)

All notices to parents/guardians regarding the district's decision on any request for interdistrict transfer shall conform to the translation requirements of Education Code 48985, and may be provided by regular mail, electronic format if the parent/guardian provides an email address, or by any other method normally used to communicate with parents/guardians in writing. (Education Code 46600.2)

Pending a decision by the two districts or an appeal by the County Board, the Superintendent or designee may provisionally admit a student who resides in another district for a period not to exceed two school months, provided the district is the district of proposed enrollment. If the

decision has not been rendered by the conclusion of two school months and the districts or County Board is still operating within the prescribed timelines, the student shall not be allowed to continue attending the district school to which the student was provisionally admitted. (Education Code 46603)

Students who are under consideration for expulsion or who have been expelled may not appeal interdistrict attendance denials or decisions while expulsion proceedings are pending or during the term of the expulsion. (Education Code 46601)

Existing interdistrict attendance permits shall not be rescinded for students entering grade 11 or 12 in the subsequent school year. (Education Code 46600)

Transfers Out of the District

A student whose parent/guardian is in active military duty shall not be prohibited from transferring out of the district, provided the school district of proposed enrollment approves the application for transfer. (Education Code 46600, 48307)

If the district is unable to provide an intradistrict transfer to a student who is a victim of an act of bullying, as defined in Education Code 46600, the district shall not prohibit the student from transferring out of the district if the district of proposed enrollment approves the application for transfer. (Education Code 46600)

The district may limit transfers out of the district to a school district of choice under any of the following circumstances: (Education Code 48307)

- 1. The number of student transfers out of the district to a school district of choice has reached the limit specified in Education Code 48307 based on the district's average daily attendance.
- 2. The County Superintendent of Schools has given the district a negative budget certification or has determined that the district will not meet the state's standards and criteria for fiscal stability in the subsequent fiscal year exclusively as a result of student transfers from this district to a school district of choice.

Bullying

The Governing Board recognizes the harmful effects of bullying on student well-being, student learning, and school attendance and desires to provide a safe school environment that protects students from physical and emotional harm. No individual or group shall, through physical, written, verbal, visual, or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any student or school personnel, or retaliate against them for filing a complaint or participating in the complaint resolution process.

If the parents/guardians of a student who has been the victim of an act of bullying requests a transfer for the student pursuant to Education Code 46600, the Superintendent or designee shall allow the transfer in accordance with law and district policy on intradistrict or interdistrict transfer, as applicable.

Bullying

Definitions

Examples of Prohibited Conduct

Bullying is an unwanted, aggressive behavior that involves a real or perceived imbalance of power between individuals with the intent to cause emotional or physical harm. Bullying can be physical, verbal, or social/relational and involvesmay involve a single severe act or repetition or potential repetition of a deliberate act. Bullying includes, but is not limited to, any act described in Education Code 48900(r).

Cyberbullying includes the electronic creation or transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account or assuming that person's online identity in order to damage that person's reputation.

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Examples of the types of conduct that may constitute bullying and are prohibited by the district include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Physical bullying: An act that inflicts harm upon a person's body or possessions, such as hitting, kicking, pinching, spitting, tripping, pushing, taking or breaking someone's possessions, or making cruel or rude hand gestures
- 2. Verbal bullying An act that includes saying or writing hurtful things, such as teasing, name-calling, inappropriate sexual comments, taunting, or threats to cause harm
- 3. Social/relational bullying: An act that harms a person's reputation or relationships, such as leaving a person out of an activity on purpose, influencing others not to be friends with someone, spreading rumors, or embarrassing someone in public
- 4. Cyberbullying: An act such as sending demeaning or hateful text messages or emails, sendingspreading rumors by email or by posting on social networking sites, or posting or sharing embarrassing photos, videos, web site, or fake profiles

Measures to Prevent Bullying

The Superintendent or designee shall implement measures to prevent bullying in district schools, including, but not limited to, the following:

1. Ensuring that each school establishes clear rules for student conduct and implements strategies to promote a positive, collaborative school climate

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- 2. Providing information to students, through student handbooks, district and school web sites and social media, and other age-appropriate means, information about district and school rules related to bullying, mechanisms available for reporting incidents or threats, and the consequences for engaging in bullying
- 3. Encouraging students to notify school staff when they are being bullied or when they suspect that another student is being bullied, and providing means by which students may report threats or incidents confidentially and anonymously
- 4. Conducting an assessment of bullying incidents at each school and, if necessary, increasing supervision and security in areas where bullying most often occurs, such as classrooms, playgrounds, hallways, restrooms, and cafeterias
- 5. Annually notifying district employees that, pursuant to Education Code 234.1, any school staff who witnesses an act of bullying against a student has a responsibility to immediately intervene to stop the incident when it is safe to do so

Staff Development

The Superintendent or designee shall annually make available to all certificated staff and to other employees who have regular interaction with students the California Department of Education (CDE) online training module on the dynamics of bullying and cyberbullying, which includes including the identification of bullying and cyberbullying and the implementation of strategies to address bullying, available annually to all certificated staff and to other employees who have regular interaction with students. (Education Code 32283.5)

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The Superintendent or designee shall provide training to teachers and other school staff to raise their awareness about the legal obligation of the district and its employees to prevent discrimination, harassment, intimidation, and bullying of district students. - 2. Discuss bullying prevention strategies with students, and teach students to recognize the behavior and characteristics of bullying perpetrators and victims
- 3. Identify the signs of bullying or harassing behavior
- 4. Take immediate corrective action when bullying is observed
- 5. Report incidents to the appropriate authorities, including law enforcement in instances of criminal behavior

Information and Resources

The Superintendent or designee shall post on the district's web site, in a prominent location and in a manner that is easily accessible to students and parents/guardians, information on bullying and harassment prevention which includes the following: (Education Code 234.6)

1. The district's policy on student suicide prevention, including a reference to the policy's age appropriateness for students in grades K-6

Student Instruction

As appropriate, the district shall provide students with instruction, in the classroom or other educational settings, that promotes social-emotional learning, effective communication and conflict resolution skills, character/values education development, respect for cultural and individual differences, self-esteem development, assertiveness skills, and appropriate online behavior.

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The district shall also educate students about the negative impact of bullying, discrimination, intimidation, and harassment based on actual or perceived immigration status, religious beliefs and customs, or any other individual bias or prejudice.

Students should be taught the difference between appropriate and inappropriate behaviors, how to advocate for themselves, how to help another student who is being bullied, and when to seek assistance from a trusted adult. As role models for students, staff shall be expected to demonstrate effective problem-solving and anger management skills.

To discourage cyberbullying, teachers may advise students to be cautious about sharing passwords, personal data, or private photos online and to consider the consequences of making negative comments about others online.

Reporting and Filing of Complaints

Any student, parent/guardian, or other individual who believes that a student has been subjected to bullying or who has witnessed bullying may report the incident to a teacher, the principal, a compliance officer, or any other available school employee.

When a report of bullying is submitted, the principal or a district compliance officer shall inform the student or parent/guardian of the right to file a formal written complaint in accordance with AR 1312.3 - Uniform Complaint Procedures. The student who is the alleged victim of the bullying shall be given an opportunity to describe the incident, identify witnesses who may have relevant information, and provide other evidence of bullying.

Within one business day of receiving such a report, a staff member shall notify the principal of the report, whether or not a uniform complaint is filed. In addition, any school employee who observes an incident of bullying involving a student shall, within one business day, report such observation to the principal or a district compliance officer, whether or not the alleged victim files a complaint.

Within two business days of receiving a report of bullying, the principal shall notify the district compliance officer identified in AR 1312.3.

When the circumstances involve cyberbullying, individuals with information about the activity shall be encouraged to save and print any electronic or digital messages that they feel constitute cyberbullying and to notify a teacher, the principal, or other employee so that the matter may be investigated. When a student uses a social networking site or service to bully or harass another student, the Superintendent or designee may file a request with the networking site or service to suspend the privileges of the student and to have the material removed.

Discipline/Corrective Actions

Corrective actions for a student who commits an act of bullying of any type may include counseling, behavioral intervention and education, and, if the behavior is severe or pervasive as defined in Education Code 48900, may include suspension or expulsion in accordance with district policies and regulations.

The Superintendent, principal, or principal's designee may refer a victim, witness, perpetrator, or other student affected by an act of bullying to a school counselor, school psychologist, social worker, child welfare attendance personnel, school nurse, or other school support service

personnel for case management, counseling, and/or participation in a restorative justice program as appropriate. (Education Code 48900.9)

Administering Medication and Monitoring Health Conditions

The Governing Board believes that regular school attendance is critical to student learning and that students who need to take medication prescribed or ordered for them by their authorized health care providers should have an opportunity be able to participate in the educational program.

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Any medication prescribed for a student with a disability who is qualified to receive services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act or Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 shall be administered in accordance with the student's individualized education program or Section 504 services plan, and doctor's orders as applicable.

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For the administration of medication to other students during school or school-related activities, the Superintendent or designee shall develop protocols which shall include options for allowing a parents/guardians to administer medication to his/hertheir child at school, designate other individuals to do so on his/hertheir behalf, and, with the child'sstudent's authorized health care provider's approval, request the district's permission for his/her child the student to self-administer a medication or self-monitor and/or self-test for a medical condition.— Such processes shall be implemented in a manner that preserves campus security, minimizes instructional interruptions, and promotes student safety and privacy.—

Because of the conflict between state and federal law regarding the legality of medicinal cannabis, the Board prohibits the administration of medicinal cannabis to students on school grounds by parents/guardians or school personnel.

The Superintendent or designee shall collaborate with city and county emergency responders, including local public health administrators, to design procedures or measures for addressing an emergency such as a public disaster or epidemic.

Administration of Medication by School Personnel

When allowed by law, medication prescribed to a student by an authorized health care provider may be administered by a school nurse or, when a school nurse or other medically licensed person is unavailable and the physician has authorized administration of medication by unlicensed personnel for a particular student, by other designated school personnel with appropriate training. School nurses and other designated school personnel shall administer medications to students in accordance with law, Board policy, administrative regulation, and, as applicable, the written statement provided by the student's parent/guardian and authorized health care provider. –Such personnel shall be afforded appropriate liability protection.

Administering Medication and Monitoring Health Conditions

Definitions

Authorized health care provider means an individual who is licensed by the State of California to prescribe or order medication, including, but not limited to, a physician or physician assistant. (Education Code 49423; 5 CCR 601)

Other designated school personnel means include any individual employed by the district, including a nonmedical school employee, who has volunteered or consented to administer the medication or otherwise assist the student and who may legally administer the medication to the student or assist the student in the administration of the medication. (5 CCR 601, 621)

Medication may include not only a substance dispensed in the United States by prescription, but also a substance that does not require a prescription, such as over-the-counter remedies, nutritional supplements, and herbal remedies. (5 CCR 601)

Epinephrine auto-injector means a disposable delivery device designed for the automatic injection of a premeasured dose of epinephrine into the human body to prevent or treat a life-threatening allergic reaction. (Education Code 49414)

Anaphylaxis means a potentially life-threatening hypersensitivity to a substance, which may result from an insect sting, food allergy, drug reaction, exercise, or other cause. Symptoms may include shortness of breath, wheezing, difficulty breathing, difficulty talking or swallowing, hives, itching, swelling, shock, or asthma. (Education Code 49414)

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(cf. 5141.23 - Asthma Management)
(cf. 5141.27 - Food Allergies/Special Dietary Needs)
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Opioid antagonist means naloxone hydrochloride or another drug approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration that, when administered, negates or neutralizes in whole or in part the pharmacological effects of an opioid in the body and that has been approved for the treatment of an opioid overdose. (Education Code 49414.3)

Notifications to Parents/Guardians

At the beginning of each school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians of the options available to students who need to take prescribed medication during the school day and the rights and responsibilities of parents/guardians regarding those options. (Education Code 4898049480)

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall inform the parents/guardians of any student on a continuing medication regimen for a nonepisodic condition of the following requirements: (Education Code 49480)

- 1. The parent/guardian is required to inform the school nurse or other designated employee of the medication being taken, the current dosage, and the name of the supervising physician.
- 2. With the parent/guardian's consent, the school nurse or other designated employee may communicate with the student's physician regarding the medication and its effects and may counsel school personnel regarding the possible effects of the medication on the student's physical, intellectual, and social behavior, as well as possible behavioral signs and symptoms of adverse side effects, omission, or overdose.

When a student requires medication during the school day in order to participate in the educational program, the Superintendent or designee shall, as appropriate, inform the student's parents/guardians that the student may qualify for services or accommodations pursuant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (20 USC 1400-1482) or Section 504 of the federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 USC 794).

(cf. 6164.4 - Identification and Evaluation of Individuals for Special Education) (cf. 6164.6 - Identification and Education Under Section 504)

Parent/Guardian Responsibilities

The responsibilities of the parent/guardian of any student who may need medication during the school day shall include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Providing Submitting the parent/guardian written statement and the authorized health care provider's written statement each school year as described in the sections "Parent/Guardian Statement" and "Health Care Provider Statement" below. The parent/guardian shall provide a new authorized health care provider's statement if the medication, dosage, frequency of administration, or reason for administration changes. (Education Code 49414.5, 49423, 49423.1; 5 CCR 600, 626)
- 2. If the student is on a continuing medication regimen for a nonepisodic condition, informing the school nurse or other designated certificated employee of the medication being taken, the current dosage, and the name of the supervising physician, and updating the information when needed. (Education Code 49480)

3. Providing medications in properly labeled, original containers along with the authorized health care provider's instructions. For prescribed or ordered medication, the container also shall bear the name and telephone number of the pharmacy, the student's identification, and the name and phone number of the authorized health care provider. (5 CCR 606)

Parent/Guardian Statement

When district employees are to administer medication to a student, the parent/guardian's written statement shall:

- 1. Identify the student
- 2. Grant permission for an authorized district representative to communicate directly with the student's authorized health care provider and pharmacist, as may be necessary, regarding the health care provider's written statement or any other questions that may arise with regard to the medication
- 3. Contain an acknowledgment that the parent/guardian understands how district employees will administer the medication or otherwise assist the student in its administration
- 4. Contain an acknowledgment that the parent/guardian understands his/herthe responsibilities to enable district employees to administer or otherwise assist the student-in the administration of medication, including, but not limited to, the parent/guardian's responsibility to provide a written statement from the authorized health care provider, to ensure that the medication is delivered to the school in a proper container by an individual legally authorized to be in possession of the medication, and to provide all necessary supplies and equipment
- 5. Contain an acknowledgment that the parent/guardian understands the right to terminate the consent for the administration of the medication or for otherwise assisting the student in the administration of medication, at any time

In addition to the requirements in items #1-5 above, if a parent/guardian has requested that his/her child the student be allowed to carry and self-administer prescription auto-injectable epinephrine or prescription inhaled asthma medication, the parent/guardian's written statement shall: (Education Code 49423, 49423.1)

- 1. Consent to the self-administration
- 2. Release the district and school personnel from civil liability if the student suffers an

adverse reaction as a result of self-administering the medication

In addition to the requirements in items #1-5 above, if a parent/guardian wishes to designate an individual who is not an employee of the district to administer medication to his/her child the student, the parent/guardian's written statement shall clearly identify the individual and shall state:

- 1. The individual's willingness to accept the designation
- 2. That the individual is permitted to be on the school site
- 3. Any limitations on the individual's authority

Health Care Provider Statement

When any district employee is to administer prescribed medication to a student, or when a student is to be allowed to carry and self-administer auto-injectable epinephrine, or prescribed medication during school hours, the authorized health care provider's written statement shall include:

- 1. Clear identification of the student (Education Code 49423, 49423.1; 5 CCR 602, 626)
- 2. The name of the medication (Education Code 49414.7, 49423, 49423.1; 5 CCR 602)
- 3. The method, amount, and time schedules by which the medication is to be taken (Education Code 49423, 49423.1; 5 CCR 602)
- 4. If a parent/guardian has requested that his/her child the student be allowed to self-administer medication, confirmation that the student is able to self-administer the medication (Education Code 49414.5, 49423, 49423.1; 5 CCR 602)
- 5. For medication that is to be administered by unlicensed personnel, confirmation by the student's health care provider that the medication may safely and appropriately be administered by unlicensed personnel (Education Code 49423, 49423.1; 5 CCR 602)
- 6. For medication that is to be administered on an as-needed basis, the specific symptoms that would necessitate administration of the medication, allowable frequency for administration, and indications for referral for medical evaluation
- 7. Possible side effects of the medication

8. Name, address, telephone number, and signature of the student's authorized health care provider

For self-administration of inhaled asthma medication, the district shall accept a written statement from a physician or surgeon contracted with a health plan licensed pursuant to Health and Safety Code 1351.2. Such written statement shall be in English and Spanish, and shall include the name and contact information for the physician or surgeon. (Education Code 49423.1)

District Responsibilities

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that any unlicensed school personnel authorized to administer medication to a student receives appropriate training from the school nurse or other qualified medical personnel.

The school nurse or other designated school personnel shall:

- 1. Administer or assist in administering medication in accordance with the authorized health care provider's written statement
- 2. Accept delivery of medications from parents/guardians and count and record them upon receipt Receipt. Control substances shall be counted weekly and recorded.
- 3. Maintain a list of students needing medication during the school day, including those authorized to self-administer medication, and note on the list the type of medication and the times and dosage to be administered
- 4. Maintain for each student a medication log which may:
- a. Specify the student's name, medication, dose, method of administration, time of administration during the regular school day, date(s) on which the student is required to take the medication, and the authorized health care provider's name and contact information
- b. Contain space for daily recording of the date, time, and amount of medication administered, and the signature and title of the individual administering the medication
- 5. Maintain for each student a medication record which may include the authorized health care provider's written statement, the parent/guardian's written statement, the medication log, and any other written documentation related to the administration of medication to the student

6. Ensure that student confidentiality is appropriately maintained

7. Coordinate and, as appropriate, ensure the administration of medication during field trips and other school-related activities

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- 8. Report to a student's parent/guardian and the site administrator any refusal by the student to take his/her the medication
- 9. Keep all medication to be administered by the district in a locked drawer or cabinet
- 10. As needed, communicate with a student's authorized health care provider and/or pharmacist regarding the medication and its effects
- 11. Counsel other designated school personnel regarding the possible effects of thea medication on a student's physical, intellectual, and social behavior, as well as possible behavioral signs and symptoms of adverse side effects, omission, or overdose
- 12. Ensure that any unused, discontinued, or outdated medication is returned to the student's parent/guardian at the end of the school year or, if the medication cannot be returned, dispose of it in accordance with state laws and local ordinances
- 13. In the event of a medical emergency requiring administration of medication, provide immediate medical assistance, directly observe the student following the administration of medication, contact the student's parent/guardian, and determine whether the student should return to class, rest in the school office, or receive further medical assistance
- 14. Report to the site administrator, the student's parent/guardian, and, if necessary, the student's authorized health care provider any instance when a medication is not administered properly, including administration of the wrong medication or failure to administer the medication in accordance with authorized health care provider's written statement

Emergency Epinephrine Auto-Injectors

The Superintendent or designee shall provide epinephrine auto-injectors to school nurses or other

employees who have volunteered to administer them in an emergency and have received training. The school nurse, or a volunteer employee when a school nurse or physician is unavailable, may administer an epinephrine auto-injector to provide emergency medical aid to any person suffering, or reasonably believed to be suffering, from potentially life-threatening symptoms of anaphylaxis at school or a school activity. (Education Code 49414)

At least once per school year, the Superintendent or designee shall distribute to all staff a notice requesting volunteers to be trained to administer an epinephrine auto-injector and describing the training that the volunteer will receive. (Education Code 49414)

(cf. 4112.9/4212.9/4312.9 - Employee Notifications)

The principal or designee at each school may designate one or more volunteers to receive initial and annual refresher training, which shall be provided by a school nurse or other qualified person designated by a physician and surgeon authorized pursuant to Education Code 49414 and shall be based on the standards developed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction (SPI). Written materials covering the required topics for training shall be retained by the school for reference. (Education Code 49414)

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A school nurse or other qualified supervisor of health, or a district administrator if the district does not have a qualified supervisor of health, shall obtain a prescription for epinephrine auto-injectors for each school from an authorized physician and surgeon. Such prescription may be filled by local or mail order pharmacies or epinephrine auto-injector manufacturers. –Elementary schools shall, at a minimum, be provided one adult (regular) and one junior epinephrine auto-injector. –Secondary schools shall be provided at least one adult (regular) epinephrine auto-injector, unless there are any students at the school who require a junior epinephrine auto-injector. (Education Code 49414)

If an epinephrine auto-injector is used, the school nurse or other qualified supervisor of health shall restock the epinephrine auto-injector as soon as reasonably possible, but no later than two weeks after it is used. –In addition, epinephrine auto-injectors shall be restocked before their expiration date. (Education Code 49414)

Information regarding defense and indemnification provided by the district for any and all civil liability for volunteers administering epinephrine auto-injectors shall be provided to each volunteer and retained in his/herthe.org/his/herthe.org/ personnel file. (Education Code 49414)

A school may accept gifts, grants, and donations from any source for the support of the school in carrying out the requirements of Education Code 49414, including, but not limited to, the acceptance of epinephrine auto-injectors from a manufacturer or wholesaler. (Education Code 49414)

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records regarding the acquisition and disposition of epinephrine auto-injectors for a period of three years from the date the records were created. (Business and Professions Code 4119.2)

Emergency Medication for Opioid Overdose

The district may elect to make emergency naloxone hydrochloride or another opioid antagonist available at schools for the purpose of providing emergency medical aid to persons suffering, or reasonably believed to be suffering, from an opioid overdose. In determining whether to make this medication available, the Superintendent or designee shall evaluate the emergency medical response time to the school and determine whether initiating emergency medical services is an acceptable alternative to providing an opioid antagonist and training personnel to administer the medication. (Education Code 49414.3)

When available at the school site, the school nurse shall provide emergency naloxone hydrochloride or another opioid antagonist for emergency medical aid to any person exhibiting potentially life-threatening symptoms of an opioid overdose at school or a school activity. Other designated personnel who have volunteered and have received training may administer such medication when a school nurse or physician is unavailable, and shall only administer the medication by nasal spray or auto-injector. (Education Code 49414.3)

At least once per school year, the Superintendent or designee shall distribute to all staff a notice requesting volunteers to be trained to administer naloxone hydrochloride or another opioid antagonist, describing the training that the volunteer will receive, and explaining the right of the volunteer to rescind his/herthe offer to volunteer at any time, including after receiving training. The notice shall also include a statement that no benefit will be granted to or withheld from any employee based on his/herthe offer to volunteer and that there will be no retaliation against any employee for rescinding his/herthe offer to volunteer. (Education Code 49414.3)

The principal or designee may designate one or more volunteer employees to receive initial and annual refresher training, based on standards adopted by the SPI, regarding the storage and emergency use of naloxone hydrochloride or another opioid antagonist. The training shall be provided at no cost to the employee, conducted during <a href="https://her-regular.org/his/her-regular.org/

provided by a school nurse or other qualified person designated by an authorizing physician and surgeon. Written materials provided during the training shall be retained at the school for reference. (Education Code 49414.3)

A school nurse, other qualified supervisor of health, or, if the district does not have a qualified supervisor of health, a district administrator shall obtain a prescription for naloxone hydrochloride or another opioid antagonist for each school from an authorized physician and surgeon. Such prescription may be filled by local or mail order pharmacies or manufacturers. (Education Code 49414.3)

If the medication is used, the school nurse, other qualified supervisor of health, or district administrator, as applicable, shall restock the medication as soon as reasonably possible, but no later than two weeks after it is used. In addition, the medication shall be restocked before its expiration date. (Education Code 49414.3)

Information regarding defense and indemnification provided by the district for any and all civil liability for volunteers administering naloxone hydrochloride or another opioid antagonist for emergency aid shall be provided to each volunteer and retained in his/her the employee's personnel file. (Education Code 49414.3)

A school may accept gifts, grants, and donations from any source for the support of the school in carrying out the requirements of Education Code 49414.3, including, but not limited to, the acceptance of the naloxone hydrochloride or another opioid antagonist from a manufacturer or wholesaler. (Education Code 49414.3)

The Superintendent or designee shall maintain records regarding the acquisition and disposition of naloxone hydrochloride or another opioid antagonist for a period of three years from the date the records were created. (Business and Professions Code 4119.8)

Meeting Conduct

Meeting Procedures

All Governing Board meetings shall begin on time and shall be guided by an agenda prepared in accordance with Board bylaws and posted and distributed in accordance with the Ralph M. Brown Act (open meeting requirements) and other applicable laws.

(cf. 9322 - Agenda/Meeting Materials)

The Board president shall conduct Board meetings in accordance with Board bylaws and procedures that enable the Board to efficiently consider issues and carry out the will of the majority.

(cf. 9121 - President)

The Board believes that late night meetings deter public participation, can affect the Board's decision-making ability, and can be a burden to staff. Regular Board meetings shall be adjourned at 10:30 p.m. unless extended to a specific time determined by a majority of the Board. The meeting shall be extended no more than once and subsequently may be adjourned to a later date.

(cf. 9320 - Meetings and Notices)

Quorum and Abstentions

The Board shall act by majority vote of all of the membership constituting the Board. (Education Code 35164)

(cf. 9323.2 - Actions by the Board)

The Board believes that when no conflict of interest requires abstention, its members have a duty to vote on issues before them. When a member abstains, his/herthe abstention shall not be counted for purposes of determining whether a majority of the membership of the Board has taken action.

Public Participation

Members of the public are encouraged to attend Board meetings and to address the Board

concerning any item on the agenda or within the Board's jurisdiction. So as not to inhibit public participation, persons attending Board meetings shall not be requested to sign in, complete a questionnaire, or otherwise provide their name or other information as a condition of attending the meeting.

In order to conduct district business in an orderly and efficient manner, the Board requires that public presentations to the Board comply with the following procedures:

- 1. The Board shall give members of the public an opportunity to address the Board on any item of interest to the public that is within the subject matter jurisdiction of the Board, either before or during the Board's consideration of the item. (Education Code 35145.5; Government Code 54954.3)
- 2. At a time so designated on the agenda at a regular meeting, members of the public may bring before the Board matters that are not listed on the agenda. The Board shall take no action or discussion on any item not appearing on the posted agenda, except as authorized by law. (Education Code 35145.5; Government Code 54954.2)
- 3. Without taking action, Board members or district staff members may briefly respond to statements made or questions posed by the public about items not appearing on the agenda. Additionally, on their own initiative or in response to questions posed by the public, a Board members or staff membermembers may ask a question for clarification, make a brief announcement, or make a brief report on his/hertheir own activities. (Government Code 54954.2)

Furthermore, the Board or a Board member may provide a reference to staff or other resources for factual information, ask staff to report back to the Board at a subsequent meeting concerning any matter, or take action directing staff to place a matter of business on a future agenda. (Government Code 54954.2)

4. The Board need not allow the public to speak on any item that has already been considered by a committee composed exclusively of Board members at a public meeting where the public had the opportunity to address the committee on that item. However, if the Board determines that the item has been substantially changed since the committee heard the item, the Board shall provide an opportunity for the public to speak. (Government Code 54954.3)

5. A person wishing to be heard by the Board shall first be recognized by the president and shall then proceed to comment as briefly as the subject permits.

In general, individual speakers shallwill be allowed three minutes to address the Board on each agenda or nonagenda item. The, and the Board shallwill limit the total time for public input on each item to 20 minutes. With Board consent, However, in exceptional circumstances when necessary to ensure full opportunity for public input, the Board president may increase or decrease the, with Board consent, adjust the amount of time allowed for public presentation, depending on the topic and the number of persons wishing to be heard, input and/or the time allotted for each speaker. Any such adjustment shall be done equitably so as to allow a diversity of viewpoints. The president may take a poll of speakers for or against a particular issue and may also ask members of the public with the same viewpoint to select a few individuals to address the Board on behalf of that additional persons speak only if they have something new to addviewpoint.

In order to ensure that non-English speakers receive the same opportunity to directly address the Board, any member of the public who utilizes a translator shall be provided at least twice the allotted time to address the Board, unless simultaneous translation equipment is used to allow the Board to hear the translated public testimony simultaneously. (Government Code 54954.3)

- 6. The Board president may rule on the appropriateness of a topic, subject to the following conditions:
- a. If the topic would be more suitably addressed at a later time, the Board president may indicate the time and place when it should be presented.
- b. The Board shall not prohibit public criticism of its policies, procedures, programs, services, acts, or omissions. (Government Code 54954.3)
- c. The Board shall not prohibit public criticism of district employees. However, whenever a member of the public initiates specific complaints or charges against an individual employee, the Board president shall inform the complainant of the appropriate complaint procedure.

7. The Board president shall not permit any disturbance or willful interruption of Board meetings. Persistent disruption by an individual or group or any conduct or statements

that threaten the safety of any person(s) at the meeting shall be grounds for the president to terminate the privilege of addressing the Board.

The Board may remove disruptive individuals and order the room cleared if necessary.— In this case, members of the media not participating in the disturbance shall be allowed to remain, and individuals not participating in such disturbances may be allowed to remain at the discretion of the Board. When the room is ordered cleared due to a disturbance, further Board proceedings shall concern only matters appearing on the agenda. (Government Code 54957.9)

When such disruptive conduct occurs, the Superintendent or designee shall contact local law enforcement as necessary.

Recording by the Public

Members of the public may record an open Board meeting using an audio or video recorder, still or motion picture camera, cell phone, or other device, provided that the noise, illumination, or obstruction of view does not persistently disrupt the meeting. The Superintendent or designee may designate locations from which members of the public may make such recordings without causing a distraction.

(cf. 9324 - Board Minutes and Recordings)

If the Board finds that noise, illumination, or obstruction of view related to these activities would persistently disrupt the proceedings, these activities shall be discontinued or restricted as determined by the Board. (Government Code 54953.5, 54953.6)

ISSUE: Shall the Board receive and review the status report on District enrollment and

attendance through Month 6 of the 2019-20 school year?

BACKGROUND: As student enrollment and attendance plays a key role in determining General
